My dear Colleague:-

Some months ago I wrote you, inviting you to come to Newark to deliver the oration at our Union Thanksgiving service, and was naturally very much disappointed when you replied that you could not come. And yet, notwithstanding that disappointment, I venture to ask you again to come to Newark, thereby conferring not only an honor upon my congregation, but a particular favor upon me personally.

Being a rabbi, you will appreciate what it means to complete 20 years of service with one congregation. On March 1, I shall have rounded up such a period with Cong. B'nai Abraham. My congregation is anxious to celebrate this anniversary fittingly. But I feel that if you could grace the occasion with your presence, it would make my happiness complete.

In order to facilitate your coming to Newark, we will arrange the programme to suit your convenience. You may choose either Friday evening, March 3, or Sunday evening March 5, and I repeat what I said on the previous occasion, that whatever the cost may be, my congregation will only be too happy to defray.

Let me hope that your reply will be favorable, and I will ever remember it with gratitude. In the words of Saul to Samuel:

My dear Rabbi:

Dr. Krauskopf who expected to make a tour of the country to deliver the message of the Farm School has been confined to his bed most of the time since January 1st, he having obtained a leave of absence from his congregation on that date to make this tour. It becomes necessary, therefore, that we ask the friends of Dr. Krauskopf to assist us in delivering the message of the Farm School.

The citizens of Newark, New Jersey and Boston, Mass. expressed a desire to have you speak to them and Dr. Krauskopf, when informed of this, urged upon Mr. Harry Hirsch, Vice-president of the Farm School and chairman of the Silver Jubilee Committee to extend you an invitation to speak in Newark either on March 11th or 12th and in Boston on March 12th or 13th, depending entirely whether you will speak in Newark on the 11th or 12th.

I desire to state that I was invited to arrange the Silver Jubilee by Dr. Krauskopf and Mr. Hirsch, and it is on this account that Mr. Hirsch suggested that when I reached Erie yesterday, February 24th, that I call you on the 'phone and extend you this invitation. The world would then be a better place to live in." And Mr. Bass concluded: "Any time you have Rabbi Silver here again you may be sure that I will come to hear him."

If we are to minister at the high altars of God in faithfulness and in sincerity, we must speak to our people the word of God as it comes to us, kindly but firmly, with sympathy and understanding, but also with candor and force. Above all we dare not seek to pamper or to please them, lest we betray them in the direst needs of their lives. Nor must we allow ourselves to be pampered by them or crave their constant adulation. This has proved the tragedy of more than one minister; for in all such adulation first comes the shimmering foam and then the bitter lees and dregs.

We must find the deepest import of our ministry not in popular acclaim, which at best is fickle, and which can be had only at the cost of truckling to popular idols. We never hear of popular prophets; though we do hear all too often of popular preachers. Leadership is a crown, to be sure, but a crown of thorns. We must walk the road of the unpopular causes, the hard road of frustration and defeat, if we wish to arrive at the only victory which matters, the victory of the spirit. A great number of cheap and easy victories may be won by a talented minister in the manifold skirmishes of his profession, but the real victories of the Kingdom can be won only at the cost of many sacrifices, heart-aches and disillusionments.

The deepest satisfaction which the years of our ministry will bring will be the treasured recollections of blessed hours, when having been tried, we were not found wanting; when defeated, we were not deterred, and when praised, we were not beguiled.

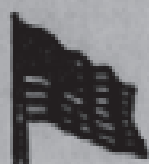


Ordinarily, the meeting is divided into two parts, first: a report from the President regarding the work of the society during the past year, which lasts in the neighborhood of fifteen to twenty minutes; this is followed by a speech from our guest of honor, lasting anywhere from forty to forty-five minutes. The hope is that the luncheon may be finished by one or one-ten, so that the meeting may be over before quarter past two, - if possible, by five or ten minutes past two.

Mr. Lynde tells me that you can present splendidly the place in the community of a Bureau of Associated Charities. Our name, "Social Service Bureau", possibly is somewhat indefinite, but we correspond to the Associated Charities of Cleveland, being the non-sectarian Family Welfare Society, of Newark. We would suggest that you speak on the general subject of social case work and the place of a Family Welfare Society in large city life, or that you speak about community participation in connection with the work of a Family Welfare Society and the Community Chest. Possibly you may feel inclined to introduce all of these topics during the course of your speech.

So frequently one makes polite remarks of a perfunctory character, that I desire to reiterate what I said yesterday, to convince you of our sincerity in this whole matter.

Never, since I have been in social work, have I heard a more remarkable address, or a more eloquent plea in behalf of scientifically organized social work. I am certain that it will have lasting effect for good, and that everyone present left the meeting yesterday with a renewed faith in social case work.


I believe that my client would be in a position to pay a fee of approximately \$350 to \$400, which is, as you know, in this particular time, a maximum honorarium.




