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



JEWISH COMMUNITIES THROUGHOUT COUNTRY CONTINUE TO REPORT INCREASED CONTRIBUTIONS

NEW YORK, April 9. (JTA) -- Jewish welfare fund campaigns throughout the United States and Canada are maintaining a strong "plus giving" pace to meet crucial needs in Israel, overseas and at home, according to reports received by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds.

These reports, the Council said in a statement today, indicate that early increases over 1950, averaging up to and beyond 22 percent, are continuing im many communities as campaigns approach the half-way mark. "Plus" results are in evidence from the largest down to the smallest communities, the statement declared. It mentioned as "typical" the experience in Philadelphia, Cleveland, Detroit, Newark, Miami, Buffalo, Dallas and Cincinnati.

Samuel Daroff, general chairman of the Combined Campaign of the Philadelphia Allied Jewish Appeal and the Medical Center Building Fund, reported a resounding 42 percent increase over funds raised from the same people at the Leader's Dinner, March 29. At this function \$2,054,272 was raised in contrast to their 1950 gifts totalling \$1,446,670. Fhiladelphia's next public report will be made April 18.

Miami, which is further advanced than most community compaigns, is still maintaining a robust 21.4 percent increase over 1950. To date Miami has raised \$1,040,-257 as against \$856,923 from the same people in 1950. Cleveland has pushed its percentage of increase from 20 to 22 as the campaign has gathered momentum in that community. At a Special Gifts dinner April 3, \$1,310,695 was raised as against a 1950 total of \$1,073,000 from the same people. This by far is the highest total ever achieved by Cleveland at a fund-raising meeting.

In its first public report, Cincinnati announced a total of \$575,260 raised in 1951, contrasted to \$490,824 from the same people in 1950. This represents a 17 percent increase. Newark, which moved away to a fast campaign opening success, is continuing its "plus gift" status as it approaches the million-dollar mark. To date, \$952,000 has been raised, as against \$821,000 from the same people in 1950. This total represents a 16 percent advance over last year.

Detroit and Buffalo reported increases of 12 and 13 percent over 1950. The Motor City has now raised \$1,610,000 as against \$1,437,500 from the same people in 1950, and Buffalo has registered \$329,272 as against a 1950 sum of \$291,886 from the same contributors. Reporting an increase of 18 percent over 1950, the Dallas Jewish Welfare Federation Campaign has thus far raised \$664,587, compared to \$562,893 in 1950 from the same people. The campaign began with the largest Advance Gifts meeting in the history of the community.

ISRAEL MINISTER ADDEESSES U.J.A. LEADERS IN NEWARK; STRESSES NEED OF GIFT DOLLARS

NEWARK, April 9. (JTA) -- The importance of the United Jewish Appeal for Israel was emphasized today by Taacov Geri, Israeli Minister for Trade and Industry, addressing several hundred U.J.A. campaign workers at the Essex House. Mr. Ceri reported on up-to-the-minute economic conditions in Israel.

MILITON WELL ELECTED PRESIDENT OF NEW YORK PROBRATION OF JEWISH PHILANTHROPIES

NEW YORK, April 9. (JTA) -- Milton Woill, veteran of philanthropic and civic activities, was today elected president of the Federation of Jewish Fhilanthropies of New York, at a meeting of the Federation's Board of Trustees. Mr. Weill, who became the Federation's 14th president, succeeds Ralph E. Samuel.

Z.O.A. PRESIDENT AFFAIS FOR QUICK PASSAGE BY CONGRESS OF GRANT-IN-AID BILL FOR ISRAEL

NEW YORK, April 9. (JTA) -- An appeal for quick passage by Congress of the joint bill, introduced under bi-partisan sponsorship, for a grant-in-aid of \$150,000,-000 to the state of Israel was voiced here last night by Benjamin G. Browdy president of the Zionist Organization of America, addressing a meeting of the national executive committee of the Z.O.A. at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. The meeting was attended by about 100 members from all parts of the country.

Mr. Browdy also stressed the urgent need of aiding the United Jewish Appeal and supporting the Israeli bond issue of \$500,000,000 which will be offered in the United States on May 1st. The meeting was also addressed by Rabbi Abba Silver and by the two General Zionist Israeli leaders, Joseph Serlin and Major Shalom Lysman, now on a visit to this country.

J.N.F. IN AMERICA RECEIVED ABOUT \$250,000 FROM WILLS AND BEQUESTS LAST YEAR

NEW YORK, April 9. (JTA) -- Close to a quarter of a million dollars from wills and bequests was received last year by the Jewish National Fund, it was announced here by Mendel N. Fisher, executive director. Speaking at a meeting called to discuss the J.N.F.'s recently established Dapartment of Living Legacies, Mr. Fisher said also that \$200,000 in insurance policies, naming the Jewish National Fund as a beneficiary, has already been received.

Under the Living Legacies plan the J.N.F. guarantees a fixed income for life to American Jews who assign their capital to the organization for use in the upbuilding of Israel. Mr. Fisher told the gathering that in Israel the Jewish National Fund has received the sum of \$2,800,000 under its Living Legacies program.

PIONEER WOMEN'S TEFRE-DAY CONFERENCE DISCUSSES AID TO CHILDREN IN ISRAEL

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 9. (JTA) -- Problems of child rescue and rehabilitation work were discussed here this week-end at a tri-state regional conference of the Ploneer Women, Zionist Labor group. The conference marked World Jewish Child's Day yesterday.

More than 100 delegates from 12 states attended the three-day parley, which closed last night. They came from Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Georgia, Louisiana, Missouri, Tennessee, Colorada, Oklahoma and Texas. The Pioneer Women has established, and now maintains, a network of more than 250 child-care centers, youth villages, agricultural and vocational guidance schools and social service institutions throughout Israel.

JEWISH WAR VETERANS HONOR DR. SILVER; PRESENT HIM WITH OBGANIZATION'S MEDAL OF MERIT

NEW YORK, April 9. (JTA) -- The Jewish Wer Veterans of the United States yesterday presented its medal of merit to Dr. Abba Hillel Silver at a meeting held at the Concourse Plaza Hotel. The award was given to the Zionist leader for "cistinguished leadership in mobilizing the moral and material resources of world Jewry in the struggle to establish and secure in the free state of Israel a new life and a new hope for oppressed and persecuted Jews."

25,000 JEWS ATTEND MASS MEETING ADDRESSED BY GOLDA MYERSON IN BURNOS AIRES

BUENOS AIRES, April 9. (JTA) -- Twenty-five thousand Jews last night attended a mass meeting here sponsored by the United Jewish Campaign and which featured Israel's woman Labor Minister, Golda Myerson, as its chief speaker. Mrs. Myerson called on Argentine Jewry to become Israel's partner in its great task. Earlier, Mrs. Myerson conformed with Gen. Juan Pistarini, Argentine Minister of Public Works. She was the recipient of flowers from Mms. Eva Peron, First Lady of Argentina.

We look forward most anxiously to your reply and sincerely hope that it will be in the affirmative.



Dear Dr. Sliver:

I have the honor to invite you to speak at Carnegie Ball. New York, on the evening of Wednesday, July 25, at a public meeting on civil rights, around the theme of the dissenting opinions of Mr. Justices Black and Douglas in the Smith Act decision.

Since the Supreme Court decision was handed down on June 4th, the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions has been attempting to apprise the American people, and particularly those engaged in the cultural fields, of the significance of this case to future freedoms. The enclosure is an example of this effort.

The meeting at Carnegie Hall can play an important role in mobilizing public opinion to restore the traditional concept of American free speech. It is with this thought that we are appealing to you, among a number of distinguished citizens, to add your voice in a public forum to the growing protest against the Smith Act decision by responsible journals of opinion, newspapers and civic leaders.

We join Black's dissent

In Dennis et al v. U.S., No. 336

MR. JUSTICE BLACK, dissenting.

Here again, as in Breard v. Alexandria, decided this day, my basic disagreement with the Court is not as to how we should explain or reconcile what was said in prior decisions but springs from a fundamental difference in constitutional approach. Consequently, it would serve no useful purpose to state my position at length.

At the outset I want to emphasize what the crime involved in this case is, and what it is not. These petitioners were not charged with an attempt to overthrow the Government. They were not charged with non-verbal acts of any kind designed to overthrow the Government. They were not even charged with saying anything or writing anything designed to overthrow the Government. The charge was that they agreed to assemble and to talk and publish certain ideas at a later date: The indictment is that they conspired to organize the Communist Party and to use speech or newspapers and other publications in the future to teach and advocate the forcible overthrow of the Government. No matter how it is worded, this is a virulent form of prior censorship of speech and press, which I believe the First Amendment forbids. I would hold Section 3 of the Smith Act authorizing this prior restraint unconstitutional on its face and as applied.

But let us assume, contrary to all constitutional ideas of fair criminal procedure, that petitioners although not indicted for the crime of actual advocacy, may be punished for it. Even on this radical assumption, the only way to affirm these convictions, as the dissent of Mr. Justice Douglas shows, is to qualify drastically or wholly repudiate the established "clear and present danger" rule. This the Court does in a way which greatly restricts the protections afforded by the First Amendment. The opinions for affirmance show that the chief reason for jettisoning the rule is the expressed fear that advocacy of Communist doctrine endangers the safety of the Republic. Undoubtedly, a governmental policy of unfettered communication of ideas does entail dangers. To the Founders of this Nation, however, the benefits derived from free expression were worth the risk. They embodied this philosophy in the First Amendment's command that Congress "shall make no law abridging . . . the freedom of speech, or of the press. . . . " I have always believed that the First Amendment is the keystone of our Government, that the freedoms it guarantees provide the best insurance against destruction of all freedom. At least as to speech in the realm of public matters, I believe that the "clear and present danger" test does not "mark the furthermost constitutional boundaries of protected expression" but does "no more than recognize a minimum compulsion of the Bill of Rights." (Bridges v. California, 314 U.S. 252, 263.)

So long as this Court exercises the power of judicial review of legislation, I cannot agree that the First Amendment permits us to sustain laws suppressing freedom of speech and press on the basis of Congress' or our own notions of mere "reasonableness." Such a doctrine waters down the First Amendment so that it amounts to little more than an admonition to Congress. The Amendment as so construed is not likely to protect any but those "safe" or orthodox views which rarely need its protection. I must alse press my objection to the holding because, as Mr. Justice Douglas' discern shows, it sanctions the determination of a caucial issue of fact by the judge rather than by the jury. Nor can I let this opportunity pass without expressing my objection to the severely limited grant of certiorari in this case which precluded consideration here of at least two other reasons for reversing these convictions: (1) the record shows a discriminatory selection of the jury panel which prevented trial before a representative cross section of the community; (2) the record shows that one member of the trial jury was violently hostile to petitioners before and during the trial.

Public opinion being what it now is, few will protest the conviction of these Communist petitioners. There is hope, however, that in calmer times, when present pressures, passions and fears subside, this or some later Court will restore the First Amendment liberties to the high preferred place where they belong in a free society.

We lend our public support in behalf of a rehearing of the case before the Supreme Court.

A STATEMENT TO THE AMERICAN PEOPLE

When Br. W.E.B. DuBois and his associates of the former Peace Information Center were indicted upon the ground of failure to register under the Foreign Agents Registration Act, a profound question was posed to every man and woman of the arts, sciences and professions.

For more than sixty years, Dr. DuFois has devoted himself to the struggle for the equal rights of the Negro people and for racial and international understanding. As a leader of the Negro people and founder of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, he has contributed greatly to the struggle for equal rights for Negroes and thus for the realization of freedom for all Americans. As writer, anthropologist, historian, member of the National Institute of Arts and Letters, life member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, member of the London World Races Congress, in consultation with leaders at the founding of the League of Nations in 1919, and consultant at the United Nations in 1945, organizer of the Fan-African Congress in the Twenties, Special Minister from the United States to Liberia, and author of a dozen books on the Negro and colonial peoples, the work of W. E.B. DuBois has been a contribution of lasting value to American and world culture,

Our country is justly proud of Dr. DuBois as it is of other outstanding American scholars, writers, artists, musicians and scientists. In a larger sense, however, the creative work of American and foreign cultural figures is the property of all mankind. But all scientists, writers and other professional workers are gravely concerned with the trend, in these tragic days of international tension, to build a tariff wall against the free international movement of ideas. They know that free interchange of ideas is essential for extending the frontiers of human knowledge. They know that peace is the soil in which a flourishing culture grows, For this reason, cultural workers in all countries throughout history have been traditionally devoted to peace, some at great cost to themselves.

The indictment of Dr. DuBois and his associates is but one of numerous recent actions against individuals and organizations that advocate peaceful solutions to the world's crisis. In this time of hysteria, the attempted labeling of "foreign agent" on a distinguished scholar and leader of a peace movement can fairly be interpreted as an effort to intimidate and silence all advocates of peace.

If this indictment of Dr. DuBois and his associates is not defeated by an aroused public opinion, no person or organization, whose views on the crusial issue of war and peace differ from the administration in power, will be safe from calumny and attack, as writers, scientists, artists and professionals, we uphold the constitutional right of all citizens to speak for peace. We call upon the Federal authorities to withdraw the prosecution of Dr. DuBois and his colleagues.



WE, THE UNDERSIGNED members of various religious groups, are very disturbed at the continuance of a state of war with its dreadful cost in human lives and destruction of property. We feel deeply disappointed that the recent at-tempts to obtain at least a truce in Korea have proved in vain. Widespread war is the dreaded prospect for the future. Our philosophy of peace finds no clearer expression than in the words of Edmund Burke:

"The proposition is peace. Not peace through she medium of war; not peace to be bunted through the labyrinth of intricate and endless negotiations; no: peace to depend on abe juridical determination of perplexing questions, or the precise marking the shadowy boundaries of a complex government. It is simple peace; sought in its natural course and in its ordinary baunts. It is peace sought in the spirit of peace, and laid in principles purely pacific."

With firm faith in the will of the people, under God, to achieve a peaceful world, we call upon men and women of all persuasions, to meet with us in fellowship, to discuss soberly, charitably and without fear the means of establishing peace, and to ask the guidance and blessing of the Father of All upon our efforts.





The cause of Shelach is just and pure. As you know, the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions is an organization of educators, writers, artists, musicians, physicians, scientists and other professionals devoted to a democratic culture, peace, and civil liberties for all. Our Council, long concerned with international understanding and the maintenance of peace, feels that no lasting settlement among the major powers can be arrived at unless it takes account of the needs of the people in the dependencies and colonies, for independence and higher standards of living. Developments during the last few years in Asia, Africa and the Middle East have underscored this. We are not sure that the American people fully appreciate the significance of the historical upsurge for freedom of the colonial, and that means in most cases Colored, peoples of the world. For our part we cannot agree with the position taken by our representatives in the United Nations to deny a hearing of the Tunisian question before the Security Council. Hence we are supporting Congressman Armstrong's Resolution 211 in the House, calling for a reversal of the vote. We have asked Representative Armstrong whether his Congressional duties will permit him to speak at this meeting. The experience of the struggle for independence of Israel, is certainly germane to the general question. Through your first hand knowledge of Israel and the Middle East, your views would be very important to such a discussion. It would be most gratifying if you could participate and speak on any aspect of the general topic which you choose.
