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


My dear Mr. Blagamanger,



The executive committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools is anxious to have you speak on the program of the Southern Association at its meeting at the Peabody Hotel in Memphis, Tennessee on the afternoon of December 12. We realize that you have many demands on your time, but we need the message that you can bring to us. I sincerely hope that the opportunity to speak to an organization representing 1600 secondary schools and colleges in the 11 south-eastern states will appeal to you. Our budget does not permit a large honorarium. I am only allowed to offer \$50 and expenses. Our only hope is that you will feel that the opportunity is worth your time and effort.

Since national defense is one of the most pertinent problems facing the nation today and since schools and colleges must inevitably play a part in this program, we are planning to take for a theme either "Education for National Defense" or "Education for National and Individual Security." We wish speakers to have as much freedom as possible in the titles and content of their speeches just so they are related to the place and function of schools and colleges in the program of national security.

We have for a number of years endeavored to have some speaker who represents one of the great religious organizations or churches in the country on our program. Last year for example, we had the editor of the "Catholic News" from New York City. I believe we have never had a Jewish Rabbi, but the group has expressed a desire to have you with us. Since the present world upheavel has tended to emphasize racial and religious intolerance, we felt that some speaker representing one of the racial minorities might have a real message to bring us and we feel that you are peculiarly fitted to bring that message. I would suggest for you "Racial and Religious Tolerance as Related to National Defense." This is merely a suggestion. Feel free to select any title that you feel might suit your purposes better. We are only concerned that it be related to the general theme of the program and so far as possible make some challenge to schools and school people in their work of education.

Please let me hear from you at your earliest convenience as it is necessary for us to get our program outlined and the speakers selected as soon as possible.




