Dear Rabbi Silver:

This is to invite you to the Twenty-fourth American Assembly to be held at Arden House, Harriman, New York, October 24-27, 1963. The subject will be THE UNITED STATES AND THE MIDDLE EAST. Among the topics to be discussed are: nationalism and the role of the military; economic conditions; inter-Arab relations; the Arab-Israeli conflict.

The Assembly will be made up of about sixty people from business, labor, government, education, medicine, religion, and other professions. Some will be specialists in problems pertaining to the Middle East; others, interested lay leaders.

Preparation for the Assembly consists in reading background papers of moderate length written by several authorities. Participants will receive them about two weeks before the Assembly. At the close of their discussions, the participants will approve a statement of findings and recommendations for United States policy. This, together with the background papers, will be published and circulated widely.

The Assembly will convene for luncheon on Thursday, October 24th and continue through luncheon on Sunday, October 27th. Because the conclusions are those of the participants, not The American Assembly (which takes no position), it is important that those who come should remain through the plenary session on Sunday morning.

Transportation from New York City to Arden House and return will be provided. During your stay you will be the guest of The American Assembly. If you have no organization budget for travel, we can reimburse you for your round trip expenses to Arden House.

An Assembly on these subjects could be a valuable public service. I hope I may count on your participation.
