The book to which I referred, and which Ir. Klutznick probably had in mind when he introduced me at the cornerstone-laying, will be published in September by The Macmillan Company. Its title will be "WHERE JUDAISM DIFFERED -- An Inquiry into the Distinctiveness of Judaism." It is a work upon which I have spent three or four years and is, I believe, the kind of a book which will serve the cause of Judaism. It was written with an eye for the intellectual lay reader both Jew and non-Jew. The emphasis is placed squarely upon its unique and revolutionary message of unity, freedom and compassion. Its mith and humanitarianism come into sharper focus as the author portrays the contrasts between its core of faith and practice with other religions in the course of History. The moral tone of Judaism is sharply sounded as the reader encounters its prophetic message, its resistance to idolatry, and its humanitarian policies in action."

Dear Dr. Silver:

I suppose by this time you have been informed by the people at Macmillan that we offered to take an edition of your proposed book on Judaism. We have not yet heard what their final decision is. I hope that you urge them to cooperate with us.

But this is not the occasion for my writing to you. I should like to call your attention to a note in the galleys which is not sufficiently clear. One of my readers of the galleys, Professor ". Leo Levin, of the University of Pennsylvania Law School -- a very learned young man and a leader in the Misrachi -- read the galleys and was very much impressed with the book. Characteristically he also looked at footnotes and he called my attention to the fact that footnote 38, in Chapter VI, cannot be correct. The footnote refers to the YaD, Hilkhot Melakhim, paragraph 77. I searched for the reference and could not find it either. It turns out that your reference should have read "paragraph 11" and that the original statement to which your text refers is not to be found in the ordinary editions, but is to be found in the first edition, subsequent to which it was, in all likeli-hood, removed for censoring purposes. The passage involves Maimonides' attitude towards Christianity as a preparatory stage for Judaism.

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

The more intelligent of these men are conscious of the necessity of their being informed and abreast of the times so when they are released—even though it will be a span of years hence—it will not find them entirely out of rapport. They also realoze one of the major means open to them in accomplishing this goal is by reading and studying the better current books.

Many of these people are avid readers of the book sections of the New York papers and publishers' advertisements, and repeatedly bring me clippings asking that I endeavor to obtain for our shelf certain titles and authors; such is the case with your splendid book WHERE JUDAISM DIFFERED. It is amazing to see the type and scope of their reading, and I dare say that in perhaps no other strata of our society is there so much serious and recreational reading done per capita, as in a prison such as this where so many have so much time to while away and also have an innate desire to better themselves.

In my efforts I am almost entirely dependent upon the generosity and understanding of the author if I am to be able to bring them good books. I hope that you will agree with me and allow the full value of such fine titles as a great catalytic agent, under stresses of incarceration and other man made inner turmoils, and that you will be able to give us your kind consideration.

If you are able to forward a copy of WHERE JUDAISM DIFFERED, you may feel certain that your kindness will be appreciated. I am aware that oftentimes an author does not derive the financial disaster to send copies freely to all who might ask. However, under the circumstances it is my hope that you can oblige us.


