Dear Rabbi Silver:

President Edward C. Elliott of Purdue University has sensed the need on the Campus for a religious service at least once a month. We want four Protestant Clergymen, one Catholic Priest and one Jewish Rabbi. The students of Protestant faith outnumber all others here at the University, but we have quite a number of Catholics and also quite a number of students who are of the Jewish faith. In fact we have students of nearly every faith and perchance some with no religious affiliations at all.

We have had three Religious Convocations with an average attendance above 1,000. The addresses have been inspiring and the music of our choir of seventy-two singers has been a source of delight to all who have attended.

I am writing to invite you to come and to conduct our Religious Convocation on March 17. The enclosed programs will tell you something of the nature of our services as they have been conducted up to date. We could and would modify the program in such a way as to conform with your wishes. I would want you to feel perfectly free to direct me in making plans and in arranging the service to neet your wishes.

Your compensation would be \$200.00, your expenses to be paid by you.

We are eager to have you and I shall await an early reply, hoping that you can and will favor us with your presence on the date mentioned above, and that you will bring to us a message which will inspire the people of Purdue to greater faith and better living.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

I am enclosing one of our old convocation programs so that you may see the order of service followed here. Next Sunday's program will not come from the press until after the middle of this week.

The prayer to be read in unison is one which we used last year when Rabbi Wise was here. It is not the same as the one on the enclosed program. I have invited Rabbi Simon of Lafayette to sit on the platform with us and lead in the reading of this brisf prayer chosen for next Sunday.

Between the hymn and the scripture reading it is our custom to have a few words of welcome and of appreciation of the coming of our visiting speaker. President Elliott does this very well indeed, so well in fact that I think it adds much to the service. In case he cannot be present someone else will take his place.

Following this brief introduction it is our wish that you should take entire charge of the service, beginning with the scripture reading and ending with the benediction.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I am writing on behalf of the Lafayette committee for the Emergency Peace Campaign to inquire whether you would honor us by giving the principal address at the evening meeting of the Peace Rally which is to be held here on Thursday, May 21st.

For some time we have been negotiating with the national committee of the Emergency Peace Campaign in order to arrange a suitable meeting under their suspices, but it has been impossible to find a time which would fit into their schedule without conflicting with previously scheduled activities of Purdue University and other local organizations. We have therefore determined to go ahead with the same plans independently and invite speakers and discussion leaders for the full day's program on our own behalf. Perhaps you can be of some help to me. Back last March, you graciously extended an invitation to me again to address the Purdue University Convocation and I accepted for Sunday, November 29. Within the last few weeks, the Minneapolis Community Fund which has invited me in previous years to open their Community Fund Campaign in that city but whose invitations I could not accept have been urging me to accept this year. Their campaign opens with a big community rally on Sunday afternoon November 15. I hope and pray that your own work will not suffer while you are serving us. No public statement had been made, but the few to whom I had mentioned the possibility of your not coming expressed genuine regret. This was particularly true of Jewish students. You will be most welcome I assure you.

Please send me within ten days or so the subject on which you will speak so that I may give wide publicity to your coming.

You will be please I am sure to learn that our choir has been almost doubled. We now have one hund-red and twenty-five singers.

Flease do not hesitate to ask me to meet you in Indianapolis that Sunday morning if it be your wish. I shall be most willing and glad to drive to Indianapolis and bring you to Lafayette. Our Big Four agent has told me that there will be a pullman coack at Cleveland which you may enter any time after 9:30 P.M. Saturday. The train does not leave Cleveland until 2:35 A.M., but it reaches Indianapolis at 7:50 Sunday morning. We were very sorry but we had no desire to interfere with your call to large responsibilities on the coast. Thinking the matter settled, I invited Rabbi Lann to take your place on our program. He graciously accepted the invitation.

Western Union had no explanation to offer as to how the unfortunate incident could have occurred. They found the message in my own handwriting in their files. I have a receipt showing that the charge was paid, etc. Nevertheless, you waited three weeks for a reply which never reached you. I can only hope that it in no way kept you from responding to the call to go on your mission to the coast. The delay was most unfortunate. I should have written in addition to sending the telegram.





Hence, every year we single out four or five speakers; to our undergraduate members and to the general public we say: "Here are men and women who exemplify the kind of oral communication that America needs."

Naturally, opinions will differ on what constitutes "good speaking" or "the kind of oral communication that America needs." Fuided by our Constitution and by a study of history, the Society proposes three basic criteria: effectiveness, intelligence, and responsibility. In our opinion, democracy will be served only by speakers who meet all three of these standards.

We are proud, Rabbi Silver, to commend you to the American people as one whose speaking merits special recognition. Through the medium of the spoken word, you have rendered distinguished service in the cause of enlightening the human mind and freeing the human spirit.

He has offered to act as our representative and to communicate with you concerning your preferences in this matter. I believe that he will propose the possibility of the Honors Convocation at Case as a fitting public occasion for the presentation. You will no doubt be hearing from Professor McIntyre, therefore, in a few days.

I want to thank you for your gracicus telegram, and again express our pleasure in recognizing you as one of America's most eninent speakers.

#### Information concerning the Speaker-of-the-Year Awards and the Tau Kappa Alpha Society

#### 1. Purpose of the Awards

Democracy is, in a large measure, government by talk. Only by free, thorough, and honest discussion can the people of a democratic nation arrive at informed opinions. Important decisions depend upon the competence of communication; and in these days of split-second transmission of the spoken word, oral communication (that is, speech) must function at its best if democracy is to flourish.

The Society hopes, therefore, that these Awards may encourage an ever-growing appreciation of the crucial role played in a democracy by oral communication. In making these citations, Tau Kappa Alpha is not attempting to emulate the "Oscars" of the Motion Picture Academy; nor is it trying to conduct a popularity centest. The Society hopes only to promote a better understanding of superior speaking.

No attempt is made to pick the "best" speakers of the year-that would be impossible. Rather, the Board merely names several nationally known speakers who, in our opinion, exemplify our basic criteria-criteria not of flamboyant "oratory," but of good oral communication.

#### 2. Criteria

The enabling resclution of December, 1949, in authorizing Speaker-of-the-Tear Awards, specified that the purpose of these Awards should be to recognize "persons who are distinguished for effective, intelligent, and responsible speaking on significant public questions."

"Good" oral communication, therefore, we define as that which is effective, intelligent, and responsible. If speech is not effective, the desired message is not communicated; appropriate audience response is not achieved. If speech is not intelligent, a message may propagate misinformation or confusion. And if speech is not responsible, a message may culminate in disaster.

Good speech, them, is something quite different from exhibitionistic "oratory." It is speech which obtains a favorable audience response, which reflects a well informed and thoughtful intellect, and which demonstrates a constant concern for the social and ethical implications of public utterance. It is speech which enlightens the understanding and quickens the conscience of those who listen.

### 3. Nature of the Awards

Citations may be announced in as many as five broad areas of human endeaver, classified as follows:

National Affairs

Business and Commerce

Labor

Religion

Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Activities.

Recognition is symbolized by a certificate presented to the winner. No more than one speaker may be cited in a single field, and one or more fields may be omitted in any year.

#### 4. Eligibility Requirements

Nominees must be nationally known (rather than those whose repute is restricted to a small region); they must be American citizens; and the speaking upon which the Award is based must have taken place within a specified calendar year. Awards are not intended to single out individual speaches, but are made after considering the total impact of <u>all</u> speaking activities during the year.

NOTE: Awards do not constitute endorsement of a speaker's views; it is entirely possible to select a winner who meets all the criteria but who may represent conclusions or doctrines with which the Board of Award happens to disagree.

#### 5. Procedure for Selecting Award Winners

The society has appointed a National Board of Award, drawn from the ranks of college speech professors and experienced platform speakers. During the year this Board invites nominations from student and faculty members of the numerous campus chapters. It also adds nominees of its own. After careful scrutiny the Board then conducts a series of secret ballots within its own membership until winners are selected. (See the attached list of all Award winners since 1949.)
