My dear Mr. Gross:-

I am enclosing herewith copies of the correspondence which I had with the Denver folks in connection with the lecture which they wanted me to deliver. You will note that I stated what my customary remuneration is in my very first letter to them and it was on this basis that the ensuing correspondence was carried on.

Mr. Miller writing under date of August first states 'that he is confident that the new board would immediately and gladly ratify any arrangements that he would make.' The negotiations had gone as far as my sending them a list of subjects for the lecture.

Three months after the correspondence began a new set of officers came into office and they felt that they had to curtail expenses and began to 'handle' with me. I, of course, cancelled the engagement with them at once. The reaction of some of the Denver people to the action of the Brotherhood you may infer from a letter which I received from a representative of the Denver Independent Order B'nai B'rith, copy of which I am also enclosing.

You possibly do not know my policy in the matter of remunerations for lectures. I give my services absolutely free to all charitable organizations whether in town or out of town, as well as to national movements like Jewish war relief, Palestine, the Hillel Foundation, etc. etc. Frequently I pay my own traveling expenses. I have, however, a fixed charge for lectures which I am asked to deliver before clubs, societies, brotherhoods, etc. which carry on regular lecture programs. Our own Temple Brotherhood and Sisterhood pay very liberal honorariums to out of town speakers.

It might interest you to know that the honorarium which I set for the Denver folks was actually one

hundred dollars less than what I had set for other communities on the Pacific Coast. I was giving them the reduction because I would be going through Denver on my way home anyhow.

My dear Rabbi:

While a guest in your city several weeks ago one of the individuals who acted as host or was a guest in the party which I was included (for the life of me I cannot remember who he was) had occasion to speak to me about our Rabbi Silver, and in that conversation he made the statement that Rabbi Silver had arranged to deliver a lecture at the Temple for a consideration of \$150.00 and afterwards rescinded that arrangement by presumably making a statement that he could not afford to make it at that price, but that he would require \$200.00.

These were the exact words that were told me, but I cannot recall who the individual ~~who~~ was. I remember distinctly telling that party, however, that it does not sound like Rabbi Silver, nor do I believe it, as I know him very well, and also am very familiar with the motives and principles employed in his lectures that he gives thru out the country. I told him that there must be a mistake somewhere.

I had occasion to meet Rabbi Silver after my return, and more or less in a jocular way told him that he got himself very much disliked in your community, and naturally, gave him the reasons therefor. In answer thereto he rather made light of it, and made the statement that I was not advised correctly, and also that he would be glad to furnish me with the correspondence relative to this instance. Of course, I am not particularly interested in this affair, but I am interested to the extent to see that justice is done.

Dear Abba - How have you been and Miriam and the children? Things here are again running their usual course after our recent unforgettable loss. Pearl's children are now back again at the Lakewood School and find themselves happy there. The policy which Pearl left stipulates as beneficiaries her children with myself as Trustee for them. As soon as I receive the check covering the policy, I will open a savings account with same at the Bonyon Savings Bank in trust for Florence and Alvin. When they become of age - they will be able to obtain that money with accumulated interest. I note by your recent Bulletin that our mutual friend Dr. Magnes is to visit you shortly at Cleveland. Which calls to my mind a long-dormant and -cherished plan of mine regarding which I wish to write you briefly here, in order to ascertain your advice on same. I refer to my long-cherished plan of speaking about two years, beginning, say, next October at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem - my objective therein being to obtain there a Doctor's degree in Hebrew literature concentrating my studies there on my long-favored field of Jewish Ethics. My ultimate objective is of course thereafter to seek a professorship or associate-professorship in that subject with one of our Jewish liberal schools of learning here.

The unpromising and unpromising conditions at present in my bank makes it easier for me to begin the realization of my above-mentioned plan this year.

I have given thought to the financial end of the venture. I expect to be able to take care of that

with my present resources considering, the
rather moderate living cost at Palestine.

The above mentioned plan, as you may guess or
know, is one not thought up on the spur of the moment.
It has been quietly occupying my thoughts for the
past few years. And it does not seem to me one
impossible of realization at this period of my life.
There is of course the problem of finding an opening
for myself after the period in question is over,
either ~~at~~ on our own Alma Mater ~~at~~ ^{at} ~~the~~ ^{the} ~~university~~ ^{university} ~~etc.~~ ^{etc.} As to this, I would seem that with the prestige of
a doctorate from the Hebrew University coupled
with your moral support upon which I intend
to count, that should not prove impossible.

I have of course discussed this plan with
Joan. She likes the idea of my proposed return to
the academy as well as the idea of a two
year's sojourn at Jerusalem. Should we find it
practical to have my family join me there. Her
main concern naturally is as to what chance
of success there may be in properly placing myself
at the proper time.

Needless to say that I well appreciate
your giving this matter some thought. I am of course
anxious to hear from you your opinion and advice
on same.

My dear Maxwell:-

Please pardon the long delay in answering your letter. I have been away from the city a good deal of the time and my correspondence has lagged.

Jack Matlaw came to Cleveland this morning and is spending the date with us. He went with his sister to Cincinnati and it seems that the trip was worth while.

I was somewhat surprised to read of your contemplated return to academic pursuits and of your desire to spend two years in Palestine at the Hebrew University and of connecting yourself up ultimately with some Jewish institute of learning.

I have nothing to say in criticism of your plan except from the practical point of view. It would not be advisable to leave a position in which you have a measure of economic security and perhaps prospects of advancement and spend two years away from any possibility of earning anything and then face the prospect of not being able to obtain a position. You probably know that the number of openings for instructors at our Jewish institutions of learning is very limited.

If you have definitely made up your mind that that is what you want to do, I would suggest that you have a personal interview with Dr. Morgenstern. Perhaps the College would be interested in sending you to Palestine with a definite promise of an appointment upon your return.

I would have similar conferences with the heads of the Theological Seminary and the Institute in New York.

Under no circumstances would I advise you to make this sharp and definite break in your career unless you have a tangible prospect in the offing. You are no longer a young man of twenty-one or two starting out in the Rabbinate. You are forty

now with large family responsibilities and I need not urge upon you, I am sure, the advisability of caution and deliberateness.

Personally I should very much love to see you go into professional work again. That's where you belong. But you ought to map your course with an eye to what is practical and feasible.

It is possible that I will be in New York soon after Shabuoth and in that case I will have a chance to talk the matter over in greater detail.

My Dear Abba

I promised to advise you of the results of my interview with Dr. Morpustera.

Our friend was very genial, sympathetic and intimate in my hour's pleasant interview with him at his hotel room.

That surprised me and him was that he was not at all impressed by you of my definite purpose for seeking an interview with him. He had no intimation from your conversation with him at Censuravati that I was seeking to connect myself with the H. M. C. faculty.

Dr. Morpustera's main point as to the last mentioned was, in brief, that owing to the present economic depression and the consequent curtailment of income on the part of the College he is unable at the present time to enter upon plans for further expansion of the faculty i.e. the addition of a new "Chair in Jewish Ethics". At present they have a new man (his name

escapes me at the moment) whom they brought over from the Hebrew University at Jerusalem who is filling the Chair of Jewish Philosophy and also gives some courses in Jewish Ethics. Two years ago, he stated when things were prosperous he would have been able and pleased to speak more encouragingly about my proposition, but not now, due to the above mentioned reasons, which he seemed to stress and repeat with great sincerity.

Of course many things and changes could take place during the next two years of my proposed period of study such as a change for the better in economic conditions and changes in the faculty (as I gently suggested) but in view of the present circumstances he nevertheless feels unable at present to commit himself on those possibilities.

Now whether this is final and irrevocable I don't know. As a member of the Board of Governors of the College you know better than I the inside situation at the College. You also know

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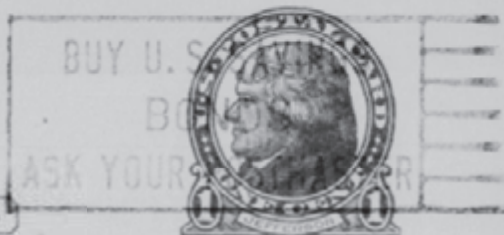
whether or not you can influence

Conversation with Congressman Sol Bloom
Washington, D.C. September 22, 1943

Present: Dr. Goldmann, Congressman Bloom

Mr. E.I. Kaufmann informed Dr. Goldmann that Congressman Bloom wanted to see him.

Congressman Bloom informed Dr. Goldmann that he had been told by the State Department that the son of Ibn Saud would arrive on October fifth; that he would stay in Washington for four days as the guest of the government, four days in New York and some time in other parts of the country. The State Department had expressed the confident hope that Ibn Saud's son would not be publicly attacked by any Jewish or Zionist group. Con. Bloom had called a meeting of other Jewish Congressmen and Con. Celler had informed him that he planned to attack Ibn Saud and his son in a radio broadcast on Saturday night. All Mr. Bloom's efforts to dissuade Mr. Celler not to do this were in vain, as Celler stuck to his opinion that he had to do this.

Mr. Bloom asked Dr. Goldmann whether he could not intervene with Mr. Celler. He further expressed the fear that the Jewish Press might attack Ibn Saud's son, which would also make a bad impression.

Dr. Goldmann told Mr. Bloom that the President had informed Dr. Wise some weeks ago of the impending visit, implying that he expected no attacks would be made by the Zionists. It would certainly be bad taste and bad politics to attack a man who comes here as a guest of the President. On the other hand, the Zionists hope that Ibn Saud's son will make no anti-Zionist statements while he is here, as the Zionists would have to issue a counter-statement.

Mr. Bloom said he would make it clear to the State Department that no such statements should be made.

Dr. Goldmann then told Mr. Bloom that he would ask Dr. Wise to discuss the matter with Mr. Celler and warn him not to make any public attack on Ibn Saud or his son. He would also discuss the matter with the editors of the Yiddish and Anglo-Jewish press and request them to refrain from making any attacks.

Dr. Goldmann, however, warned Mr. Bloom that the Jewish Army Committee might use this occasion to publish one of their well-known advertisements, and urged him to request Senator Johnson to try to keep them under control. He promised to do this.

Mr. Bloom then said he would try to arrange an informal dinner with Ibn Saud's son and invite some of the Zionists.

Dr. Goldmann said that he was doubtful whether this should be done. Ibn Saud's son might refuse to meet Zionists and they certainly do not want to put themselves in the position of having wanted to meet him and being refused. Mr. Bloom should first sound out the State Department and see whether there was any point in Zionists talking to Ibn Saud's son.

Interview with Congressman Bloom-- Washington, D. C. Oct. 6, 1943

Present: Congressman Bloom, Dr. Goldmann

Mr. Bloom said he had seen the Arab princes (sons of Ibn Saud, visiting this country) several times, and had advised them not to discuss Palestine. It is his impression that they have refrained from making any statements on the subject.

Dr. Goldmann said it had been reported in the press that Emir Feisal hoped for an Arab Federation with the inclusion of Palestine.

Mr. Bloom told Dr. Goldmann that no official press conference had been held and the report might have referred to an informal conversation. He said he would see the princes again before they left the country and that if Dr. Goldmann thought it would be useful, he would be prepared to give them a statement of his own about Palestine, asking them to transmit the statement to Ibn Saud. He told Dr. Goldmann that if he agreed, he should draft the statement. The matter is, however, to be kept strictly confidential.

Dr. Goldmann said he would think it over. If he agrees that such a statement would be a good idea, he will draft it.

My dear Dr. Goldmann:

I received today the memorandum of the conversations which you had with Judge Samuel Rosenman on November 3 and with Congressman Bloom on October 29. You will recall that we formally agreed that you were not to make any contacts in Washington without first apprising me of them. You have evidently forgotten this arrangement. You will recall that I had visited Judge Rosenman and also Congressman Bloom and that I was to contact Judge Rosenman again as well as Congressman Bloom. In fact I have been corresponding with Congressman Bloom about Ibn Sa'ud. I had been waiting to receive the revised draft of our Economic Memorandum before submitting it to Judge Rosenman. Your calling upon both gentlemen, and covering the same ground, simply creates an impossible situation. Whether it is advisable or not to send friends to see the President is certainly a matter which you should not have raised with Judge Rosenman without consulting me; nor for that matter, some other things.

I am afraid, my dear Dr. Goldmann, that I shall have to bring the entire matter up before a meeting of the Emergency Council. I had hoped to avoid the unpleasantness which it would cause. But clearly there cannot be two independent political bureaus working for Palestine in the United States, and I do not intend that you should unilaterally define the scope and authority of your functioning.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. Weisgal and to Mr. Montor who attended our meeting in Washington when as I believed we had reached a working arrangement.

My dear Dr. Goldmann:

Permit me to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of November 9. I should like to set you straight on a few facts.

If you will consult your calendar, you will find that meetings of the Emergency Committee have been held regularly as agreed upon, every first and third Monday. The only deviation from the practice was Monday, November 1, when no meeting was held because a special meeting of the Emergency Committee was held five days prior to that time, on Wednesday, October 27, at which time we discussed the action of the American Jewish Committee.

Furthermore, I should like to remind you that while it is not possible every time a situation arises, to phone Cleveland to ascertain my views, you haven't been particularly burdened with such long distance conversations to my best knowledge. Nor is it necessary. You can always contact Mr. Montor who is in daily communication with me, and sometimes two and three times a day. All that I want is that we have a central clearing house for contacts which members of our Emergency Council make with public officials in Washington so that we know beforehand who goes to see whom, and why.

As to the matter of my visit to Lord Halifax, over which you seem to be exercised, and exercising others, I will have occasion to speak of it when we meet next Monday.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I have your letter of November 5th. To begin with, I should like to put you straight on the facts.

I met with Judge Rosenman last week for the purpose of securing his help in connection with my priority for Palestine. He had offered such help some time ago. When we met, however, he was anxious to discuss some of our problems, which we did. I do not see what possible harm was done by discussing them nor how I could avoid such discussion, once the issue was raised by him. If I had thought that this was "unilateral" activity, I would not report thereon nor would I send you a minute of the conversation. Such mutual information, I think, ought to be considered quite useful.

As for Congressman Bloom, I told you that he had asked me to give him a draft of a memorandum which he desired to submit, in his own name, to the son of Ibn Saud. You will recall that I had discussed this with you and you had agreed that it would be useful. Ibn Saud's son was in Washington last week and is about to leave for London. It was therefore deemed urgent that the draft be given to Mr. Bloom. The memorandum itself was prepared by Mr. Lourie and corrected by you.

So much for the facts.

Since you have raised the question, I think it would be useful to have some clarity on the subject. You seem to be under the impression that every conversation in Washington constitutes a state affair. I think that everyone of us, having developed friendships and acquaintances in Washington, should endeavor, as often as they can get access, to meet with these people even if Zionism is not always the subject of discussion. The fault, I am afraid, is not that these people are seen too often, but too little. Their memories are not very enduring. It is quite another matter when these people are met officially for some specific purpose resulting from previous discussion and decision of our committee when it is definitely determined who should be seen and by whom. In the latter category, I am afraid, that your visit to Lord Halifax is a case in point. Such

an audience certainly should have been discussed in advance and determined upon. I am not questioning the wisdom of seeing him alone although I venture to say that you should have given consideration to the continuity of our association with him both on the part of Dr. Wise and myself. But certainly, whatever the decision, it should have been taken in advance and in consultation with us.

There is another difficulty which is inherent in the long intervals between your visit to New York and Washington. It is a very serious problem and the sooner you will face it, the better it will be for all of us and the less friction there is likely to be. It is not a question of "jurisdiction" or in keeping with arrangements. For my part, I am scrupulously trying to avoid anything that might give the impression of "independent" action. Everything I do or say is part of the record before and after the event. With the best of good will, it is not possible everytime a situation arises to phone to Cleveland to ascertain your views on the subject.


I do not want to prolong this letter unnecessarily. But if we had adhered to the arrangements of meeting at least once every two weeks (and that is very little) to outline a program of action such a situation would not arise. Even then it may be necessary for you or Dr. Wise or myself to depart occasionally from the course of action decided upon if the exigencies of the moment require it. There must be sufficient mutual confidence to realize that none of us is "running" to see people just for the pleasure of seeing them.

I have no objection to your bringing up the matter before the Executive Committee although I fail to see what useful purpose it will serve. We have problems far more serious than this seeming "jurisdictional dispute." I suggest, that as arranged, you, Wise, Lipsky, Montor, Weisgal and I meet next Monday morning to thrash this business out. If we cannot find a modus satisfactory to all, of course, there is no other alternative than submitting the whole question to the Executive Committee. I personally would regard it very regrettable.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Messrs. Montor and Weisgal.

May I extend to you my best wishes for a happy and prosperous New Year.


We were all very happy that you were so successful at the meeting of the Actions Committee and we hope that you will be as successful at the session of the Assembly.

I know how busy you are, confronted with the many, many problems of our movement but may I take the liberty to suggest respectfully that this is the time to put a painless end to the Americans for Haganah. In a private and confidential discussion which I had with Rudolph Sonneborn he suggested that the Emergency Council take over that activity. This would certainly be advisable now when, during the debate at the United Nations, all efforts for Zionist propaganda in the United States should be centralized in the Emergency Council.

During the absence of Dr. Neumann and yourself, we have had the friendliest relations with the Executive Director of Americans for Haganah and we have tried as diplomatically as possible to establish cordial relations with Mr. Feinberg, who heads the Americans for Haganah. Dr. Neumann appointed Mr. Feinberg a member of the Administrative Council and I sincerely believe that we will be able to take him out of the Weisgalian den and bring him into our midst.

We have a good fighting chance at the U N Assembly.

With reference to the Americans for the Haganah, I wish that you would take the matter up with Dr. Neumann as soon as he returns. It is questionable whether we need a separate organization to popularize the work of the Haganah and whether that same purpose cannot be accomplished through the existing Zionist organizations working under the direction of the Emergency Council.

I am eager to see you. I send you all my good wishes for a happy new year.



SEATTLE TO SELL \$7,900,000 BONDS

Offering of Municipal Power
Issue That Was Postponed
Will Be Made Aug. 12

SEVERAL LOANS AWARDED

Charlotte, N. C., Plans \$230,-
000 Loan at Interest
Cost of 1.479%

The city of Seattle, Wash., announced yesterday that it would enter the market on Aug. 12 with an issue of \$7,900,000 of municipal light and power revenue bonds. This issue was originally offered for sale on June 22, but had to be postponed because of priorities on materials required to complete the operation. The details of the proposed offering on Aug. 12 were not disclosed yesterday but will be announced at a later date.

Charlotte, N. C.

The Harris Trust and Savings Bank, Chicago, received yesterday the award of \$230,000 of water bonds of Charlotte, N. C., on a net interest cost of 1.479 per cent. The bonds were awarded on a bid of 100.079 for \$110,000 as 2s and \$120,000 as 1½s. Dated Aug. 1, 1942, the bonds will mature on Aug. 1, 1945 to 1964.

Cranston, R. I.

Officials of Cranston, R. I., yesterday sold a total of \$250,000 of securities, consisting of notes and bonds. Kidder, Peabody & Co. and Robert Hawkins & Co. purchased \$100,000 of highway bonds, due Aug. 1, 1943 to 1962, on their bid of 100.211 for 1½s. The Rhode Island Hospital National Bank of Providence bought \$150,000 of temporary-loan notes at 0.52 per cent. The notes, dated July 29, will become payable on Feb. 26, 1943.

The city of Scranton, Pa., will be in the market on Aug. 11 with an issue of \$210,000 of sewer improvement bonds.

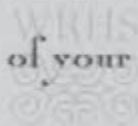
