Dear Rabbi Silver;

"Have the welfare and relief standards of the Jewish Group for which more generous budgeting has been necessary, made any impression upon the general prevailing standards?"

"Have the traditional standards of Jewish Giving, influenced the general level of contributions of the non-Jewish Community?"

"Have the giving proclivities of the Jewish Contributors, been influenced by the less developed interest or responsiveness of the non-Jewish Community?"

"With a passing of the Dopression, what phases of welfare activity will likely find permanent lodgment under Public Administration?"

"Will Jawish Communities find it desirable or necessary, to supplement Public Aid for the various types of Jewish "lientele?"

"Have Jewish Relief Standards suffered in the budgeting from Tax Sources, or have they tended to influence the adoption of higher general standards?"

"Where there is no Community Chest affiliation, is it desirable to create a Welfare Fund independently of the existing Jewish Federation; or may it better be an extension of Jewish Federation interest and activity?"



We are planning a general session for Sunday (January 6) beginning with luncheon at 12:30 P.M. on the subject -- "Problems of Jewish Adjustment and of Integration in American Life". This program is to be in the nature of a symposium at which a number of theories of Jewish adjustment may be presented. We are inviting you, and Rabbi Mordecai M. Kaplan, Mr. B. C. Vladeck and Professor Morris M. Cohen of this city to participate in this program. The speakers for this meeting have been selected on the basis of their particular viewpoints concerning Jewish life.

It has been suggested that each speaker should present a paper of approximately 25 minutes. The discussion to follow may include further statements from the floor in relation to the points of view presented by the formal speakers or may center about questions raised by members of the sudience.

We hope that we may receive, in advance of the meeting, all of the papers that are being given, in order that there may be prepared proper releases for mublicity purposes and if possible, copies of the addresses for distribution among the conference delegates.

We realize that we are asking a great deal of you to undertake this assignment on such short notice. We have had to advance our date because of the fact that Mr. James G. McDonald, and other speakers will not be in this country after the early part of January. We consider, however, that this confemence is highly important for Jewish social work at this time and that you have a definite contribution to give us on the suggested subject.

We trust sincerely that you will find it possible to accept this invitation and that we may count on you for the meeting.







My dear Er. Silver:

You must feel that we have been persistent in inducing you to come to speak at the National Board luncheon in New York on Saturday, March ninth. Since you are unable to consider that invitation, may I ask if you would be so good as to consider it for the meeting next year?

More immediate, may I ask you to send to Dr. George W. Kirchwey, Chairman, National Board of Review of Motion Pictures, c/o Hotel Pennsylvania, New York City, a night or day letter expressing regret at your inability to be with us and making a statement of your conviction about the liberal issue involved in freedom for motion pictures. We feel that this issue is peculiarly acute at present and that the reactionary sentiment favoring censors has been growing.

Personally I may guarantee the sincerity of the Board's position, as I have been familiar with its work for twenty-one years. I am enclosing a copy of last year's program. You will notice that Bishop Francis J. McConnell spoke along with other leaders. I enclose also a recent copy of the Review and a copy of my own brief address at the meeting last year which states fairly, I think, the position of the Board of whose National Council I have long been a member, concerning freedom of thought and expression. In the marrower motion picture field the Board has worked constructively for selection of superior films, encouraged educational, artistic effort and has opposed the forces of obscurantism and reaction seeking the repression of freedom through censorship. This is well illustrated by the work of Mr. Will Hays and the Producers and Distributors setup. You no doubt noted his acceptance of the new, undiscerning, quasi-censership of the Catholic and other religious bodies. You will note that a number of national leaders affiliated with the Board and with its work, with whom you are doubtless familiar, can give testimony.

May I look forward to seeing you on Tuesday when we can speak more intimately concerning the great import of the immediate issues.

I have just returned from Toronto, where, thanks to the intervention of my friends of the Jewish Welfare Board and of the Jewish Education Association here, I have been sent to try to reorganize the Jewish community of Toronto in its Jewish Educational and general character building activity.

I found a most difficult situation, and I have endeavored at least to raise a sufficient sum of money to make possible the reopening of the Talmud Torah building to some six hundred boys and girls who were literally thrown into the streets because the Talmud Torah organization could no longer continue payments to teachers and to banks, to whom their excellent building is heavily mortgaged.

I believe that if you could possibly arrange your time so that you can come to Toronto some time in early May, when I would personally supervise a City-wide reception in your honor, you could effect a saving of the Jewish educational situation in the entire city - and furthermore you could be instrumental in launching a very essential city-wide program of character building activities.

May I again urge you, if at all possible, that you come to Toronto. Your voice raised in the cause of Jewish education in that City can mean the saving of Jewish education in Canada.







My dear Rabbi Silver:

Upon my return from Europe this week our Board of Directors called upon me to arrange for a conference of representatives of Jewish organizations throughout New York, Pennsylvania and the New England territory, to mark the launching of our \$500,000 ORT campaign.

Mayor La Guardia of New York and other non Jews of national prominence will address the conference, and it is planned to have only one Jewish speaker of equal calibre. While turning over in my mind the various candidates suitable for this mission, I have come to the conclusion that there is no one better suited to open the ORT campaign than you.

Incidentally I have in my files a letter from you, offering to speak at an ORT meeting some time in 1934. I never availed myself of that offer for the reason that the particular meeting for which you were invited did not take place and I saved you up for a real occasion. The forthcoming conference is such an occasion and I now hold you to your promise.






