Dear Rabbi Silver :-

- I am writing you with reference to your visit to Reading on Jan. 23rd to address the members of the Reading Chamber of Commerce and to advise you of a situation that has just arisen here and I think should be brought to your attention.
- It is simply that in response to urgent requests from our members we have arranged for a dinner meeting on Monday, Jan . 16th at which time a speaker from Washington will address our members on the Disarmament Conference. This brings a dinner meeting of our members within one week of the date scheduled for your address, which is running things somewhat closer together than we usually arrange. It has just occurred to me that under the circumstances you might care to postpone your coming one week, viz., to Monday, Jan. 30th with the idea that an interim of two weeks between meetings might add some strength to the attendance of your meeting.
- However, I feel confident that the effect on the attendance of the arrangements as they now stand will be slight indeed and I am not writing to urge the postponement I mentioned above but simply to bring the situation to your attention in case you should prefer to make a postponement of one week. We expect that both the meeting of the Disarmament Conference and the one which you will address will attract so much interest that there will be no question of a large attend-ance at both but I appreciate that some times under these conditions a speaker prefers to take such matters into consideration.
- We are leaving the whole matter entirely up to you and are looking forward to your coming with a great deal of pleasurs. would like to know on what subject you expect to speak in

order to make proper announcement locally. I am assuming that you will speak on some subject that adheres closely to community service thru organizations of this sort or something that applies to the general field of civic activities and community service. We would prefer to let the matter of the subject entirely up to you because you will know, from your own experience what will be most interesting and valuable to an organization such as ours.
