Looking East across Cleveland's Public Square, on to Euclid Avenue (right) and Superior Avenue (center) where seventy percent of all street cars reach the down town section.



Dear Rabbi Silver:

We missed you on our various visits to Cleveland during your trip, and are glad to know that you are back. We also envied you your globe-trotting. I presume that you have been more or less in touch with developments in Cleveland on our forum council since returning, but I thought I ought to drop you a note to illuminate the inner strategy of things. We had a most successful meeting on June 24th, with about seventy people present, and got things nicely launched.

It seemed necessary to everybody concerned to emphasize at the start the definite service proposals to existing organizations in the city, working steadily from a service beginning toward the development of those more unique elements in our program, that are the deeper reason for our existence.

I am working with Miss Chadsey, who is acting as the director pro-tem, on the program on the effort to develop the speakers service as a practical preliminary to other things. It is my hope this year that through the speakers service we may negotiate: (1) Exchange addresses between Rabbis and Protestant Clergymen, who have not yet visited one another's pulpits; (2) Exchanges between the Faculties of Protestant theological seminaries in Ohio and Jewish professors or religious leaders; (3) A special conference between religious leaders of all creeds in December with Samuel Parkes Cadman present as the guest of honor. (4) The approach through the door of the speakers bureaus to the institute plan discussed in our previous conferences and to the development of smaller inter-group conferences meeting for pure discussion and to entertain visiting speakers as their guests, in round table sessions.

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



My dear Rabbi Silver:

I am writing to you as Chairman of the Division on the Family of the National Conference of Social Work. As you know, the National Conference will be held in Cleveland between May 26th. and June 4, 1926. The Family Division meetings are as large in the point of attendance, if not the largest, of any of the ten Divisions of the Conference. We are all expecting that in Cleveland the meetings will fill to capacity a good sized church or medium sized theater.

It is planned to have the third one of the five meetings of our Division consider the question of Religion and Social Case Work. It is our plan to have two addresses, each of thirty minutes duration. The first of these will be on the subject: "The Backgrounds of a Family's Religious Life as Social Data", and Mrs. John M. Glenn, a former President of the National Conference of Social Work, has agreed to give this address. She is an experienced social worker and is now not only a leader in the Family Welfare movement, (she is President of the American Association for Organizing Family Social Work), but also in several of the national social work activities of the Episcopal Church. As you may know, she is an unusually fine public speaker.

Our Committee has decided that I write to you asking you to give an address of thirty minutes, following Mrs. Glenn's, on the subject: "The Development of Personality Through Religious Experience".

Our general idea in this meeting, which we expect to be the finest of our division, is to set forth the relationship between the Church and Family Case Work. It is not our idea to present the relationship between the Church and social work in general, but rather to confine ourselves to the narrower field of Family Case Work. We thought that Mrs. Glenn would develop the subject more from the standpoint of the social agency, depicting the use or the uses of the Church, of religious background, of religious influence in moulding and building up the lives of people---particularly in developing family life. You, on the other hand, could show how personality is developed and human life enriched, (with particular reference to family life) through religious experience.
