# Seneca County Schools

My dear Rabbi Silver:

As one interested in education for a democracy, I have viewed with alarm the treatment of Minority Groups in the Europe of today. I think teachers are increasingly believing that pupils should be educated for democracy.

In consequence of my conviction and belief, I was interested very greatly in your topic for Sunday, December 9th, "The Weak in the Hands of the Strong." I should have liked to have heard your discussion and I know that I would have benefited from it. Since neither I nor my teachers could be present for your discussion, I thought that perhaps we could arrange to have you come to us.

We have in our county approximately 150 teachers teaching in 10 centralized high schools, 2 centralized grade schools and several 2 room and one room schools. In charge of the school program of these districts we have 90 members of the boards of education and clerks.

We are holding our annual teachers institute and board members meeting on Saturday, January 27, at Republic. We are planning to have a dinner speaker following our morning sessions to give us a talk, not on the traditional aspect of education, but on present day trends and developments in society. I am wondering if a discussion of Minority Problems and particularly how they may endanger a democracy, would not be both helpful and challenging. If you are free to come to address this meeting on January 27, at 12:30, we would indeed be pleased to have you.

I am sorry, however, that I do have to mention the matter of finances. Probably the total amount of money available for the entire meeting of the day is about \$40. This limits our opportunities greatly. However, we would be only too happy to have you come, if you could, to our meeting.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

We are planning an Educational Conference at Heidelberg College under the general theme "Developing Responsibility in Pupils." Our Conference begins Friday evening, March 13 and closes Saturday afternoon, March 14.

I am writing you to invite you to speak on some topic related to the general theme of our Conference. Because of your other duties I presume you would prefer to speak on Friday evening if you are available. Dr. William C. Bagley, of New York City, Editor of School and Society, will speak on the Friday evening program.

We are somewhat limited in the honoraria which we can allow for this service because we make no registration charge to those who attend and the College conducts this Conference as an educational service to the State, especially in our area. Accordingly, in our budget we have set aside a flat sum of about \$40 for this purpose. Tiffin is easily reached from Cleveland, being about ninety miles. There are good auto roads and we usually drive the distance in about two hours. I hope that it will be possible for you to accept because I believe your message in these trying times will contribute much to help in giving direction in the thinking of our public schools.

This Conference is attended by the Seneca County Teachers Institute and by teachers, principals and superintendents from the State at large and particularly in our area. Our total registration at the Conference usually is about five hundred.


