August 6, 1948 Liberal Judaism 920 Riverside Drive, Suite 31 New York 32, New York Gentlemen: At the outset I want to make it clear that I do not want any publicity of this letter, nor am I interested in entering into any debate. My purpose is to criticise inaccuracies as a result of which you have done a poor job of reporting. In your June-July issue you state on page 20 that the organization of the Suburban Temple in this city is a good example of a development "due to the world situation and the difficulties of Jews in Europe and Palestine." I do not know the source of your information or what efforts were made by you to secure confirmation thereof. The real fact is that neither the world situation nor the difficulties mentioned had anything whatsoever to do with the formation of this congregation. All you need do is consult Rabbi Eisendrath to verify this. The truth is that the organizers are a dissident group who are opposed to the required study of Hebrew and the inclusion, in the teaching of the history of our people, of any reference to Zionism and Palestine. I can readily understand why you would not want to publicize the fact that a congregation came into being as a result of a controversy, but if you intend to make any reference to the organization of a congregation the truth should be stated and not fiction. MEMORANDUM

You might wish to emphasize the following:

- 1. The original motive for the organization of the new congregation was the anti-Zionism and the anti-Hebrew instruction of the original sponsors and instigators of the new congregation. Their point of view is that of the discredited American Council for Judaism. They represent the same approach to Judaism and the Jewish people that the spokesmen of the notorious Houston Temple represented, which point of view was decisively rejected, almost unamimously, at the Union of American Hebrew Congregations Convention in Cincinnati two years ago. They do not represent reformed Judaism in the United States. The Judaism which is preached in the reformed temples of Cleveland is in harmony with the classic position of all the reformed congregations in the United States today. The curriculum of their religious schools and the text books used in the school are those approved by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Central Conference of American Rabbis. The Temple has been a leader of American Reformed Judaism for nearly 100 years. Its Rabbi was President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. The new temple, insofar as it has a point of view at all, represents a blind detour into something which is certainly not American Reformed Judaism.
- 2. The position of The Temple on Zionism is defined in the brochure which you have and which defines it clearly and accurately.
- 3. The methods which we use in the teaching of Hebrew in our Religious School are those employed by nearly all the religious schools in the United States. There may be other methods, but they have not been tried out anywhere to the point where they can be adopted by our Religious School. When better methods are found to be practicable, we shall adopt them. Everyone agrees, including the Rabbi of the new group, that the teaching of Hebrew is important. If it is, then it should be taught. Making it optional is underwriting its general neglect in the school.
- The Temple has encouraged the organization of new congregations; together with the Euclid Avenue Temple they have brought into existence and helped to finance the new Temple Emanu-El which is now self-supporting and completely independent. This was a contribution which the two existing temples made to the spread of reformed Judaism in our community, but the congregation which was thus established reached out for new and unaffiliated Jews, not those who are already members of existing congregations. The fourth congregation has carried on a propaganda among members of the existing two reformed temples to make them dissatisfied with their membership in the existing temples or with their religious schools in an effort to win them over to affiliation to the new temple. This "raiding" of existing members is a thing unknown in our community - or for that matter, in any community - and has been climaxed by the effort of last Friday evening to win away the young men and women of the existing temples and to organize them as a junior congregation of the new temple. The young people of the existing temples can find full opportunity for their religious needs in the temples to which their families belong.

The two temples in Cleveland have participated actively in the total life of the community since their very inception. Their rabbis and their lay leaders have been active in every civic enterprise. They have not "ghetto-ized" their congregants. Integration is a two-sided affair.....where the non-Jew is unwilling, the cry of integration on the part of the Jew becomes rather pathetic. Integration in the mouths of some of these people is another word for escapism, assimilation, which has not worked anywheres and will not work here.

The booklet on our Religious School elaborates on this point and on the teaching of Americanism, etc. The Temple's war record and the story of its 800 men and women who served our country during the war, some of them with distinction, is one indication among many of the "integration" of our young people in American life.

6. You might wish to indicate in the course of your remarks the pride which our young people might properly take in The Temple, its century of service to the community and to the nation, its leadership, etc. If our young people want to know more about Judaism, their religions, their history, the Temple can afford them the fullest opportunities for it,— Its services, its lectures, the programs of its Alumni Association, study groups, etc.

My Dear Rabbi:

I made reall strenuous efforts last night and early this morning to arrange the meeting at my home for this Friday evening, but found that, after reaching every name on the list except two (Jack Bialosky and Paul Kyman), even if I received affirmative responses from these two, I would have a total attendance of only five. I thought you would agree that it would be unwise to hold a meeting with so small a number and I have therefore concluded to arrange it for October 1, which is the first open date I have. I leave the city on September 19 and except for an interval of one day will be out of the city until the night of September 29 and already have a meeting scheduled for September 30.

The three who consented to come were: Alan Englander (and wife), Merle Held and Mike Feder. Three had already either left for college or were leaving today: Bill Selden, Alan Miller and George Nachman, Jr. Nachman, whom I reached before his departure for school, expressed great regret upon being unable to participate in such a meeting.

All others, (with the exception of Henry Einstein, who is out of the city until Thursday evening, and who, even if I were able to reach him then, would have but one day's notice) had previous engagements for Friday evening, which they were unable to change. It was interesting to find that with possibly one or so exceptions, all of these expressed a genuine interest in coming.

Conversations with them or their parents indicated also that "you don't have to worry about me, I'm on your side". Some indicated that they actually resented the other meeting which they attended and took issue at the time, although there was evidence that some were attracted to certain ideas and plans for conducting the religious school, although not with the theological ideas that were expressed.

While I intended to follow your suggestion, of inviting additional names that would occur to me, in the same age group, I had concluded not to invite Chuck Barnett and Sidney Stern. While I doubt that Sidney, at least, would leave our congregation, I know something of how both these boys think of the subject and felt that certainly in the case of Barnett, it might prove to be a disruptive influence in

I would prefer to continue efforts I have already made in the past to think through the larger problem with these boys. And I am afraid that at my home they would simply divert the meeting uto a running debate on Zionism. Adeline just called and told me that in speaking with you this morning you indicated the possibility of your writing to this group. She was not clear whether you meant that as a substitute for a meeting at a subsequent date, if I could not arrange one for Friday evening. I shall, therefore, call you tomorrow after you have had an opportunity to see this note, or perhaps your secretary will call me when you are free. A good example is the case of the Suburban Temple, the fourth new Reform congregation in Cleveland. Organized through the voluntary efforts of a group of laymen, the Suburban Temple today has 250 families affiliated, with Rabbi Norman M. Goldburg as spiritual leader. I want you to know that I am deeply grateful to you for giving him support and encouragement. No one can deny that his going to Cleveland was a mistake, but it would have been a greater mistake for him to have remained there. The only saving remnant of his contact with this negative group is that his own Jewish sympathies have become intensified and quickened. I spoke to Norman of an opening that exists at Fort Worth, Texas. Samuel Soskin, who was there, is going to Beth Emeth in Brooklyn. Norman would love to go to Fort Worth, and I am positive that he will be a wonderful asset to that community. There is a Sol Brachman there, a prominent Zionist, who is a key figure in the situation. Do you know him? Would you be good enough to write him a strong letter for Norman? I do not know if the powers at the Hebrew Union College see the picture in Cleveland as I do, but I would measure the success of the Rabbi at the Suburban Congregation by his desire to leave the group rather than by his willingness to accede to their un-Jewish demands. In my humble opinion, Norman has demonstrated his worth by staunchly adhering to his convictions without measuring the cost. Dear Dr. Silver:

I know that Rabbi Stone conveyed to you my thanks and appreciation for your god offices in commection with the Ft. Worth pulpit. May I add this personal word of gratitude not only for that gracious act but for your kind and generous attitude toward me.

I gave Earl rather a detailed list of the difficulties encountered in this Suburban st-up. I have communicated with Dr. Glueck and with Dr. Eisendrath, too. I am sure that both men know, by this time, the issues which have brought an early impasse between Rabbi and congregation. I made it clear to them, just as I made it clear to the Board that I could not and would not go along with the so-called program or pattern envisioned by the leaders of this group.

I described this manifestation, in a letter to Dr. Morgenstern, as the last gasp of the Houston racket of several years ago. As I told Earl, several hundred members are not involved or interested in the "philosophy" of the dominant minority. They are in the congregation for a variety of reasons.

They like the idea of a small school and one located in the Heights area. That is one reason. A second, and I think this carries a lot of weight, is that Suburban is supposed to be "exclusive". It has what I would call "snob" appeal. Some of the little people are thrilled and delighted to "work" on the same committees with and to be invited to the homes of certain leaders....

Well, that is pretty ghastly stuff, isn't it, Dr. Silver. Yet, I am afraid that this country club appeal, this invitation to join an exclusive and limited congregation have tremendous attraction for some people. The fact that leaders of Suburban Temple are not numbered among the philanthropic laymen of the community (generally speaking) nor among the workers in Jewish causes does not seem to detract.

I said in my report at the annual meeting of the congregation that within very definite limitations we had a good school. That may seem paradoxical but it is true, in ceratan respects. There was a warm and friendly relationship between Rabbi and children.

The monthly Friday evening childrens services which I introduced were outstandingly successful.

We had a few good teachers in the school. The arts and crafts department was well organized and I venture to say that this committee consisting of a half dozen intelligent and skillful wo men, some with exprience in kindergarten, general teaching, handicraft etc. produced projects on a par with anything thus far devised in the country. This phase of our work I considered superlative.

However, the restrictions and limitations were, from the first onerous and not to be borne by one of my temperament, beliefs and training. The anti-Zionist, anti-Israel bias was carried to the stupid extreme of barring Jewish current events in the school. They were sure the teachers would not know how to handle the Israel current events!

Some day, when it is feasible, I hope to have the opportunity for a long chat with you. Later on, I shall be able write a series of articles on this rare experience. At the moment, I am sitting precariously on a lid of a pot which sputters and boils over.

By, the way, Dr. Siler, I forgot to mention that the Fort Worth people seem to be disregarding all recommendations. They have asked the college for a young man, four or five years out of college. Alas, I have been a Rabbi for almost twenty years and am accounted "an old timer". I think we should begin taling about this thing and doing sme thing about placement at the next Conference.

Thank you once again, Dr. Silver. I know I do not have to tell you that this letter is private and confidential.

Dear Earl:

As the summer months sped by and nothing important opened up for me I decided to come down to this Southern pulpit which made me a very nice offer. In addition, I find myself doing quite a lot of Chaplaincy work at three large local installations. I reapplied for my Reserve Commission and that is that. I mean to say that local chaplaincy duties count on the Reserve schedule. Very nice, indeed.

Were you surprised to learn that Myron Silverman had accepted the Suburban nod. I was. He had called me on his first visit to Cleveland and I gave him as much of the picture as I could in a telephone conversation. I talked to two men at the Conference in Bretton Woods who told me (I have no reason to doubt them) that they turned it down Why a nice, easy going fellow like Silverman should align himself with that particular group is beyond me.

As I told Dr. Silver many months ago I began to feel clean and self-respecting again when I broke with the Suburbanites. I began to despise the machers very early in the game. I shall be interested to see whether Silverman can go along, whether he can absorb their "philosophy", whether he can stand by complacently when these arrogant characters begin to damn the Cleveland Rabbis. Oh boy, you have to have a strong stomache to take that kind of mdicine.

Have any more of these people broken away from Suburban? I suspect that with many of them it is essentially a matter of what they believe to be "prestige". Suburban has been made to repesent an "exclusive" pattern. It represents a "snobbish" approach to the problem of synagogue affiliation. They have the guarantee that it will ever remain small and exclusive. Oh boy, how are you going to fight taht, I want to know. It gagged me and forced my first serious break with the "managers" of the show.

May I make a suggestion. This is confidential, Eatrl, for you and for Rabbi Silver. The only treatment for these chutzbadik aggressors is "quarantine". I believe that their negative approach to Judaism is dangerous and harmful in the extreme I wrote a long letter to Nelson Glueck, after I was located in Augusta in which I poitned out the terrible errors which he, the college and the Union had made in dealing with the S. situation. I suggested to him that he has made it easy for rebellious groups to set up shop. I charged that he had given his hechsher to the Sub.group. He sent his assistant a fellow named Katz to Cleveland to confirm the first class. He sent a flowery congratulatory wire to Silverman. He exchange messages with that unspeakable Dietz which messages were used, cleverly and effectively, to prove to Cleveland Jewry that Suburban was O.K. in every way. I discovered in Bretton Woods that Katz returned to the College with high praises for the S. group and with words of disparagement for Goldburg. Yes, these fellows took care of me, while they were building up the malconents. At the same, time, I made it clear to Glueck that he had lost face and that the college had lost face with the people who really count. He put a light estimate on the loyalty and good-will of the Cleveland Rabbis. He was willing to take at face value and without investigation the pretty declarations of men like Dietz, Stone, Fallon, Burroughs the book man etc. etc.

The last thing he should have done was the very first thing he did.....

I go back to the idea of quarantine for groups that get started as S. did. Frankly, I do not see how a Rabbi could live happily in a community like Cleveland unless he had, if not the friendship, at least the good-will and respect of the Cleveland Rabbis. I should think he'd feel like an outcast. In fact I think he should be made to feel like an outcast. I maintained while I was in Cleveland and I shall always maintain it that Dr. S ilver was the only Rabbi with guts enuf to handle these little Jew-haters. He had their number from the start and would not compromise with them. If the college and the Unon had gone along with him I&d have been saved from a mortifying situation. The group would never had gotten started.

Really, Earl, it is almost as hard to forgive the collge and Union as it is to forgive myself. Well, this more normal set-up has done me a world of good. I feel like a new man, certainly like a new Rabbi. These people have been wonderful to us and would like to have us remain here indefinitely. However, that is something else again. I mean to say I am not a Southerner and sometimes I think I shall never adjust to this so different routine.
