MOTHER OF GODLINESS, DISCIPLINE, and FREEDOM





Mother of Godliness, Discipline, and Freedom



NE of the most beautiful war memorials in the world is on the campus of Winchester College in England. This memorial is built in the form of a cloister around an open court. On the walls beneath the cloister ceiling are carved the flags and shields of the allied nations and the names of five hundred young men from this school, who lost their lives in the last great conflict.

Above the names, deep-cut in the stone, is the remarkable inscription composed by the old headmaster himself in memory of his own boys:

IN THE DAY OF BATTLE THEY FORGAT NOT GOD WHO CREATED THEM, NOR THEIR COUNTRY, THE STRONGHOLD OF FREEDOM, NOR THEIR SCHOOL, THE MOTHER OF GODLINESS AND DISCIPLINE . . . THOU, THEREFORE, FOR WHOM THEY DIED, SEEK NOT THINE OWN, BUT SERVE AS THEY SERVED, AND IN PEACE OR IN WAR, BE EVER AS CHRIST'S SOLDIER, GEN-TLE IN ALL THINGS, VALIANT IN ACTION, STEADFAST IN ADVERSITY.

Here is the meaning and purpose of education. The young man who comes from college or university shall be one of Christ's soldiers, with all the lofty conception of life that this implies, willing and proud to seek not his own advantage but the common good of all, to enrich human society by unselfishness and sacrifice.

He will be gentle in all things for he will have learned that tenderness, not coarseness, or vulgarity, or cruelty, is the badge of courage and manliness, and that next to food, raiment, and shelter, kindliness and consideration are the necessities of life.

He will be valiant in action, bold and fearless in whatever he undertakes. He will understand that education is not intended to lead a man into cynicism, mockery, or inertia, but to endow him with fortitude as well as with wisdom for the doing of great deeds.

Finally, he will be steadfast in adversity. He will know that the test of any man is his courage in difficulty and in danger. He will not bemoan his fate when misfortune assails him, nor content himself with futile protests against an unkind world. He will not sit helpless in idle vanity or despair, blaming others for his weakness. He will feel that every difficulty is an opportunity for resourcefulness and achievement. He will understand that man is born to be stouthearted in adversity, stronger than adversity, if he is to be of the stuff to justify his creation.

Thus the inscription sets forth the meaning and purpose of education. It does more. It defines a school or college. Recall the phrases, "the school, the mother of Godliness and discipline", and "their country, the stronghold of freedom." Let it read "a college, the mother of Godliness, discipline, and freedom." These words speak a true definition of an institution of learning.

Godliness: Faith in God and the conviction that "to believe in Him and His love is not to escape from reality but to stand upon the rock of the only certainty known to man:" Faith in Christ, the Son of God, and the revelation of God to man: Belief in the power of goodness and the permanence of spiritual ideals: Not faith and belief alone, however, but a life in which character and virtue find expression.

Discipline: The discipline of hard work, of genuine scholarship, of fine academic standards, of intellectual attainment, and of careful training of mind and body: The discipline of a sense of duty, of self-control, and of self-reliance: The discipline of good taste, good manners, and of high ideals.

Freedom: That freedom of the mind and conscience which is the very breath of life for college or university: That freedom of mind and conscience which is man's most precious possession, the source of creative talent, the means and opportunity of man's finest growth and development: That freedom which preserves and defends the dignity of human personality, one of the great concepts of life: That freedom which is the avenue to happiness and peace:

But not an irresponsible freedom; not a freedom that confounds license, disorder or violence with liberty; not a freedom that confounds rudeness, selfishness or self-indulgence with independence: A freedom rooted in responsibility, in self-discipline, in a sense of obligation to serve society and government, and to champion the principles of justice and decency, on which civilization rests.

This is Sewanee's ideal for herself: That THE UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH shall always be the mother of Godliness, discipline, and freedom. And this, the ideal of the University for Sewanee men: That they shall not seek their own gain, but that they shall serve their people, and shall be ever as Christ's soldiers, gentle in all things, valiant in action, and steadfast in adversity. 
