FOREWORD

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver

This is the Bible--the Book of Books--the sacred literature of Judaism and mankind's noblest record of faith and man's quest of God and the good life.

The Bible has nourished the hearts and minds of countless generations of men, Jews and non-Jews alike, and has guided, challenged, and comforted the humble and the great, the champions of brotherhood, justice and peace and those who have sought to redeem life from all forms of fear, evil and oppression. It is inextricably bound up with the culture, ethics, history, art and literature of half the world.

In this incomparable religious literature repose not alone the basic doctrines, teachings and practices of Judaism, but also the chronicle of Israel's early history and the immortal utterances of its seers and prophets who carved new highways for man's spiritual and social prgoress. In their highest ranges these writings attain to a power and majesty of expression which are aglow with a solemn and ageless beauty. This beauty of holiness pervades them regardless of the literary form in which they are cast, be they lyric or psalm, prayer or prophecy, proverb or parable.

"Turn it round and round again, for everything is in it," the sages of later times said of the Bible. The whole, colorful panorama of life is here, the sweep and scope of the timeless tapestry of humanity. Much is not made manifest to the casual eye. While it is neither cryptic mor occult, the Bible, on occasion, does not yield up its hidden treasures except to those who dive deep for them.

The books of the bible are ancient documents and, as in all such cases, time has blurred the clear meaning of some of its original words, phrases and allusions. Here the aid of a good commentary may help one to surmount the obscure passage and will enhance the enjoyment and profit of Bible reading and study.

The Bible is a book about God and the eternal laws which He set for the just governance of human society. It is also a book about man, all classes and conditions of men, the wise and the simple, the rich and the poor, the just and the unjust, those who suffer and those who inflict suffering, those who love greatly and by their love are exalted, and those who hate and by their hatred are destroyed. The Bible knows all the travail of the human heart, all the sorrows of men, their hopes and their frustrations, their passions and their tribulations. Somewhere in its pages every man will find the counter-part of his own personal problems and, possibly, also the key to their solution.

The aim of the inspired authors of the books of the Bible was to help men find their way through the confusions and entanglements of life, to give them faith to face their destiny with dignity and courage and to summon them to discover the supreme meaning of life in obeying the will of God and in building the good society on earth.

Open, then, its pages reverently and peruse them lovingly. Here, God speaks to man of statutes and ordinances, of justice and loving-kindness, and here man pours out his burdened soul to his Maker. Here is man's patent of nobility as a child of God, fashioned in His image. Here is edification, challenge and consolation. Here all men may find "a lamp to their feet, a light to their path."
