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

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



My dear Rabbi:

At a meeting of a small group of men held in the Center of Dr. Salit's congregation in Far Rockaway to discuss the Palestine situation, I learned that you were booked to address the Men's Forum of that Congregation on February 28th. Upon my suggestion the Forum Committee generously agreed that instead of speaking under their auspices only, you should speak before the Men's Club of the Reform Temple. I further suggested that instead of speaking at the Center, that you speak in the Temple. My suggestion was prompted largely by the fact that the Reformed Jews of our Community have heretofore shown very little interest in Palestine. This has been due partly to the fact that Rabbi Landman has been an opponent of Zionism, and only several weeks ago delivered a sermon approving in large measure Dr. Pritchard's report and used the report as confirmation of his previous position. I understand that his attitude is somewhat more favorable since the exchange of letters between Dr. Weizmann and Mr. Marshall.

In this condition of affairs I feel that you could render a much better service by speaking in Dr. Landman's pulpit than you could by addressing a Forum in an orthodox congregation. The Trustees of our Temple have acceded to the request of the Man's Club that you speak in the Temple, and while I anticipate that Rabbi Landman will express the view that the present drive is entitled to support by reason of unemployment in Palestine, and other charitable considerations, it seems to me that the opportunity should not be lost of presenting Palestine upon a much more spiritual and constructive plane.

I also would like to point out that although you will be speaking in Rabbi Landman's pulpit your talk will be under the auspices of the Men's Club and not as the result of his personal invitation. I point this out lest you may be misled as to the amenities of the occasion and feel restrained by any convention not applicable to the situation.

Unfortunately, Rabbi Landman has at various times however sincerely spoken in strong terms of disapproval of orthodox customs, beliefs and traditions, in

the desire to emphasize the alleged superiority of modern Jewish reform, philosophy and practices, and has asserted that the Zionist movement is opposed to reform conceptions. The result is that Palestine has received very little support from the Reformed Jews in our Community, many of whom might not give support even if the conditions were different, but who find ready excuse in the attitude of their Rabbi. The result has been an undercurrent of bitterness on the part of the Orthodox Jews and the feeling that things dear to them have been scoffed at. I have recently been told that our Rabbi has given expression to some change of position, and is willing to cooperate on the basis of the proposed Agency.

I have written you thus in confidence and at some length, because I feel confident that your talk will attract an audience large for our section, but I see no reason why your talk should necessarily bear the label of Palestine. I have in mind the message of your sermon in Carnegie Hall several years ago which moved me very much, and in which you pointed out that Judaism was in a state of flux, and that Reformed Judaism especially was by no means fixed and you pointed out that it lacked, as it undoubtedly does, much of the devotion, color and spirituality of orthodoxy.

Far be it from me to presume to suggest to you either text or method of presentation, but in view of the conditions which I have sought to present rather hastily, but I hope fairly, it seems to me that an effective way of bringing home the cultural, spiritual and other possibilities of Palestine might be under the heading of Some misconceptions as to Reformed Judaism.

The Men's Club Committee desires to advertise your talk and it might be helpful to announce a subject. No funds are to be solicited after your talk, but we hope to create the inspiration which will result in a large outpouring at a dinner which we intend to give to Mr. Louis Marshall on March 13th, and which after some persuasion he has indicated to me that he will attend.

Now as to a more personal matter: Mrs. Lauterstein suggested to me that if you were coming to our section on February 28th, she would like to keep a promise made last summer in Maine to Mrs. Aaron Davis that we would get in touch with them during the winter. If you could take dinner with us at our home on the 28th, we would like to invite the Davis, to join us and thus resume a pleasant friendship.

I look forward with pleasure to meeting you again. I hope that you will be able to accept our invitation to dinner and I can assure you of a very hearty reception by our Community and which needs inspiration of your message.



I am writing you on behalf of the Metropolitan Conference of Temple Brotherhoods, an organization recently formed under the jurisdiction of the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods and taking in twenty-five of the Temples in the Greater New York District. I believe Roger Straus, the President of the National Brotherhood, has already written you advising you of a dinner to be given by the Conference to take place in New York on December 18th, 1927.

We expect to have approximately 1500 representatives, not only members of the Men's Club but Trustees of Temples and general membership attending this dinner. It probably will be the first purely religious affair of its kind held anywhere in this country and we expect that this dinner will be the forerunner of other events of a similar kind which will tend to aid the Temples and Synagogues in our City.



At the outset of my service as Secretary of Survey Associates, the membership (non-profit-making) corporation which publishes THE SURVEY and SURVEY GRAPHIC. I want to take you into confidence and tell you some of the things about it which, after upward of forty years in the newspaper and publishing business, have engaged my interest, and, I hope, will engage and reinforce yours.

If THE SURVEY were only "another magazine"; if I thought you subscribed for it only as something else to read in a world already cluttered with print; if all we wanted of you were your name on our mailing-list, I should not be sending this letter to you. I am sending it precisely because none of these things is true. I want to make you think in a somewhat new way about your relation to the periodicals brought out by Survey Associates. You thought you were buying something to read. I want to sell you something to do!

. . . .

Every little while somebody says that THE SURVEY ought to be "self-supporting". "It's so darned good," such an one said to me the other day, "that it ought to be a big money-maker." But we gave our word, in our Articles of Incorporation, that that was precisely what we should not do; that there never would be any stockholders or others entitled to interest in our profits; nor, for that matter, any profits! We declared it our purpose "to promote the cause of constructive philanthropy exclusively by education and educational methods, including the publication of books, pamphlets and periodicals." As those who are engaged directly in this enterprise envision it -the idea that "got me" to join forces with them -- THE SURVEY is an educational institution, as little devoted to money-making as a college. If Survey Associates, through its receipts from circulation and advertising, ever should become self-supporting in the usual sense, it would be because we had tired of our job and had left it for the easier one of commercial success. In the nature of the field to which we devote ourselves, it is impossible, even if it were desirable, for us to acquire either the mass circulation or the volume of advertising which would spell such success. Our subjects of investigation and interpretation quite usually are such as to be highly controversial; the facts often highly disturbing to those at either extreme--not infrequently to both. Ours is a difficult task. Sometimes we blunder; we claim only the intent to be thorough, accurate and truthful, whomsoever it may please or displease, help or hurt; above all to be fair.

1 1 1 1

At this present moment our publishing receipts more than match our membership dues and other contributions, as you will find set forth in detail in the Annual Report of Survey Associates published in THE SURVEY for November 15th. The publication accounts of THE SURVEY (semi-monthly) and SURVEY GRAPHIC (monthly) are kept on a business basis; both have reached the point where they nearly cover the cost of maintenance; but not the cost of the non-commercial activities of which they are the carriers. With the growth of circulation and advertising, and increase of support by those who believe in what we are trying to do, we shall expand these activities and extend our reach. Every dollar that comes in from any source goes and will go back into our work, of research, report, interpretation, extension of our field of membership and influence. The more money entrusted to us, the more we shall be able to do.

. . . .

In this discouraging period of lapse into the "hard-boiled" state of mind, when it seems as if the average person were satisfied to be that kind of "optimist" somewhere described as "a chap who doesn't care what happens so long as it doesn't happen to him"; when "America First" seems so often to mean only "Safety first for US and the devil take all the rest of the world", it appears to me more than commonly desirable to have, and to strengthen the hands of, such an institution as THE SURVEY, endeavoring to help ap increasing public to know and think; endeavoring to revive, inform and extend the social spirit and social intelligence which received so serious a set-back as aftermath of the War.

In aid of this endeavor I am writing to ask you who have been reading THE SURVEY or SURVEY GRAPHIC to think now whether you do not want to join us as a <u>Member of Survey Associates</u>. This is a good fellowship, of folk trying in one way and another, as light is given them, to make the world a better place of habitation. Come on in!

as doubtless you fully uniorstand, The Survey, of which "Survey Graphic" is the first -of-the-month, illustrated issue, is a semi-monthly periodical published by Survey associates, a non-profit-making corporation organised under the Membership Corporations less of the State of New York.

burden upon a comparatively few people." At this moment we are supported by upwards of 20,000 separate individuals. That is to say, our bona fide paid circulation (we have no free list) is now above a 25,000. That represents (1) non-member subscribers to the twice-amonth Survey and Graphic and to the monthly Graphic alone; and (2) at this date nearly 2,000 persons who are members of the corporation. (Of the minimum summal dues of \$10, \$5 is allocated direct to subscription, in the ordinary sense, to the magazine.)

Our gommercial receipts, from circulation and advertising during the past fiscal year (ending Sept. 30) were \$110,725., or about 55% of the \$198,809.53 which it cost to maintain the establishment. We have sound reason for expecting this proportion of business income to increase steadily.

our "living andowment," in which we take most pride, and upon which we spend a let of very careful personal pains, is our on-the-level Hembershi, numbering as I have said nearly 2,000 persons, scattered all over the country, a considerable number in "furrin parts." Just a month see we sent out a call for renewals, so that we could get a bird's-eye view ahead, of our probable resources. from these members in cash, at \$10 each, \$12,420.00. In units of \$25 we received \$7,850; in \$50 units \$4,700; in \$100 units \$7,800. In other words, nearly three-quarters of our support came from sales of the magazine and advertising and from contributions by members in same of \$100 or less; approximately 70 per cent of them \$10 each.

In addition to this there was \$15,165 "unclassified," meaning both large gifts (six of \$1,000 each, others from \$500 down to \$200), and small ones down to sums as small as \$2.50. Still further, there was a total of not quite \$10,000 in contributions specifically directed to our special departments, of Health, Industry, Social Fractice, Education, and Foreign Service (this last a vering international and inter-rucial relations and problems including immigrations)

Associates, with the responsibility for raising the money to fill the gap between business receipts and cost of maintenance, was not to go out after "nagels," but to draft and circulate that letter which evoked your reply; with the purpose of pulling out from among our teemty-old thousand non-member renders of the magnaine, as many as I could who might be inspired by the idea of participation in this worth-while thing to the fuse of 310 onch.

I am not such a fool as to try to "kid" you into a belief that if you, or any other person, should come into the office with an eye-filling contribution of a thousand — or for that matter a million — dellars, we should indignantly drop you or him down the elevator-shaft. A man who has been in the banking business — not to mantion politics — as long as you have, would laugh and throw this letter away. Of carrie, if I should indeverteatly chance to dig up some Rip Van Winkle with even more than that in his journs overlooked by others, believe me there would be a perfectly good latch-string hanging out for him! But I am quite sincere in saying that personal interest and cooperation on the part of individuals to whem \$10 means real money. Toward of our members \$10 is more in terms of sacrifice than \$5,000 means to others.

So they are coming in — school-teachers, ministers, serious-minded folk of the kind I speke to in Grand Rapids the other day, who believe in what we are trying to do. They are the kind of people I was endoavoring to reach. It looks as if I had reached some of them. At the same time I say touched by quite a lot of letters from people who did not simply throw my letter away as "just another appeal," but have written to say they wish they could but they can't. I as writing to every one of such, of course; for their letters spell Good Will, of the kind you can't buy with money. One chap wro to that he would join, and was askeded that he hadn't done it long ago.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

We are planning to have in Cleveland, probably on Monday, January 9th, a luncheon in the interest of Survey Associates under the auspices of the Committee which is now being formed. The place is still to be settled upon; but probably the luncheon will begin at twelve-thirty and last for a couple of hours.

We are very desirous of having you speak upon that occasion for, say thirty minutes. This letter is to ask if you will do so.

The luncheon itself will be very simple and those who attend will be expected to pay for their lunch something in the neighborhood of a dollar - the precise amount depending upon what arrangement we can make with the hotel or restaurant where it is held.

I suppose we shall invite perhaps 1000 people and judging by past experience the acceptances will be upwards of 100. Of course, we hope for more than that.

We have just had such a luncheon at Buffalo and it was very successful. A finely representative group gathered, Rev. Palfrey Perkins presided, remarks were made by Paul U. Kellogg, Editor of the Survey, Miss Mary Ross of our staff, and myself.

I don't know how fully you know and understand the Survey. It is published by a non-profit making corporation, known as Survey Associates; incorporated under the membership corporation law of the State of New York. These luncheons are directly for the purpose of gaining members, with minimum dues of \$10, of that corporation.

By way of affording "background" for this request, I enclose herewith copies of two letters; one which I wrote a few days ago to Senator Ferris of Michigan in reply to certain inquiries made by him; the other a circular letter which as Secretary of Survey Associates I have been sending out to non-member readers of our magazines. 

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



I know that you will be glad to hear that in almost every other community we have secured men of this type to be the Chairman of our Society. I think that in this way we are interesting an entirely new group of influential and representative citizens in the University, and hence in Palestine.

May I take this occasion to ask you whether it would be possible for you to save us a few speaking dates next year? With Dr. Magnes busily engaged on Mt. Scopus it is exceedingly difficult for us to secure the type of speaker necessary to inspire the communities to enter effectively upon a new project like the University. This is especially true since we are interesting an entirely new group who have thus far been indifferent, if not hostile to Palestine. We have had the unfortunate experience in Louisville, for instance, where we have an excellent committee organized, but which refused to go ahead this spring unless we secured a speaker of your prominence to help them to get started. Our campaign there had to be postponed until the fall. I am writing you so early because I know in what great demand you are for lecturing.
