In accordance with the telephone conversation I had with you last night, I am sending this letter in further explanation of our movement.

Several years ago a movement was begun im Quincy known as the Back to Church Movement. The group was composed of service clubs such as the Quintonus, Rotary etc and the Gnamber of Commerce. The membership is made up of Jews, Cetholics and Protestants as well as people from every walk of life. The purpose of the group was to increase church and synagogue attendance and to promote better understanding and greater cooperation among Jews, Catholics and Protestants. The Jewish community in this city took a very active part and within the past year the movement has taken on national recognition. In fact, in May of 1941 the Readers Digest had a story describing our entire program.

The organization puts on a series of four meetings a year usually on the four Wednesdays in October. The meetings are held at noon in one of the local theaters and a speaker of a different faith addresses the audience for approximately twenty-fire misutes. Our attendance in the past has usually run between eleven and fourteen hundred people. The entire city turns out for the occassion and a great isal of publicity is given the event along with the Proclamation by the Mayer.

This year, when unity is such an essential thing for the American people, we wanted to have as fine

To promote Church Attendance throughout the year and sepretally on the first Sunday of each month To promote better understanding and better cooperation among Catholics, Jews and Protessants a representative of the Jewish people as possible address the group. I immediately suggested your name and the Board of Directors of the organization were so enthused with the possibility of your coming that they suggested that you be allowed your choice of the four dates available, namely October 6, 13, 20 and 27. I might say that we should be very glad to take care of all the expenses involved.

I, personally, would be greatly honored if you would find it possible to accept this invitation to come to Quincy. Besides the pleasure of hearing you speak. I would be very happy to be able to see you and meet you at my home. I should also appreciate an early reply as we are setting up our Fall program this month.



My dear Rabbi Silver:

We are planning a few Sunday evening conferences during the winter term for the presentation to our teachers and our older boys and girls (17 and 18 years of age) in simple and positive terms of the forms of faith and worship of some of the great religious bodies about which many of us are not well informed. We expect to hold the conferences in the Library and to have introductory talks, about half an hour in length, to be followed by questions from teachers and students.

Would it be possible for you to come over from Cambridge on Sunday evening, February 6th, to speak and answer questions about present-day Judaism in America in respect to its faith and worship? The hour could be set at 7:30, 8:00, or 8:30 according to your convenience. (Our vesper service during that term is held just <u>before</u> supper.) We will send a car for the 25 minutes trip from Lowell House to Milton and return, or the car can meet you elsewhere. We should be happy to have you with us for supper at the School at 6:15, if you can come at that time.

Mr. Jones, the Head Master, and the Principals of both Upper Schools heartily join me in this invitation. A conference with you of the kind that I have indicated would mean much to us, and we earnestly hope that you will find it possible to come.

We realize, however, that your days in Cambridge and Boston may be taken up with many engagements and we can understand Dean Sperry's feeling that, even if you should be free for part of that Sunday evening, we may be asking too much of you. If, therefore, you cannot come yourself, would you be willing to suggest some other representative of the Jewish faith, preferably of this vicinity, who would give us the kind of interpretation that we need? Yet we hope you can come.
