
Tributes Are Planned for Rabbi Abba Silver



Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, famed rabbi who left Wheeling for Cleveland some 45 years ago, will be honored at a huge civic testimonial dinner on Jan. 20 in Cleveland.

The occasion is Dr. Silver's 70th birthday and the program is scheduled for the Hotel Sheraton-Cleveland, Dr. Silver is rabbi of the Cleveland Temple. His first pulpit was at the old Eoff St. Temple here.

Some 60 national personalities including former Presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower and Herbert Hoover are serving as sponsors of the testimonial.

Fifteen years ago, almost to the very date of this tribute to him. Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, one of the most eloquent voices in Jewish history, addressed the United Nations on behalf of the Jewish people and in favor of the creation of a Jewish State in what was then Palestine.

Dr. Silver spoke with an extraordinary eloquence that enraptured the diplomats of the world seated in the great hall at Flushing Meadow; at the same time he stirred the emotions of hundreds upon hundreds of Jews sitting in the galleries hoping to hear from his lips those very words which would justify before the world the reestablishment of a Jewish State for the first time in 2,000 years.

Dr. Silver's address reverberated throughout the corridors of history as well as through the United Nations and to this day this single speech has justifiably been credited with having been the most persuasive address delivered by any champion of the cause of Zion Reborn.

It is, therefore, most fitting that at this time we pay tribute to Dr. Abba Hillel Silver for his lifetime of service to his people. A native East Side boy who organized one of the earliest Zionist clubs in the area and inculcated the spirit of Zionism among thousands of fellow East Siders. Dr. Silver became President of the Zionist Organization of America. Chairman of the American Section of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, and Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Israel Bond Organization. He has stood in the forefront of every major effort to advance the security, the culture and the economy of Israel.

We are proud that he is in our midst; that he continues to inspire us; and that he plays a key role in the Israel Bond drive which is so vital to the people and the State of Israel. Now In Its 75" Year





Good Years Ahead For Free World, Says Rabbi Silver as He Nears 70

"The element of fear is gone and the next few years should be good years for the free world."

That is the opinion of Ratbi Abba Hillel Silver, world citizen, Zionist leader, and for the past 45 years spiritual leader of The Temple, E. 105th St. and Silver Park, the largest reform congregation in the world.

Rabbi Silver, whose 70th birthday will be celebrated in a special service Sunday at The Temple, and who will be honored at a civic banquet Sunday evening at the Sheraton-Cleveland Hotel, reviewed the world situation Tuesday in his paneled study at The Temple. He will be 70 on Jan. 28.

Cuba Called Turning Point

He feels that the Cuban crisis, with the firm stand taken by President Kennedy and backed for as normal an international by the American people, was a life as possible," Dr. Silver be-

Probably the greatest strength of Israel is that it is the one free country in that part of the world, and as such serves as an example to the struggling countries around it. Dr. Silver believes.

He and Mrs. Silver will make a trip there in March. It has been their practice for a number of years to make an annual visit to Israel but they passed it up last year in favor of a trip to Russia and to other Iron Curtain countries.

Cites Needs In U.S.

Asked if he would like to make his home in Israel when he retires, Rabbi Silver smiled.

"I love the country and it is a good place to go when there is a specific problem to be worked out," he said. "However, the Jewish community in this country needs leadership, too. I would not want to give up my place here to move permanently to Israel."

Asked what he considered the greatest accomplishments in his long, busy life, Rabbi Silver hestitated.

"In my private life it was winning the good lady who is my wife," he answered. "In my public life it is the part I had in establishing the State of Israel."

Rabbi Silver was born in Lithuania and came to the United States when he was nine years old. He was graduated from the University of Cincinnati and Hebrew Union College and received his doctorate from Western Reserve University.

He married Virginia Horkheimer while he was spiritual leader at Eoff Street Temple in Wheeling, W. Va. They are the parents of two sons, Rabbi Daniel Jeremy Silver, associate rabbi with his father at The Temple, and Rafael D. Silver, a Cleveland businessman. There are five grandchildren.

Contributions Numerous

In addition to the guidance of his congregation, Rabbi Silver has been one of the outstanding figures in the American Zionist movement. He is a former president of the Zionist Organization of America and is its honorary president.



(JTA) - The last two German war criminals convicted and detained in France, who were personally responsible for some of the worst anti-Jewish atrocities committed during the German orcupation, were released last month, it was announced here this week. The release was kept a closely guarded secret, presumably to prevent popular protests.

The two were Karl Oberg, commander of all SS and German police services in occupied France between 1942 and 1944, and Elmut Knochen, who was second in com-

Red Chief Reverses Stand on Test Bans

WASHINGTON-Soviet Premier Khrushchev, in a reversal of policy, has told President Kennedy he is willing to accept two or three on-site inspections a gear in an effort to speed negotiations for a ban on mats of nuclear weapons.



WHEN RABBIS COOPERATE

A dinner given in Cleveland last Sunday, to mark the 70th birthday of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, attracted nationwide attention. Representatives of many communities joined the Clevelanders in paying honor to a great man. Many of the country's most distinguished scholars, from the ranks of all faiths, were on the national sponsoring committee. But that honor was minor compared with the lasting tribute to the eminent scholar incorporated in a great collection of scholarly essays.

What an enviable honor that the volume, "In the time of Harvest-Essays in Honor of Abba Hillel Silver on the Occasion of His 70th Birthday," (published by Macmillan), was edited by his son, Rabbi Daniel Jeremy Silver, who now shares the semi-solution-Creveland with ins fathers that the point of editors who were associated with the son of the man wholeid heing honored so deservedly includes CI-Drs. Solemon B. Freehof, Emanuel Neumann and Solomon Zeitlin; that the distinguished participants in this anthological volume are the world's most noted scholars.

Monarchy lived on in Jewish life mostly as a messianic pipe dream while the realities of Jewish life struggled to establish a government of law rather than of man."

The essay "Monarchy" fits well into the collection of scholarly studies in the Silver Jubilee Volume, and as an addendum of its editor's able compiling of noteworthy participants, as well as his accumulation of his

Prof. Elias Rivkin of Hebrew Union College wrote on "Ben Sira and the Monexistence of the Synagogue-A Study in Historical Method."

"The Origin of the Idea of the Messiah" is the topic of the assay by Prof. Solomon Zeitlin, of Dropsie College, one of the editors of the book.





THOUSANDS VIEW "EXHIBITION OF PIONEERS"

The whole panoramic picture of Israel's history unfolds before the eyes of the viewer as the fascinating and educational exhibit of Israel's first colonies vividly depicts the lives and times of the first settlers.

VISITING SENATOR

The popular and liberal-minded Republican Senator from New-York, Jacob Javits, took some time from his busy schedule here in Israel, to renew old acquaintances at ZOA House. Here on a private visit for his son, Moshé Joshua's Bar-Mitzvah, Mr. Javits stopped into the House to see Mr. Joseph Serlin, Deputy Speaker of the Knesset and Chairman of Z.O.A. House's Management Committee, whom he had met on his previous trip in 1956.

The Senator was shown around the House and was again favorably impressed with its facilities and important role in the community. ZOA House is proudly presenting this important exhibition, to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the Biluim, in cooperation with Beit Neta who has set it up from their historical archives founded by the Agricultural Center of the Histadruth.

On show are farming and household tools, and weapons used to guard against Arab attacks, as well as models of the first settlements of Israel as they are only historically remembered today. Here is Petach Tikvah, a thriving modern city at the present, as it was when founded as an agricultural settlement by pious Jews from Jerusalem who believed literally in the mitzvah "Thou Shalt Bring Forth Bread From the Earth". Depicted also are Gedera, Akron and Rishon-Le-Zion founded by the Biluim, the first settlers of Israel who organized themselves in Russia and were one of the motivating forces behind the aliyah from Eastern Europe.

Seen also are the models of the first colonies supported by Baron Edmond de Rothschild the "Father of the Yishuv" (the Jewish Community), such as Zichron Yaakov and Rosh Pina. On view are documents, and pictures of the first leaders of Israel's historical movement.

Throughout the whole exhibit one strongly felt the yearning and first struggles for cultural expression and spiritual fulfillment as portrayed by the first books of Hebrew verse and poems and the model of the hut in Rehovoth which was Israel's first community center.

On behalf of ZOA House, Mr. Isaac ZivAv delivered the opening address on the first night of the exhibit. Mr. Z. Isaakson, President of the Farmer's Association brought greetings, and Dr. Shaul Levine, Head of Tel Aviv's Department of Education praised this meaningful event for making it possible for all highschool students in the city to visit the exhibition during the week.

In the annals of ZOA House, it was one of the most worthwhile and enriching cultural events ever to take place.

Liberal International Convention

Delegates from 16 countries convened to discuss many things, and uppermost in importance was the role of liberalism in the new countries. Because the Congress, which is an international event, was held in Israel, it shows the regard in which the Israel Liberal Party is held by other liberal parties. It also shows the appreciation of liberal circles for Israel's work on behalf of the new States.

In delivering his keynote address, Professor Giovanni Malogodi, President of the Organization, as well as President of the influential Italian Liberal Party declared that the European Economic Committee must be expanded to include Israel. He also advised the new countries that "economic development is simply not enough, there is a need for a sense of purpose of values".

Education Minister Abba Eban

who brought the Government's greetings, said that the triumph of the Liberals was in having their ideas erupt beyond their original frontier, and expressed the hope that the Liberal International would grow.

The Conference was opened by the International's Secretary-General, Mr. Richard Moore of Britain.

Mr. Paul Foundoux, UNESCO delegate of Congo-Brazzaville, conveyed to Israel the greetings of the Congolese people and of President Youlou. Mr. Minoo Massani of the Indian Swatantra Party brought the Asian Liberals' greetings.



FRIDAY NIGHT FORUMS

Timely topics, controversial subjects, informed and prominent speakers, and an aware interested audience are the integral components of ZOA House's Friday Night Forums. Topics have recently been discussed such as "Is There Religious Coercion in Israel?".

To complement the Forum of January 11th, "The Oldtimers Have Their Say", a unique exhibition was on display for 3 weeks of photographs, documents and models of Israel's first colonies and first settlers. (There is a complete review of the exhibit on another page of the ZOA House News). In celebration of the 80th Anniversary of the Biluim, the first settlers, four top exponents of Israel's colonization spoke about their hardships, achievements and aspirations. Ziv-Av, Director General of the Farmers Association and member of the Board of ZOA House; Deputy Speaker of the Knesset, Israel Yeshayahu, initiator of the Yemenite Aliyah at the early part of this century; Baruch Weinstein, one of the first active leaders of Zionism in East Europe; and Dr. J. Weinshal, military historian and one of the first veteran Zionist leaders to settle in this country.

In a completely non-partisan atmosphere, the Forums continue every two weeks. On January 25, four Knesset members will take the stand to discuss Israel's relationship with West Germany and in February, the Forum will discuss "America in the Eyes of Israel". On Friday night, ZOA House is the meeting place for stimulating freedom of thought and discussion.

With his strong personality and dynamic vision, Dr. Silver stirred the American Jewish communities in the forties. With the magic of his leadership, he forged American Jewry and American Zionism for the trials to achieve statehood. He struggled hard with the Jewish organizations in the U.S., and even more in his own organization - the Zionist Organization of America, until he spiritually prepared them for the historic battle. In those years, he became a precursor of the Jewish State, the leader of American Jewry and American Zionism. In the latter part of 1946, at the first Zionist Congress after World War II, Silver also assumed leadership of World Zionism. His appearance before the United Nations in 1947, is one of the brilliant chapters which he recorded in the annals of the struggle for statehood.

After the first Zionist Congress in liberated Jerusalem, he became deeply hurt by the State's attitude toward him, and withdrew more and more into his own community. At that same Congress in Jerusalem, dejected and embittered, he said to his colleagues: "Why should I continue being active in the Zionist Movement which all these years has only caused me grief and distress; I shall return to my community which has always been a source of gratification and satisfaction for me." Upon hearing these words one of the friends replied: "Dr. Silver — if your name will be inscribed in history, and I'm sure it will, it won't be for the satisfaction you derived from your community, but rather for the troubles caused to you by the Zionist Movement."

That friend was right. From that time on, Dr. Silver confined himself to Cleveland. The young generation in Israeli does know the streets bearing his name and the cities and towns of which he

"City" Series at Art Institute Called Best Yet

A series of lectures examining the question "What is a City?" from a wide variety of viewpoints, sponsored by the Women's Committee of the Cleveland Institute of Art for its scholarship fund, is being hailed as the most successful series yet held by that group.

With two lectures remaining, proceeds from the first four, which filled to capacity the Institute's auditorium, have already exceeded expectations, according to a Committee spokesman.

Contributing to the success of the series has been the interest shown by people involved in city planning in the northern Ohio area, who have attended regularly to hear top architects, city planners, artists, sociologists and government representatives present their views on the nature and function of the modern urban center.

First to speak was Professor Burnham Kelly, dean of the College of Architecture, Cornell University, who spoke on "A City Planner Looks at the Changing City." Professor Kelly set the scene for succeeding speakers by noting that a city is many things to many people, and that there is no single answer to the question "What is a City?" He was followed by Dr. Edmund Chap-

He was followed by Dr. Edmund Chapman, professor of Art History and chairman of the Division of Art and Architecture at Western Reserve University, who examined the city from an art historian's viewpoint.

"The Architect Looks at the City," a lecture by Robert A. Little, architect with Robert A. Little and George Ealton & Associates followed, and in turn was followed by Associate Professor John E. Turner of the School of Applied Social Sciences, WRU, who discussed the sociological implications of the modern metrcpolis.

On February 7 William L. Slayton, commissioner, Urban Renewal Administration, Washington, D. C., will give a talk entitled "The Government Administrator Looks at the City."

The last of the series, on February 14, will present a film, "Form, Design and the City." Damon Childs, chief of Urban Renewal and Planning Division of the Philadelphia Planning Commission, will be on hand to comment on the film and on the Philadelphia story.

Temple Leader Honored on Double Anniversary

On a characteristic note of hope Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver has entered his 71st year of life and his 46th year as spiritual leader of The Temple.

Speaking at a dinner in his honor attended by some 2,000 admirers at Hotel Sheraton-Cleveland, Dr. Silver said that while the twentieth century is building a "better and ampler world for man," the next century will improve upon it.

"A society will emerge which will be free from the dark heritage of the past, the ageold curse of poverty, misery and exploitation, of inequality, racialism and intolerance. It will be an exciting world, and for men of courage and faith a welcome and challenging world."

President John F. Kennedy, former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and David Ben-Gurion, Prime Minister of Israel, were among scores of world leaders who sent congratulatory messages to Rabbi Silver. President Kennedy's message was read by Anthony J. Celebrezze, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare and former Cleveland mayor. Mr. Celebrezze hailed Dr. Silver's effectiveness in the dual role as a leader in his community and in causes "which transcended community boundaries."

Also on hand to congratulate Rabbi Silver were Ohio Governor James A. Rhodes, Cleveland Mayor Ralph S. Locher, Dr. Joseph Schwartz, national director of the Bonds for Israel organization as well as many religious and civic leaders. His wife, Virginia, and his two sons, Rabbi Daniel J. Silver and Raphael Silver also were there to pay him tribute.

New Sound of Music To Be Heard at Case

Don't look now but they're turning your tape recorder into a full-fledged concert instrument.

That's what three of the nation's most outstanding modern composers are set to prove in a discussion-demonstration at Case Institute of Technology's Strosacker Auditorium on February 8, when they will play and discuss their explorations into the eerie field of electronic music. The program is free and open to the public. Vladimir A. Ussachevski, associate pro-

Vladimir A. Ussachevski, associate professor of music at Columbia University, Otto Luening, professor of music at Columbia, and Milton Babbitt, professor of music at Princeton University will participate in the demonstration. All three have distinguished themselves through their works for tape recorder and orchestra. The three are co-directors of the Columbia-Princeton Electronic Music Center, founded in 1958 by a Rockefeller Foundation grant. Their music has been performed live and on records by major symphony orchestras in this country and abroad and has won wide acclaim.

The tape recorder, as an instrument, enables the composer to exploit the entire realm of sound—not just sounds peculiar to conventional musical instruments. It also enables him to create new sounds through distortion, multiple recording, and other devices, and to control the sound to a far greater degree than ever before.

Perhaps the time has come to talk about the "four B's"–Bach, Beethoven, Brahms . . . and Beeps.

presentation to Rabbi Silver of the first copy of the book, "In the Time of Harvest," published in honor of his birthday by the MacMillan Company. The volume contains biographical material, a bibliography of his writings, selections from his sermons as well as a number of articles by political leaders and scholars from throughout the world.

A second testimonial volume, prepared by elementary school students at The Temple, was presented to Dr. Silver by Rabbi Daniel Silver.

Putting an end to speculation that he might announce his retirement, Rabbi Silver said that "At 70 my days of apprenticeship are about over. I trust that I can now use the tools of my craft a little more expertly."

Reflecting that there have been times in his 70 years that have been difficult and even dreadful, Dr. Silver said that he was glad to have lived in these times.

"My ministry witnessed the emergence of new hopes and visions and new programs for the salvation of man. Today at 70 I feel confident that mankind will achieve even greater good, unpredictable though the outcome of many issues, domestic and international, still is."

Worth Noting

On February 26th, THECDORE LETTVIN, concert pianist and head of the piano department of the Cleveland Music School Settlement, will be the featured soloist with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra in New York City. No newcomer to the concert stage, Mr. Lettvin has been concertizing since the age of 12, when he appeared with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and has performed with major orchestras throughout the world. Throughout his career he has compiled a record that may be unique in the music world—he has never once cancelled or been late to a concert.

DR. MARVIN B. SUSSMAN, chairman of the Western Reserve University department of sociology, is director of a project that will for the first time make use of telephone survey methods in making a large-scale urban health study. If successful, the survey will provide valuable health classification material available in no other way. Dr. Sussman's survey team is expected to contact some 3,500 Cleveland area families, who will be asked questions concerning use of eyeglasses, hearing aids, and assistance in walking as well as certain chronic diseases.

DAN SNOW, director of the Balph Mueller Planetarium and Observatory at the Museum of Natural History, is one of the city's real experts on astronomy-a fact that many thousands who have heard him lecture will testify to, Snow started out as an engineer, then became a professional photographer. Through his interest in lenses he became fascinated with telescopic equipment, then took up astronomy as a hobby. Dr. Nason J. Nassau, former head of the Case Observatory, talked him into taking the jcb with the Museum 11 years ago after Snow had helped solve photographic problems for that observatory. At that point he had never spoken before any group. Since then he has spoken to over 200,000 people.

He is, in the opinion of many, the greatest living orator in the rabbinate. We wish him good health "ad me-ah v'esrim shanah". > When is a man free? Not when he is driftwood on the stream of life ... free of all cares or worries or ambitions -.. He is not free at all --- only drugged, like the lotus eaters in the Odyssey.... To be free in action, in struggle, in undiverted and purposeful achievement, to move forward towards a worthy objective across a a fierce terrain of resistance, to be vital and aglow in the exercise of a great enterprise --- that is to be free, and to know the joy and exhilaration of true freedom. A man is free only when he has an errand on earth.

The Land of Israel will be small ... but the people of Israel will make it great Not in opulence but in eminence will their destiny be fulfilled, and the elixir of their pride will be distilled not out of dominion or far-flung borders, but out of the faithful and skillful building of the good society.

When prosperous, men find it easy to dispense with God.

WHAT IS THE BASIC IDEA OF REFORM JUDAISM?


