Dear Rabbi Silver:

We are pleased with the contents of your letter of June 19, holding out the hope that you may be able to be with us this coming year.

In my last letter, I suggested two dates in October, as well as the December dates. Apparently, neither of these will be convenient for you but I am wondering whether October 21 or 28 or November 4 or 11 might suit you. I am making this suggestion because the weather in this region usually gets bad in December and to depend upon getting to Indiana in time for an evening service would be exceedingly risky if you do not arrive in Pittsburgh before five o'clock. However, earlier in the year the risk would not be so great. We can send a car down to Pittsburgh and get you to Indiana in time, provided your train is reasonably on time there.

Will you kindly give these dates consideration, and if you can meet one of them I will take the matter up with our local ministerium and try to arrange for one of these dates.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

You will recall that last July we fixed on a definite engagement for you to speak in our Auditorium Sunday evening, October 28.
