The Institute Forum, which will begin early in November 1931 and will finish late in February 1932, on Wedne aday nights during that period, is very anxious to have you appear this year.

Unfortunately, we are unable to pay the fee that I know you ask as a general rule, and that you are not only worthy of, but many times more. We have been very hard hit in our Forum last year and as things look, we will be hart still more this year, due to the depression and the tramendous unemployment.

Won't you be a good fellow, and as a personal compliment to the Institute, make an exception and appear on our program at a considerably reduced fee, so that your coming to us may be a possibility. Our people want to hear you and needless to say how much I'd like to have you here. I'll appreciate a line from you regarding this matter at an early date.



My dear Dr. Silver:

Thanks for your prompt reply. Of course I know that you didn't take what I said about the German situation as intended in a way of criticism. had plenty of evidence directly that your appraisal of the psychology of the German Jew was correct, in fact, I may say that from such contact as I had with individual German Jews either personally or by correspondence, particularly the more prominent ones who have some position of standing and some substantial material basis in Germany, I sometimes feel either that they don't yet understand the situation or - but I would not want to assume too quickly we are really exaggerating it, but when you offer an opportunity to a German Jew to establish himself in the United States, he begins to haggle about percentages, salaries and all kinds of things. When the Russian immigration wave was flooding over, we didn't expect them to be immigrants de-luxe.

However, this is neither here nor there. I have hope that when you come to Cincinnati next, you will give us an opportunity to have you at our home where we can talk things over at leisure. Mrs. Rubinow is particularly anxious to see you again.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

Your name has been suggested to me by Sherwood Eddy who is on our list of speakers discussing international affairs, and who I understand is a personal friend of yours. I am writing as result of his suggestion to inquire whether you would be interested in joining the group of speakers for whom I have been securing engagements during the past two seasons. If you wish to inquire about this organization, I would be glad to have you write Sherwood Eddy, Kirby Page, Stanley High, P. W. Wilson, Ralph W. Sockman, or William B. Stidger, all of whom have been on our list and are contiming for the season 1934-1935.

Eriefly stated, our purpose is to provide speakers who will present in a constructive way a discussion of international problems to organizations at moderate fees. Likewise, we seek to serve individuals such as yourself who are in a position to accept speaking engagements but who do not desire to give exclusive booking rights to a professional speakers bureau. We permit all speakers on the list to accept whatever personal engagements they wish and do not bind them to giving any blocks of time or definite dates other than those they may voluntarily suggest or which are asked for specifically by organizations with which we have contacts. I am outlining below our proposed plans for cultivation for 1934-1935 season. If these plans meet with your approval, I shall be very glad to include your name on our list of speakers.

Cur business of the past two seasons justifies presenting speakers in a large attractive booklet providing a full page for each speaker instead of using the less practical individual booklet. This arrangement has several advantages. It will:

Enable us to present your name to 7000 or more organizations instead of having only 1000 copies of an individual booklet for distribution. The four page individual folder averaged about \$20 per thousand copies. We can, however, print 7000 or more of the larger booklet at a cost of only \$25 to each speaker. This amount, as you have already no doubt estimated, is only part of the honorarium which will come from one engagement.

- 2. We can also print at no additional cost approximately 1900 individual sheets for each speaker to be used in special cultivation.
- 3. We can reach more organizations and keep your name open for consideration over a long period of time by the use of the proposed attractive booklet.

I believe the above plan will commend itself to you. We expect to print next season's literature in February so that we can place it in the hands of the newly elected program chairmen soon after they take office, and have it available for colleges and other organizations which book speakers many months in advance. I need at your earliest convenience any new material about yourself which you would like us to include; your plans for the coming summer, particularly if they include a trip abroad; your plans for the 1934 season, including the subjects of addresses which you plan to give and the names of any prominent organizations which may have already asked you to speak.

I would like to have this information within the next two weeks, and would also appreciate having your check for \$25 if you decide to join our list of speakers. In order to secure the best quality of printing and the larger quantity of booklets at the lowest cost, I must guarantee prompt payment of the account. We pay for all general cultivation and correspondence. You will have no expenses for that service unless you wish some special cultivation such as we have done for some speakers in the past. Although the margin is narrow, we plan to continue on the commission basis as in the past - 20% of the net fee - hoping that increased volume in bookings will come as a result of more effective cultivation. As you may know, the majority of speakers bureaus charge a 25%, or even more, commission.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I hasten to reply to yours of the 2nd inst. To begin with, may I explain to you how sorry I was not to be able to be present to hear you at the Wise Center Forum last Monday evening but as you may have heard, I was out of town and didn't get back until last night. Everybody tells me that you made a wonderful address, but that is nothing new to you.

I am flattered that you should ask my advice, but if it is worth anything at all, by all means accept the invitation from B'nai B'rith in Chicago. Ewen though you and I may have liked to see the President make a public statement in regard to the German situation, let us not forget that in his case there is no "neutrality" on the situation. I honeatly believe that he feels as strongly about it as you and I. His confidence in our people has been demonstrated so strongly that he is subject to violent criticisms for having gone too far, for instance in the matter of Jewish appointments. How strongly he expresses himself in private to some American Jews as well as to the German representatives is well known to many of us, and after all I feel that I must defer to his judgment as to the wisdom of any particular step in the tremendously complicated international situation even though I might not agree with him. President Roosevelt may be an "accident", if that is not speaking too disrespectfully of him, but he is certainly the best thing that happened in American life for a generation, and the Jewish problem is not the only thing in which you and I can be enthusiastis about his program.

I saw a cartoon in the New York Tribune the other day representing Norman Thomas as praying to the figure of Franklin Roosevelt and though one may not agree to all its implications, there was at least some truth in it.

If I may make bold to offer any suggestions. I would not in your place limit myself to the Jewish policies of President Roosevelt but rather emphasize the support that the Jews must give him because of his entire economic and political program.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

No doubt you and Mrs. Silver had a very interesting and worth-while trip after we had that delightful luncheon with you in Geneva. I have never had the opportunity of being in Cleveland since my return to the United States. Mrs. Wilson and I have been working on international relations institutes and driving about in Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio.

I am writing this letter especially to ask if you could give our opening evening address at the Third Annual Mid-West Institute of International Relations, at 8:00 P. M., on the evening of June 25. We are expecting a very splendid program again this year; and our opening evening address is the one which we hope will set the tone of the entire twelve days.

The first week will be devoted largely to the economic and political difficulties facing world peace, under the leadership of Garfield Cox of the University of Chicago, and some one in the field of history or political science who has not, as yet, accepted. James Weldon Johnson will be on the program Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, giving an evening address on "The Art of Being Civilized," and discussions in the Institute on the Negro in American life and the Negro in literature.

During the second week Grover Clark will have a course on the situation in the Orient; Leyton Richards, from Birmingham, England, will discuss the spiritual foundations of world peace; and Kirby Page will lead a week's discussion on "The Ethics of Coercion, War, and Violence." Devore Allen is to talk on the peace movement at home and abroad; and Dorothy Detzer on politics and peace at Washington.

This is the fifth year during which the Friends have put on such Institutes; and they are expecting to have five during June - one at Wellesley, in New England; one at Haverford, Pennsylvania; one at Duke University; and one at Atlanta, Georgia, in addition to the one at Northwestern University.

These are designed primarily for men and wemen who are working with young people in churches, synagegues, public schools, and all sorts of civic and community organizations. Our evening addresses draw largely from the summer school students and men and women living on the North Shore. The first year at Northwestern our audiences ranged from six hundred to fourteen hundred people, and were slightly less last year because of the Werld's Fair which was just getting under way at that time. You would be assured of a very hearty and sympathetic response from the men and women making up the Institute, and from those in the community who attend in the evening. The dress is informal, and the whole atmosphere we try to keep as simple and straight-forward as possible.

I know you are thoroughly familiar with the long-time interest of the Friends in world peace, and the many cordial relationships they have had with the Jews. The little Quaker group in Germany spoke their concern for fair treatment there a long time before Hitler came into power; and the Friends' center in Paris has been very active in helping to care for German refugees.

These Institute programs have a strong spiritual basis, but are inter-denominational in character and make-up and emphases.

I hope you will feel that this is a most cordial and urgent invitation to take part in our program this summer and to come and be our guest as long as you can. These institutes are made possible by individual contributions and gifts, white are, of course, never adequate to do as wide-spread peace education as we desire. We could offer you your round-trip transportation expenses from Cleveland, and an honorarium of at least \$50.00. We should be happy to have Mrs. Silver as our guest, also, if she could come with you.
