We are arranging to climax our educational program looking to our Brotherhood Day with a big massmeeting here on the evening of Bebruary 22nd. Beginning immediately after the first of January, the four radio stations of the city will each give weekly a broadcast on some aspect of the problem of living together in a democracy. In addition to that, we are holding two contests: an essay contest in the universities and colleges of the state, and a poster contest in the high schools of the state, for the best theme and poster on some aspect of this subject, to be climaxed - as I say - by this massmeeting. My dear Rabbi Silver:

I am writing to you now at the suggestion of Rabbi Lazaron and Dr. 2.M.T.Finney in the interests of the Baltimore group of the National Conference of Jews and Christians. Our group is planning for a city-wide observance of Brotherhood Day for February 22, 1925, with a big mass meeting in the largest hall we can secure for this purpose. 

You may perchance recall that I am the Baltimore Zionist with whom you had an exchange of correspondence about a year ago in connection with a United Palestine Appeal subsidy for the Baltimore Zionist District. Your last letter put a very effective quistus on me and I have not bothered you since. However, your advice has not been wasted and we are attempting to raise our necessary operating fund in some of the ways you suggested. No one knows better than you, of course, the need for enlarged Zionist funds because of the very extended work that has been undertaken in the last year, not only by the Zionist Organization of America, but also by your own organization.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

It does not seem likely that you will remember the undersigned, Leon M. Adler, from your relatively casual contact with him in 1948 and 1949 when he served as Assistant to Arthur Lourie at the Consulate General of Israel in New York. It seems even less likely that you will remember, if ever you knew, that the undersigned was then and is now a Reform rabbi.

As you can imagine, this letter is not being written merely to remind you of a past and relatively casual contact nor to provide you with a piece of gratuitous information concerning my profession, but with a specific purpose in mind. Before turning to that purpose, however, I should like, with your indulgence, to say something about the nature of and the reason for my past rabbinical service, which I do, not to provide you with further gratuitous information about myself, but to supply the proper framework for the immediate purpose of this letter and to indicate to you, if only by indirection, why you have been singled out especially for this request.

Commencing with my graduation in 1944 from the Jewish Institute of Religion and, for what seemed to me, the most urgent and compelling of reasons, flowing from the tragic nature of Jewish and world events during the last two decades, I had "granted" myself an "extended leave of absence" from the "normal" duties of a rabbi and had engaged for a period of almost ten years in various corollary activities (a detailed record of which is attached to this letter), which I felt were more appropriate to the times and more in keeping with what I conceived to be the nature and spirit of my rabbinical responsibilities.

It was not until last year that I felt morally free to resume the career for which I had been trained and in which I wished to spend my professional life. After a certain amount of hesitancy, born of my lack of direct experience with congregations, I decided that the acceptance of a pulpit would be the happiest means of fulfilling my rabbinical aspirations. Because of my hesitancy I chose the congregation that I should serve very carefully and postponed any definite and final commitment in my own mind until a year of mutually happy association would slapse. That year is now over, and I am if eased to be able to say that I am now firm in my desire to devote the years of my rabbinate to congregational service and that I wish to continue for as long a time as possible my association with my present congregation, which I may say, parenthetically has been kind enough to offer me a three year contract, an offer which I have accepted.

In view of what has been stated above, I now feel free to give expression to a long cherished hope (which brings me to the point of this letter) that you honor me by consenting to install me as rabbi of my congregation.

I make this request of you and not of another, partly, it is true, because of the identity of our interest in, if not of our contribution to, the cause of Zionism, a cause which I have long cherished and to which I have devoted most of my professional life.

But were this to have been my sole motivation, it would not have proved sufficient. I make this request to you primarily because of my respect and regard for you as a rabbi, for it is as rabbi and not as Zionist leader that you will, if you consent to do so, install me.

And it is as rabbi to rabbi that I extend to you this invitation, which accords to my mind as great an honor as one rabbi can accord another, and affords, by its acceptance, the opportunity of performing as great a service as one rabbi can perform for another.

Because of my keen awareness of the demands upon your time, I should like to extend to you the greatest latitude in the choice of a date. I shall merely indicate my own preference in this matter, leaving it for you to make the final decision. We would prefer the installation to take place at a Sabbath Eve service on September tenth, which date we have chosen because we believe that the appearance in Washington before the High Holidays of a rabbi of your national stature will appreciably increase the number of non-affiliated who will be stimulated by your presence to identify themselves with a congregation of their own choosing. Should the above date not be convenient because of its falling in the pre-holiday season, a Friday evening, preferably, or any other evening in the

Fall after Succoth would be our next choice. Should none of these alternative be suitable, please advise us of the time that would be convenient for you.

Inasmuch as we should like to give your coming to Washington the widest possible publicity, I should appreciate an answer to this letter at your earliest convenience.

May I mention, in closing, that above and beyond any other consideration previously mentioned, your presence in Washington can be of inestimable value to the cause of Reform Judaism in this city, which, for many reasons, has until very recently suffered misunderstanding and neglect.

HISTORY OF TEMPLE EMANUEL

Temple Emanuel, of Montgomery County(Maryland) was founded less than two years ago, in August 1952, by a few like-minded families, who felt the need of a Reform congregation in this suburban area of Washington, DD. C. Until this time, Montgomery County and its adjoining county, Prince Georges, while the home of seven or eight Jewish congregations, had not as yet seen the establishment of its first Reform congregation. Inasmuch as Montgomery County has been reported to be (excepting Los Angeles County) the fastest growing county in the United States and inasmuch as the Jewish segment of its rapidly increasing population has been variously estimated as from three to five thousand families, the urgent need for the establishment of a Reform Jewish congregation becomes readily apparent. It might be added, as of more than passing interest, that Montgomery County contains within its borders the "city" of Silver Spring, second in population only to Baltimore in the state of Maryland, and that it is also the site of the finest suburban residential areas of Washington, D. C. (Bethesda, Chevy-Chase, etc.)

The factors mentioned above account, in part for the steady growth of Temple Emanuel, which, in spite of its late start, already numbers approximately two hundred families. Its past rate of growth, the present rapid increase in the county's population, the esteem in which Temple Emanuel is already held because of the quality of its activities and the caliber of its membership assure it a continued and probably increased rate of growth in the coming years. Its potential for growth, as can be seen from the facts mentioned above, is almost unlimited.

The congregation is, at this time, actively engaged in searching for a suitable site to build a home. Adding urgency to the search is the fact that the public schools in the area, which formerly provided more than adequate quarters for our Religious School (as well as for Sabbath Servies) are becoming less and less available for such purposes. When it is considered that last year's enrollment in the Religious School was two hundred and seventy-five children and that this year's enrollment, even with the increase in membership no greater than that of last year, will be a minimum of four hundred and twenty-five children, the pressing need for suitable quarters of our own can be well understood. The Religious School space requirements are only the most dramatic highlight of similar requirements that are felt for High Holidays, Sabbath and Festival services, Sisterhood, Men's Club and Youth Group's meetings, Adult Education sessions, social events, etc. The Temple program of religious, education and social activities (of which the above mentioned listing represents merely a small part) is a full,

varied one, participated in by a relatively large proportion of the Temple membership, which fact is a cause for gratification at the effectiveness of the Temple program but one which also serves to further dramatize the need of a permanent home.

One last word is in order about the membership of the Temple, the most important factor in determining the quality of the congregation. The average age of the membership is somewhere between thirty-five and forty for the men and thirty and thirty-five for the women. There is a very high proportion of college graduates, both among the men and women. It is estimated very roughly that above fifty per-cent of the members are employed by the government in the highest grades of the permanent Divil Service. The remaining fifty per-cent of the membership is composed of professionals with non-governmental agencies or selfemployed and of men engaged in one or another phase of the world of commerce. The average number of children per family (a rising average) is about two plus. The congregation is both intellectual and intelligent, critical and discriminating, yet perceptive and receptive, which qualities afford it the opportunity of paralelling its growth in the area of membership and physical factors with an equally effective and far more important growth in the realms of the mind and spirit, the areas of true and final significance in the life of a religious institution.



In discussing the Near East situation a few facts should be kept clearly in mind:

- (1) Egypth purchase of arms from the Soviet Block is clearly as outlined, the fact which was apparent to most everyone, that the Araby States are acquiring arms not to defend themselves against Russia but to prepare a war upon Israel.

 Those in our State Department who have been hoping to hold the allegiance of the Arab States to the West by providing them with arms, are building up a military front, not against Russia, but against Israel.
- (2) The Arab States know that Israel is not threatening them. Time and again Israel has publicly and officially offered to negotiate a peace settlement and to discuss all outstanding issues. These offers have been disregarded and contemptuously brushed aside.
- (3) The Arab States will not recognize the existence of the State of Israel, and their leaders have time and again publicly announced their intention to wipe Israel off the map.
- (h) Allied diplomacy has at no time since the establishment of the State of Israel, seven years ago, been of the kind as to persuade the Arab States that well anything is to be gained by them in prolonging the boycotts, the blockade and the cold war against Israel. The extensive economic and political aid which was given to one or the other of the enteral Arab States by our Government and by the other members of the allied nations was never made conditional upon the Arab agreeing to peace negotiations with Israel and a package settlement of the outstanding issues.
- (5) The fri-partite agreement of 1950 which was to have insured tranquility on the Israel-Arab borders, pending a permanent peace settlement, has certainly failed of its objectives. It has insured neither tranquility new has it a verted

a desperate and coetly arms race. The arms race is on! And the allied nations, we as well as the Soviet Block, have by their sale of arms, been encouraging this armament race.

- (6) The State of Israel has been compelled to armaitself because immediately upon its establishment it was attacked by the armies of neighboring Arab States in a war which they declared warm Israel in defiance of United Nations. In this war they were defeated, but they have not abandoned their intention to launch another war at the first opportunity to accomplish what they failed to accomplish in their first onslaught. This is their clearly avowed intention. Until these states have made peace with Israel and have abandoned their intention of exterminating it, or until such time as the allied nations give Israel the assurance of a Calkellake. military pact, the young State must, as best as it can, look to its own defenses. des water Israel desires no arms race. It wishes to devote every available dollar to the up-building of its economic life -- to the care of the tens of thousands who have come to it from all parts of the world, and in more recent years from Arab countries where their lives have become insecure. It has no expansionist ambitions and it covets nothing which its Arab neighbors possess. It needs peace desperately, and security.
- (7) It will not purchase peace at the price of reducing its small territory of 8,000 square miles in order to augment the 1,700,000 square miles of the territory of its Arab neighbors. The Arab States require no additional territory but the development and cultivation of what they have. The State of Israel, in its present boundaries, is already less than one-fourth of what was originally intended for the Jewish National home.
- (8) Creat Britain's offer of mediation on the basis of territorial concessions by Israel is motivated, not by the economic needs of the Arab States or by any moral questions, but by the desire of Great Britain to insure for itself a corridor through the Negev to Jordan in the Middle East. Egypts desire for the Negev, to which it has absolutely no claim is motivated by its desire to have a common land

frontier with other Arab States, to deny Israel an outlet to the Red Sea, and to gain prestige and Kudos for Egypt in the Arab world.

(9) Israel wants no war - and no preventative war. It has not employed its armed forces, which according to the testimony of the Arabs have been superior to theirs, in launching any war against any of them. The Arab States can have peace with Israel any time they want it. They need not spend, and they should not be encouraged to spend, their limited resources, which anculd be devoted to solve their desperate problems of wide spread poverty, disease and ignorance among their peoples. The policy to purchase their loyalty to the Neet by supplying them with arms has clearly none bankrupt. An attempt to compete with Russia on the basis of grants - sale of arms - in that part of the world will also end in disaster. It will simply make the Arab leaders more intransigent, more ruthless and demanding. They will play off the East against the West to the utter confusion of both exercise.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF TEMFLE EMANUEL LOCATED IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY, MARYLAND (SUBURBAN WASHINGTON, D.C.)

We are four years old, entering our fifth year, with roughly four hundred member families. We expect by next year, with our building's first phase up, to increase to five hundred-plus, stabilizing at that point on a permanent basis (at least this is present thinking on the subject). Our religious school has approximately six hundred seventy five children in it, the largest of any synagogue in all of metropolitan Washington and, as informally reported by the American Association of Jewish Education survey team, the best in this area. In addition, fifty children, all of whom are in attendance in the religious school on Sunday, come twice a week to Hebrew classes in preparation for Bar or Bas Mitzvah. Of significance is the fact that our first post-Confirmation class was organized this year on a voluntary basis and, with one exception, every single member of the last three Confirmation classes registered for the course.

Our adult education program this semester has ninety people registered for three courses, and in the spring, when we expect to offer twice as many courses, we expect about one hundred fifty registrants. In addition we offer a single lecture series on Sunday mornings.

We have two youth groups, a NFTY group about thirty-five strong with a professional leader, and a junior high group of roughly one hundred children with a professional leader budgeted and presently being sought.

Attendance at services is quite good, running at about an average of one hundred for non-special occasions and to two hundred and more for special occasions like holidays, Bar Mitzvahs, Sisterhood service, etc. When one considers that our group is young (see school attendance), engaged in other community activities, and with only a limited budget for baby-sitters and many demands on same, the attendance is even more encouraging.

We are just finishing a fund-raising campaign conducted by our own members which has raised, so far, over sixty thousand dollars (added to the one hundred ten thousand dollars raised last year), a campaign conducted among people almost none of whom had been in the Temple more than a year, and most of whom just two or three months.

These are just a few examples of our program. All this, as just stated, without a building.

It was a great pleasure to have heard you on Monday. Your address made a profound impression and I have heard ever so many appreciative comments about it.

I think that you might be interested in some background about the meeting. I received an invitation to be present as a guest last October. I accepted with pleasure. Subsequently, I learned that there was a clause in the constitution of the Advertising Club that restricted the membership to "white Males". I discussed this with several members of the Advertising Club and with Eabbis Shusterman and Shaw. We agreed that unless the discriminatory clause in the constitution was withdrawn, that we would not attend the meeting and that we would inform you of our refusal to be present and of the attendant circumstances. You will be happy to learn that in December by unanimous vote the restricted clause was eliminated from the constitution. While as yet, to my knowledge, no Negroes have been admitted to membership, I am sure that this will take place in the very near future.

While none of us locally could speak for you, the mere thought that you would decline to attend was a major factor, I am sure, in the decision to eliminate the discriminatory procedure.

I thought that you would be pleased to know about this.
