My dear Rabbi Silver:-

I am instructed by the Committee on University work in the Summer Schools, to offer you the lectureship at the University of Virginia during the 1920 session. This University proved to be one of the strongest and most responsive ones.

Some of the lectures given there are as follows -

Rabbi Abram Simon, of Washington, D. C. - a course of twelve lectures on "The Crises in Jewish History;" five on "The History of Jewish Education" and five on "Jewish Literature;" six on "Bible Interpretations."

Dr. Max Margolis, of Philadelphia, on "The Origin and Transmission of the Hebrew Scriptures."

Rabbi Louis Witt, of Little Rock, Ark., on "Aspects of Judaism - Theological and Modern."

Rabbi David Lefkowitz, of Dayton, O. - course of eleven lectures on "Jewish Literature from the Close of the Bible Canon to the Completion of the Talmud."

Will you kindly select the topic for a course of lectures and send same to us forthwith. The Committee will pass on the advisability of the subject. The reason for the request of this privilege is that we do not wish to run counter to what the University may regard as academically fit.

From one of the Universities with which we are in correspondence, and in which we are represented by one of our men, we received the following statement from the Dean -

"May I suggest that you bear in mind that the topics treated and the objects of the lecturer shall be in keeping with academic ideals and modernacademic life. I mean neither too conservative nor radical, but to embody sound scholarship and worthy motives. I am not seeking to put any check upon the satisfactory evidence in the past of your good judgment, but I do desire to avoid any criticism that we are trying to put over any propaganda for a particular class or sect."

We pay all expenses of our lecturer and an honorarium of \$100. for the course of lectures given by you.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

We are now contracting for our lecturers in the summer schools of the various universities for the coming 1936 session, and our Committee on University Work has authorized me to extend to you an invitation to be our lecturer at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

They write us, "Our summer session opens June 29 and ends August 7. In general, the first half of the session is better for addresses of general interest than the latter part." Our history with the University of Wisconsin is a particularly interesting one, in that for a number of years we were unable to get an entree. Then, from 1925 to 1932, we met with marked success. We were compelled to call off on account of finances after that. We are particularly happy at being able to get back on their schedule for this year and we are, therefore, most eager to have an outstanding speaker represent us.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors, it was suggested that due to the depleted funds of our treasury, and the economic situation confronting us generally, we should ask the cooperation of our lecturers to the extent that they should accept the appointment with an honorarium of twenty-five dollars for each lecture and expenses, (of course, travelling at ministers' rates). Needless to say, we realize you thoroughly appreciate our position in this matter.

Due to the lateness of my appointment as Executive Secretary,

the contacts with the universities this year are several months behind schedule--therefore, it is most important that we have our list of speakers selected promptly, so that we can notify the universities at the earliest possible date.

We sincerely hope that we will be favored with your acceptance and will ask you to send us your choice of dates, likewise your selection of topics, so as to simplify correspondence.


