About one year ago I helped to establish in this community a Central Talmud Torah which has its sessions at the Y. M. E. A. and which endeavors to afford an intensive Hebraic Jewish education to the unschooled children of the community. In a short space of of one year, the school has enrolled 175 pupils without affecting the registration of the Hebrew school connected with my own Congregation. This Central Talmud Torah is supported **partitudely** by the local Jewish Federation and by the tuition fees received from some of the children. The only way of meeting the expense is to enroll a large number of annual members.
