



## DR. J. PHILIP WERNETTE

Brief Biography

Dr. Philip Wernette is professor of business administration at the University of Michigan, and editor of the Michigan Business Review. He is also a member of the faculty of the Graduate School of Banking, at Rutgers University; and of the Pacific Coast Banking School, at the University of Washington.

A native of Michigan, he moved with his family to California and attended college there. Later he went to Harvard, earned a Ph.D. degree, and served on the Harvard faculty from 1927 to 1945.

During that period he went twice to South America to do financial advisory work for the governments of Colombia and of Peru, spent 14 months in Europe studying business and economic conditions, and was in Washington a year on war work.

From 1945 to 1948 he was president of the University of New Mexico, in Albuquerque; and then moved to the University of Michigan. Dr. Wernette has written several books and numerous articles on business and economic subjects. He is a member of several professional, honorary, and fraternal organizations. His travels have taken him to every state in the United States, and to twenty foreign countries.

For many years, Professor Wernette has been publishing analyses of business and economic conditions. Although his forecasts often have been at variance with general opinion, his record of predictions shows a very high batting average.

The other day when I spoke to you, I outlined rather broadly the subject upon which you are to speak - "The Individual's Impact on Public Attitudes". The Freedom Agenda Committee has asked me to ask you to include the following points in the course of your speech:

- 1. Place emphasis on the fact that the individual citizen can have a real impact on public opinion.
- 2. Bring out the fact that the "good old days" were not necessarily so good. Today we have made progress, but it has to be much better; every citizen is involved in making it better.
- Stress fact that dramatic things which an individual does are not necessarily the most important. The influence of the individual begins right in his own circle.
- 4. Point out that the individual or even an organized group, does not have to convince everyone to turn the tide. It is important to concentrate on the middle-of-the-road group while acknowledging, of course, the points of view of all extremist groups.

This is the symbol of the Cleveland War Memorial Fountain.

Soon now, the dream and plan that was born on the front page of The Cleveland Press will become a reality.

Soon now, the beautiful Fountain will take its place among Greater Cleveland's art treasures and from its site on the Mall keep the community ever mindful of the contributions made by its citizens in the name of freedom.

While actual construction has been delayed nearly a decade because of problems created by world conditions unforeseen at the time of the planning, the purposes of the project never were lost slight of.

Basically the Fountain is composed of a large granite basin in which water will move and spray continually. In the center of this will be the sculptured portions.

Set into the basin rim will be polished bronze panels containing the names of all those who lost their lives in service in World War II and in Korea.

This booklet contains the names of all those servicemen listed in The Press files.

We want you to check the list for names of your friends and relatives.

If you see a name which is spelled incorrectly or if you fail to see the name of someone you know to have died in either war, please write or call The Press Public Service Bureau at CHerry 1-1111.

This will enable us to make the corrections before the names are engraved on the bronze plates.



THE FALLECY OF TECHNOLOGICAL UNEMPLO MENT

By Fred H. Chapin

Since the dawn of history, man's progress in the process of becoming civilized has been measured in terms of his ability to shape things for his own use from raw materials he could obtain. Down through the centuries his increasing skill in performing these shaping operations we now identify as four successive civilizations: the Stone Age, the Bronze Age, the Iron Age, and the Electric Age. It was the difference in imagination and in individual skills that raised each of these successive areas above the level of the others.

Prior to the time when we embarked upon the Iron and Steel Age these skills were vested largely in the hands and muscles of individuals or groups of individuals, and such quantity and quality of production as we then had was a result of the ability of the members of guilds to specialize in manufacturing processes wherein they excelled for greater efficiency.

Some manufacturing shops gained reputations as builders of better than average products because in the process of their development they had devised power operated tools and machines—they had mechanized certain operations previously limited to the individual skills.

Superimposed upon this business growth over the years is a pattern, a phantom ideology, dedicated to the assumption that where manufacturing becomes mechanized, man's opportunity for work is curtailed. Those who claim to support such a contention travel as the proponents of "Tech-

nological Unemployment."

I am not greatly impressed with the term "Technological Unemployment." That is a high sounding phrase designed to capture the imagination of those whose sluggish minds prefer to accept glamorous words as a substitute for reasonable thinking. What the originator of the term really meant was that the ingenious mechanization of production machinery was a threat to full employment—a lessening of private buying power and an advantage to a relative few; the ones profiting most being those who make use of labor-saving devices.

That this theory is still a wanced to delude those individuals whose information and thinking do not descend below the surface is illustrated by a speech made by Phillip Murray, of the C.I.D., as recently as March 28th of this year. He is quoted as saying that American industrialists were spending their profits on new machines to replace workers and "starve them to death." That the displacing of men by machines was fast pushing memployment to the "danger mark." He accused industry of using its "bigger and bigger" profits on plant improvements "not necessarily to increase production, but to increase profit and per capita production." That "the machine is displacing the man" and (he added the threat) that "organized labor is not going to sit idly by to permit the widespread introduction of machines to starve them to death."

It is rather astonishing that one who tries to impress the public with his claims to modern economic wisdom should display such abysmal ignorance on a subject that is surrounded by hundreds of years of accumulated evidence that contradicts every inference of that sort.

It is the same old vicious pattern that has governed the short-sighted thinking of certain groups since the mechanization of industry began. Let us go back a matter of 200 years and look briefly at a few facts as they relate to this so-called "Technological Unemployment" in a few of the world's basic industries.

Now, I am not going to bose you with a lot of statistics. I know how I myself react to a speaker who reels off volumes of figures that are never remembered and can, therefore, be used to support 'most

any contention.

One night in 1784, Dr. Edmund Cartwright, an English minister, at a dinner with a group of textile mer from Manchester, had his attention directed to the subject of machinery, and particularly to the spinning "jenny" that could turn out thread so fast that hand weaving could not keep up with it. He advanced the thought that it would be possible some day to weave the thread into cloth by machinery.

The ridicule and skepticism which greeted this observation was his challenge. He went to work and it took six years of development to put his theories into practice and the exhibition of the first machine that worked. It took several more years to build and equip a factory of 500 looms.

Almost immediately hand weavers thought they saw in this machine a threat to their employment and consequent livelihood—that they would lose their jobs. An angry mob surrounded the factory, fought for days, killing two men and wounding others. Finally, in a burst of angry resentment, they broke into the building, smashed the looms and then set fire to the place.

The British Parliament, however, granted Cartwright 10,000 pounds in recognition of his mechanical contribution.

The machine weaving continued and at tremendously lower cost. Selling prices were correspondingly reduced, so that with increased wages and better working conditions people began buying more and more cloth.

Between 1830 and 1914 the number of textile workers in England increased two and one-half times, while the population only doubled. The experience was much the same in the United States where the number of wage earners in the textile industry increased fourfold in the next fifty years.

In 1845 workers in Massachusetts organized to prevent the introduction of the sewing machine. Tailors also said, "If we put it to work, we'll soon be beggars." Manufacturers feared it would be dangerous to make the change, for meanwhile, workers staged the famous sewing machine riots.

History shows how wrong they were. For, by 1944, the sewing machine had made it possible for women to buy four or more dresses each year in addition to the clothing made in homes on 20,000,000 sewing machines from 69,000,000 patterns. Well over 1,000,000 Americans are now employed in operating sewing machines and at good wages.

Let us consider the case of the typewriter. Shortly after the Civil War, Christopher Scholes despaired at seeing office people laboring over their high desks with quill pens, producing records with ink that faded and of which copies were seldom made. When his invention of the typewriter became commercially practical for quantity production, penmen and bookkeepers took a hopeless view of their future.

Before the advent of the typewriter, only 3 out of every 1,000 persons did office work. In 1940 with the addition of calculators, bookkeeping machines, check signers, and various accounting machines, 38 persons out of every 1,000 were engaged in office work. Between 1920 and 1930 the number of stenographers increased from 615,000 to 820,000.

I could go on and recite case after case where the introduction of labor-saving machines had caused a panic in the ranks of the workers who feared that their opportunity to work was going to be

destroyed.

Mr. Murray would do well to take a serious look into the facts concerning employment in the sheet steel industry today, as compared to a few years ago. Previous to about 1923 sheet steel was in short supply, due to the greatly increased demands for automobiles, refrigerators, washing machines and other modern conveniences. It was not being supplied fast enough, nor cheaply enough, chiefly because it was being produced by hand operated mills. In 1923 John Butler Tytus gave to the steel industry the continuous sheet process that revolutionized that branch of the industry, greatly increased the man-hour output, and, consequently reduced the cost.

A similar experience can be cited with reference to the use of the automatic screw machine. This is a branch of industry with which I am pretty familiar.

One of these machines has, in several instances, accomplished the work of six ordinary lathes, thereby saving the work

of five operators.

Back in 1890, before the advent of these multiple spindle automatic machines, the value of tools then used by manufacturers producing screw products for sale was \$1,672,000 and the number of persons so employed was 1,057. During the next 56 years, the value of tools per worker increased four times, while the production and the average pay per worker increased six times.

Thus, in this industry, as in all others, the ratio between the development of modern machines and the volume of employment is increasingly in favor of the worker.

The largest users of these machines are in the automotive industry, where mass production has been brought to the high-

est point of achievement.

I wonder if many people realize how much an automobile in the class, we'll say, of the Chevrolet, the Ford, or the Plymouth would cost if it were not for such labor-saving devices as the continuous sheet mill, the modern rapid punch press, and the automatic screw machine. One automobile authority assures me that, on the basis of today's wage rates, it could not be built under \$7,500.

Now, someone is going to say, "What becomes of these thousands of workmen who are rendered unnecessary by the introduction of these labor-saving devices?"

Why, the same thing that happened centuries ago and has continued to happen down through the ages! Those persons readjusted themselves to existing conditions either by finding work made available in the same institution by reason of increased volume of production due to lowered prices, or, as in the case of the automobile industry, by finding new job opportunities resulting from the increase in the number of new car dealer outlets, new gas and oil stations, accessory stores, salesmen, and so on.

What is true in the few examples cited is also true in all mechanized industry whether it be manufacturing, construction, mineral extraction, transportation, communication, or agriculture.

The facts are that between the years 1870 (which began the Machine Age) and 1940 the population in the United States rose 231%, while the number of jobs increased 249%. How does Mr. Murray square this U. S. Bureau of Labor figure with his statement?

The company or individual who does not adjust himself to these changes has certainly lost the parade. This absorbing and readjusting process has been going on for so many centuries that the wonder is that anyone in this day and age can fail to be aware of it.

The machines that Mr. Murray complains of are not products of spontaneous invention. Most of them are the result of years of development through trial and error . . . Evolution through experience . . . Adaptability to public desire and usefulness.

Who are the greatest beneficiaries of these improved plants and the development of labor-saving machines of which Mr. Murray complains? Are they the few members of society who have been fortunate enough to accumulate wealth and at death leave most of it to charitable or educational institutions? Or are they the hundreds of thousands from the ranks of those very people who Mr. Murray so loudly proclaims himself champion—those who have been emancipated from the wash-tub, the hand loom, the grain cradle, the oil lamp, the horse-drawn vehicle, and who now ride daily to and from their

work in their own automobiles, and wear what workers in other countries would regard as luxurious clothing?

One who utters the things that Mr. Murray did in that speech is not, and never can be, ought but an enemy of the very people he professes to befriend.

If these preachings were to be followed or left to go unchallenged, it would be only a matter of time when all commerce and industry, within or outside the State, would be regulated, regimented, controlled and licensed, so that in the foreseeable end we would become one of the so-called backward nations of the world, waiting for an "E.C.A." of some other country to come and rescae us.

We have been too easy in swallowing this dogma that points the way to deca-

dence and ultimate defeat.

To say that the use of new mechanical inventions, designed to reduce the manhours needed to accomplish a given task, will deprive workmen of the opportunity to earn a livelihood is to admit that mankind has reached the apogee of existence—that no further improvement is possible in our standard of living. Why, we always have been on the threshold of an age that is to raise that standard to greater and still greater heights. It is no more reasonable today than it was 300 years, or 1,000 years ago, to say that man has reached his ultimate in living standard and, therefore, must perforce become static.

We look back only 75 years and view an existence without telephones, without automobiles, sypewriters, Pullman cars, electric lights, pneumatic tires, safety razors, cash registers, and the multitude of other things that looked like luxuries, when they were first introduced, but which today are regarded as common necessities in the most humble American home.

Turn back only 40 years and we see an era without airplanes, radios, mechanical refrigeration, accounting machines, and other inventions that have now become commonplace.

Even in the past 15 years we have witnessed the advent of electronics, radar, Diesel locomotives, cape recorders, the Geiger counter, and now there looms on the horizon a new and revolutionary form of power—known as Atomic energy.

Who shall say that in another 25 years these, and other inventions, will not take their place among the essentials to our further improved standard of living and provide new jobs for thousands who may be required to readjust themselves to a new order of life.

All these things have to be produced at a cost that places them within the range of the people's ability to pay. To accomplish this will require new and faster productive machinery, manned by countless thousands of workmen, many engineers, and special tools capable of turning out interchangeable parts in mass production.

If these are the machines which Mr. Murray is talking about, I wonder just who he thinks would be most inconvenienced if such a threat could be carried out? Let him ask his own people! Since the birth of time the human race has struggled toward one great objective. In all parts of the world wherever men trudged the grueling path of Life, they have sought relief from the burden of toil. "Leisure"—men call it.

Destiny decreed that the greatest abundance of that coveted state called "Leisure" was to occur right here in our United States. We have attained it to a higher degree than any other spot in the world. With great achievement in machines that save human energy we are going to experience more and more leisure among the common people.

Observe how far we have come in the last 60 years. I am old enough to remember when a standard day's work was 12 hours, six days per week. It was less than 40 years ago, or shortly before World War I, that the standard was reduced to 10 hours. The prevailing wage for common labor was 16½c per hour, \$1.65 per day, or approximately \$10 per week.

Now, this same man through the development of modern machinery earns upwards of \$56 per week and produces more and better goods than was ever done before and in shorter time. As a consequence he has more time for recreation and amusement.

We must recognize that continuing improvement in the standard of living of employees depends upon technological progress, better tools, methods, processes and equipment, and a cooperative attitude on the part of all parties in such progress, and that producing more with the same amount of human effort is a sound economic and social objective.

Perhaps we are headed for a six-hour day, or less, if the world's work can be

performed in less than that time.

If it can, it will be achieved through the development and application of inventions not yet dreamed of. Mechanizations that will harness and direct the dynamic energy of the world and channel it into avenues that will still further relieve mankind of the burden of physical drudgery.

One of the regrettable phases of this process is that we haven't yet learned how to intelligently employ our leisure time.

Man has got to seek enjoyment through the pursuit of spiritual, mental, and moral, as well as physical indulgences, or else he will find bimself enslaved to a power far worse than the drudgery from which technological advancement has freed him.

There must be a continuation of individual thinking and planning and discovering, and less trust in mass action, which is too often motivated by sheer emotion rather than deliberate reasoning.

There must be a growing resistance to the imperious regimentation of the mass conduct of men by selfish buccaneers and political bushrangers who seek to destroy individualism and create class hatred.

There should be more, and not less, emphasis put upon the encouragement of individuals to develop additional ingenious devices that will implement Man's power to produce for his life requirements.

Utterances such as that accredited Mr. Murray are designed to obstruct progress by nailing Mankind to a cross of Government regimentation and selfish dictatorship. I hope such attempts will never succeed, for I fervently believe in the plan of our forefathers which provided incentive and not discouragement for the individual in his search for better and cheaper commodities necessary to support our living standards and our way of life.

The ever-rising standard of material living in this Country under our present free enterprise system should convince every right-thinking man of the paramount importance of precious values of individual liberty from which all progress springs.

In the last analysis, the individual and his God-given qualities of character account for all human progress!

Among the roung people who get our year-round attention both inside and outside of The Philiis Whentley Association buildings, the program must be maintained and wherever possible, increased tremendously.



# 1955 COMMUNITY CHEST CAMPAIGN OCTOBER 17-27 — GOAL \$8,110,000



The 1955 Community Chest campaign goal has been set at \$8,110,000. This is almost \$400,000 more than was raised last year, yet it is the absolute minimum amount required by the 126 Red Feather agencies. This goal figure, which was determined after many months of carrful study by many Greater Cleveland residents, is vitally needed to continue and expand these important health and welfare services.

A lot of folks will wonder why the Community Chest asks for mone money each year. It's a natural question. To justify increased operating allowances year after year requires sound reasoning. There are several reasons why the Chest's Budget and Goal Committees feel that an \$8,110,000 campaign goal s vitally needed. First, more money is needed so that all Red Feather agencies may continue their essential health and welfare services. Then, additional funds are required at that the Chest can provide new services to meet new needs in the community. Finally, agency workers are entitled to minimum pay raises.

The need for Red Feather services is present in every neighborhood. It knows no economic bounds. Care cannot be denied a child whose only crims was to have been born into a poor family. There isn't time to discuss budget deficits when someone is brought into the emergency room of a Red Feather hospital.

Community Chest funds are allocated primarily to: (1) children and families, (2) sick and handicapped, (3) aged persons and (4) recreational facilities. The 126 agencies receiving whole or partial Chest support serve men, women and children in need of their services more than 40,000 times a day. To maintain and extend these services will require an additional seven per cent over last year's campaign result. Even with this increase the 1955 goal has been carefully determined to meet only the minimum needs of agencies for the coming year.
