## The Children

**T**WENTY-SIX Community Fund agencies cared for 7,159 dependent children during the past year—2,041 in the 14 orphanages, 63 in the two homes for crippled, 1,293 in boarding, free, or adoptive homes of the Humane Society, 1,230 under supervision in their own homes, 1,375 in seven day nurseries, and 303 at the Children's Fresh Air Camp for undernourished and "pre-tubercular."

Cooperation by these child-caring agencies through the Children's Bureau is keeping children in their own homes wherever possible and is retarding the need for more institutions.

Health service was provided for all and, through the Children's Aid Society and the Child Guidance Clinic, 854 "problem" children found a way out of their difficulties.

The average "family" under care of these 26 agencies on any one day numbers 3,170 children.



## Health

**I**N the promotion of health 16 agencies are busy.

218,718 nursing visits last year were made by four agencies to 30,822 homes; 3,266 persons received individual health instruction from three agencies.

23,950 treatments were given 9,950 persons in health and dental clinics; 726 blind and 1,285 crippled folks learned to work or play.



### **The Family**

**D**IFFICULTIES greater than they could meet — economic disaster — confronted 10,659 families and 19,370 individuals last year.

Food, clothing, shelter, and other relief through ten Community Fund agencies enabled them to get through safely.

Work was secured for 7,782 persons; 2,136 disabled ex-service men and families of such men received aid.

Thousands of others were in need of the neighborly helping hand which these agencies gave as representatives of more than 400,000 Community Fund donors.

---

### **Our Aged**

**E**IGHT Homes for Aged sheltered 272 old folks last year, providing a haven for their declining years. Two of these homes are maintained especially for the care of invalids.

Many more aged people, more fortunately placed, are enabled by help from the family agencies to remain in their own homes, or with relatives or friends.

### **Character Building and Recreation**

Children, adults — people of many classes — benefit from the Recreational and Character Building agencies.

In schools and citizenship classes of the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A. and Citizens' Bureau, 11,053 last year received instruction. A total attendance of 523,381 was recorded in clubs and classes at ten settlements.

Ten playgrounds reported an attendance of 311,815 while 45,732 happy boys and girls belonged to organized groups in the Boy and Girl Scouts, Camp Fire and Girl Reserves, Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A.

8,896 city children were taken to the 16 fresh air camps where character - and -health - building combines with the thrill of two weeks amid fields and woods.



### **Dispensary and Hospital Care**

Eighteen Community Fund hospitals admitted 49,762 bed patients last year — 7,818 free, 31,407 part pay, and 10,537 full pay — an average of 1,890 per day.

In addition 287,812 visits were made to 15 dispensaries operated by these hospitals for those unable to pay the regular fees.

Your Community Fund invested \$855,260 last year in free and part pay service of dispensaries and hospitals.

Additional service of the same kind amounting to \$292,567 was provided by hospitals themselves with income from their endowments.





## Protection

Nine protective agencies helped 28,014 persons last year. 932 of these were unmarried mothers assisted by the Humane Society and the four rescue homes.

389 were girls protected by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd; 147 were discharged prisoners helped through the Brotherhood Club.

16,630 strangers were assisted by the Travelers' Aid Society; the Legal Aid Society served 7,525

Thousands of girls with delinquent tendencies received guidance and help from the Women's Protective Association.

**I**T should be understood that the 1926 Community Fund budget (pages 8-9) does not commit the Fund to make corresponding appropriations. The circumstances during 1926 cannot be foreseen, although present and past experience is a useful guide. Some cases are more urgent than others, but changing conditions may rearrange priorities; as the year 1926 proceeds some needs may be decreased and others increased. In order to permit the wisest application of resources to needs as they develop, the Community Fund reserves discretionary power with respect to appropriations. Any balance in the Community Fund, unexpended or unappropriated on January 1, 1927, will be considered available for Community Fund purposes requiring support during the year then beginning.

Dear Sir:

Pursuant to request, we have audited the recorded Cash Receipts and Cash Disbursements of the CLEVELAND COMMUNITY FUND, for the period from November 17, 1924, to September 30, 1925.

We submit herewith a summary of the recorded Cash Receipts and Cash Disbursements for the period audited, together with a summary of pledges received in connection with the 1924 Campaign, showing the total pledges, payment received and the unpaid balances as September 30, 1925. There are also included exhibits of expenses applicable to the 1924 and 1925 Campaigns, and Administration, Collection and Publicity expenses for the period from January 1, 1925, to September 30, 1925.

All recorded Cash Receipts for the period named were traced directly into the bank deposits by us, and we found all recorded Cash Disbursements for the same period to be supported by cancelled bank checks and other data on file, with the exception of the checks outstanding at September 30, 1925. 



Confirming telephone conversation, there is a second great service that I would like to ask of you, namely, that you be the principal speaker at Mr. Mather's annual dinner meeting, which will be held on the following Wednesday evening, November 14th, at 6 o'clock at the Mid Day Club.

We have usually had an out of town speaker for this event, but this year inasmuch as this is our Tenth Anniversary Campaign, we desire to make it a home effort.

Mr. Mather has given this dinner each year for the past ten years, as a recognition of the services of Division "A" and the leaders of the other Divisions of the Campaign organization. An invitation is extended as well to a group of the larger donors. It is a meeting of the utmost importance to us all and in the past has been most effective in renewing the interest and enthusiasm of the leaders of the community in the great Fund enterprise.

We turn to you as the one who can most faithfully interpret the great social and spiritual values contained in the Fund plan. We would expect to allow you thirty to forty minutes. You would not need to feel under the necessity of getting an entirely fresh address ready for this second event.

We would hope that you would especially stress at Mr. Mather's dinner the responsibility that goes with prosperity and wealth - stewardship in all of its broad and deep implications - the responsibility of the strong to help the weak.


Dear Rabbi Silver:







The Speakers Table will gather in the foyer of the Grand Ballroom at noon, and will move into the Ballroom at 12:10.


