



Dear Rabbi Silber:

I have thought of you on many occasions since I heard you deliver the inspiring lectures here in Minneapolis. I have often wondered when I would again have the opportunity of hearing you.

I have been made chairman of a committee to arrange for Menorah lectures at the University, and it occurred to me at once that it would be a great pleasure to have you deliver a lecture at the Minnesota University Menorah Society this coming year.

I am writing to you for the purpose of ascertaining whether it would not be possible for you to come to Minneapolis to address the University students on some Jewish topic. We would like to have you come during the latter part of October. Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday nights would be satisfactory, though Wednesday would be preferable.

I would also like very much, should you be able to come here, to try to arrange for you to deliver a convocation address at the gathering of the general University body. These addresses are held at the University Armory on Thursday mornings. We would also probably be able to arrange several other meetings for you before the Zionist societies of Minneapolis and St. Faul.

The Minnesota Menorah Society has raised a small lectureship fund with which it will be able to defray the expenses of several of our most prominent leaders to come and address them. I thought it very fitting to have you come as the first outside speaker, because what we want is to inspire our students with the proper spirit and enthusiasm towards carrying on Jewish cultural work.

I am expressing the sentiments of the local members of the committee and of the general Menorah body when I say that we hope you will find it possible to come here to speak to us.



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



Dear Rabbi Silver:

The Jewish Educational Center Association of St. Paul is about to conduct a campaign for a \$100,000 Hebrew School and Community building.

We have at the present time in St. Paul a very fine Hebrew School, which school, however, is very badly handicapped because of the very undesirable and unhealthy quarters in which it holds its sessions. The school has at the present time approximately two hundred fifty students, and about fifty applicants on its waiting list that the school is unable to take care of because it is now filled to its utmost capacity. If there were proper quarters available there would be quite a large number of additional children sent to the school.

We have in St. Paul at the present time no quarters of any kind where Jewish young people may gather or where Jewish functions of any kind may be held.

The Jewish Educational Center Association has been organized to meet these needs and has decided to erect a \$100,000 building to house a Hebrew school and to provide facilities for Jewish communal activities. It is proposed to have in the building in addition to the school facilities proper, an auditorium which will be used both for school purposes and other communal purposes, a gymnasium to be used for school and communal purposes, a library, meeting places, club juarters, and kitchen and dining room facilities.

The campaign committee has decided to start the campaign the latter part of November with a banquet, and has asked me to extend to you an invitation to be the speaker at this banquet. The committee realizes, Rabbi Silver, what a busy man you are, and hesitated before asking you to make this sacrifice, but the project is of such great importance to the life of the Jewish community of St. Paul, that we felt we might ask you to do this for us and we sincerely hope, if it is at all possible, that you will accept our invitation. Rabbi Abba Hellel Silver -3 October 32, 1926.

As I have indicated it is the desire of the committee to have this banquet the latter part of November, and we would hold the banquet on any date that would be agreeable to you, after November 30th.

We already have approximately \$35,000 assured. We have one \$10,000 pledge as a memorial, one \$5,000 pledge from an individual, one \$2500.00 pledge from an individual, and two \$1000.00 pledges; the balance consists of pledges from about forty people none of whom are in the wealthy class, so you see we have a very good start and we are convinced that the public is ripe for the appeal. With your presence here we are satisfied that the major part of our budget could be raised at the banquet.

May I ask you to wire me on receipt of this letter, and may I again express the hope that your response will be in the affirmative.

Dear Silver:

I do not know whether the Council people have taken up the matter of the subject of the address that you are to deliver before that organization the later part of February. If they haven't and the matter is still open, I should like to offer a suggestion or two.

The last two speakers before the Council were Lewis Browne and Goldman of Chicago. — The one reducing Judaism to some kind of nebulous psychology and the other, presenting a racial, secularistic Jewish humanism. The impression actually prevails amongst certain groups that there is no outstanding representative in American Jewish life, who can see Judaism as a religious way of life and who does not believe that God in the modern world has become an anachronism. Because I felt that this was the impression amongst many, I made it a special point at the time to suggest that you be asked to speak - to present another view of the situation.

If you will therefore permit me to suggest, I should like to have you "lock horns" with this racial, secularistic Jewish humanism and secular nationalism, as you did in the article "Why Do the Heathen Rage?" and at the same time, to present the challenge to the godless humanism that you do in your "Religion in the Changing World" (for which I offer to you my hearty congratulations.)

It seems to me that it is time for us to strike out boldly with this challenge. As I see it, the conservative group is gradually drifting toward a secular racialism and nationalism. Our reform group is drifting from religious mcorings without any nationalistic anchorage.

I hope that I have given you some idea as to where your message might strike best.





It will appear impertinent on my part to ask of you to come to the rescue of Jewish education in Minneapolis.

As you are aware, the Minneapolis Talmud Torah has been in existence for twenty years. We have about 1,000 pupils in our four departments, 120 of whom are in the Beth Hasefer Hagavoah and the Beth Hanmidrash. Many of them have been with us from nine to ten years. There is also an Extension Department for those boys and girls who had no opportunity to receive Jewish instruction when they were younger.

During the present crisis, we have tried our utmost not to lower our standards nor did we replace any of our veteran teachers by novices. So far, the standard of salaries has not been reduced.

On the other hand, our income has been cut severely. The two avenues we had, Tuition Fees and the Federation, have been dwindling down and Jewish education in Minneapolis is facing a real crisis.

As we have been in existence for twenty years, we decided to have a 20th Anniversary Celebration and we are confident that we can, even under present conditions, raise enough money to tide us over until better times. We have cast about for a saviour and there was a unanimous opinion that the only man who

can save the situation is Dr. Abba Hillel Silver.

I realize, Dr. Silver, that you are actively engaged in local and national affairs. Nevertheless, you who are imbued with the spirit of Jewish culture and with a great love of the Hebrew language can only realize what a calamity it would be not only to Minneapolis but to American Jewry at large, if one of the best schools in the country should have to close its doors.


