Dear Dr. Silver:

One of the connunity enterprises in Kalamazoo is a School of Religion sponsered by the First Presbyterian Church. We have an enrollment of close to one thousand people and an attendance sometimes much larger. This is a college town and our colleges contribute largely to our attendance.

Next fall we hope to secure four of our outstanding religious leaders for addresses to our whole group. We try to have our program cover the wide field which is the basis of our several religious faiths.

Would it be possible for you to come to Kalamazoo for one of these addresses, speaking on some subject concerning religion and our life today. We have the dates October 22d, November 5th, 12th and 19th, and you could take whichever of these is most convenient for you.

You did not tell me about the financial responsibility we should assume in bringing you to Kalamazoo. And you know that is an important item both for your sake, and for ours. I am sorry to add another burden of correspondence to your busy program, but once we get these matters settled, we will have done everything needed for the immediate carrying out our program and further correspondence will not be necessary until fall.


