



The Babies Must Be Protected

Five Thousand Babies Were Helped

Last year 4,885 babies were aided by the Baby Clinics, the visiting Nurse Association, and the Child Welfare Association and the Red Cross. Many others were aided by the Hospital dispensaries. In many cases the life of the little one was saved by the careful and trained ministrations of the workers in these agencies. This service is of vital importance to the community. These children are our greatest asset. The work must go on, and those whose parents cannot pay must be cared for free of charge. Gifts to the Welfare Federation help provide this free service.



Many Little Lives Saved Yearly



Last year over 1000 little babies were treated in the two Welfare Federation hospitals and one-third were cared for free because parents were unable to pay. These babies live in Harrisburg, and in Dauphin, Perry, and Cumberland Counties. Physicians and surgeons donated their service and attention, but food, medicines, and supplies had to be purchased. Hundreds of little babies will need the same kind of service this year. Many smiling tots will be saved for a fruitful life because our citizens, through gifts to the welfare fund, provide for the care of those whose parents cannot pay.

Unmarried Mothers Cared For

Unmarried mothers and their fatherless children are being quietly but efficiently cared for by the Welfare Federation agencies. No institution is used because institutions are expensive and because this problem can be handled better in an individual way. Last year 15 unmarried mothers and their little babies were successfully cared for in this individual way. While the emphasis of the Welfare Federation is on preventive work, the babies and the mothers must not suffer.

Little Children Must Not Suffer

Over 12,000 Children Aided

12,616 children from Dauphin. Perry and Cumberland Counties received some type of care last year from the Welfare Federation agencies. These organizations are always on the alert to protect little children from the ills of improper social or economic environment.

A father deserts his family and the mother is left alone without relatives or money. The Children's Bureau of the Associated Aid Societies answers the call for help. The children may be sen: to the Children's Home or to the Sylvan Heights Home for temporary care. They may be placed in a foster home until the mother is able to support them. The mother may be given an allowance so




that she can remain at home with her little family. Each situation is studied separately, the mother helping to work out the plan that will best meet her particular problem. Over 400 cases of this sont were successfully handled last year.

The Child Welfare Association Builds Better Citizens



The Child Welfare Association looks after the health and recreation of the child in the formative period of its development; it provides playgrounds, health and recreation centers in the poorer sections of the city; it directs the diet of the growing child through the medium of the "Penny Lunches," which give a balanced diet at a penny a portion.

Healthier, stronger, and more capable children are the result, and this means a stronger citizenship for the Harrisburg of tomorrow. How better can a welfare dollar be spent than for preventive work of this calibra?

Character Building Agencies Must Be Supported

Preventive Work Pays

The Character Building agencies of the Welfare Federation cooperate with the churches in preventing the youth of today from becoming the social problem of tomorrow, Their service is not measured in terms of money spent but in the number of youths contacted each day of the week and each week in the year.

Last year the attendance at the various activities of these character building agencies and the membership in their various groups and classes totaled 239,073. This figure represents youths not only from Harrisburg but from almost every town in Perry, Dauphin, and Cumberland Counties.



Why They are Not Self-Supporting



The Character Building agencies which gave such excellent service last year to the youth and to the community are the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Central Y. M. C. A., Colored Y. M. C. A., Jewish Community Center, Pennsylvania Railroad Y. M. C. A., Phyllis Wheatley Association (Colored Y. W. C. A.), and the Y. W. C. A.

Any of these organizations could be entirely self-supporting, asking no help from the Welfare F-sderation, if they raised their dues to the figure that would cover the actual cost of operation. But this would exclude boys and girls from the poorer families, and often these are the

ones who need this service the most. Many people believe that money invested in this type of preventive work is the lest money we spend.

Needy Families Must Be Helped

Helping Families to Become Self - Supporting

Unemployment, sickness, death, desertion, or other causes may place any family in a position where it is unable to be self-supporting and must be cared for by the community.

When such a situation arises the Family Service agencies send a trained and experienced worker to visit the home. This worker always gives emergency relief immediately where it is needed. Then the causes of the trouble are studied and the family is helped back to a self-supporting basis. Last year scores of such families were successfully aided in coming back to self-support where they were no longer a drain upon the community.



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Nearly 50,000 People Aided Last Year



The Family Care and Relief Agencies are the Associated Aid, and Harrisburg Benevolent Association, and the American Red Cross. The Red Cross gives family care and relief in Perry and Dauphin Counties while the Associated Aid cares for families in Harrisburg and on parts of the West Shore. The Bethesda Mission, the Salvation Army, the Social Service Exchange, and the Traveler's Aid Society cooperate in helping to solve these problems.

Last year these agencies aided 48,961 families or individuals in Harrisburg and im the towns of Perry, and Cumberland Counties.



How Duplication is Prevented

The Social Service Exchange operates a clearing house for families and individuals which are being helped. This organization stimulates cooperation and helps to prevent duplication and overlapping. Last year the Social Service Exchange found that over 35% of the people applying for help were already known to some of the welfare agencies.

The Sick Must Be Cared For

Over 2,500 People Treated Free By Hospitals

Most men can support themselves and their families if they retain their health and vigor. Hence the curing and prevention of illness play an important part in solving the social problems of families.

Last year the Polyclinic Hospital and Harrisburg Hospital gave free care to 2519 patients, and part-pay service to 155 others. A total of 31,885 days of free care were given by these two institutions. Gifts to the Welfare Federation helped to make this service possible.



Nearly 3,000 People Helped By Visiting Nurses



The Visiting Nurse Association provides free nursing care where the patient is unable to pay, and port-pay service for those who can afford to pay only a small fee. Often only 25 of 50 cents is paid for service that would cost many dollars. This nursing service embraces pre-natal care, maternity service, well baby clinic service, preschool nursing service, and bedside nursing. 1'11 persons were cared for last year and 311 of these were unable to pay anything. 99 others could pay only a part of the fee. 1278 babies were cared for at the well baby clinics, making a total of 2989 persons receiving ware from this organization.

There are 179 blind persons in Harrisburg and Dauphin County. Many of these could be self-supporting if they would be given the right kind of work. The Association of the Blind provides employment for ten blind people in its small workshop, and assists a number of others to do a little work in their own homes. Given a chance to help themselves by other means than begging, the blind person usually shows himself an able and apt workman. The Association for the Blind has asked for a little larger budget this year and if this can be provided many more blind people can be given a chance to help themselves.

The Modern Way of Helping Aged Folks

The winter of life finds many uged people with no relatives or resources. Some of these old people are sickly and must be cared for in institutions. Many of them, however, can be made happier and can be cared for more economically by arranging for them to live with some private family. The Family Service agencies of the Welfare Federation are providing for a number of our aged people in this way.

Just as the old fashion-d "Orphan Asylum" has given way to the modern way of caring for children in private homes, so we are gradually learning that if aged people

can be placed in private family homes they are happier and more contented. This is the kind of care that your Family Service Agencies try to provide.

Why More Money Is Needed in 1928

There are three big reasons why more money is needed by the Welfare Federation this year.

INCREASED SERVICE TO BLIND

1. We must have money to do more for the blind people of our community. There are 179 blind in Dauphin County. Only 10 can be given employment in the small workshop now operated by the Association for the Blind. Many others are capable of earning a living if the proper facilities can be provided. Here is challenge to the generous people of Harrisburg. The blind must be cared for. This can only be done by increasing last year's subscriptions to the Welfare Fund. \$10,000 in new or increased gifts is needed.

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2. More money must be provided for character building work. Last year all of the agencies engaged in this work were handicapped by lack of funds. One organization almost closed up in the last months of the year. \$5,000 in new or increased gifts is needed.

3. Last year our Family Service agencies were badly handicapped because of insufficient funds. Three emergency appropriations were made to the Harrisburg Benevolent Association and the Red Cross. The people of Harrisburg do not want these erganizations underfinanced. \$3,000 in new or increased pledges is needed.



In addition to these three needs, totaling \$18,000, the Welfare Federation has lost almost \$3,000 in the past year on account of the death of contributors business failures, and removal from the city. This means that we must receive a total of \$21,000 in new gifts or increased pledges this year in order to take care of the conservative justified needs of our agencies.

Explain these facts to every contributor and urge those who are able to do so, to increase last year's pledge. Only in this way can the money that is needed be raised.

IN THE LEGISLATURE . . .

The first complete program of civil liberties legislation was presented to the Pennsylvania General Assembly at its 1931 session. Nine measures were introduced, aimed to correct conditions in a state notorious for the number and variety of cases involving free speech, press and assembly and the right of labor to organize for its protection.

Three Bills Passed and Signed

1. A curb on labor injunctions: Definite restrictions were placed on the courts in issuing injunctions against labor unions by limiting the life of temporary injunctions to five days and requiring a public hearing of both sides before the issuance of permanen; injunctions,

2. Trial by Jury for Contempt of Court: A companion measure of great importance took from judges their arbitrary power to inflict heavy fines and long prison terms for violations of labor injunctions. Trial by jury in such cases is now a law; fines are limited to \$100, and sentences to fifteen days. (This applies only to indirect criminal contempt).

3. Imported Strike-Breakers Ousted: Professional strike-breakers, often from the underworld of large cities, cannot be used in Pennsylvania in the future as deputy sheriffs. No one may now be deputized by the Sheriffs unless a resident of the county for one year, and free from a criminal record for ten years prior to appoint-

Bills Defeated-Bu: Discussed

Six measures-prepared, introduced and discussedfailed to pass. But the education of the Legislature and

the public on these vital matters was begun:

- 1. A Resolution calling for an investigation of con-ditions in "Company Towns," netorious for corporation control of workers lives and liberties. Passed the House, but was withheld from a vote in the Senate by one of its committees.
- 2. Repeal of the Sedition Act: A measure, passed in the wake of war hysteria, used to suppress freedom of speech and particularly to gag agitation for labor organization. Killed in a House Committee after a public hear-
- 3. Outlawing of "Yellow Dog" contracts: These agreements, which workers are forced to sign, prohibit them from joining a labor union for their own benefit and improvement. Our bill to outlaw these contracts was killed in the House Committee on Manufacturers.
- 4. Abolition of Company Payment of Deputy Sheriffs: A bill which would have invalidated contracts for the services of deputies between sheriffs and private companies failed to emerge from committee.
- 5. Control of State Police in Strikes: Our bill would have placed responsibility on the Governor for the presence of the State Constabulary in strikes. It was defeated twice in the House.
- 6. Abolition of Coal and Iron Police: We opposed all substitutes for the present syst-m and advocated complete repeal of the enabling statute. Governor Pinchot cancelled all coal and iron police commissions on July 1, 1931, for the duration of his term, but future governors may invoke the law again. It must be repealed!

Now is the time to prepare for the 1933 Session. A real start has been made in paying the way for the successful enactment of the defeated bills.

IN THE FIELD ...

Civil Liberties issues came to the front in every part of the state during a winter of unparallelec unemployment. Prosecutions under the Sedition Act and police violence against strikers and radicals were especially frequent. Some outstanding cases are noted:

Gains

1. Hunger March, Harrisburg, April 21, 1931: A state-wide Hunger March on Harrisburg promised to develop disorder and rioting, if the police interfered with their parade and petition to the Legislature. But the sensible decision of the Legislature to hear spokesmen of the march, and Governor Pinchot's interview with its leaders prevented all trouble.

2 Free Speech Victory at Johnstown: The arrest of fourteen people in connection with an attempted public meeting of the unemployed in Johnstown, February 10, 1931, after a permit had been refused, precipitated a free speech fight in the courts. Since then meetings have been

freely held without permits.

3. Ryder-Lynn Sedition cases—Philadelphia: Charged with distributing "seditious" literature, two young Communist girls were saved from prison by receiving suspended sentences.

4. Police censorship at Pittsburgh: The ban placed by the Pittsburgh police on the street sale of "The Unemployed," a magazine, on an equality with other publications was carried to the County Court by the League for Industrial Democracy where a notable victory was won. The same decision was subsequently used to uphold the sale of the "Daily Worker."

Losses

1. Sheriffs' Peace Proclamation in strikes: Sheriffs' "Proclamations," used to suppress lawful union activities under the cloak of "keeping the peace," continued to appear. Such orders were posted in Berks, Montgomery and Monroe Counties during a hosiery strike of 1930, and in the soft coal strike area in Washington County. The Civil Liberties Committee is advised that these proclama-

tions have no basis in law. They are a usurped power.

2. The Soft Coal strike—1931: The arrest of hundreds of strikers for picketing and parading, the employ-ment of deputies paid and directed by private companies, the killing of Peter Zigaric, and many other tragedies marked the strike in the bituminous mines of Western Pennsylvania. The Civil Liberties Committee interceded with public officials, held a public pretest meeting, and aided in court defense.

3. Hosiery Strike-Stroudsburg: A strike during the early months of 1931 was crippled by a sheriffs' procla-mation with the support of the Bar Association and by a court injunction. The murder of a girl striker and the conviction of a labor leader followed by a two-year jail sentence were of tragic significance. The Civil Liberties Committee aroused the community against the injunction at a protest meeting held April 12, 1931.

4. Arrest of James H. Maurer, Pittsburgh: This arrest, for his attempt to speak as the Socialist candidate for Governor from the steps of the City-County Building, Pittsburgh, where an opponent had previously spoken, resulted in a \$10.00 fine, from which ro appeal could be taken.

Conviction of Morgenstern and Goodman for Sedition: Arrested for distributing "seditious" literature, two young Communist workers were found guilty. A mo-

tion for a new trial is pending and unsecided.
6. Lansdale Free Speech Fight: a problem of overcoming official opposition to labor meetings in that
Borough attracted wide attention. Officials ignored a plea from the Governor, and a temporary victory in the Courts has helped, but not settled, the final determination of this issue which has far-reaching significance.

WHAT DOES THE CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION STAND FOR?

The Pennsylvania Civil Liberties Committee stands on the general principle that all thought on matters of public concern should be freely expressed without interference. It believes that the Constitutions of the United States and Pennsylvania established this principle as a perpetual protection from official aggression. Orderly social progress is promoted by freedom of opinion. Punishment of mere opinion, without an overt act, is never in the interest of orderly progress. Suppression makes for violence and bloodshed. This is the historic American position on free speech, stated once for all by Thomas Jefferson: "It is time enough for the rightful purposes of civil government for its officers to interfere when principles break out into overt acts against peaceand good order."

The Civil Liberties Committee is organized to defend and promote this point of view in Pennsylvania. Its program in the legislature is noted elsewhere in thisleaflet.

Program for 1932

- 1. Pardon the Woodlawn prisoners: Tom . Zwaa and Peter A. Muselin, serving five-year sentences for merely possessing literature, adjudged seditious. Pardon plea pending.
- 2. Lassdale: A plan not yet completely worked out that will bring the officials into Court to defend their willful and repeated violation of Constitutional grarantees of free speech and assembly.
- 3. Appeal from conviction of Goodman and Morgenstern: Appeals in the Superior Court are now pending, based on the unconstitutionality of a section of the Sedition Act, not yet passed on by the courts. Appeal will be carried, if necessary, to the Supreme Course of the United States.
- 4. Sheriffs' Proclamations: Definite ruling of these proclamations to be secured from the State Astorney-
- 5. Hoffman conviction: Pardon for Alfred Hoffman, labor leader, convicted at Stroudsburg. The decision of the Superior Court, upholding the Hoffman conviction. takes Penssylvania labor law back two generations. It must be wiped out by new legislation or appealed in the higher courts.
- 6. Wildwood mine sentences: Appeal from savage sentences of six months to six years meted out to striking miners.
- 7. 1953 Legislature: Preparation for the 1933 Session of the Legislature.
- 8. Uremployment protests: Suppression of free speech in memployment situations throughout the state must be opposed whenever it occurs.

9. New Committees: Organization of new committees in all the larger cities of the state.
