Dear Abe: I don't know whether you know it or not but Ism out here at the University of Wisconsin at the head of the Hillel Foundation doing the work similar to that of Frankel's at the University of Illinois. Without taking any of your time with a long schmoos and explanation, the enclosed card will give you an idea of the kind of work I am trying to do. What I want to ask you specifically is this. "Are you going to be in or around Chicago or Milwaukee at any time during the winter?" If you are, I would like you to come up to Madison, which is only a few hours from each of these two cities, to talk before the Jewish Students at one of their Open Forums meetings. These are held once a month, when our guest speaks, following the close of the religious services on Sunday night. The dates for our Open Forums are the following: December 13, Jamuary 18, February 15, March 22, April 19, and May 17. If, being in our neighborhood, you could arrange to come up for one of those days, I would be extremely grateful. The only rub is the financial one. Our budget is extremely limited, else I would invite you to come and pay your expenses even from Cleveland. My dear Rabbi Silver:

For the past four years an informal group of students at the University of Wisconsin here have been studying questions relative to cultural conflicts. Last April for the first time we sponsored a three-night series of discussions under the name of an "Institute on Cultural Conflict." It was very well received.

This year we plan to repeat a similar series. Three speakers are being invited to speak respectively on the extents, on the causes, and on steps leading towards the remedy of cultural conflicts. The meetings will take place April 21, 22, and 23.

This letter is to invite you to be the guest of this group for the discussion of the "Extents of Cultural Conflicts" on April 21 (Tuesday). Kindly let me know what honorarium, besides expenses will be expected of us.

A word more about the group may not be out of place: We number about 19 in all--some Nordic Gentiles, some Jews, some Negroes. To the Institute we invite about 200 pivotal people on the campus. The speakers may each talk for 45 minutes or an hour, and allow an hour or thereabouts for questions and discussion from the floor.

This, I think you will recognize, is somewhat of a departure from the rather strict secularism traditional at this University. A faculty committee has been appointed by the President of the University to organize these lectures, under the chairmanship of Professor A. Campbell Garnett of our Department of Philosophy. Since he is out of the city for the summer, teaching at the Union Theological Seminary, I am serving as acting chairman of the Committee. We are anxious to make this first annual series an outstanding success. Our Committee would be very happy indeed if you could see your way clear to come to Madison to give one of these lectures. The other speakers we are inviting are Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam, Professor Etienne Gilson, and Dean Jerald Brauer of the University of Chicago Divinity School. As your topic we suggest, but only tentatively, the subject of the concept of brotherhood in religious thought. We would like to have the students see that theology today is a live and significant field of thinking, at the same time bearing in mind that the average student has very little background in either philosophy or theology. If you have alternative topics which you would prefer, we shall be happy to receive your suggestions. The address will be given to the general student body, chiefly undergraduates, with attendance wholly optional. I am sure you will know well the kind of presentation needed for such an occasion. We have made no final arrangements as to dates, but our plan is to arrange one of the addresses in middle or late October, one in late November or early December, the third in February, and a fourth in March or early April. We would greatly appreciate it if you could suggest several Sunday afternoon dates at approximately these periods on which you would be free to come, so that we can arrange the schedule of lectures in such a way as to avoid conflicts with other University events which might detract from the attendance. I regret that we are not able to offer a really attractive honorarium for this service. We are allowed to offer you only \$150 and your expenses. Accommodations will also be provided for during your stay in Madison. Our Committee will be very happy if you are able to accept this invitation. 
