My dear Rabbi Silver:

I am reminiscing and going back to May, 1922. It was then that I opened my drug store at Orville and East 105th. I was a young man just 20, ambitious, going out into the world to show my parents, relatives and friends what I could do. The going was not very easy, many a mistake I made, and I really had a lot to learn. The old story that theory is not always compatable with practical experience what looks good in the book doesn't always work out in practice.

I am trying to give now, a little of my background and gradually tell you what I have in mind.

I think that you, Rabbi, just recently were married to a young lady from West Virginia, and lived on Ashbury Ave. near E. 105th St. I remember you and your wife taking strolls along the street with that beautiful collie. At that time I first became acquainted with you. You used to come in my drug store now and then. Your stature was growing. Your sermons, your wisdom, your oratory was the talk of Cleveland, not only by our people but by all. I took time off to hear your sermons and many a time there Was standing room only at the Temple. Your success was assured. We who were interested in your work could follow what you were doing. You instilled something into me that has stood the test in years to come.

I think that it was in 1925 or 1926 that Dr. Chaim Weitzman was coming to Cleveland to organize a stronger Zionist group and sell us on what he was doing. Dr. Moses Garber asked me to represent the druggists at a meeting held, if I recall the name correctly, at the Excelsior Club, which was then located near Wade Park, across from Western Reserve University. It was my first meeting and the first time that I ever did any work in behalf of rebuilding the State of Israel. I was close to Ezia Shapiro, Charles Auerbach, Suggs Garber, Dr. Garber and quite a few others who were active in that movement.

Due to economic and health reasons, I became inactive but with the hope that someday I'd go back in the fold in work, in behalf of ideals that have been within me.

In 1941 my family and I moved to Tucson, Arizona, and in 1944 I went into business for myself. The first few years were a hard struggle, with little money and a family to raise, but thank God the sun started breaking through the clouds and economically things became better and the first chance I had to become active in religious and civic work, I did.

I was on the board of our Congregation, first vice-president then president for three years; on the board of our Community Council and now first vice-president; also on the board of our Community Center. I headed the Drug Division, then the Professional Division for our Combined Jewish Appeal. Last year I headed the Advance Gifts Division.

There is one thing I hoped that when and if the community honored me with the general chairmanship for our Campaign, that I would be privileged to have as our honored guest for the kick-off dinner, Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver. This year I am General Chairman.

I have discussed this with your good friend, Marvin Kane, and he thought it would be wonderful if you could come. Marvin has a beautiful ranch and you are welcome to stay there as his guest. David Garber, Sugg Garber's son; A.A. Kalish are a few of the ex-Cleveland people who are hoping that my and their dream would be attained.

Any time during the last two weeks in January, preferably the week of January 28th - when we could have our kick-off dinner and if you could possibly give us the privilege and honor of having you with us, it would be something the Tucson community would be privileged to have and would never forget, and to me it would be a dream come true.
