Last year three such Institutes were held, and only three years ago the first such Institute was founded at Wildacres, N. C., by the North Carolina State Association. Maurice Weinstein, of Charlotte, N. C., 3rd v.p. of District No. 5, and a Marine Corps veteran of World War II, is the father and promoter of the idea. He has been hailed as another "Ben Frankel" or "Sam Beber" who, as young men, founded Hillel and AZA respectively.

Mr. Weinstein's idea, however, has to do not with youth but with adults. He feels that Jewish education is a crying need among adults, and that American Jews can survive and make a significant contribution only if a goodly number of them have a Jewish background. He also feels that one of the best ways for busy adults to get such a background is to come together for three or four days during vacation time, at a quiet place where there are no outside distractions, and study and discuss Judaism intensively with qualified teachers. The idea was tried out for the A BB Institute of Judaism is a first time at Wildacres, the North Carolina mountain-top home of Mr. and Mrs. I. D. Blumenthal, three years ago. It was so successful that it was repeated two years ago. Last summer, after the third annual North Carolina Institute, District No. 5 held its own Institute at the same place. By that time, the idea was beginning to get around the country, and the Upper Wisconsin BB Council held its first Institute at Camp Flambeau, Wis.

This coming summer the three Institutes held last year will be repeated. In addition, their first Institutes will be held by District No. 1, District No. 7, and B'nai B'rith of Indiana.




A typical outdoor lecture session at Wildacres, where the BB Institutes of Judaism were founded. At extreme right is Maurice Weinstein, the founder.

its recommendations were approved later by the National Executive Committee.

The Institute committee has set up permanent offices at the Supreme Lodge Headquarters, 1003 K St., N. W., Washington 1, D. C. All lodges, chapters, councils, and Dis-tricts interested in forming Institutes of Judaism have been asked to write to the BB Institute Committee at that address.

The committee, consisting largely of rabbis, is proceeding realistically. There will be no sudden rash of Institutes; expansion will be slow but steady. It takes a lot of work Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan: ". . . a great and planning to organize a successand planning to organize a successful Institute. The meeting place must be quiet and inspiring, suitable for conscientious study. The faculty must consist of highly qualified scholars. The subject must be carefully considered. The books must be wisely chosen. And the students cannot be recruited overnight. All in all, it takes about six months of work before an Institute can be held. Mr. Weinstein therefore has urged that any group that wants to have a BB Institute of Judaism this coming summer should write to the Institute Committee vival in America. immediately.



No BB Institute will be accredited as such unless it first submits its plans to the national committee and works with that committee. All Institutes are expected to be self-supporting, and if a profit should result, it must be ploughed back into the program for the following year.

The BB Institute movement is growing, slowly but solidly, and has been hailed by outstanding Jewish personalities as potentially a major contribution to Jewish sur-







#### DR. MORDECAI M. KAPLAN

Dr. Kaplan is a professor at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. He is the founder of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism, and is preeminent as a Jewish scholar and philosopher. Among his works are "A New Approach to the Problem of Judaism," "Judaism as a Civilization," and "Judaism in Transition." His recent book, "The Future of the American Jew," will be the basis of the course of lectures he will deliver at the Institute. Copies of the book will be available to all the students.









#### RICHARD E. GUTSTADT

Mr. Gutstadt is Executive Vice-Chairman of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, and has achieved national renown as a lecturer and administrator in the field of Jewish public relations. He has been an official of B'nai B'rith since 1917, and from 1933 to 1947 served as National Director of the Anti-Defamation League. Mr. Gutstadt will lecture on the present and future importance of B'nai B'rith to a creative Jewish survival.

### History of the Institute

Wildacres is the birthplace of the summer institute plan of adult education of B'nai B'rith. The plan was start ed by the North Carolina Association of B'nai B'rith Lodges in 1948. These institutes are dedicated to Jewish learning. The idea is not new, but comes from the treasure house of the Jewish past, wherein the gathering together of Jews for the purpose of study was the cornerstone of Jewish life. In 1948, Ludwig Lewishon, Marvin Lowenthal, and Rabbi Arthur J. Lelyveld were among the lecturers. In 1949, Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan and Dr. Solomon Grayzel were among the lecturers. The N. C. Association of B'nai B'rith Lodges, at its institute at Wildacres, beginning July 25th, 1950, will present Dr. Robert Gordis, Dr. Jacob Marcus, and Mr. Edward Grusd on the theme: "Our Heritage and Jewish Life Today."

Upon motion of District Grand Lodge No. Five, the Supreme Lodge of B'nai B'rith at its convention in Washington on March 21, 1950, adopted a resolution making B'nai B'rith Institutes of Judaism a nation-wide project of the order.

Leaving Marion, proceed west on U. S. Route 70 for 2 miles, then proceed on N. C. 221 for about 8 miles, turn left on N.C. Route 26-A and continue until you see sign "Wildacres—B'nai B'rith Institute." Marion in on the Southern Railroad, and arrangements can be made to meet those arriving by train. 

#### DR. ROBERT GORDIS

Dr. Gordis, eminent scholar, author and lecturer, is Associate Professor of Bible at the Jewish Thelogical Seminary of America and Rabbi of Temple Beth-El of Rockaway Park in New York. He is Past-President of the Synagogue Council of America, and likewise is a past President of the Rabbinical Assembly. He is the author of a number of scholarly and general works, the most recent of which are "Conservative Judaism—An American Philosophy" and "The Wisdom of Ecclesiastes." He has also been heard over all the major radio net-works as guest speaker and preacher on such programs as "The Message of Israel," the Mutual Radio Chapel, the Columbia Church of the Air, N.B.C.

#### DR. JACOB R. MARCUS

Dr. Marcus occupies the Adolph S. Ochs chair of Jewish History at the Hebrew Union College, and is Director of American Jewish Archives, in Cincinnati. He is likewise president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. He received his A.B. degree at the University of Cincinnati, and his degree of Rabbi at the Hebrew Union College. He served with distinction overseas in World War I. He is the author of "Israel Jacobson"; "A Brief Introduction to the Bibliography of Modern Jewish History"; "Jewish Festschriften"; and other books important to Jewish life and letters. His latest work is "Communal Care in the German Ghetto."

#### EDWARD E. GRUSD

Mr. Grusd, for twenty-two years editor of The National Jewish Monthly, published by B'nai B'rith, is a native of Cincinnati. He graduated from Ohio State University College of Journalism in 1926. He did post-graduate work at the Hebrew Union College in 1930 and 1931. He has been a reporter on the Cincinnati Post, the Omaha World Herald, a foreign correspondent for the Ohio State Journal, and American correspondent for the Paris Jewish "L'Univers Israelite." He assumed editorship of the National Jewish Monthly in 1928.

### THE FACULTY



RABBI OSCAR Z. FASMAN



DR. SHALOM SPIEGEL

Rabbi Fasman is President of the Hebrew Theological College of Chicago. He is a graduate of the University of Chicago and was ordained at the Hebrew Theological College. He has served as a chaplain with the Canadian Army. He has written several articles in the "Jewish Library Series" and "Great Jewish Books," and he is author of "The Sabbath—Cornerstone of Jewish Life." He is an outstanding scholar and lecturer.

Rabbi Freehof is Rabbi of Rodef Shalom Temple in Pittsburgh. He is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati and of the Hebrew Union College, where he later served as a professor. During World War I, he was a chaplain with the American Expeditionary Force. He has been president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Among his works are "Commentary on the Book of Psalms," "The Small Sanctuary," "Modern Jewish Preaching," "Reform Jewish Practice." His fame as a scholar and lecturer is nation-wide.



RABBI SOLOMON B. FREEHOF

Dr. Spiegel is professor of Medieval Literature at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. He studied at the University of Vienna (Ph.D. 1922). From 1922 to 1928, Dr. Spiegel lived and studied in Palestine, after which he served as Professor of Biblical Literature at the Jewish Institute of Religion. Among his works are "Hebrew Reborn," "Ezekiel or Pseudo-Ezekiel," "Prophetic Attestation of the Decalogue," and "Noah, Daniel, and Job." He is a profound scholar and a stimulating lecturer.

#### HISTORY OF THE INSTITUTE

Wildacres is the birthplace of the summer institute plan of adult education of B'nai B'rith. The plan was inaugurated by the North Carolina Association of B'nai B'rith Lodges in 1948. These institutes are dedicated to Jewish learning. The idea is not new, but comes from the treasure house of the Jewish past, wherein the gathering together of Jews for the purpose of study was the cornerstone of Jewish life. Among lecturers who have appeared at B'nai B'rith Institutes of Judaism at Wildacres are: Ludwig Lewisohn, Marvin Lowenthal, Rabbi Arthur J. Lelyveld, Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan, Dr. Solomon Grayzel, Dr. Robert Gordis, Dr. Jacob R. Marcus, Mr. Edward Grusd, and Mr. Richard Gutstadt.

#### LOCATION

Wildacres is located on the pinnacle of a mountain in the Blue Ridge of western North Carolina. It is 18 miles from Marion, N. C. on the road to Little Switzerland, N. C. Leaving Marion, proceed west on U. S. Route 70 for 2 miles, then proceed on N. C. 221 for about 8 miles, turn left on N. C. Route 26-A and continue until you see sign "Wildacres—B'nai B'rith Institute." Marion is on the Southern Railroad, and arrangements can be made to meet those arriving by train. Those arriving by air can proceed to Charlotte, N. C. via Eastern or Capitol Air Lines. Applicants should advise the co-chairman of reservations, of means of travel and time of arrival.

#### ATTENDANCE

The facilities at Wildacres proper are limited to 55 men and women. There are accommodations for 20 additional at a near-by hotel. The cost at Wildacres will be \$20.00 for registration plus \$20.00 for food, making a total fee of \$40.00. At the near-by hotel the cost will be \$20.00 for registration, and \$4-\$5 a day for room with food a la carte. All registrations will be handled at Wildacres. The facilities at Wildacres provide private rooms with private baths. Applications should be made at once with accompanying deposit of \$20.00. Reservations will be accepted in order of presentation. The evenings are cool, so warm clothing should be brought. Sport clothing is customary at the Institute.

A book shop will be operated for the sale of Jewish literature including writings of the lecturers. All lectures are followed by group discussion.

The use of the facilities at Wildacres has been generously made available at less than cost of operation by its owners, Mr. and Mrs. I. D. Blumenthal of Charlotte, North Carolina.
