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



We look forward to your visit with great anticipation. I am enclosing a copy of the order of the service of Sage Chapel which might give you an idea as to the format and the responsibilities in conducting the service. It is the practice in Sage Chapel to have the Preacher lead the congregation in worship as well. If you have any particular questions, please do not hesitate to write.

There are two other matters with which I hope you will be able to favor us with your assistance. One is that I would like to have an informal meeting with a number of faculty people at which time I would like to have you speak on the general situation of Israel and its relationship to American foreign policy. During the past semester there have been a number of speakers brought by the Arab Club that have caused a bit of stir on the campus. Among the speakers were Alfred Lilienthal, who happens to be a Cornell alumnus, and Dr. Faye: A. Sayegh, the Acting Director of the Arab States Delegation to the United Nations. Lilienthal had a very large turnout primarily because of the goodly number of Jewish students who came out of curiosity and mainly to heckle. Nevertheless there are some influential members of the faculty who indicated agreement with his views. Dr. Sayegh, who in my opinion is the ablest speaker for the Arab viewpoint, did not have a very large turnout but was effective with a number of influential University people. I think it is important that we have a person like yourself to speak to a university audience and to try to correct some of the misinformation.

The other matter relates to the Jewish Chautauqua Society which has recently contributed about thirty books to the library of Cornell United Religious Work. Would it be possible for you to act on their behalf in officially presenting these to the library? All that would be required would be a brief statement and acceptance by the Director of Cornell United Religious Work, Dr. Glenn A. Olds. This can be done very easily at a reception which we will have immediately after your talk. We have a number of copies of your book and individuals might wish to purchase copies then for your autograph. An appropriate announcement

to this effect will be made by our Chairman.

I realize this entails a heavy schedule, but I trust it will not be too great a burden upon you. I will appreciate your letting me know what your plans for arrival and departure are.
