



MAJOR EMPHASES Recommended by the NATIONAL BOARD for the Biennium 1938 - 1940

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Part of the Report of the National Board of the Young Women's Christian Associations of the United States of America to the Fifteenth National Convention, Columbus, Ohio, April 22-28, 1938 Issued by the NATIONAL BOARD OF THE YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATIONS 600 Lexington Avenue New York, New York

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Major Emphases for the Biennium 1938-1940

In a troubled time such as the present, the Association is pressed from every side to face important issues and to add new tasks to those to which it is already committed. It is particularly necessary therefore for the whole Association and especially for its leadership to see clearly the ends toward which the program must be directed. In the light of our Christian purpose and the needs both within the Association and in the world at large today, the National Board recommends the following major emphases for the biennium 1938-1940.

Religion:

Two years ago the National Board in recommending a major emphasis on religion for the years 1936-1938 said: "The Y. W. C. A. believes that the Christian way of life is the answer to the acute problems of our time, and that the great question which faces us today is how to interpret our Christian faith in living terms so that it shall be recognized as the dynamic that can transform the whole of life." As the Associations and the National Board and staff together have striven to make this emphasis during the past two years, as they have faced the challenge of the Standards Study to make the Christian purpose of the organization the touchstone for all its program and all its ways of work, they have become more and more aware that religion must always be a major emphasis in the Y. W. C. A. Moreover in these two years of deepening world tragedy the conviction has grown among many in the Association that an international fellowship of Christian women has a very special contribution to make to the life of our time. In presenting religion as the first of the major emphases for another biennium the National Board is conscious of a call to the Association in this realm at this time which cannot be denied without disloyalty to our most fundamental purpose.

The studies made in several Associations of methods of developing the religious emphasis have revealed not alone the complexity of the Association situation but also the almost unique opportunity we have in the religious field because of the great diversity of religious background, tradition, and experience to be found within the leadership, the membership, and the constituency of the Association. In the second section of the report of the National Board on the past biennium that opportunity is, in general terms, defined. The report from the National Services Division on its work with relation to membership practices points out the baffling sense of confusion and failure which exists in many Associations with regard to developing a more significant electoral membership. There are however evidences of an increasing desire among the membership in some Associations to share more fully in the responsibility for the realization of the Association purpose.

The report of the Standards Study makes unmistakably clear not only that the Christian purpose affords the only possible criterion for judging Association practices and relationships and that any Association which does not "deliberately, persistently and honestly endeavor in all that it does to build the kind of fellowship described in the purpose" is substandard at the most crucial point, but also that throughout the movement are to be found many practices that thwart rather than build such a fellowship.

In the analysis of some of the issues before the Association in the report of the past biennium attention is called to the fact that Christianity is today being challenged by opposing systems of thought as it has not been for many centuries and stress is put upon the extent of the responsibility that rests upon the Association as an international Christian organization in the face of this challenge. We are beginning to see more clearly the greatness of our task and the faith and courage, the insight, patience, and humility required to accomplish it. A sorely troubled world demands of us today that we risk our Christian purposes in areas of conflict where, often, the forces that drive men apart seem stronger than those that bind them together. In the face of bitterness and strife in the world, in our own communities, and often in our very selves it is necessary today for the Association to have both sound knowledge and great faith and courage in believing that it is possible "to build a fellowship of women and girls devoted to the task of realizing in our common life those ideals of personal and social living to which we are committed by our faith as Christians." We are at a moment when the Y. W. C. A. along with other Christian groups needs desperately to re-examine and restate the faith that is in us and fearlessly strive to build life upon it. Believing that responsibility for this rests upon the entire leadership of the movement, it is recommended:

- 1. That Association leaders strive for a deeper understanding of the meaning of the Christian faith and of those ideals to which we are committed by that faith; for a better knowledge of the religious needs of the different groups within the Association constituency and of how the Association may help its members to find new and adequate life direction through Christian experience; and that the National Board strengthen its program resources at these points.
- 2. That in the selection of professional leadership, special effort be made to secure young women who have academic preparation as well as personal experience in the field of religion and who are consciously seeking to relate their training and experience in this field both to the many personal problems and to the great social issues with which youth today is confronted.

3. That the National Board give special consideration to the place of religion in training for leadership in the Y. W. C. A., making such modifications in or additions to the training offered to volunteer and professional leaders as shall equip them more adequately for work in an organization with a Christian purpose.

Democracy:

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The Young Women's Christian Association endeavors to live its life as an organization in a way that shall conserve freedom for the individual, that is, the right of the individual to make his own choices and to carry his share of responsibility for the common life. This is what the Association means by democracy. The Y. W. C. A. holds this philosophy of group life not because of commitment to any particular political theory but because it is Christian. Such a viewpoint stems back to the Christian philosophy of the value and worth of each individual person as a child of God.

For the actual expression of this philosophy in the life of the Association a democratic administration of Association affairs is, as the Standards Study points out, an essential condition. Administrative processes should recognize both the status and the responsibility for the whole of each individual and group within the Association and should provide opportunity for the fulfillment of the responsibility which attaches to the status. Such a process is long and complicated. To have faith in it is to recognize that often the way a plan is made, a policy or a program developed, is quite as important as the policy or program itself.

Wherever immediate results are the accepted test of value, this patient serving of the demogratic ideal is easly underestimated and misunderstood. It is well to ask ourselves at this time just what it costs to be democratic in method in loyalty to our Christian purpose. The cost is very definite: in the first place the whole pancess of work is made slower; quick results cannot be gained in this way. In the second place there is a certain loss of sharpness of outline. The result of combining many viewpoints into one is always that the most widely divergent views are toned down. Thirdly, there is bound to be a loss of interest and support on the part of those persons who cannot modify or change there own viewpoint to include that of others. And lastly, the organization that is committed to a democratic ideal in the ordering of its life must accept the fact that its life will never be restful. Tension is inevitable if differing views are constantly appearing and forcing change of opinion and modification of methods of work.

If these are some of the more obvious costs, what are the gains? The first gain is that by firm adherence to this principle of democratic process we express in unmistakable terms our belief in one of the fundamental teachings of Christianity, that is the worth of the individual. The second gain is that however slow may be our advance, it holds steady, and avoids those extremes which do not grow out of experience. The third gain is that by this process, and only so, a widely varied movement containing many kinds of women and girls enriching each other and the life of the whole by their widely differing experience is made possible. The fourth gain is that insofar as the Association can achieve success in this process it will make a contribution to the dominant problem in the world today—the problem of living at peace with one's fellows in a world grown small.

To hold to this ideal of democracy in all the activities of a Christian organization is a difficult task. From the leadership it demands a twofold equipment. It requires in each one a spiritual life so confident in its steady turning toward God that mind and heart are open to His leading for thought and word and deed, and it requires also the skill in leadership and the breadth of understanding that come from constant study of the problems of our daily life. Over the last quarter century the Association has been more facile in developing the techniques of leadership than it has been in encouraging and assisting the growth of the life of the spirit.

The dark shadows of a world rent by controversy are closing round us. This present generation of Association leaders and those who follow close after may face, as their predecessors never did, the sharp conflict between the ideals of personal freedom and a controlled society, the fundamental divergence between a philosophy which is God-centered and a philosophy which is man-centered. The Association through its ways of work as well as through the guiding star of its purpose can prepare women and girls to face and make the choice of the road to be followed not only by the Y. W. C. A. but also by themselves as individuals. This prophetic function is of great importance; it should not be lost. It is, therefore, recommended:

- 1. That the leadership of the Association, both local and national, endeavor in the coming biennium to make its methods of work a more adequate expression of the democratic way of life which is one of the ideals to which we are called by our "Christian faith.
- 2. That the National Board strengthen its help to Associations in this field through the sharing of experience and the preparation of material.

Building a World Community:

The Y. W. C. A. believes that the only solution of the tragic differences which now tear the nations apart is to be found "in the progressive organization of a world society in which the principles of the brotherhood of man and the freedom of all peoples may find practical expression in political, economic and social practices and institutions,"* and from which war shall have been completely eliminated. As a member of a world-wide Christian organization, the Y. W. C. A. in the United States feels an urgent call to take its full share in the task of helping to bring such a world society into being. It recognizes that responsibility for striving toward this goal rests peculiarly upon the present generation which sees the rapid growth of nationalism and of wars more destructive than ever before. Yet how, actually, as Associations or as members of the Association, may we set about working for this ideal of the brotherhood of man, expressed in the ordered life of a world community? Two things are necessary, an attitude of mind, and a program of action, and of these two the first is primary in importance.

Those who would help to build a world community must accept it as an object of personal dedication. They must be prepared to study diligently the means by which it may be achieved and to work untiringly for it, knowing that it is a task which will require many generations. Above all they must themselves develop in their relations with others those attitudes of mind which the building of a world community requires. What are some of these essential attitudes?

The first attitude is belief in one's fellow men. Today it is difficult to move forward in the field of constructive international relations because of the wide-spread attitude of suspicion and cynicism: suspicion of individuals, classes, nations; cynicism regarding the existence or worth of idealism, altruism, unselfishness and neighborly good will. Such attitudes as these are great disintegrating forces. They must be replaced by belief in men and in ideals if we would build a world community. The mood of sophisticated hyper-criticism current today paralyzes effort and does nothing toward constructing a better world.

The second of these attitudes is tolerance. Building a world community will permit no intolerance of religious groups—Protestant, Catholic, Jewish, or any other. It cannot be coupled with intolerance of racial groups—Negro, Oriental, or any other. It cannot be combined with intolerance of any political group, such as communist or fascist. Nor will it prosper with intolerance of class groups, such as labor or capital. Tolerance does not imply agreement. If all agreed, there would be no need for tolerance. Nor does it imply failure to express judgment where moral issues are involved. It does, however, insist that there must be constant effort to understand and to

give status and responsibility to each group, and recognition that the world community can only be built of all groups.

To the attitudes of tolerance and belief in one's fellow men the worker for a world society must add patience and humility. With humility one ceases to be assured that one knows the certain remedy for the ills in the complicated structure of world affairs; with patience one is ready to listen, to study, to work with others toward the goal. The task is a long one. At the same time the need is immediate. Even where we do not see the way we must diligently search for it.

The program of education and action for the Y. W. C. A. which these attitudes must undergird is one with which we are already familiar: education in international affairs and in world fellowship especially as it is experienced through sharing in the life of the Association in other lands; action with regard to international relations such as is recommended in the proposed program in Public Affairs; participation in the policy and program of the World's Y. W. C. A. and in the work of the Foreign Division. There is also an especial call today for us to take upon ourselves the burden of suffering of those in war torn lands. Most important of all is the action which we can take within our own Associations by which we demonstrate in our own life the power of Christianity to overcome race prejudice, to eliminate race discrimination and to make one true community of our diverse American population.

Believing that the Y. W. C. A. is called today first of all by its Christian purpose and also by the inclusiveness of its membership, by the large and diverse number of young women in its constitutency, and by its world-wide fellowship to outstanding effort for the building of a world Christian comunity, it is recommended:

- That the Associations and the National Board endeavor to extend more widely throughout the constituency of the movement the idea of a Christian world community and an understanding of the opportunity and the responsibility which the Association has to help build it.
- 2. That the Associations and the National Board give special attention to the unique opportunity inherent in the Association for increasing direct contact between girls and women of different countries and races, making the fullest possible use for this purpose of the opportunities afforded by our membership in the World's Y. W. C. A.; by the work of the Foreign Division; and by the diversity of races and nationalities within the constituency of the Associations in the United States.

The adoption of these emphases would charge the Association, both leadership and membership, with responsibility for a fresh expression of the Christian purpose of the Association in terms of the great needs of our generation.
