My dear Rabbi Silver:

Rev. David R. Williams of the North Church Forum in Cleveland has spoken of you a number of times to Mr. Coleman of the Ford Hall Forum in Boston, and has suggested that sometime we must surely have you on our program.

Your name has been in our minds for the past three or four months as one of our first choices for the coming season, and I am writing thus early in the hope that you can find a Sunday for us among the many that are open on our schedule.

Ford Hall is not in position to pay more than a flat \$50 per speaker, from which is deducted our own 20% commission, but it is very often possible for us to arrange one or two connecting engagements, usually on Sunday afternoon and the Monday evening immediately following, and we can count upon \$50 to \$75 for each of these. Thus the week-end would amply cover your traveling expenses and net you a moderate fee in addition, if we had good luck in arranging a group of engagements.

Would you be willing to set aside a Sunday from the following dates and let us try to work up such a grouping?

The Ford Hall audience is one I am sure you would enjoy addressing. It is made up largely of young Jews of more or less radical tendency, keen, intelligent, thoroughly alive in the question period following the address. The hall holds an audience of one thousand to twelve hundred and is packed to overflowing practically every Sunday.

December 17, 31	February 4, 11, 25	April 1 (Easter)

Dates previous to March would be better for us from the point of view of securing connecting engagements.

OF BAPTIST PARENTAGE

The Ford Hall Forum is the child of the Boston Baptist Social Union, and it has never left the home in which it was born. Daniel Sharp Ford, in his will, urged the Social Union to use their new building as a common meeting-ground with the working men and women of Boston. For nearly twenty years Mr. George W. Coleman has been chairman of the committee of the Social Union which spends the income from the Ford bequests. He persuaded his committee to venture forth with this new type of meeting, and ever since has been the director and chairman. The Social Union still grants the Forum the free use of the halls in the Ford Building, but for the last seven years the running expenses have been met by the collections taken at the meetings and by the contributions of friends, including many members of the Social Union. Mr. Coleman and a host of forum folks, besides a number of members of the Social Union (notably Mr. J. Arthur Sparrow and Mr. James P. Roberts), have given their time and energy and money to the work of the forum and they feel that it has been a privilege to do so.

ABLE AND DEVOTED SECRETARIES

From the beginning, Mr. Coleman has had the assistance of able and devoted secretaries. Miss Mary Caroline Crawford's initiative and energy as Executive Secretary for thirteen years made a large contribution to the success of the meetings. Her ingenuity and enterprise were vital factors in the growth and development of the movement. Miss Alice H. Samson, who became Executive Secretary immediately following the 1920-1921 season, has been Mr. Coleman's private secretary for many years. She did all the clerical work in connection with the first season and ever since has been greatly devoted to the forum. No one, not even Mr. Coleman himself, has shown greater devotion or made more sacrifices than has Miss Samson.

FIFTEEN CONTINUOUS SEASONS

Even the stress of the war did not blot out the forum meetings, although the seasons at that time had to be shortened. Coal and money were hard to get.

The Ford Hall programs for fifteen seasons comprise 326 Sunday evening meetings. During this period 244 different speakers have given their message on the Ford Hall platform. Three quarters of all these speakers have appeared on the Ford Hall platform but once; only 12 per cent of the entire number have made a second appearance; but 9 of the 244 have been presented three times; only 6 four times; 2 five times; 3 six times; and 2 seven times. Charles Zueblin holds the record of having spoken to the Ford Hall Forum audience thirteen times.

Of our total number of speakers, 33 (about 14 per cent) have been women. Nearly 28 per cent (or 66 exactly) of the speakers have been ministers, priests or rabbis. Eight medical doctors have addressed the crowd, and 22 college professors. Among the remaining group of 115 are found business men, lawyers, judges, poets, social workers, publicists, representatives of labor, journalists, authors, lecturers and educators. Almost never have we had men in high political office.

The late Henry Abrahams, long Secretary of the Boston Central Labor Union and recently its President, was one of the speakers on the opening night, fifteen years ago, and a member of the Committee of Citizens from the beginning.

OUR AUDIENCE

A fresh census of the Ford Hall Forum audience, based on the return of 674 blanks, reveals these interesting facts. Sixty-one per cent of the audience are regular attendants. Fifty-eight per cent are men. Twenty-five per cent of the audience are under 30 years of age; 44 per cent between 30 and 50 years of age; and 31 per cent above 50 years of age. Just one third of the audience are foreign born, while 61 per cent are of foreign parentage. One hundred and thirty-four different occupations were designated on the census blanks and 37 varieties of religious faith, with only 7 per cent indicating an absence of any faith. Fifty-eight per cent lean toward Protestantism, 22 per cent are Jews, and 6 per cent acknowledge Catholic affiliation. Only 2 per cent confess to Agnosticism or Atheism. In indicating the speakers that are best liked, John Haynes Holmes leads the list overwhelmingly, and Margaret Slattery comes second. Even speakers who have not appeared on our platform for many years received generous marks of preference.

The space here is insufficient for the presentation of other interesting details which the census blanks revealed.

SPREADS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY

From the very first, the Ford Hall Sunday evening meetings attracted wide attention. They very soon became the inspiration and model for other forums, first throughout New England and later all over the country. The necessity for providing forum literature, supplying speakers and gathering forum leaders together for fellowship soon resulted in the formation of the Open Forum National Council. The first meetings were at Sagamore Beach in connection with Mr. Coleman's Sociological Conference. Subsequently, annual gatherings of considerable import were held in Boston, Buffalo, Chicago and New York City.

SPEAKERS' BUREAU REQUIRED

The Open Forum Speakers' Bureau, initiated and fathered by Dr. Harold Marshall, the founder of the Melrose forum, and managed for years with great devotion and self-sacrifice by Miss Mabel B. Ury (now Mrs. F. Morton Leonard), furnishes speakers to forum platforms in twenty-one different states. The offices of the Open Forum National Council, the Speakers' Bureau and the Ford Hall Forum are all in the Little Building, Boston, Rooms 1243 and 1244. The Bureau is managed by Miss Mildred C. Smith, and the National Council work is handled by Miss Alice H. Samson.

A FORUM MISSIONARY

Mr. Coleman has been the President of the National Council from the beginning and has traveled over 40,000 miles in a single year, presenting the forum message in every section of this country and Canada. In connection with war work he planted forum seed in England, speaking in the City Temple, London, and in Old Boston, Lincolnshire.

During the last four years Mr. Coleman has conducted at the mother Chautauqua, New York, under the auspices of the National Council and in co-operation with the Chautauqua Institution, a Summer School of Open Forum Methods, with classes twice a day and great evening forums with three or four thousand in attendance.

It has made the forum idea acceptable, very largely, however, because of the wisdom and the breadth and the vision of its leader. I wish every forum in the land were as wisely and as sanely conducted as is the Ford Hall Forum. It is hospitable to all men and to all views, but supremely hospitable to truth. Therein lies its strength and its distinction."

"As a rabbi, I trust I may be permitted to make a reference to the circumstance that in the Hebrew tongue the number fifteen is expressed by two Hebrew letters

which together constitute the name of God. So this is your fiftieth year, and it is inevitable that I should ask that the blessing of God be with the Ford Hall Forum in the years that are to come. An instrument of mighty service has been fashioned for you by that fine American, George Coleman. Let it be well and worthily used, not to serve a faction nor to further partisan views, but in the interest of truth and truth alone, the truth which not alone makes men free but the pursuit of which emancipates the spirit of men.

God be with you in the years that are to come and make the Ford Hall Forum another Faneuil Hall for Boston and all America.

"With warmest greetings to all the blessed company of sane cranks, who together make up the constituency of the Ford Hall Forum, and my affectionate greetings to dear George, whom you must not let do it alone."

Dear Rabbi Silver:

About two years ago there was a very serious discussion in our community as to the advisability of raising several million dollars for a proposed new Jewish Hospital.

I need not tell you of the arguments pro and con when I tell you that the portion of the community opposed to a Jewish Hospital are the same individuals who, by and large, have been opposed to things Jewish, Zionism and others of kindred nature.

The situation was so acute at that time that it was only by herculean efforts that we prevented an irremediable break in the community. In that first campaign, the portion of the Jewish community already convinced of the need of a hospital, raised one million dollars. We prevented a permanent rupture in the community about a year after this first attempt, when plans were effected whereby the entire community might rightly feel that this was a communal project. We promised to attempt to raise the balance necessary -- about a million dollars. It is now

up to some of us, who, although of the older Jewish settlers, are profoundly interested in the Jewish aspect of Jewish communal affairs to attempt to secure an additional million. It is a big task because there are many of the older Jews who are still uninterested, either emotionally or financially. That small group who are associated with me in this enterprise need your help, and we hope you can assist us by coming to speak at the banquet which will open our campaign on Sunday, March 7th.

We would not urge you to come unless we felt that only you could help us bring about the result that all of us want. That is, the price that men who have the capacity to serve and to achieve always have to pay. Men hereabouts still talk of your marvelous address a few years ago at the Convention of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. A group of us were discussing the matter a few days ago and not one could think of anyone who could compare with your attraction for this purpose.

We know that you serve frequently and at great sacrifice, and yet we have no hesitancy in asking you to do this because the results you will surely achieve are commensurate with the effort involved in your leaving your community to come here. After all, there is more than a hospital involved in this present campaign. Communal peace, upon which all things Jewish, in their Jewish aspect, national and international, depend, rests upon the success of the present effort.

May we not, therefore, in view of the situation count upon your service at this time. I need not add that all of us will feel greatly


