As Host Superintendent and as a fellow Clevelander, I invite you to give the principal address at the luncheon meeting of the Insurance Commissioners of this region (Zone II) on May 10, 1956, at the Carter Hotel in Cleveland. Approximately 300 to 500 people are expected to attend who will represent the personnel of the state insurance departments and influential members of the insurance industry.

The National Association of Insurance Commissioners is composed of the insurance supervisory officials of the 48 states, Canada, etc. It is a voluntary organization that convenes semi-annually to discuss regulatory problems common to all of us. The topics for discussion are submitted by the states for zone consideration and from there to the national level.

The national association is divided into six zones, usually made up of eight states each. In Zone II we have Ohio, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Delaware, Maryland and the District of Columbia.





(RNS) -- A warning that racial and religious intolerance will disrupt America's unity in "dangerous times" and call into question her "credentials" for world leadership was sounded here by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, spiritual leader of The Temple in Cleveland. In an address to the ninth annual meeting of the Religious Newswriters Association he labelled bigotry and intolerance "the caries which cause decay and spread infection." "Prejudice, intolerance, race and group hatreds are tragic walls which men build around themselves, " he said, "and our age has unfortunately witnessed the erection of many such forbidding walls. Whenever there is unhappiness, discontent or unrest among men, racial and religious bigots swarm out of their dark holes, sweep over the land and sow the dragon seed of suspicion and hate. Sometimes even good and respectable citizens build walls around themselves which are effective blocks to mutual understanding and goodwill." Rabbi Silver told the newswriters that in the sight of God "there are no blue bloods and no first families, no Brahmins and no untouchables -- only children of the dust who, in their brief careers on earth, may find a measure of happiness in life by helping one another in goodness and love." Declaring that a moral revival was "long overdue." he said, "we must tidy up our moral lives. We must demand more of ourselves. We must raise our sights as to the meaning and obligations of our lives

as free citizens in a menaced world."

Rabbi Silver emphasized that freedom survives only in "spiritual discipline." America will not give leadership to the world, he said, if her people are "hollow" and "spiritually wasted" within.

He recalled that all the great democracies of the past which perished were first undermined from within by corruption and indifference, "by a moral laxity which prepared the way for the vicious and unpatriotic elements to step in and take over, who then drained and weakened these democracies to the point where their fall became inevitable."

Today's "deteriorated and dangerous" international situation will not be improved by military strength alone, the rabbi continued. "We must learn to rely more on statesmanship and moral leadership and less on force."

Ways must and can be found, he said, for East-West coexistence. While idealogies cannot be adjusted by compromise, Rabbi Silver said, political problems of coexistence can be.

He noted that in the 16th and 17th centuries it was universally held that Catholicism and Protestantism could not live together in the same world. "The stakes were enormous -- far greater than those at stake in the East-West struggle today," Rabbi Silver said, "for not only were the fortunes of this world involved, but also those of the next world.

"The ideologies could not be reconciled -- and so the struggle passed from the realm of ideas and propaganda to the battlefield . . . The wars of religion lasted for a hundred years and destroyed towns, cities and whole provinces, until the inevitable truth dawned upon men that a way had to be found for Catholicism and Protestantism -- and other religious minority sects -- to live together in the same world without sacrificing their particular loyalties and dogmas."

Out of the religious toleration which was finally achieved, Rabbi Silver said, there flowed also political liberties to the peoples of Western Europe.

"Our age, too," he said, "will have to find a formula of toleration which will enable the many evolving and fluid forms of capitalism and socialism to work out their destinies in the one world in which we live. They may be irreconcilable in theory; they need not be in practice."

Rabbi Silver added that the ultimate defense of democracy in the world lies neither in superior armor nor in the atomic or hydrogen bomb but in raising the standard of living "of the masses of the earth whose misery and wrongs are receptive soil for all kinds of doctrines of violent revolution and for all types of economic deceptions."

"When we shall come to these underprivileged peoples bringing them gifts not of bombs and bayonets, but of bread and health and education and freedom," he declared, "they will become our natural allies, and our alliance will be cemented in good will and in hope."

This is the kind of leadership to which the world will respond, he told the newsmen, "leadership which does not wait on the occasion but makes it, which is prepared to take calculated risks for peace, which is eager for negotiation and conference to settle all issues which endanger the peace of the world."

Urging Americans to look to their own political, economic and spiritual defenses at home, he said:

"We must remain free at home, and solvent and civically uncorrupted. If our own free institutions and the moral character of our own people are undermined at home, the last great hope of mankind for a new birth of freedom will have perished."

#### QUICKIE FACT SHEET

- Q. When and how did the American Medical Center start?
- A. In 1904 a small group of recovered T.B. patients determined to start a hospital to relieve destitute consumptives. With an original fund of \$1.10 and a national appeal for nickles, dimes, quarters and half dollars, they founded what was eventually named the Jewish Consumptives Relief Society. The original 6 tents and a one-story frame building have grown to a group of 34 buildings on 148 acres.
- Q. What is its purpose?
- A. Originally established to cure economically helpless tubercular patients, it has now accepted the challenge of cancer. By admitting T.B. patients thought to be hopeless, the former JCRS became among the first to discover the means of controlling the disease. It is the hope of the American Medical Center that a like contribution to the control of cancer will be made. Its skilled staff of medical, surgical and radiological specialists is aided by a complete laboratory, technicians and research scientists.
- Q. How many patients has it received?
- A. Almost 3,500,000 days of free care, medical, surgical, social and religious have given back to society more than 10,000 useful lives formerly thought hopeless. More than 100 cancer patients have been treated since the inception of the cancer program in 1955.
- Q. How does a sick person qualify for admission?
- A. Admission requirements are simple. He must be sick and in need. No one can pay for care received here. Not a single penny has ever been charged to any patient. Admission is strictly on a first come, first served basis. There can be no favorites where the stakes are Life or Death.
- Q. Are there any other restrictions?
- A. The hospital is open to all, regardless of race, creed or color, or ability to pay. Neither tuberculosis nor cancer are respecters of religious faiths. Whether Gentile or Jew, the need for help is equally urgent.
- Q. As residents of another community, why are we called upon to aid an institution located in a different area?
- A. Because the American Medical Center is the true concept of the Brotherhood of Man in practical operation; because it is local in nature since a patient's point of residence is immaterial; because all men are brothers in the sight of God and those who give to help support this wonderful institution do believe in fact they are their Brother's Keeper and accept the moral responsibility which goes with that belief.

#### RABBI ISRAEL PORATH THE MAN WE CHOOSE TO HONOR

An outstanding, world renown personality lives in our midst. He is a brilliant scholar, rabbi, lecturer and author who has received acclaim throughout this country as well as Europe and Israel. This gentle, shy, soft spoken man has served our Cleveland Community in every phase of Jewish life, as one



of its most outstanding leaders for the past thirty years. He has counseled newlyweds, guided parents, educated the youth, visited the sick and comforted the bereaved—all with sympathy and profound understanding. Having been born in Jerusalem, as was his father, he was steeped in Jewish lore. These distilled qualities of a rare heritage he brought to our community and generously shared with all who came in contact with him.

'Though youthful and vigorous, in body and in spirit, he and his wife have recently celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary together with their seven children and seventeen grandchildren.

A child prodigy at the age of five, already engaged in higher learning, he was promoted to a class in the difficult study of the Talmud. His scholarly aptitudes having been recognized, he was eagerly tutored by the greatest rabbis of Israel and was ordained by the famous Rabbi Berlin and Rabbi Cook. He had mastered Turkish, French and German and soon became the representative of Jerusalem's Jewish Community to Turkey. As a man of integrity with humane understanding, he was entrusted with the distribution of relief to the poor and the needy of Jerusalem. At the end of the First World War, he was offered a position as rabbi in Liverpool, England. This, he rejected and came to America. Here he completed a course in World Literature given by Columbia University and accepted a post as rabbi in Cleveland.

Today three decades later, Rabbi Israel Porath is the Dean of Cleveland's Orthodox rabbinate. As author of the OUTLINE OF THE TALMUD written in modern Hebrew, he has received letters of praise and acclaim from over 1500 scholars the world over. Six volumes of this work have already been published. The seventh is in manuscript form. These scholarly works have been used as texts and as reference manuals by students and rabbis everywhere.

Rabbi Porath's love for Torah and Jewish Education had long established him as a great teacher in our community. The Board of the Bureau of Jewish Education looks to him as to its staunchest pillars. His poetic and fluent command of Hebrew has served as an inspiration to all members of Cleveland's Histadruth Ivrith of which he is honorary president. Similar inspiring influences have been felt on every board and in all the many organizations to which he belongs. Indelible are the impressions he has made on his congregations and audiences wherever he spoke but especially memorable are the courses and institutes on the Bible which he conducted for Hadassah, Pioneer Women, Mizrachi and Council of Jewish Women.

The efforts of Rabbi Porath on behalf of the Jewish National Fund on whose executive board he has served for many years have been a way of expressing his deep and abiding love for the people and the land of Israel.

Therefore, the Women's Division of the Jewish National Fund Council takes great pride in honoring this beloved rabbi by launching a drive to plant 10,000 trees in a forest in Israel to be known as THE RABBI ISRAEL PORATH FOREST.





# AN INVITATION TO SEE

# ART OF THE SEAWAY NATIONS

Cleveland began a 10-week-long celebration of the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway on April 20, 1959.

Highlighting the affair are nationality weeks featuring many of the nations whose bonds of commerce, industry, and culture will be more closely linked with Cleveland because of the Seaway.

How best could The East Ohio Gas Company, asked its president, R. W. Ramsdell, participate in honoring these nations?

The answer was to exhibit the art of Seaway nations in East Ohio's community room in Cleveland's newest skyscraper. Here, in a setting of modernity, could be blended the art of yesterday which lives today and which will live tomorrow.

It was a project which The Cleveland Museum of Art was happy to make possible, for the Art Museum believes in bringing art to the people of Cleveland.

Each week the exhibits on display are to be changed to honor a different Seaway nation. On the following pages are descriptions of the art exhibits to be seen in the Community Room of The East Ohio Gas Company, East Ninth and Superior.

You are cordially invited to visit East Ohio's Community Room to see these and other exhibits which will be on display during the Seaway celebration.



# POPE INNOCENT X

This portrait of Pope Innocent X expresses much of the grandiose, extravagant, and luxurious spirit of the papal commissions in the midseventeenth century, the height of the Baroque period in art. Innocent X, formerly Gian Battista Pamfili, reigned from 1644 to 1655. The Pamfili were just one of several papal families who were the most zealous patrons of art of the era. They played the part of royal princes and they were responsible for the construction of magnificent churches and chapels with their rich appointments of paintings, altars, and tomb monuments. They built vast complexes of palaces, villas and gardens. And they also had their portraits painted on canvas and rendered in large impressive sculptural busts such as the one on exhibition. One of the most renowned paintings of all time is Velazquez' portrait of this same Pope, Innocent X, which is now in the Galleria Doria-Pamfili in Rome.

The Cleveland Museum's bronze bust lies in the tradition of the official portraiture of such Baroque sculpture as Bernini (1598-1680) and Algardi (1602-1654). Much of the richness of surface, the sweep, and the sense of monumentality found in their work is seen here. Here also we may see a realistic depiction of the lines and expression of the face. Offsetting this is the richly chased ornament of the border of the cope and the full swell of the cope itself. This bronze was probably made in the Vatican foundry in Rome.



### A ROMAN PORTRAIT BUST

Roman portraiture, throughout its long and varied career, from the days of the Republic in the first century B.C. until the time of Constantine in the fourth century A.D., has furnished us with numerous sculptures of excellent quality. The portrait bust of a woman, now on exhibit, is a fine example of the style prevalent at the time of Nero (54-68 A.D.), at the very end of the Augustan Age.

At the beginning of the Augustan Age, during the reign of Augustus (31 B.C.-A.D. 14), when Rome had become a cosmopolitan center, Roman portrait artists were highly influenced by Greek sculpture. A new concept of the individual had evolved under the Empire, a concept which required a style more noble, more monumental, than the realistic and highly individualistic style which had prevailed under the Republic. This classicist style continued throughout the Augustan Age, and we can see lingering traces of it in the portrait bust, which was carved at the end of that period. The features are generalized, and rendered by simple, abstract, almost geometric forms.


The portrait bust of a woman is characteristic of a style of Roman portraiture at the apex of the classicizing Augustan Age, and presages the developments of the latter part of the first and the second centuries, where a return to the native tradition of realistic, individualistic portraiture is made.



### MIRACLE II

Jacques Lipchitz in his later work, such as this fine bronze executed in 1947, shows a pre-occupation with multiple imagery combined with emphatic sculptural forms. Here there is a direct allusion to the Torah, or Pentateuch, and the Chanukah Lamp, the eight-branched lamp used for the Festival of Dedication, which was instituted in 165 B.C. by Judah Maccabeus in celebration of the rededication of the Temple, three years after it had been defiled by Antiochus Epiphanes.

The sculptural effect depends largely on the repetition of a series of upward turning arcs on each side of a central axis. The resulting flame-like quality expresses a joyousness which alludes both to the celebration of Chanukah and the feelings of hope and expectation of the Jewish people at the end of World War II.



### THE DRILLER

Max Kalish in an effort to discover, as an American sculptor, something that touched him deeply and also had universal appeal, devoted a great part of his creative life to the laborer as subject matter. Of the many labor subjects that he did, such as "Man Power," "Stoker," and "Glass Blower," "The Driller" which was done in the thirties, is one of his best works. Kalish felt that by his sympathetic treatment of American workers, he was speaking out on their behalf, and making a wider public aware of the important force behind our highly industrial society.

As a sculptor, his concern was more for the sentiment and idea suggested by his subject matter than for the formal elements of sculpture itself. Considerable emphasis is placed on facial expression, muscular development, and posture, with the result that great realism is achieved.

Max Kalish's productive life and wide national acceptance made him one of Cleveland's best known sculptors.



# **NARCISSUS**


Maurice Lambert's metal figure bearing the provocative title of "Narcissus," taken from the Greek myth, rises, seemingly half formed, from the leaves or petals at the base. It is represented in terms of soft rounded undefined forms, conveying a feeling of embryonic development of form at the brink of self-realization, the nascent self. This type of sculpture is interesting not only for its design of smooth curves, but also for its subtle psychological implications.



### HELMET HEAD

This small work by the well-known contemporary sculptor, Henry Moore, has the monumental quality of some of his large-scale sculpture. It was made in 1952, possibly as a study for a larger work. This bronze presents an intriguing contrast of enveloped space with rounded planes. The texture of the surface is varied by means of lines and accents. The Helmet Head also expresses a foreboding, ominous quality, due in part to the ambiguity between helmet and head, shoulders and enveloping cloak, an effect heightened by the extreme contrast between the deep shadows of the interior space and the highlights on the surface.

In many of Moore's earlier works, the human form is suggested by cutting into, even entirely through, the solid bulk of the material. This piece is almost a reversal of that process—here he encloses and models space by means of plastic forms. In both cases, space is as important an element as the solid material in creating the illusion of human form.




### LITTLE BROTHER AND SISTER

This charming work by Auguste Rodin was given to The Cleveland Museum of Art in 1917 by Mr. Salmon P. Halle, who directly negotiated for it with the great French sculptor himself. It is important as one of Rodin's last efforts before his death in 1917. The handling of the material, a clear white, almost translucent marble, reflects the subtle delicacy of texture and modulation which Rodin captures in so many of his larger works. The size of the block from which it was cut can be realized from the large base that still remains. The sculpture itself expresses a delicacy of sentiment and suavity which is truly French and yet also an unmistakably personal quality of Auguste Rodin, found in many of his works in marble.



# YOUNG SAINT JOHN AND THE LAMB

This small bronze sculpture of eighteenth-century France shows a winsome figure of the infant St. John the Baptist together with his symbols of the lamb and the rough wooden cross. The sculptor has depicted the familiar saint, however, not as a stern ascetic or preacher in the usual rough garment of animal skin but in a way very similar to the Baroque depiction of the Christ Child as a charmingly playful infant. This work can easily be compared to the "Little Brother and Sister" for it contains the same refinement and sentiment along with a certain suave delicacy which can be seen in the Rodin work done many years later.

### BRONZE PLAQUES BY MEUNIER

Constantin Meunier was a Belgian artist of the late nineteenth century who was artistically alive to the problems of his time. As a painter, sculptor, graphic artist and teacher, he had considerable influence upon the artists of his day.

The three bronze plaques exhibited are studies he did for a huge Labor Monument in Belgium. His interest in coal miners, foundry workers and farmers reminds us of one of his more famous contemporaries-Van Gogh. The comparison could be drawn at least as far as to point out that both men were influenced by the powerful and simplified figure drawing of the French artist Millet, whose paintings expressed a sincere concern for the problems of the common man.

The effects of movement, struggle and power in these plaques are established, artistically, by use of strong diagonals, triangular groupings, and dramatic shadows created by the high relief of the figures. The powerful convincing effect of the series as a whole is established by the control and reserve of the artist. The figures are monumental in form, the composition lucid and simplified.

#### A JAPANESE WOODEN MONKEY

According to an old legend, the monkeys decorating the stable of the sacred horse at Nikko, dressed in Shinto priest's garments, come to life again each New Year's Eve. This story may have been derived partly from the famous Chinese romance about Songoku, the Wondrous King of Monkeys, who was also made the Master of the Heavenly Stable by the Jade Emperor, the Taoist Supreme Deity, with the hope that this would pacify the notorious rebel of the heavens. Disgusted by this not so complimentary title, our monkey hero raised a hell again in heaven. He styled himself as the "Great Sage, Equal to Heaven," and with his extraordinary magical power, put the hordes of heavenly army to flight. He crowned his achievement this time by stealing the Peach of Immortality, which he consumed. He was subdued finally only by the immeasurably gentle power of the Buddha, to whom he pledged his eternal service.

In traditional Eastern thought, animals no less than man are part of the same universal order, in whose embrace all participate in the undifferentiated, perpetual "process of being." From time immemorial, the Eastern artists have been delighted to express their joy and intimate understanding of the oneness of all realms of existence.

In this sixteenth-century wooden sculpture of the Japanese Momoyama Period, the artist not only took pleasure in recreating his mental image of the legendary monkey, which is rich in subtleties of sensuous delight and a certain abstract quality of decorativeness characteristic of his period, but he also bestowed upon our thoughtful animal a natural dignity and innate humor, and strongly reminded us that under the seeming melancholy of the monkey's expression and the seeming formality of his garment, remains always the Great Rebel in heaven, the Eastern counterpart of Prometheus—precursor of humanity.





#### A BRONZE ALVAR

This is an image in bronze of one of the twelve saints called Alvars, possibly Periyalvar, who lived in South India in the ninth century, and devoted himself to the great Hindu deities Vishnu and Krishna. He brought flowers to Krishna's temple at Shrivilliputtur, every day. The hymns he wrote, still recited on all occasions of worship, express an ecstatic and tender devotion characteristic of all the Alvars, who were ardently dedicated to the service of God in a direct and personal, rather than an official, ritualistic way. This is shown in the image by the reverent position of the hands, a gesture of salutation and supplication.

Such images stood in the large temple of the Great God, or were placed in small temples of their own, situated on hill tops, on the banks of rivers, or in gardens. This one was cast from a wax model in the eleventh century when the powerful Chola dynasty ruled South India.



#### A GLASS BOWL BY DALL

Spanish artists have played a leading role in contemporary art. Pablo Picasso, Juan Gris, Joan Miro and Salvador Dali are names well known to the general public. Dali, the designer of this bowl, played an important part in the Surrealist movement for several years and he has always had a flair for the dramatic—in life and in art.

The design for this bowl exhibits the Surrealists' interest in irrational images from the subconscious, the world of dreams. Several of Dali's familiar symbols, such as the crutch and the sail, are used here. His tendency to work primarily in terms of line, rather than atmospheric light and shade or color, makes it relatively easy for the glass engraver to apply his design to the bowl.

#### **HEAD OF A PRINCESS**

Among the tribal arts of Africa are the magnificent bronze sculptures created in the ancient kingdom of Benin, which existed in the territory of Modern Nigeria from the twelfth to the nineteenth centuries. This particular culture, although mute in written record, speaks plainly of its past skills and glory through examples of cunningly cast bronzes such as the "Head of a Princess." It is completely stylized, as is most African art, a portrait head realized in a crisp, clear and highly decorative style. The beaded headdress and coral necklace contrast effectively with the smooth fully rounded cheeks. The intricate play of curves in lips, eyes and necklace are accented by the strong straight upright line of the braid. It is both a subtle and sophisticated work in a style which has markedly influenced and inspired modern art in Europe and America.



#### **ADAGIO**

Georg Kolbe's bronze figure "Adagio" (1923) is a work of this important German sculptor's middle years. It stands at a point in his long career where the suffocating effects of a rigid academic training, the influence of the tortured humanism of Rodin, and the elegant manner of the Paris school, have all been put behind him. The careful balance of shapes and volumes, the gentle rhythms in the whole piece and its supporting parts, coupled with a suggested withdrawn and aesthetic mood, characterized all of his work of this period. These elements were almost infinitely varied and refined in the remarkably long creative years that followed. He seldom did groups of figures, but limited his basically lyrical expression to single figures.

The span of his productive life covered some artistically dangerous years. And the evidence of such influences as romanticism, nineteenth-century realism, cubism, and expressionism make their appearance almost in that order. But a considered look at the final accomplishment leaves one satisfied that Kolbe was one of the twentieth century's significant sculptors.

#### STONE METATE AND ROLLER

This massive sculptured stone metate was used by the Indians of Pre-Columbian Central America for grinding all-important maize into the flour meal from which the staples of their diet were The metate itself is more than a mere utensil, it is also a handsome example of the Pre-Columbian peoples' predilections in design and sculpture. It is a solid blocky piece standing on three short legs in the form of a highly stylized beast, powerfully executed in a grotesque style. Probably the serpent head motif which occurs here had some magical significance in relation to maize, since a number of their three-legged metates have been found with the same type of fantastic head. This useful piece of sculpture found in Honduras illustrates the uniquely powerful and highly complex designs of the natives, and it shows, in the roller shaped to fit the grinding surface, their efficient practicality in making useful objects of stone.





#### MASK

This Wooden Head and Face Mask is Mexican and probably comes from the tropical village of Paintla not far from Taxco. It was used in a pagan animal dance which is now part of the Lenten celebrations associated with the blessing of the animals. It is difficult to date art objects of this kind because of their strong regional character and, usually, unique use.

It is carved from a single block of wood. The inside is roughly done but much care has been taken with the outside. The seal or dog-like appearance of the face and head with the ribbing around the mouth and the one blank eye

indicate a deliberate procedure.

The use of this type of mask in primitive magical rites is well known and its comic-horrible appearance holds a curious fascination for most of us.


