

Forum Who's Who

- BURTON KENDALL WHEELER—United States Senator from Montana, was born at Hudson, Mass., February 27, 1842. Elected to the United States Senate in 1922. No American audience need be told very nuch about Senator Wheeler—of him it can truly be said that he is always on guard proceeding the interests of all the people, not only of the great State of Montana but of our entire country. The only mistake he ever made, in our opinion, was moving from Massachusetts to Montana. The road to the White House, Senator, is more direct from the State in which you were born than from the State of your adoption—but, then, detours are often necessary.
- WALTER DREY—Vice-president and general manager of Forbes Magazine, a conservative business man who writes good poetry. An unusual topic is "The Social Value of Hypocrisy." Why do you tell your friend her new hat is becoming when you think she looks like a fright in it? Why do you ask your guest to come again when you've been bored almost to distraction? Why do you tell your employer he's a fine fellow when all the time you're thinking he ought to be hung, at least? Why do some people come to the Ford Hall Forum 'heresy llunting' instead of with an open mind? Mr. Drey has been gathering material and preparing just for this address for more than a year. Take our word for it—and there is no hypocrisy about it either—you are going to hear the most unusual talk you have even heard in your life.
- SCOTT NEARING—Was born in Morris Run, Pa. Received the degree Batchelor of Science in Economics, Wharton School, in University of Pennsylvania 1905; and Doctor of Philosophy there in 1909. Dr. Rearing's lecture work in the field of economics and sociology has been carried on before widely differing groups of people from coast to coast and from Montreal to Mexico City. Whether you agree with him or not, and most people do not, he shakes you out of your complacency and makes you think. He acts as a mental tonic, and this being the first day of spring, we especially urge you to invite some of your sulphur and molasses taking friends to hear our speaker for this evening. The change may do some good.
- JULIUS HOCHMAN—Graduate of Brookwood Labor College, vice-president, International Ladies' Garment Workers Union, went to work at the age of cleven. He made labor history in 1923 when he successfully conducted a dressmakers' strike in New York City, and was the first man to establish a five day, 40 hour week in the American labor movement. He has led the fight to keep the Communists from gaining control of the Unions he represents and says that they hate him more than they hate any capitalist. You will hear a tale of an industrial struggle that will amaze you; not between Capital and Labor but between two groups within the same labor organization. This will be an especially good night to park your prejudices on the outside.
- ABBA HILLEL SILVER, D.D.—Rabbi, The Temple in Cleveland since 1977; was born in 1893. One of the ablest orators in America and one of our most progressive thinkers, we are fortunate, indeed, that he is to address us at this time on so pertinent a subject as "Democracy at the Cross-Eoads." We call him the "Friend of Ford Hail" and he well deserves the title, because it is only his friendship for our Forum that makes him willing to make the long trip from Cleveland just to address us. We appreciate much this honor that you have conferred on us, Rabbi Silver, in accepting our invitation and trust we may continue to merit your friendship and interest just as we know you will continue to merit that of the Ford Hall Forum.
- ROBERT EMMONS ROGERS—Professor of English, M. II. T., was graduated from Harvard in 1909, A.B. and A.M., and was one of Professor G. P. Baker's early students in Drama. He taught at Williams College, worked for a time in the theatre with Charles Frohman and Maude Adams, and was special writer on the Brooklyn Engle. Since 1913 he has been in the English Department of the Institute of Technology, specializing in modern American, English and European Literature and the Drama. For a year he gave courses in literature at the Boston Labor Union College, and for the past five years has given numbers of courses in Boston and neighboring cities for the state University Extension. This is something new for our audience—a sort of forum lecture recital. We hope you like the experiment. If you do, you can have more of hem another season.
- SHERWOOD EDDY—LL.D., Y. M. C. A. worker and Clergyman. Appointed Secretary for Asia, Y. M. C. A. work of the International Commission, D11, working among students of Japan, Korea, China, India, the Near East and Russia. With a group of one hundred speakers and writers, for a part of each year, he has been making a study of the political, industrial and religious situations in twelve of the principal countries of Europe. Mr. Eddy and his party have thus become the unofficial Ambassadors of American culture to these foreign lands, who were beginning to think that our only interests were commercial. We wanted a speaker and topic for this, our closing night of the season that was in keeping with the day and the o-casion—"Dare We Be Christian" is the topic hat fits the day and Sherwood Eddy, because he practises what he preaches, is the speaker who fits the occasion.

My dear Rabbi Silver:-I was greatly disappointed when I learned from your telegram that you could not come to our Jewish Education Week which will be held during Passover. One thing, however, you can do for us which will be of very material benefit to us. This month the Legislature of Massachusetts passed a bill granting the Hebrew Teachers College of Boston the right to grant the degrees of Bachelor, Master and Doctor of Hebrew Literature, Hebrew Laws and Jewish Education. This formal recognition of the Hebrew Teachers College is no surprise to those who know it intimately. It has grown by leaps and bounds as far as attendance is concerned. As to the course of study, it calls for a four-year Preparatory Course and a four-year college course, plus a minimum of two years in a secular college before the Bachelor's degree can be granted. There is daily attendance throughout beginning with 10 hours a week and ending in the last three years, with 20 hours and more per week. All courses are given in Hebrew. Twenty-four students have already graduated in the last two years, and are doing very creditable work in the Hebrew schools of Boston and other New England towns. I understand from Mr. Morris Morse, president of the Brotherhood of Temple Israel of Boston, that you will address their Brotherhood on April 4th. If, in the course of your address, you will congratulate Boston on its success with the Hebrew Teachers College pointing out its significance to the progress of Jewish education in New England, your words will strike homein a very influential quarter. Rabbi Lavi has been a very staunch friend of the institution since its inception, and your favorable opinion will carry fruitful conviction.

Under separate cover I am sending you a copy of the second Year Book issued by the students of the Hebrew Teachers College. In a few days I shall send you a copy of the course of study of the Hebrew Teachers College.

The writer has been active in communal work, having been Chairman of the U. P. A., and J. D. C. Drives for the past few years. I am also organizer and President of Congregation Beth El, and have recently completed the building of a beautiful House of Worship.

It might be of interest to you to know that we have just engaged Rabbi Israel Harburg, who graduates from the Hebrew Union College next month, as our spiritual leader. I have delayed confirming our recent telegraphic arrangement foryou to speak at our 20th anniversary banquet because I wanted our entire committee to hear the goodnews of your acceptance.
Our committee met Monday night and the action of
the subcommittee in arranging your appearance was
mostheartly endorsed. You may be sure that a
most royal welcome awaits you here in Lynn.

It would be presumptuous for me to attempt to tell you what to say, but I believe the following brief statement will prove of use to you:

The Lynn YMHA was organized about 20 years ago, languished for a year and them went out of existence. It was revived a year and a half later and ever since has been in existence, attempting to do good work in the community. For the first three years we carried on in small quarters and our activities were mainly of the type to bring publicity to the association but not fundamental in kind.

Up to two years ago we had purely volunteer workers, periodically flushed with enthusiasm and then cooled off. As a result our organization would one year number a hundred or more and the next would be fortunate to count half that number.

In June, 1925, under the inspired leader-ship of a young man, we bought our present location at \$75000. The boldness of this step may be imagined when I tell you that we had no money in the treasury and about 30 members. But we put our shoulders to the wheel and raised about \$20000 which we put into alterations in the building. As a result of this step our membership grew by leaps and bounds until we now have about 400, senior and junior. With this increase in membership the need for professional service was realized and I am now trying to do what is necessary to build up a big constructive program.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

I do not need to tell you what a successful opening you gave the Ford Hall Forum this year and what a special delight it was to me personally to have those brief contacts with you. It just makes me wish more than ever that you were going to become a Boston citizen.

Some of the Zionist "mis-leaders" are still nasty about your refusal to go to their meeting. Some of them have been so dammably insulting that I have threatened them with a public statement, but I am waiting until next week when I am to have a session with some of their more intelligent leaders whom, at least, I feel that I am willing to sit down at the same table with.

They had the impudence to announce at that meeting that you did not want to come up because you were too tired, and one of the members of the committee, even as late as last Wednesday night, told me that you had "sunk in her estimation." Even after I had explained the facts to her, she said that that made no difference; you should have come. I was quite indignant with her and told her that it was just such attitudes as hers that made it necessary for me to make sure that every member of our Jewish community knew the exact facts. I told her that you were my guest and as your host, I was going to see to it that no guest of mine was misrepresented. I told her that I had made any previous statement because I realized that the Zionist organization had troubles enough and I did not want to add to its burdens at this time, nor did I want to "wash any of our dirty linen in public." As long as that seemed to make no impression upon her, and she being a member of their Executive Committee and one whom I considered an intelligent member of their Boston committee, I felt that something should be done about it.

Of course I do not intend to say a word until I have your permission to do so. You had promised to send me a copy of the correspondence you were going to have with their secretary and with that impertinent little shyster lawyer, Robert Morrison, who sent you that letter at the Brotherhood meeting. I also understand that you have had letters from some of the others.

I don't want to annoy you too much with this cheap crowd, but it makes my blood boil to think of some of the nasty and libelous things they said about you. One of their committee in their committee meeting applied to you a dammably, vulgar epithet and I won't stand for it!

Of course, they still insist that I am to blame for the whole thing and they applied even worse epithets to me, which bothers me not at all. They insist that you would have come if I had permitted it, which, of course, flatters me entirely too much. I have never had anything to do with that crowd and I intend to have even less, but even at this late date, their continued impertinent intent to censure you would be cause for amusement if it were not so pathetic.

I personally feel badly to think that so many innocent persons are being misled by this crowd and I am wondering if I do not owe it to the Jewish community here to make it impossible for them to pull over another hoax like the one they did.

Their committee member admitted, Wednesday night, that they had your telegram in plenty of time to call off the meeting, and yet she says that they did not do it because they thought you would change your mind. They insist that you should have come no matter if you had said previously that you would not come. That is the kind of thing, Dr. Bilver, that I think must be stopped. I told the committee that in justice to you that I was going to see to it personally that every prominent Zionist in Greater Boston knew the exact facts and that I would call upon some personally and reach the others by correspondence. I will do nothing, however, until I have heard from you.

Of course I have no copy of the letter which I wrote to Mr. Mobert Morrison in Boston. It was written in long hand. The gist of it, however, was as follows:

from the Roston Signists to address a meeting under their massions on Sunday evening, Outober 30th.

When I was in Boston on Sept. 27th, addressing a Zionist luncheon, I happened to drop the remark to one or two Zionists that I would be back in Boston about a month later. They snapped up the information and said they would arrange a meeting for me while I was there. I told them under no circumstances were they to arrange any meeting for me but if there happened to be a Zionist meeting in Boston at the time of my visit and if I found it convenient, I would drop in on the meeting.

Thereupon the gentlemen proceeded to arrange a meeting without even taking the trouble to consult me about it, or even to inform me of it. I first learned of the fact that I was scheduled to address a Ziomist meeting on October 20th from a chance reading of the Jowish Advocate, which I receive.

I immediately wired the Boston Zionists that under no circumstances would I attend this meeting. This was five days <u>bofore</u> the date of the meeting. The gentlemen completely ignored my telegram and proceeded to advertise me as if nothing had happened.

Upon my arrival in Boston on October 20th one of the officers reached me at the hotel in the afternoon and again I informed him that I would not attend the meeting.
