No doubt you have read something about the riot in East St. Louis about this time last year and about Dr. Charles W. Bundy, a Dentist and prominent citizen being arrested and held as the impicator of this riot. Dr. Bundy was tried last month by a prejudiced jury and as a result was convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment.

The colored people all over the United States are interested in this case. We feel that Dr. Bundy is innocent of the charge placed against him; that his trial was anything but just and fair. We also feel that Dr. Bundy's case is not a one man matter, but a race matter, therefore we have taken upon ourselves the raising of a fund sufficient to take this case to the Supreme Court with the hope that we will receive the justice due us in this case. We, in Cleveland started a Campaign two weeks ago, which will end Sunday, June 1st; on which date we are arranging to hold one of the largest Mass Meeting's that has ever been held in Cleveland, at St. John's A.M.E. Church, E. 40th Street near Central Avenue at 3: P.M.

As Chairman of the committee I am writing to ask if you will be kind enough to address us on this occasion. We want you to make an appeal to our people; an appeal that will bring to their minds the importance of seeing this matter as a race problem and that only by working together can this problem be solved.
