My dear Friend Silver

I have just recalled your kind response to my request when I last met you in Wheeling, to honor the Philadelphia brethren of the B'nai B'rith, as well as its Jewish community in general, with your presence at a public function. You then were kind enough to state that you would arrange to come here at the most opportune time. That time has now arrived. The B'nai B'rith Lodges of Philadelphia are in the midst of a most active campaign of work and service, having determined to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of the Order in this way, in combination with an active drive for new members.

It is planned to hold a Jubilee Celebration at the conclusion of this campaign, which is fixed for Sunday, March 30, 1919, in the afternoon. A large hall has already been tentatively engaged, and the Committee is but waiting to hear that you are going to redeem your promise by accepting their invitation to come here on the day abovenamed.

It may be interesting to you to know that the B'nai B'rith situation in Philadelphia is developing along the best lines of Jewish service and enthusiastic interest, and your presence and eloquence will not only be of the greatest assistance to the cause, but will afford the Jewish community here the splendid opportunity

to hear and listen to a man from whom they will learn much and enjoy still more.

If the date above named should not be precisely agreeable, I am sure the Committee will gladly arrange the Sunday following.

This communication is addressed to you in behalf of the Committee which has in charge the celebration, and which has requested me to be the means of communicating same to you.

Let me, in conclusion, send you very warmest personal regards, and urge you with all seriousness, to send your acceptance.

Dear Silver:

About four or five years ago, when I was on the point of accepting a position in San Francisco, some of my friends prevailed upon me to remain in Kansas City, and, as a sort of tribute, raised about \$100,000. for a Y.M.H.A.,a project in which I was immensely interested at the time. Unfortunately, the erection of the building was put off on the theory that the price of material would go down. The reverse being the case, the result is that at least another \$150,000. is needed to put up the kind of a structure which would adequately take care of the athletic, social, cultural and educational needs of nearly 2500 men and women in the organization. Incidentally, it is quite remarkable that Kansas City, with an esti-mated Jewish population of about 12,000, should have that many members in its Y.M. and Y.W.H.A.s.

Had I been in Kansas City during the past four years, I am satisfied that I could have succeeded in raising the necessary amount. the circumstances, the community finds every pos-sible excuse for its apathy toward a project which, in my mind, is as essential to a community as any philanthropic agency. I feel, and I imagine you share my belief, that a Y.M. and Y.W.H.A., properly conducted, should be made a power for the greatest good in a community, and Kansas City is extraordinarily fortunate in having at the head of its Y.M.H.A. a Mr. Passamaneck, who is one of the most capable and resourceful Y secretaries in the country.

With the above long, prefatory statement, I am going to ask of you a tremendous personal kind-ness, and that is, in the course of your speech next Wednesday night in Kansas City, to make as powerful an appeal as only you are capable of making, in behalf of the Y movement.

### Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver

I need not tell you that the vast majority of people in a community function almost exclusively in terms of remedial charities; the widows, the orphans and the sick make a peculiar appeal to them, but when it comes to athletic and recreational facilities, they are apathetic. And yet the latter are even more important than the former.

The house houses

Kansas City is an exceptionally fine community. There are a lot of substantial men and women. Despite supposedly hard times, I venture to say there are in Kansas City at least twelve or fifteen men - millionaires - who can put up \$150,000. or \$200,000. without the least possible sacrifice. The community surely can make up the amount if properly enthused.

I do not know what your subject will be, but you are such a master that even if you should speak about Einstein's Theory of Relativity, you would still find opportunity to discuss the value of a Y.M.-Y.W. movement in community life. After all, you, like myself, are a pragmatist. You are no longer satisfied with folks coming to you at the conclusion of your speech and saying: "It is the most wonderful address I ever heard in my life," or something to that effect. You get satisfaction only insofar as you can actually "cash in" your efforts. You have an opportunity, as far as Kansas City is concerned, to enthuse the people to such an extent that they will sit up, take notice, and, after you will have left, raise the necessary amount of money for the project.

While I have given you the essential outlines of the situation, yet I will ask Mr. Herman Passamaneck, the Secretary of the Kansas City Association, to get in touch with you for a few minutes during the day and probably give you a few more facts, - though I doubt whether these are really essential.

I wonder if you realize - I suppose you do - to what an extent your name is being mentioned now adays, especially with Emanu-El? The comments would please as well as amuse you.

I am looking forward to my appearance at your Temple on March 4th. Every now and then I am told: "You have colossal nerve to occupy Rabbi Silver's pulpit." I think I have. I am beginning to get cold feet, but I shall do my bestest.





Dear Dr Silver:

The National Conference of Jewish Social Service will be held, this year, in Philadelphia, May 12th to 15th, inclusive.

Jewish social work, as you know, is facing probably the most critical test that it has been subjected to, primarily because of the continuance of the present economic depression and its peculiar effect upon American Jewry.

A re-examination of values will be attempted at the Conference this year. Three main general sessions are being planned to take place on three consecutive evenings. It is intended that the outstanding personalities in Jewish communal life, lay and professional, will present papers on the more important features of Jewish communal life both here and abroad. The main topics that are to be treated at these general sessions will be, "The International Scene of the Jew," "Economic Changes in American Jewish Life," "The Industrial Outlook and its Relation to the American Jew," and "The Relation of the Depression to Cultural and Spiritual Values of American Jewry."

As Chairman of the Program Committee, I have been asked both by the President of the Conference, Dr Maurice J Karpf, Director of the Training School for Jewish Social Work, New York, and the Program Committee, to request you to be the principal speaker at one of the general sessions in Philadelphia. The last named topic, "Cultural and Spiritual Values of American Jewry," was the one suggested for you to cover. It is expected that at the meeting at which it is planned to have you speak, Felix Warburg will preside.

A Memorial Service for Dr Lee K Frankel is being planned for either Saturday morning, May 14th, or Sunday morning, May 15th. Saturday night, May 14th, will be the principal meeting of the Conference, which will be in the form of a dinner and at which it is expected that Felix Warburg will preside, as well as participate in the Memorial Service for Dr Frankel. I thought

it would be highly appropriate, should you find it possible, for you to be the principal speaker at this Saturday night occasion, which is the most important one of the Conference and at which Mr Warburg will preside; also, if at all possible, for you to participate in the Memorial Service for Dr Frankel.

If Saturday should be inconvenient, then we can shift our speakers and make available for you Friday evening, or possibly, Thursday evening, the latter being the evening when the presidential address is made.

To have you at the Philadelphia Conference at this most crucial time would be a significant contribution to Jewish communal life in America. There is much confusion in the minds of Jewish social workers with regard to objectives and scope, particularly because of the tremendous shifting of emphases of our efforts, enhanced by changing economic conditions. Your presence would make us all happy and encourage us in our burdensome tasks.



Dear Dr. Silver:

You will recall that under date of April 13th I wrote you saying that later I would have some material which you might wish to consider in connection with your forthcoming address before the National Conference of Social Work in Philadelphia. You replied immediately that you would be very glad to see whatever I had to offer. I hope I have not allowed too much time to elapse. If I have, it has been unavoidable as it has been quite a job to assemble material from the various fields of social work indicating what effect the depression has had upon their programs and upon the people they serve.

However, I am sending you, under separate cover, by special delivery, a body of material which may be helpful. This material has been assembled for two purposes primarily: to help you with your address, and to help Newton D. Baker with an article he has agreed to do on the same subject for a fall issue of the Atlantic Monthly.

Sage Foundation, joined me in asking representative agencies in four major fields of social welfare and health work for statements and supporting data on the situation confronting them. As a means of indexing this data for your convenience, I have divided it into five groups: one general folder, on the top of the pile, and a special folder each for (1) health; (2) social case work; (3) character-building and leisure-time, and (4) child welfare. We have included nothing on emergency relief as we felt that you are already sufficiently familiar with this phase of the situation by reason of your active participation in various emergency activities.

In the general folder, I should like to call your attention particularly to a statement by our so-called Platform Committee - "Underlying Purposes and Principles of the National Campaign of Education for Social Welfare Services". This suggests what we believe to be the desirable philosophical background for modern social work. It defines, too, the up-to-date conception of community responsibility for general human welfare as distinguished from the old-fashioned idea of individualistic giving exclusively in response to sentimental impulses. While we are not expecting you to deliver an address about our movement as such, we felt that it would not be too much to hope that you would at least mention it and possibly make use of some of the fundamental ideas

Dear Dr. Silver:-

where throughout the country, during the past year or two, has suffered greatly from the lack of just such searching and candid analysis and criticism as were presented in your address last evening. The directors and executives of relief agencies seem to have suffered from a sort of creeping paralysis, due to their feeling that it is not good policy to attack, or criticize, the public officials from whom they are hoping to get further public relief; and private individuals who might say something to the point are inhibited because of a feeling that the relief agencies are staggering under unprecedented burdens with resources which are relatively unprecedentedly meagre.

I hope that the circulation of your address among social workers and others will mark the turning point in courageous thinking and frank expression. Of course, I do not mean that there has been any undue complacency in the relief agencies. My observation, on the contrary, is that they have been extremely frank in admitting the inadequacy of their resources and standards.

I appreciate your generous reference to the program of 1906. Your present proposals, and those which we made at that time, are not, of course, on all fours. But they are alike in demanding an end of exploitation and anti-social profits. We ded not hold that the existing economic system, as a whole, comes under this condemnation. Even now, I think that it may be found that certain large common interests, such as transportation, banking, etc., should be directly controlled in the public interest, and that many other activities, like agriculture, manufacturing, and retail distribution, can still be left to private

enterprise and free capital. Of course, any such division of industries should be the result of economic planning in the public interest, and not left to blind chance, as heretofore.

Your address made a great impression on the audience. Many people spoke to me about it later in the evening. Naturally not all agreed, but, as far as I could judge from the expressions which I heard, all who heard your address, whether they agreed with your conclusions or not, were deeply moved, and recognized the extreme importance of the issues which you raised. Personally, I think a pretty good case could be made for the thesis that organized social work, instead of standing between the economic system and revolution, has really, in many ways, prepared the way for the revolution, insofar as the welfare agencies have been willing to tell the truth about the conditions with which they have been dealing, this would certainly be the result.

Pardon this long letter. I am really writing only to express my own appreciation of your magnificent address, and the hope that you will have the result in public opinion which would be the only adequate reward for your painstaking labor in preparing it.


