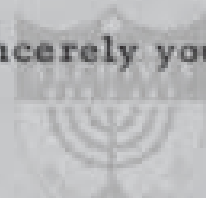

Dear Rabbi:

Thank you for your letter of December 30 returning the article from THE NATIONAL OBSERVER sent you recently.

The comments in your letter tend to miss the point. You speak of "authoritarianism" alone. The point I tried to make is that collectivism inevitably tends toward authoritarianism. The whole history of the human race shows that in a collective trend certain individuals will obtain control over the collective, and wherever there is a collective climate, the individual tends to abdicate individual responsibility. Thus, the sentence which was underscored in the article reads:


"Basically, these individuals see themselves as functioning for others or for a group. They identify themselves completely with what they believe others expect of them."

All of which leads to the opinion which I hold, and which you do not, that the collectivist trend in this country is much too strong and bodes ill for democracy, in its real sense.

In all discussions of this kind, it must be remembered that it is possible to like an individual without necessarily liking what that individual may say from time to time.
