I shall greatly appreciate your answer as early as possible.



I am now situated in Utica, N.Y. and have charge of our Community Chest here, as well as giving supervisory direction to the work of our Americanization Council.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

We should like to invite you to speak before the Chevalier Class (Men's Club) of Westminster Presbyterian Church, Utica, at our meeting, November 11th. If this date does not fit with your schedule, we should appreciate an indication of which of the dates below would be most convenient.

We have attempted in our meetings to inspire and stimulate the layman to a greater religious consciousness through messages by leaders in religious thought. Our speakers are not limited to an audience of our own membership alone and on occasion combined meetings with other men's groups have been held.

We should plan, on the occasion of your visit to Utica, to welcome the men from Temple Beth-El and others. Action has not as yet been taken in this direction but because of the friendship which exists between the two groups, and given a reasonable amount of advance planning, we anticipate that this might be one of our largest gatherings.

Dear Rabbi:

On one of my too infrequent chats with you, I spoke about the possibility of your speaking here in Utica on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal. As I recall, we were chatting in front of the Fenway and you said that you had cut down on your outside engagements but that if the situation warranted it, or perhaps if you were in the vicinity anyway or enroute to New York, you might be able to help out.

Our situation in 1956 is a bright one for a fund-raising address from you. Utica has always been a strong Zionist community. We are proud to lay claim to having the highest per capita Israel Bond sales record in America; our \$150,000 sales achievement in November duplicated the effort of each of the four previous years. The UJA has always done well here and this year we are looking for a return of the "Spirit of '48". We think you are the campaign keynoter who can help us bring this about.

Our plan is to have a communitywide rally of 1,000 to 1,200 people, no solicitation, to set the atmosphere for the campaign. Prior to the meeting, however, there would be a supper at which the Big Gifts people would make their pledges.

Our UJA Executive Committee has said that anytime during the month of March is acceptable, although Sunday evenings, especially March 4th or 11th, are preferable.
