Dear Rabbi Silver:

I realize that this letter will come in your absence, and apologize for the long delay in not having previously replied to your's of December 24.

The truth is that I went into the hospital the middle of December for an emergency operation and am only now back on the job with the first of March.

I do hope that the delay on my part has not kept your schedule for the next season in suspense, but I hasten to avail myself of your generous offer to come to us on the third Sunday in February--namely, the 21st of February--1943.

You realize, of course, that this will be a holiday weekend, but I do not think that next year it will seriously interfere with our congregation. People will be on the ground and there will not be much holiday-making-for example, skiing in the White Mountains--and, from our standpoint, it would mean a great deal to have you here at the time of one of our national festivals, since what you will have to say will plainly bear in part upon the issues which presumably will still be before us then.

May I ask the secretary who receives this letter to send us a line reassuring us at this point and saying that we may count on February 21, 1943?

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Other things being equal, you are to be our preacher on Sunday, February 21. I am scheduled to preach in King's Chapel on that day, alas, so may have to leave you somewhat to your own devices at Harvard. However, you are now well at home here. I shall, of course, hope to see you and get a good chance for a personal visit.

Now insofar as you have February 21 in mind, when the date draws near, would you kindly make note of the fact that President Roosevelt has appointed February 19 - 28 as Brotherhood Week, in connection with Washington's Birthday. He wishes observance of the general idea of the brotherhood of faiths and races within the framework of American democracy given proper recognition.

He especially calls on the National Conference of Christians and Jews to join in the observance of the Week. It is a happy accident that you are our preacher on the Sunday which falls within this week. Although I am not suggesting that you write a sermon on this single theme, it would be a fitting thing if you were to mention the fact that we join "to affirm anew the religious principles of understanding, justice, friendliness, and cooperation on which the realization of brotherhood rests."

Dear Rabbi Silver:

I am beginning to think about the schedule for the University Church here for 1943-44.

Is it too soon to ask you whether you would be so generous as to come to us on a Sunday during this coming University year?

If so, would you be kind enough to suggest two or three Sundays, let us say in February or March, and then I can choose one of them, having in mind other choices being made by a couple of men to whom I am extending a similar invitation.

Your annual visit has come to mean a great deal to us, and serves both going and coming to keep our two types of religious thought and institutions in touch with each other. I hope you feel that from your standpoint the visit here is rewarding. It certainly is from ours.

I can't tell you what the congregation will look like by a year hence, but I think I am safe in saying that there is pretty sure to be a congregation. As undergraduates drop out, their places are being taken by men in the services - mainly the Navy - and the congregations have been on the whole going up rather than going down in numbers. Therefore we do not have to face a deserted church because of the exodus of students.

I hope all goes well with you and that the festival which The Temple is observing in your honor is bringing not only personal pleasure but reassurance to you in behalf of the things you care about.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

We are looking forward with the greatest pleasure to your coming to us for Sunday, February 21st. The Preacher's Room at Lowell House is at your disposal, and I assume that you will make yourself at home there.

As I wrote you, by unhappy accident I am preaching at King's Chapel on that day - a date of very long standing - but I will try to find someone here to take a hand in the service with you and relieve you of at least part of it. If, however, you would be willing to select and read a New Testament lesson and offer the pastoral prayer as well as preach the sermon - that is the usual division of duties at the service.

Unless you have some other appointment for Sunday noon, I hope you can take lunch with me, whether at my own house or whether I may come down to lunch with you at Lowell House I don't know for the moment. I can let you know about that later. Domestic arrangements seem to be getting a little complicated in these parts.

February 22 is a holiday and the University will not be in session. Furthermore, undergraduates are fairly well cleaned out and their places taken by men in the services. I haven't the merve to ask you under these conditions to stay on for Morning Prayers, but if you would like just to take a day or two of quiet rest where nobody can bother you, the Preacher's Room is there at your disposal.

I shall announce in the college paper that you are going to recognize the observance of Fellowship Week for which President Roosevelt asked.
