Silver Doubtful on German Arms

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver sees the year just past as "a relatively good year for the world, almost a whole year of peace."

But he told the congregation at the Temple, where his review of 1954 formed the sermon at the morning service yesterday, that he has grave doubts concerning the rearmament of Germany.

"France has most reluctantly agreed to rearming Germany and its inclusion in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization," he said. "Thus Germany will be rearmed as a bulwark against Russia, and with the approval

of the nation which has most to fear from her."

"Leaders of the world hope Germany will not go militarily aggressive, will not exceed the limitations of personnel and armament imposed. The world's past experience with Germany is thus ignored, the lessons of the past two wars are discounted in the hope that the Nazis or their successors will not come into power again and that the German general staff will not take over."

Praises Potsdam Agreement

"Politicians and statesmen say that when Germany grows strong again it will remain a docile member of the community. I hope these statesmen are right, but I have my serious doubts. Only the future will tell."

"Only a democratic, disarmed, neutralized and united Germany as envisaged in the Potsdam agreement, will keep peace, but

we have a rearmed, militarized divided Germany. I fear that is on the rock of a divided Germany that all of our plans are likely to founder."

In speaking of what went before the decision to rearm Germany, Rabbi Silver pointed out that fear of Russia and Soviet communism had been exploited by Hitler and Mussolini both in their domestic drive for power and in their Spanish adventure.

"The Spanish republic was destroyed with the connivance of Great Britain and the other western powers," he said. "This was the prelude to the Second World War."

Lands Book on Spain

Rabbi Silver then read from Claude G. Bowers' book, "My Mission to Spain," which the rabbi called an "amazing book, a startling review of facts that should be known to all people." Bowers was ambassador to Spain during the civil war that ended with Franco as Spain's dictator.

The book, the rabbi said, showed the attack on republican Spain to be part of a plan for the destruction of democracy in Europe and preparation for war.

Under the guise of fighting communism, Germany and Italy were really testing the will of the democracies to resist and the strength of their faith in their own ideals, the rabbi said.

"I'm afraid the same technique is being used to rebuild German military might," he said.

Name McCarthy Threat

Among domestic events of importance the rabbi listed the McCarthy hearings, the McCarthy-Army controversy and the censure of McCarthy.

"The McCarthy hearings showed us how demagogues and would-be dictators operate," he said. "The threat of McCarthyism is always present. American citizens must be on the alert to guard themselves against such dangers."

The latter half of 1954 saw a lessening of attacks on our liberties when Americans fought back, in church, school and press."

Turns to Church Events

He called the Supreme Court decision for integration of races in schools "one of the most gratifying events of the year and a milestone of our progress to-

ward our ideals."

Toward the end of his sermon the rabbi turned to events of the year that had especial interest for his congregation. He pointed out that 1954 was the 300th anniversary of the settlement of the first Jews in North America, that the year marked the rise of Israel's population

to two million and increases in that country's income.

He regretted that the foreign policy of the United States toward Israel had been misunderstood by Arab states, especially when arms were shipped to Iraq without any being shipped to Israel to balance them.

Man of the Week

Mr. Zionist

NO MAN better qualifies for the title of "Mr. American Zionist" than the eloquent, able 62-year-old Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, spiritual leader of the famed Temple of Cleveland, Ohio, but to non-Ohioans it must come as a surprise that he is equally well known as a civic leader, a force for social reform and a progressive Republican.

This column can hardly more than hint at his long list of achievements in the cause of good government. A friend of the late Senator Taft and of President Eisenhower, he was

respected by President Roosevelt and President Truman for his services to the nation in behalf of wider human welfare legislation for citizens of all faiths and races.

In the depression years and before, he was a pioneer in furthering efforts of local, State and national government to assist the unemployed and to obtain social benefits for the disabled. In this field he has held many important appointive posts.

He has written several books in which the application of Jewish history and ethics to the modern scene, is stressed.

Dr. Silver began his Zionist activities as a boy, on New York's East Side, when he was president of the Herzl Zion Club, formed in 1904, the year of Herzl's death. Another member was the noted world Zionist leader Emanuel Neumann.

At Cincinnati's Hebrew Union College, he and several other Herzl Clubbers were a stronghold of Zionism in a decidedly anti-Zionist environment, at a time when Reform Judaism was seeking to shun what it regarded as the "alien" spirit of pro-Palestine activity.

Silver, according to Dr. Neumann, looked like anything but a stereotype version of "Zionist"; he lost his East Side accent, he dressed with unusual care and elegance. In fact, he looked like a popular version of an "assimilationist".

Which shows how deceptive appearances can be. He was an ardent Zionist then, as always, sharing the platform with Louis D. Brandeis, his youthful idol. While still in his 20's he addressed a huge rally in Royal Albert Hall in London at the first International Zionist Conference. Other speakers were Lord Balfour, Chaim Weizmann, Max Nordau and Lord Cecil.

In 1933 he headed the United Palestine Appeal and the United Jewish Appeal and in the same year attended the Zionist Congress in Geneva. In 1943, he was persuaded to assume leadership of the Zionist Emergency Council, the new instrument for active political Zionism that helped to achieve the rebirth of Israel.

Always a "controversial" figure even in the ranks of Zionism, he was ever the center of powerful partisanship; people felt strongly about his role in the movement; his opponents were not few. He was president of the Zionist Organization of America when policy debates waxed hot and heavy.

Dr. Silver has strong support from many Zionists inside and outside the country who hope for his return to top leadership in the ranks of American Zionism. He is a man of great learning and power and of a remarkably independent mind.

He has seldom accepted conventional opinions on world or Jewish affairs, and he has been the target of the unthinking on many occasions. He is one of the few American voices, Jewish or non-Jewish, who have recently denounced the rearmament of Germany.

It is difficult to appraise Dr. Silver's contributions both to America and to Israel, especially as they are still being made. Many observers of the American scene predict that his greatest achievements are still in the future.

'Life With Dignity' Campaign Theme

\$1,350,000 Drive Kicked Off by CJA

Life with meaning, hope and dignity for Jewish people everywhere in the world was the theme at the kickoff of Greater Miami's 1955 Combined Jewish Appeal campaign Thursday night.

Some 2,000 CJA volunteer workers and community notables attended the fund drive opening in the Miami Beach Auditorium.

They heard Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, Cleveland rabbi known as the "spokesman of American Jewry," call for them to come to the "altar of re-dedication" and open their hearts to needy Jews at home and in the new state of Israel.

He was the featured speaker at the meeting, which signalled the start of one of South Florida's largest fund-raising drives.

The 1955 Greater Miami CJA goal is \$1,350,000. That represents a little over 1 per cent of the national goal of \$119,521,275.

About half of the money raised locally will be used for welfare work among six Greater Miami Jewish agencies, and some 45

other agencies in this country. The rest will go to the United Jewish Appeal for relief and rehabilitation work in Israel, Europe and the Middle East.

Sam J. Helman, CJA campaign chairman, told the audience he and his all-American team of volunteers will reach the \$1,350,000 goal within 90 days.

A concentrated house-to-house drive, which will end in March, will include every member of the Jewish communities in Greater Miami, Helman said.

The dynamic, thundering Rabbi Silver called on the audience, "to clasp the hands of the Jewish people in Israel."

He likened the situation in Israel today to that in America 200 years ago.

"Your help in upbuilding the state of Israel in this critical hour will represent a crowning achievement of the American Jewish community," he said.

The volunteer workers also heard from Bruce William McDowell, former director of the United States operations missions in Israel.

McDowell said Israel is "far more than a haven for refugees. It is an important link in the democratic nations being formed in an area where democracy means so much to the rest of the world."

"If you justify their faith in you, they will more than justify your faith in them," McDowell said.

He directed the use of more than \$100,000,000 which the United States made available for technical and agricultural development in Israel, and he told the audience that Israel's agricultural progress is very sound economically.

Stanley C. Myers, president of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation, told the audience "our forged unity will lead us to unprecedented achievement in this 1955 campaign."

Myers introduced Mayor Harold Shapiro of Miami Beach and Mayor Abe Aronovitz of Miami. Both offered their support in the CJA fund-raising drive.

DR. SILVER FORESEES EXPANSION OF JEWISH LIFE IN UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, Feb. 22. (JTA) -- An optimistic view of the future of American Jewry was expressed here last night by Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, noted Zionist leader, addressing 2,000 persons at a meeting at Hunter College arranged by the American Zionist Council on the occasion of the American Jewish Tercentenary celebration.

"Given peace and economic stability," Dr. Silver said, "the American Jewish community will move forward and develop. It will expand its cultural and religious life and institutions and will make worthy contributions to the total life of America and world Jewry."

"The American Jewish community of tomorrow will, in the main, be what American Jews will make it. External pressure may from time to time be massive, but the internal motivations will be decisive. It should be remembered that always it was not external compulsion or any historic dialectics which kept the Jewish people alive, but fierce, stiff-necked voluntarism."

"Given devoted and well-informed leadership and adequate religious training of our youth, we may look to the future of the American Jewish community, barring disastrous revolutionary changes in the structure of American government and society, with a good measure of confident hope," Dr. Silver stated.

The Zionist leader emphasized that "the guiding principle should be maximal participation in American life and maximal devotion to its progress and security, along with maximal interest in and support of Israel." He lauded American Jewry's contributions to the creation of the Jewish State. "The great political victories which culminated in the decision of the United Nations, and in the recognition of the State of Israel by the American Government, were due in a very large measure to the activities of the American Jewish community," he stressed.

American Zionists, Dr. Silver declared, should "most decidedly oppose" positions taken by the U.S. Government which "appear to us to be unsound, unjust or ill-advised." At the same time he cautioned against interpreting "all actions of which we do not approve as stemming from ill-will or malice."

Asserting that "we should not accept or concur in any foreign policy of our Government, whether in relation to Israel or for that matter to any other country, which does not appear to us to be just and good for the American people," Dr. Silver added: "But when we criticize our government for wrong policies toward Israel, we should never lose sight of the basically friendly and cooperative attitude which has persisted through many decades."

PROGRAM SET FOR JUDAISM DAY

RELIGIOUS FESTIVAL SERIES

Rabbi Silver Is Featured Speaker At Tues. Tercentenary Celebration

More than 3,000 military personnel and civilian guests from several New Jersey and Pennsylvania communities are expected to participate in the "Judaism Day" observance here March 1 at the Sports Arena, Chaplain (Maj.) Herman Dicker announced. The program will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, renowned authorstatesman and rabbi of the Temple in Cleveland, Ohio, largest liberal Jewish congregation in the U.S., will be featured speaker. An foremost American spokesman of Zionism, Dr. Silver led the United Nations effort for the State of Israel, made a prayer at President Eisenhower's inauguration, and was selected by Life magazine as one of the nation's leading ministers.

Judaism Day is one of three "days" honored annually by the major faiths in post. A Catholic ceremony was held last December and the Protestants will meet this fall. The Jewish celebration is not a calendar holiday, Chaplain Dicker, post Jewish chaplain, said.

"We will review the history, traditions and meaning of our faith and how they apply during these troubled times." Also, the observance has added significance this year, since it falls during the tercentenary anniversary of the first settlement of Jews in this country.

Col. Harry D. Henschel, chairman of the Armed Services division of the National Jewish Welfare Board, will deliver a special message from the national office. The NJWB has provided religious and social functions for the troops in the past.

The Sports Arena will be used for the ceremony with a giant 80 by 30-foot backdrop built for the occasion. It will dramatize the religious theme, having a 22-foot Star of David on one corner and a sixfoot menorah painting in the center.

The invocation will be read by Chaplain (Col.) Leo Bernthalman, post chaplain. "Adonai" will be read by Chaplain (Maj.) Max Diana, while Chaplain (Lt.-Col.) Edward J. Burns will read the closing benediction.

Cantor will be the Reverend Marshall Glantz of Temple Emanu-El, Trenton, other cantors represented by delegations will be Atlantic City, Tacon River, Camden, Newark, and Philadelphia.

Men of all faiths assisted in the Judaism Day preparations. Special music was orchestrated by CWO R. H. Duran, bandmaster of the 173rd Army Band. Pvt. Eugene Greenberg will present Jewish tradition in words and music with a cantata he wrote for the Jewish chapel choir.

Judaism Day and the Catholic and Protestant observances planned for the year are part of a program of religious emphasis initiated by Maj. Gen. C. E. Ryan, commanding general. With the general's guidance and the cooperation of big staff and regimental commanders, the religious work of the chaplains has taken on more significance at Fort Dix.

FORT DIX, N. J., March 1. (JTA) -- More than 3,000 Jewish soldiers and civilian guests attended "Judaism Day" exercises here today in the largest program of its type ever presented on an Army installation in the United States. The "day," one of three—the other two were assigned to the Catholics and the Protestants—featured religious observances and a review of the history, traditions and meaning of the Jewish faith.

The featured speaker at the exercises was Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver. Major Herman Dicker, senior Jewish Chaplain at the post, spoke on the religious significance of Judaism, and Col. Harry D. Henschel, chairman of the Armed Services Division of the National Jewish Welfare Board, delivered a message from the NJWB. The affair was sponsored by the Jewish chaplains at Fort Dix and the NJWB.

3,000 Attend First Dix Judaism Day Celebration

A near capacity crowd of 3,000 soldiers and civilian guests heard the famed Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver at Fort Dix' first annual Judaism Day celebration.

"... Our (United States) strength is in our religious faith and our religious loyalties," the spiritual leader of The Temple in Cleveland, Ohio, told the audience gathered to pay homage to the Jewish faith. "The religious traditions of both Jew and Christian trace back to the Bible," Rabbi Silver declared, adding, "It is the Bible which inspired the founding fathers of this republic. As long as we remain true to our great religious loyalties, our country is secure."

The Jewish author-statesman had noted earlier, "The deadliest foe of Democracy is not Sovietism but poverty. There need be no poverty in our land. With intelligent management, we can produce abundance for all, without expropriating the possessions of any."

The observance was one of three to be honored annually by the major faiths here. It was planned under a program of religious emphasis instituted at Fort Dix last year. The National Jewish Welfare

Board co-sponsored the celebration jointly with the post chaplain here.

Brig. Gen. John W. Harmony, commanding general, extended an official welcome to Rabbi Silver and the audience in one of his first public appearances after taking command. Greetings from the national office were given by Col. Harry D. Henshel, chairman of the JWB armed services committee in New York City. Music was provided by the 173rd Army Band, under the baton of CWO R. H. Duran.

Although the observance fell during the Tercentenary Year (the 300th anniversary of the first settlement of Jewish people in the United States) and National Brotherhood Week, the "Day" did not commemorate a special Jewish calendar or national holiday.

Program coordinator Maj. Herman Dicker, senior Jewish chaplain, pointed out that the meeting was designed to illustrate graphically the importance and scope of religion in daily living and to rejuvenate spiritually the Jewish servicemen and women stationed here. (Signal Photos).

Nach der aufsehenerregenden Veröffentlichung der Yalta Vereinbarungen und nachdem die Grossen und Mächtigen unserer Zeit ihre Meinung darüber geäussert haben, ist es natürlich, dass für eine Welle aus verschiedenen Gruppen und Schichten der Bevölkerung ein Echo zu hören sein wird. Wir vernehmen im Cleveland Plain Dealer vom 28. März in einem Bericht durch Marc D. Gleisser, dass kürzlich solch ein Echo in dem Tempel des gelehrten Rabbiners Silver in Cleveland schallte. Practicing out of Hudson, Ohio, beginning in 1801 he was the nearest physician to the Village of Cleveland, some 25 miles away. His practice covered a radius of 50 miles.

The following quotation was made: "Whenever investigation is made of the maladies which yield to faith cures, it is found that in almost every instance they are not organic but functional . . . Jewish Life Mar. 1955 *What To Do*

The fears of the Jewish people and of the peoples of the world have a real basis. It is therefore time that the Jewish people and their organizations heed the call of Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, who is crying for peace like a prophet in the wilderness. In his year-end sermon in The Temple in Cleveland, Rabbi Silver once again affirmed that "Only a democratic, disarmed, neutralized and united Germany, as envisaged in the Potsdam agreement, will keep peace." Since the leadership of Jewish organized life has largely suppressed discussion of this vital issue, it is high time that the members of Jewish organizations have a say in the deciding policy on this all-important issue. The masses of Jews must have the opportunity to discuss the crucial question of West German rearmament and participate in decisions regarding it. The demand for discussion of the issue needs to be made throughout Jewish organized life.

The Jewish masses have the right to make their voice heard on this issue when the Senate considers ratification of the Paris agreements. To this end, both individuals and organizations can demand that the Senate Foreign Relations Committee hold open hearings on the Paris agreements and that as many representatives of the people as possible be permitted to present their viewpoint at the hearings. The interests of the Jewish people as well as the American people as a whole dictate that the greatest number of such representatives speak for their organizations at these hearings.

Rabbi Silver Challenges Toynbee as Anti-Jewish

Arnold J. Toynbee, English historian, was accused of anti-Jewish bias and of slanting the story of history to fit his own preconceived偏見, in a sermon by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver yesterday.

The spiritual leader of the Temple, long recognized as the leader of American Zionists, charged Toynbee not only with lowering his Agent's fame about the state of Israel but challenged the Briton's competency to write world history.

He asserted Toynbee's monumental "Study of History" was permeated with the author's own political notions, including his "pet theory that nationalistic feelings are all wrong."

Yet, Rabbi Silver declared, "Toynbee seems to think nationalism is all right where England is concerned. It's just wrong with the countries he doesn't like."

The rabbi condemned Toynbee's statement that Israel's "persecution" of 700,000 Arabs (a reference to the Palestinian Arab refugees) was worse than

Nazi Germany's extermination of more than 6,000,000 Jews.

The comparison is beneath contempt, Silver asserted.

Alluding to Toynbee's assertion that Israel was created "through force of arms," Rabbi Silver charged the historian completely ignored the fact that both the United Nations and world opinion had approved the formation of the Jewish national state.

The rabbi and Toynbee neglected to point out that the Arab refugees were refugees largely by their own choice, that "hundreds of thousands of Arabs chose to remain in Israel and are now full-fledged Israeli citizens."

"The plain fact of the matter," Rabbi Silver concluded, "is that Mr. Arnold Toynbee is just absurd because the Jews have not acted the way he thinks they should have—that, despite a 11 persecution and tyranny, they have remained here."

SILVER ATTACKS ARMING OF ARABS

Rabbi Denounces Near East Policy of U. S.

United States policy in the Near East was vigorously denounced as "murdering" and "unsound" yesterday by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, spokesman for Zionism, in his sermon at the Temple.

He emphasized that he thought the American part in the Israeli area was not that of statesmanship or peace but one that sought to reward "hunger" Arabs by arming them while punishing Israel by isolating her.

Supplying arms to Arab nations to buy their allegiance against Communism can lead only to a heightening of tensions in the Near East with no assurance that the Arabs will be on our side, he said.

Would Harm Arms

The rabbi offered three points to aid in the solution of Near East problems. They were:

STOP SENDING ARMS to any country in that part of the world until peace is firmly established there.

DO NOT SUPPORT a regional defense pact that excludes Israel since such a pact is plainly hostile and would be so regarded by Israelis.

REAFFIRM the United States' resolve to stand by the tripartite agreement.

Says U. S. Blunders

Our government blundered, Dr. Silver said, when it set out to arm the Near East as a bulwark against Sovietian policies, first assuring itself that these weapons would not be used in war against Israel.

Dr. Silver prefaced his attack on government policies with the assertion that "our own country has sought to be sincerely helpful, but its approach to the problem is not always wise."

"I have never charged malice to the government," he said. "It reflects the American people, who have always been friendly to Israel. While our policy may be fluctuating, both parties have acted decisively in behalf of Israel on important issues."

He touched on the recent Turkey-Iraq pact which, he said, had been engineered by America in an attempt to break the united front of the Arab League.

Cites Egypt's Hostility

This, he remarked, had added fuel to Egyptian hostility since it drove the Egyptians to reassert leadership among Arabs with acts of aggression on Israel.

The latest border incident with Egypt, the rabbi said, was an isolated episode that was part of a larger problem which quinquennial authorities cannot solve.

"Unless the roots of the problem are looked for, the issues will remain unresolved and incidents will break out with increasing violence from time to time," he said.

A United Nations study of the evidence followed by a formal condemnation of the recent Egyptian incident will accomplish little, he said.

New Israel Isolated

Dr. Silver added that between September, 1954, and February, 1955, Egypt had been condemned 27 times for attacks, murder and plunder and that repeated warnings had had no effect on her.

It was in the courting of such Arabian countries that America set up the defense ring which excluded Israel and isolated her in the Near East, he said.

"Basically Israel is not opposed to the plan, but for the life of them its leaders cannot see why their land—the most western, democratic and friendly country toward America—should be left out," he said.

The rabbi concluded that, despite all the goodwill in America, mistakes in foreign policy have been made. But, he said, when goodwill persists, mistakes can be corrected.

Advancement Seen

Rabbi Silver rejected the popular idea that this is a materialistic age, lacking ideals and direction, he declared.

"In terms of social-welfare—and human advancement—this is a great age," he said.

He cited evidence of the "moral forward thrust of man" and of a "radical new integration of humanity and a profound change in social organization."

"Much is being done in this generation to raise the standards of the common man than was done in any five generations in the past," Rabbi Silver said. "Never have quiescent peoples risen as now to achieve freedom and independence."

Anastasian Age?

He said man still continues to overcome the tyranny of his fellow man, just as he had conquered the forces of nature.

"The remaining dictatorships cannot win," he said. "Slavery, racism, militarism and imperialism represent the last wreckage of the past."

During the next century—the "American age"—the Jewish community in this country will continue to grow and make worthy contributions, Rabbi Silver said.

However, he warned the Jews against an "unconscious drift" away from their heritage. An "evolving religion" is not suited to those days, he said.

During their first 200 years here, Jews made their most "memorable" contribution by helping to fashion the basic traditions and institutions of this country, Rabbi Silver said.

Efforts Cited

Other accomplishments of which they can be proud are their institutions of philanthropy and social service; their concern for Jews in other lands and their share in rebuilding Israel.

In his annual message, Ralph N. Koplowitz, president of the Jewish Community council, said: "One of our great objectives and needs now is to design and build a Jewish community center and adequate facilities for our community Hebrew school."

The study will be the first step in achieving this long-range goal.

3,000 View Climax of Jewish Celebration

Three thousand persons filled Public Music Hall to capacity last night in a stirring climax to Cleveland's celebration of 300 years of Jewish life in America.

Highlight of the program was the world premiere of an inspiring cantata, words for which were written by Norman Corwin, nationally known author and script writer, who flew in from Hollywood to direct final rehearsals.

Music for the cantata, called "The Golden Door: A Mosaic," was by Maurice Goldman, Cleveland composer, who conducted the 200-voice choir and an orchestra composed of members of the Cleveland Orchestra.

The tercentenary address was delivered by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver of the Temple.

A dramatic recital of the tragic history of the Jews from persecution by the Pharaohs up to today, the cantata also told of their achievements and contributions to America.

Goldman conducted the musical portions of the cantata with a sure hand, drawing from the massed choir and orchestra fine variations in tonal quality necessary for the different shades of meaning in the work.

The piece opened with a faint wash of strings that became suddenly tense as the speaking part started. An ironic treatment of a monkish chain swelled up and then diminished behind a description of the Inquisition.

In portraying the emigration of 23 Jewish refugees from Brazil to Nieuw Amsterdam, the music introduced a sweeping new spirit of heightened optimism in good response to Goldman's clear direction.

After a solo of rejection to tyrants' yokes, the chorus echoed the defiance of the singer with great effectiveness and then changed the mood to a more somber tone.

The progressive optimism of the cantata's theme was carried unusually well by both the chorus and orchestra, which also effected good change-overs to music of less genial character.

Describes Exiled Persons

The cantata told of temples crumbled to ruin and people driven into broken and scattered exile "living by the leave of whose and whomever; rooted in air, at the shallow mercy of fickle times and passing tyrants."

It traced the midnight tortures of the Inquisition and expulsion to Africa, Middle Europe, Asia Minor and to the New World.

Woven through the musical fabric were golden threads of achievement—leadership in intellectual development, civic and cultural advancement, sacrifices on battlefields to make and keep America free.

It told how, as America grew, the Jews became rooted in its vigorous soil, giving their lives to the spread of its frontiers, bending to minor tyrants, rising again with the glory of free men.

Through the Revolution, the Civil War, the two world wars they gave their blood and earned plaques and medals and praises in the archives of conflict. And they gave of themselves in peace as ambassadors, cabinet members, senators, governors to

deserve the freedom and understanding they found in America.

The cantata concluded with:

Let us forget the scattered bones
and the broken tabernacles;
Cover the sinkholes of despair!
See well to the present and the
future will sing;
Cleanse the wound, and leave it to
the scutches of time;
Let us have done with menacing—
Institute love and conscience in our
every scheme
And make of each iron gate a
golden door.

In his address Rabbi Silver recalled how the Jews came with Columbus on his first voyage of discovery and later came in increasing numbers seeking a haven.

He pointed out that the record of Jewish experience in Europe for the last 300 years was, with few outstanding exceptions, one of continuous persecution, discrimination, massacres, exiles, indignity and insecurity.

Good Fortune Unique

Turning to the three centuries of the experience of Jews in America, he said:

"In no other country on earth have our people been privileged to enjoy so long a period of uninterrupted and peaceful dwelling and labor. In no other country in the world, since the dispersion, have our people enjoyed a continuous period of 300 years of equality, freedom and dignity.

"For all this we should be grateful to a kind Providence and to the traditions of this gracious land. For all this we should be daily resolved to contribute of the best of our heart, mind and hand to the preservation of the great traditions and institutions of this country, and to the enhancement and enrichment of its cultural and spiritual life."

Dr. Silver said that Jews had served America patriotically in peace and in war, that they had made creditable contributions to its material prosperity, its political and social progress, its democratic institutions, to labor and industry, to its arts, science, literature and music.

Dr. Silver concluded that there are two ways in which we can express our gratitude for these richly blessed years of life: by words—and they are important if they are sincerely spoken and emanate from truly grateful and understanding hearts, but, more important by far, by deeds and dedication."

Cantors and cantorial singers from leading synagogues had parts in the cantata. Luther Adler had the principal speaking role in the cast of 200. The Cleveland Jewish Singing Society, augmented by professional singers, made up the chorus.

Director of the entire production was Mark Feder, head of dramatics for the Jewish Community Centers of Cleveland.

300 Years of Jews in America—IV

The Golden Age of Zionism

by Dr. Jakob Rosenthal

"The inescapable logic of events will in due time make Palestine a Jewish State . . . When all the doors of the world will be closed to our people, then the hand of destiny will force open the door of Palestine."

—Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, in an address, in 1943.

THE outbreak of World War Two in Europe in September 1939, which forecast the appalling tragedy that soon was to descend upon European Jewry, confronted American Jewry with the historic task of assuming the leadership in Jewish life which until recently had been firmly held by the thousand-year old communities on the continent—those of Warsaw and Vilna, Vienna and Prague, Frankfurt and Amsterdam.

Trapped in agony and helplessness by Hitler's ruthlessly advancing columns that subjugated one country after another within a couple of weeks or days, masses of frustrated and panic-stricken Jews, men, women and children, crowded the highways and ports, wandered as exiles and refugees over the face of the earth in a last, desperate quest for asylum and sanctuary only to find all the gates barred against them. Soon these modern odyseya were to find their final destination on the bottom of the coffinships, the "Salvador," the "Patria," the "Struma," etc., etc. Despair beyond description gripped millions of Jews. The darkness of a long, long night had fallen over the great Jewry of Europe, the pride of Judaism, the stronghold of Jewish culture and traditional learning for many centuries.

Against this somber background, the situation in Palestine was of particular heartbreaking pain. Jewish Palestine that could easily have served as a sanctuary to hundreds of thousands of Jewish men, women and children whose lives were later extinguished in the gas chambers of Auschwitz, was practically closed to Jewish immigration by the cruel laws of Malcolm MacDonald's notorious White Paper of May 1939, issued by the expedient and defeatist Chamberlain Cabinet that a year before, at Munich, had sold out to Hitler the Czechoslovakian Republic of Masaryk and Benesh, the strongest citadel of democracy and freedom in Central Europe between the two world wars.

Palestine Jewry, which had grown during the past two decades—not to a small extent by the generous flow of financial support from American Jewry—from a tiny community of 50,000 souls to a creative and vigorous, state-conscious and state-building nation of about half a million Jews, faced the new situation with great courage and re-

sourcefulness by proclaiming its determination to "fight the war against Hitler as if there were no White Paper; and to fight the British White Paper as if there were no war."

IN the Jewish panorama of those turbulent and fateful days—a panorama of agony and despair in the hell of Nazi-occupied Europe, a panorama of endurance and zeal in Palestine—American Jewry appeared as the great tower of strength, a beacon of hope and light. The largest and most powerful Jewish center in the world, that had been blessed to remain intact during the gigantic struggle, was destined by providence to act as the guardian of the Jewish people's rescue and survival.

The leaders of the Zionist Organization of America were the first to grasp the momentous situation and to realize the tremendous responsibilities which history had thrust upon their movement and the entire Jewish community in this free republic. Thus for a second time within one generation, American Zionists were called upon to assume the burden of leadership and to rally all their forces under the banner of emergency and historic opportunity.

In 1914, it was the young, inexperienced and loosely organized Federation of American Zionists that, under Louis Lipsky and Dr. Shmaryahu Levin, formed the Provisional Executive Committee for General Zionist Affairs with Louis D. Brasdeis as its chairman and distinguished leader. The Committee wrote the first great chapter into American Zionist history, for it was instrumental in winning Zionism's first international victory: the Balfour Declaration.

Twenty-five years later, in 1939, a similar committee came into being under the impact of Jewish disaster and distress; it subsequently won Zionism's greatest political triumph: Jewish statehood.

In the fateful days of 1939 it was the ZOA, by then already a leading and dynamic force on the American Jewish scene, that was entrusted with the formation of the Emergency Committee for Zionist Affairs, a wartime body of the World Zionist Organization in this country. Headed by ZOA president Dr. Solomon Goldman, with Dr. Stephen S. Wise and Louis Lipsky as vice-chairmen, it consisted of representatives of the major Zionist groups affiliated with the movement, including Mrs. Tamar de Sola Pool for Hadassah, Gefilish Boblik and Leon Gelman for Mizrachi and Dr. Hayim Greenberg for Poale Zion.

Out of this Emergency Committee, which after January 8, 1942, was called American Emergency Committee, rose (in 1943) the American Zionist Emer-

gency Council which was destined to perform a task of unmatched magnitude in Zionist history. First under the joint chairmanship of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver and Dr. Wise, and later under the leadership of Dr. Silver as chairman with Dr. Emanuel Neumann as vice-chairman, the Council revolutionized the movement, imbued its ranks with a new hitherto unknown enthusiasm and fighting elan, forged the divergent parts of American Jewry into a united front determined in the demand for a Jewish Commonwealth, and aroused and won for the Zionist cause America's public opinion, marshalling the support of the entire American nation, from the President down to the smallest wage earner of labor's trade unions. Leaders of Congress and of both political parties, governors and clergymen, college and university heads, prominent writers and movie stars—they all passed their sympathies with the Jewish cause into one gigantic collective effort that paved the way to victory. It was the bold and vigorous performance of the Council, the daring vision, the glowing ardor and the almost fanatical zeal of its leadership, that brought about the Zionist revolution of our time and its most prodigious triumph.

THE new fighting spirit in American Zionism found its first dramatic echo in two great Jewish conclaves meeting in this city amidst the turmoil of global war and under the shadow of the stark Jewish tragedy in Nazi-occupied Europe, when myriads of Israel's children were being tortured to death in Hitler's gas furnaces at Maidanek, Treblinka and Auschwitz.

The first was the Extraordinary Zionist Conference convened under the auspices of the American Emergency Committee at the Biltmore Hotel in the

heart of Manhattan on May 9-11, 1942. Here was created and formulated what was to go down in modern Zionist history as the "Biltmore Program," subsequently adopted and endorsed by the supreme organs of the Zionist Movement as the new fundamentals of the Jewish people's claims in the reconstruction program of the post-war world. From the room of this midtown hotel in New York City went out the call that Palestine be established as "a Jewish Commonwealth integrated in the structure of the new democratic world," as "the only way to right an age-old wrong." The solemn declaration, which was adopted by acclamation by the 600 delegates including Zionist leaders from 17 foreign countries, was presented by ZOA President Judge Louis Lewinthal.

The active participation of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency Executive in Jerusalem, in the conference's deliberations and decisions, lent prominence and authority to the new policy embodied in the Biltmore Program. It was the first time that Zionism had placed itself on record with a clear and firm definition of the movement's ultimate goal: the Jewish Commonwealth. Eleven years earlier, at the 17th Zionist Congress at Basle in 1931, Dr. Weizmann had lost his leadership of the movement to Nahum Sokolow on account of the so-called "*Endsiedlungsfrage*" which dominated that Congress.

The closing session turned into a moving affair when Dr. Stephen S. Wise, the chairman, presented Dr. Weizmann with the ring worn till his death by the immortal founder of the Zionist movement, Dr. Theodor Herzl. The ZOA leader had been in possession of the ring, which was given to him by friends, for several years.

A leading Jewish rabbi expressed the belief here last night that "our age will find the formula of toleration which will enable the many evolving and fluid forms of capitalism and socialism to work out their destinies in the one world in which we live."

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland, Ohio, declared:

"America will lead in finding the way. The way is not that of a global communist race which will imperil the peoples of the earth, savages included, and end us all in the abyss and in the catastrophe of war.

"The way is rather that of confidence, of courageous diplomacy, of giving urgent leadership to the United Nations in a program of speedy and balanced reduction of armament and help to the backward peoples of the earth."

Dr. Silver spoke at the Charter-night observance of the American-Zionist Tercentenary, which marks the 300th anniversary of Jewish settlement in the U.S. The celebration was held at the Jewish Community Center.

He described the coming age as "great" for America and for American Jewry. "If the catastrophes of war does not snuff it out," he said.

"It is a minority (the Jewish people)—we are helpless against the forces of hate and demagogery which war and economic depression unleash."

But given peace and economic stability, the American Jewish community will move toward and develop. It will expand its cultural and religious life and institutions, and will make worthy contributions to the total life of America."

He warned that the only danger to our Jewish future here is not racialism, xenophobia or deliberate anti-Semitic tendencies, such as characterized Jewish communities elsewhere and at other times.

Farther the danger lies in an unconscious drift and a carefree relaxation of all discipline," he asserted, "out of conviction and out of sheer indifference....

In discussing the current age, Dr. Silver said the trends were in the right direction.

"It is moving perceptually in the right direction. He declared, "in the abolition of war, the reduction of poverty, and the alleviation of racial inequality. These are the three major trends of our century."

Dr. Silver was introduced by Rabbi Abraham Feinstein. Also appearing on the program were Alex Alper, chairman of the Tercentenary; chairman of the Tercentenary committee, Cantor Reuben Frischer; Louis H. Marks and Rabbi Aaron Walden.


Jewish Drive Nets 4 Million

HAS been active in the General Conference of American Rabbis, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Hebrew Union College.

HAS held high positions in the United Jewish Appeal and the United Palestine Appeal.

HAS played an important role in the American Zionist movement, holding a number of important offices, including that of the presidency. Was active in the Zionist Action Committee, the Council of the Jewish Agency, and the American Emergency Committee for Zionist Affairs.

DURING the critical period before and after the establishment of the State of Israel, Silver did an outstanding job in persuading the United States and the world powers to recognize the new state.

IS KNOWN as an outstanding orator and preacher and is the author of *Religion in a Changing World*, *World Crisis and Jewish Survival* and other works of note.

Leisure Is Activity, Speaker Here Notes

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, featured speaker at the 25th birthday dinner of Oglebay Institute last night, described the role of leisure in modern-day living, and the vital part the Institute has played in providing the many and varied recreational, educational and cultural activities which are a part of leisure.

Speaking to more than 300 persons, Rabbi Silver said, "Leisure is a part of the real business of life and man must find his opportunity for real creative living in his leisure time—not in the tag end of his life when he is exhausted and spent, but periodically throughout his lifetime. A man incapacitated for work is incapacitated for leisure," he explained.

Leisure, according to Rabbi Silver, is not the opposite of activity, but rather it is a kind of activity. He credited the machine age with being responsible for two of the nation's major problems: increased leisure for which "Americans are not fully prepared," and secondly, the problems of sterilization of life.

"The machine is shortening a shorter day and a shorter week even now," he observed, "and life is in danger of becoming stereotyped," he warned. "Leisure, then, man must use in the development of his own life and man must say to the machine, 'thus far shalt thou come and no further.'

Rabbi Silver's return to Wheeling is significant in that he addressed the first public gathering following the institute's incorporation in 1939.

At the close of last night's session, Rabbi Silver was presented with a pair of monogrammed silver cuff links and the bar, made by Phil Maxwell of the Oglebay Institute craft department.

Henry S. Schroeder presided over the dinner. The Rev. Charles J. Teuer, pastor of St. James' Evangelical Lutheran Church, delivered the invocation, while the benediction was given by the Rev. Lawrence R. McHugh, president of Wheeling College.

Mayor Alfonso J. Cimino will extend the greetings of the city of Cleveland and will present the former president the key to the city. Gov. Frank J. Lausche will deliver an address of welcome to Ohio.

"We shall continue to urge our government to make the most determined efforts to bring about negotiations between Israel and the Arab states," the ZOA president said. He reported that the ZOA now has a membership total which exceeds last year's figures and represents a reversal of the trend of yearly decline which had been in effect since the establishment of the state."


The ZOA president made a detailed review of the organization in all phases of Zionist endeavor with special emphasis on public relations "recognizing this as the most vital area of the American Zionist activity." He said that "the steady deterioration of Israel's position on the international scene has made this phase of our work an imperative necessity."

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, addressing the session, said that normalization of East-West relationships could improve the international position of Israel. "If the approaching conference of the Big Powers in Geneva will succeed in reducing tensions and the dangers of an all-out war between the free world and the Communist world, the need for wooing the Arab states to line up on one side or the other will be greatly diminished," he stated.

Dr. Silver said that a pact linking the United States with Israel should be "viewed on its own merits, as an instrumentality for strengthening American interests and the interests of the free world generally, in that strategically vital part of the world, and for restoring the military balance which recent Western policy in that region has tilted in favor of the Arabs."



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



The Unjustified Attacks on Zionism

Israel's rebirth as a nation was accompanied by a gradually-developing series of attacks on the Zionist movement, whose heroic leaders and whose strong principles were responsible for the development and the rise of the Jewish state.

It is natural for realities to overshadow visions and dreams. With the creation of the State of Israel, the vision inherent in Zion faded. Certainly a vision turned into reality can no longer be termed a dream, and dreamers thereupon automatically become realists, pragmatists, partners in a great redemption effort.

No one can possibly be above or beyond criticism, especially when he labors for a cause. It is only the inactive person who can never be subjected to criticism. Nevertheless, the attacks on Zionism and the Zionists have come not only from former anti-Zionists and from non-Zionists but also from Zionists; and this is inexcusable.

Thus, at the Bnai Brith Institute at Starlight, Pa., a former propagandist for the Zionist cause, Dr. Trude Weiss-Rosmarin, saw fit to explode a bomb by asserting that the Zionist movement was bankrupt. She referred to the movement as it is constituted at present as "largely a holdover of both men and ideas from an age when scientific

Zionist achievements were made." She was fair enough to add that they were "achievements which culminated in the formation of the State of Israel." But the attack itself—the charge of bankruptcy—is too damaging to be condoned.

At this point in Jewish life, if there is a "lack of imagination" in Jewish communal planning, especially in the fields of education, culture and information, then the fault must be placed at the door posts of all Jews, regardless of their party affiliations. Zionists are not alone in such unimaginativeness and in a concentration of internal politics. The latter is a universal fault, and to pin it on Zionists may be mere headline-seeking. Dr. Weiss-Rosmarin certainly has succeeded in securing notoriety for her charges, and we should be called to task for sensationalism. This is not the way to find a solution to an admittedly-serious problem which affects American and British Jewries, and perhaps also all other Jewries outside of Israel.

The scholarly London magazine, The Gates of Zion, recently published this editorial on "Zionism and Our Survival":

Twelve years ago, after an heroic struggle, the Warsaw Ghetto was wiped out, which marked the peak of the extermination of Eastern and Central European Jewry. The German murderers have been reprieved and Germany

is being wooed both by the East and the West. But our wound has not yet healed and even the existence of the Jewish people itself is still in danger. It is the duty of the Zionist movement to lead the Jewish people in the struggle against assimilation which is now stronger than ever before in our history, as the bulk of the Jewish people live in Anglo-Saxon and Latin-American countries where assimilationist tendencies have strong traditions. In the Iron Curtain countries the totalitarian regimes ruthlessly try to uproot the very existence of our people. Our spiritual future must be safeguarded, this is the task of the Zionist movement.

This is a point well taken. It is our conviction that the movement that was primarily responsible for the awakening of the Jewish masses to the need for national rebirth remains well qualified to continue the battle for the safeguarding of our spiritual future. As in the past, Zionists must work in this field with the synagogues and with other elements in Jewish life, but they must again assume a leading role in the serious effort to regain our spiritual stature and dignity.

In his address at the recent convention of the Zionist Organization of America, Dr. Abba Hillel Silver spoke of the continuing Jewish interests in Israel. He described Israel's recent triumphs and the need for matching the Israelis' perseverance, and stated:

"The men and women in Israel today go about their work with such a resoluteness and such an intrepid and joyous confidence as to make one feel that they are guided with strength and are building for permanence."

"I hope that we can match their perseverance and their courage. So far we have; and this gives me an additional ground for confidence in the future progress and stability of the State of Israel."

"One is pleased to note that Jews of America are visiting Israel in increasing numbers each year. Many go as tourists; but return as pilgrims. They come back with a new insight, a new pride, and a new consecration. What our arguments here at home and our persuasion failed to accomplish, the unfolding heroic pageant of reborn Israel which they see with their own eyes—its drama, its dynamism, its

The author's face was an unmaskable mask last weekend. Barely do we blabber on stages, but when we do, it's a workmanlike job. So we are all apologetic for confusing October 16 with 17 for the appearance of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver at the annual American Zionist Fund dinner. He spoke last Sunday evening and as far as we know, will not be giving a repeat performance this Sunday.

It was interesting to hear Dr. Silver's observations to the press once again, for whatever his opinions may be, he is reflecting on. As was expected he drew a grim picture of Middle East tensions and cautioned that the continued bumbling by the Western powers could understandably precipitate another Arab-Israeli war. For the faithful Republicans that Dr. Silver was more than mildly critical of the present Administration in that Middle East policy was largely responsible, in his judgment, for the Soviet penetration into that part of the world. The U. S., he contended, could on several occasions have pressed for a peaceful settlement of border differences, refugee resettlement and other problems, but instead the boat-and-not-woodedly, the Rabbi added with ominous intonation.

But now that Communism has thrust its leprosy bated into the Middle East, there are obligations which this nation must immediately discharge, Dr. Silver said. We in the U. S. must (1) see that Israel gets adequate arms at all costs now that Egypt is being absolutely supplied; (2) our Government must keep the American people as fully informed as possible as to what is going on over there; (3) the people must make sure that the key figures in our Government know who is playing which role in the Arab-Israeli conflict. In other words, who is trying to preserve democracy over there and who is attempting to destroy it by dealing with the enemy?

On one major point this paragrapher refuses to buy Dr. Silver's merchandise. When he contends that the one sure way of bringing the Arabs to terms is for the U. S. to conclude a mutual security pact with Israel, Dr. Silver is inviting further complications. We are already encircled by enemies of them. The U. S. is already playing the role of big brother to a substantial slice of the map. We cannot and should not police the globe. It is one thing to help a struggling ally with funds and materials of peace or war; it is quite another to put the blood of our youth at that ally's disposal.

Dr. Silver presented the case for Israel candidly and realistically. While he made there wasn't a sound in the packed banquet hall other than the audience's breathing.



Eisenhower Again Offers Pact on Near East Borders

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Nov. 15.—President Eisenhower today reaffirmed his Administration's willingness to enter into formal treaties with Israel and her neighbors to guarantee peace in the Near East. In a letter to ~~Rabbi~~ ^{Abba} Hillel Silver, which Rabbi Silver read tonight at a mass meeting at Madison Square Garden in New York, General Eisenhower said he believed that true and lasting security in the area must be based upon a just and reasonable settlement.

"It seems to me," the President wrote, "that current problems are capable of resolution by peaceful means. There is no reason why a settlement of these problems cannot be found, and when realized I would be prepared to recommend that the United States join in formal treaty engagements to prevent or thwart any effort by either side to alter by force the boundaries which Israel and its immediate neighbors agree."

The United Press reported tonight in Washington had said the President's statement did not alter the United States position that Egypt and Israel should settle their border and refugee disputes in advance of any such treaty.

Mr. Israel, Premier Ben-Gurion rejected a British offer to mediate border disputes with the Arabs.

Need Held Imperative

The President repeated a statement he made several days ago in Denver, emphasizing that while the United States was willing to consider requests for arms for legitimate self-defense, it would not contribute to an arms competition in the Near East.

The United States will play its full part in working toward such a settlement and will support firmly the United Nations in its efforts to prevent violence in the area. RALLY DENOUNCES RED MIDEAST AIM

Zionist-Sponsored Gathering Urges U. S. to Back Israel by a Security Pact

Sharp denunciations of Communist designs in the Middle East were raged last night at a rally in Madison Square Garden.

Mayor Wagner led speakers at the rally in urging mutual defense pacts. He said the State Department "must move fast, decisively and effectively to assist, protect and encourage re-unification in the Middle East."

Dr. Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, which carries on programs of settlement and rehabilitation in Israel, called along with Mayor Wagner a re-orientation of the 1950 declaration to safeguard Israel's borders.

Dr. Goldmann told the audience that "for years the friends of Israel throughout the world have cautioned the Western powers that a policy of aggression and of sending Arab intruders may lead to a major catastrophe for the Western powers." He charged that "there is in formation in Cairo today" an "antagonistic Egyptian military" group joined by former Nazi military experts "who will not permit to leave a vest [of] technical" in Egypt.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland, a Zionist leader, declared Israel "will not sacrifice any of its already sharply reduced territory of 8,200 square miles in order to augment the 2,100,000 square miles of its Arab neighbors."

Israel Rally Calls for U.S. Security Pact

A mutual security pact between the U.S. and Israel was urged last night at a rally attended by 20,000 in Madison Square Garden.

Speakers called for a pact to counter the flow of Communist arms to the Arab states.

The rally was held under the joint auspices of several major American Jewish organizations and the American Zionist Council.

A message from President Eisenhower indicated he favored less hasty action by the U.S. and awaited a formal Israel-Arab settlement before guaranteeing the borders.

Mayor Wagner led speakers in calling for a mutual security pact. President Truman wrote expressing anxiety over the delivery of Red arms to Egypt.

"The immediate objective of our government," he said, "should be the immediate conversion of the tripartite declaration of 1950 into a more clearly defined security guarantee for all the peoples of the Middle East."

The declaration of 1950 was by the U.S., England and France giving moral support to the temporary Israeli belligerent stand in the Arab-Israeli armistice pending a formal peace settlement.

The Mayor said that if the Communists do not cease sending arms to Egypt "we should be prepared to supply to Israel the necessary arms and you, the know-how to help to protect them from aggression."

The President's statement repeated one made several days ago in which he said the U.S. was willing to consider requests for arms for legitimate self-defense but would not contribute to arms competition in the Near East.

"We believe the true and lasting security in this area must be based upon a just and reasonable settlement," the message said. "It seems to me that current problems are capable of resolution by peaceful means."

The President's message was received with only mild applause. After reading the message, Dr. Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland honorary president of the American Zionist Council said:

Mid-East Settlement Is Vital, Ike Tells Zionist Rally Here

President Eisenhower, in a message to a Zionist rally that packed Madison Square Garden, declared Tuesday night that a peaceful Arab-Israeli settlement "becomes daily more imperative" before the U.S. will guarantee Middle East borders that have not yet been clearly fixed.

IN ANOTHER MESSAGE, ex-President Truman described as "very dangerous" the sale of Communist arms to Egypt, and called for an immediate U. S. guarantee of security to all Middle East nations.

As speakers took their turns on the Garden platform to support a rally resolution calling for U. S. guarantees against aggression for Israel and "any other States of the Middle East which desire the preservation of peace," an overflow crowd of 300 stood in the rain outside, listening over a loud-speaker system.

Eisenhower reiterated his previous cautious statement that "while we continue willing to consider requests for arms needed for legitimate self-defense, we do not intend to contribute to an arms competition in the Near East." He said he would "continue to be guided by the Tripartite Declaration of May, 1950," made by the U.S., Britain and France, giving moral support to boundaries fixed by the Arab-Israel armistice.

IT WAS THIS declaration, said Truman, that should be "immediately converted into a more clearly-defined security guarantee for all the peoples of the Middle East."

Earlier in the day, British Prime Minister Eden also called on Israel and the Arabs to settle their border differences.

But his assertion in Commons that this required "some compromise between their two positions" brought from Israeli Premier Ben-Gurion his strongest attack in the Knesset (Parlia-

ment) against British Middle East policy.

ISRAEL "WILL NOT conduct any negotiations" on the basis of giving up territory, he said, as this would be "rewarding the aggressors."

While the United States is "willing to consider requests for arms needed for legitimate self-defense, we do not intend to contribute to an arms competition in the Near East." President Eisenhower declared last night in a message to a rally that jammed Madison Square Garden.

Mr. Eisenhower reiterated his recent opinion that the dispute between Israel and the Arab nations can be solved peacefully and suggested that the immediate aim should be agreements upon which permanent treaties could be based.

Finds Something Lacking

Announcement that a message from the President was to be read drew an ovation from the crowd, but after it was read by Dr. Hillel Silver, honorary chairman of the American Zionist Council, there was only mild applause, and Dr. Silver remarked: "This isn't everything that I should have liked him to include in his statement."

Another speaker, Joseph Breslaw, chairman of the American Trade Union Council, who spoke in Yiddish, said, "I appreciate President Eisenhower's telegram, but 100 jet planes would accomplish more."

Message From Truman

From former President Harry Truman came a message urging that "The immediate objective of our government should be the immediate conversion of the Tripartite Declaration of 1950 into a more clearly defined security guarantee for all the peoples of the Middle East."

Mr. Truman declared that "it is our country's solemn responsibility to pursue a policy against aggression in any form and to take a stand through the United Nations and back it up so that there will be no aggression in the Middle East or anywhere else in the world."

Rally Asks Security Facts

An estimated 17,000 persons jammed the Garden for the rally, which was organized by the American Zionist Council with the co-sponsorship of a number of Jewish organizations. Outside, several hundred people heard the speeches and the reading of messages through loudspeakers. Similar rallies were held in twenty-six cities of the nation.

A resolution adopted at the

rally called for the United States "to negotiate without delay security treaties with the State of Israel and any other states of the Middle East which desire the preservation of peace . . . to make available to the State of Israel military means for its legitimate self-defense . . . to act today, firmly and decisively, before it is too late."

The principal speaker, Dr. Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the Jewish Agency, demanded immediate action by the United States.

United States Policy Criticized

He declared: "If this government would announce its clear intention to implement the moral obligation it has assumed under the Three Power Declaration of 1950 to preserve the balance of military strength between Israel and the Arab states; if this government, furthermore, would announce its intention to offer Israel a security treaty, simultaneously extending similar offers to any Arab state that wishes to avail itself of this offer, the situation would change, radically and favorably, overnight."

Dr. Goldmann continued: "What we complain of and criticize in United States policy today is not its lack of good intentions, its lack of friendship toward Israel, but rather its lack of firmness, consistency and decision."

NEW YORK (UP) — President Eisenhower said last night that the need for a peaceful Israeli-Arab settlement "becomes daily more imperative."

A message from the President, convalescing at his Gettysburg, Pa., farm from a heart attack, was read to a big Jewish-sponsored rally in Madison Square Garden. The rally was supported by Jewish groups with a total membership of 750,000.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland, honorary president of the American Zionist Council, said of the Eisenhower message: "This isn't everything that I should have liked him to include in his statement."

Like Earlier Statement

The President's message was almost identical with a statement he issued through Acting Secretary of State Herbert Hoover Jr. in Denver in which he described Israeli-Egyptian fighting as a "threat to world peace" and declared "firm friendship toward Israel and all other nations in the Near East."

The President said the United States was "willing to consider requests for arms needed for legitimate self-defense" but did "not intend to contribute to an

arms competition in the Near East."

He said he would recommend that the United States join in a formal guarantee against the altering of boundaries between Israel and the Arab nations once "current problems" in the Middle East are solved.

Others Give Views

Meanwhile, he said, the government will continue to be guided by a U. S.-British-French declaration of May 23, 1950. This declaration gave moral support to temporary boundaries in Palestine pending a formal peace settlement between Israel and the Arabs.

Somewhat different views were expressed in messages by other American leaders to the New York rally:

Former President Harry Truman said the present objective of the American government "should be the immediate conversion of the tripartite declaration of 1950 into a more clearly defined security guarantee for all the peoples of the Middle East."

The 1950 declaration came after the Palestine war, in which Israel won more territory in some areas than had been provided by United Nations recommendations for division of Palestine.

Ives Urges Action Now

Senator Irving M. Ives (R.N.Y.), generally regarded as close supporter of the Eisenhower administration, told the rally the tripartite statement was "ineffective," and added that Ameri-

can responsibility to Israel now must be shown, "whether by providing arms or by a mutual security pact or by any other effective means."

In Washington, Israeli Ambassador Abba Eban made an appointment with Acting Secretary of State Hoover to present a list of defensive weapons Israel wants from the United States to offset Communist-supplied arms for the Arabs.

The State Department insists it has made no decision on Israel's arms request, despite reports America will sell her important supplies of weapons.

Rejects Eden Proposal

In Jerusalem, Israeli David Ben-Gurion rejected British Prime Minister Anthony Eden's call for settlement of the dispute through territorial concessions by Israel.

The white-haired premier, wearing battle-dress as he addressed the Knesset (Parliament), called Eden's proposal "fantastic." Ben-Gurion said the plan "to truncate the territory of Israel for the benefit of its neighbors has no legal, moral, or logical basis, and cannot be considered."

He added that Eden's statement was likely to intensify "Arab aggression" and may lessen the possibility of peace.

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Going to Office

Settling down to a mixed routine of business and relaxation at his handsome farm home, the President made plans to visit his downtown office for the first time Wednesday and to meet with the National Security Council and the Cabinet next week.

Eisenhower said the need for a peaceful settlement of the Middle East crisis "becomes daily more imperative." The United States, he added, "will play its full part in working toward such a settlement . . .

"By firm friendship towards Israel and all other nations in the Near East, we shall contribute immeasurably to the peace of the world," he said.

Walks and Rides

B-sides conferring with Adams, Eisenhower spent the first full day of his convalescent visit here by working on routine government business and making an extensive inspection of his rolling acres on foot and by jeep.

A White House spokesman said Eisenhower will try out his newly-decorated office in the Gettysburg Post Office Wednesday during a conference with Commerce Secretary Louis W. Johnson.

The President also approved plans for Security Council and Cabinet meetings on separate days early next week at Camp David in the nearby Maryland mountains.

Will See Dulles

With official duties increasingly claiming more of his attention, Mr. Eisenhower will meet with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles Thursday

afternoon and again Friday to discuss the recent Big Four foreign ministers meeting.

Dulles will fly here from Washington immediately after his return from the Geneva conference.

Weeks, the only Cabinet member who did not confer with the President during his confinement in a Denver hospital, will arrive here about 9 a.m. EST Wednesday, along with Adams.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said specific dates for the meetings next week have not been set. However, he said they will be held in time to enable the President to spend Thanksgiving day with his family.

Mr. Eisenhower is expected to spend one night at the Catoctin Mountain retreat.

When Adams arrived at the farm this afternoon, Mr. Eisen-
hower had just gone out to his new practice putting green. The President putted four balls, Hagerty said, and then walked to his first-floor study and bedroom for the conference with Adams.

TREATY GUARANTEEING BORDERS PROPOSED TO PREVENT WORLD WAR

President Describes Any Threat of Major Conflict Between Israel and Egypt as Equal Menace to Entire Globe in Message to Rabbi Silver for New York Meeting

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Nov 15 (UP)—President Eisenhower said tonight the United States would be willing to join in a formal treaty to guarantee the Egypt-Israel border if the two Middle Eastern nations will stop their fighting.

In a statement issued at his farm home here, the President said "a threat to peace in the Near East is a threat to world peace." He said "there is no reason why a settlement of these problems cannot be found."

The President also reaffirmed this country's position that it is willing to consider requests for arms needed for "legitimate self-defense" but does "not intend to contribute to an arms competition."

In Washington, U.S. officials said the President's statement did not alter this country's position that Egypt and Israel should settle their refugee and boundary disputes in advance of any such treaty. They said that is what Eisenhower meant when he referred to "these problems."

Israeli Ambassador Abba Eban is scheduled to call on the State Department in Washington Wednesday with a specific list of the "defensive arms" his country hopes to get from the United States.

The message was issued after Eisenhower had received a report from Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams on a two-hour cabinet meeting held in Washington today.

12th Annual Zionist Donor Dinner Expected To Attract Over 800 Guests

"Over 800 guests are expected to attend the 12th Annual Donor Dinner of the Baltimore Zionist District on Tuesday, December 6, at the Lord Baltimore Hotel, to hear Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver." Mr. Leonard Rosen, general chairman of the Donor Dinner Committee announced this week. Five Greater Cleveland hospitals will benefit from the Charles Kammann award which went to "elder statesman" Alfred A. Bencich last night.

Silver Hits British Territory Aims

BALTIMORE, Md. — Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, addressing the 12th annual AZF dinner of the Baltimore Zionist District on Dec. 6, pointed to the failure of the Tri-Partite agreement of 1950 to insure peace on Israeli-Arab borders and asserted that Great Britain's offer of mediation on the basis of territorial concessions by Israel is motivated by the desire to insure for itself a corridor through the Negev to Jordan and the Middle East.

Over 800 guests attended the dinner, the income of which will be devoted to financing the major projects of the ZOA. Leonard Rosen, toastmaster, served as general chairman of the dinner committee which was composed of a large number of active workers including Joseph W. Spector, chairman of the committee which is securing scholarships for prospective students to Kfar Silver Agricultural Training Institute in Israel. Harry L. Landay is president of the District.

In his address Dr. Silver enumerated as basic facts which must be faced in discussing the Near East situation some nine points, the first three of which dealt with the Arab states. The first charged them with acquiring arms not to defend themselves against Russia but to prepare a war against Israel. He also asserted that "those who are hoping to hold the allegiance of the Arab states to the West by providing them with arms are helping to build up a threatening military front, not against Russia, but against Israel."

The second fact cited stated, "The Arab states know that Israel is not threatening them . . ." The third stated, "The Arab states will not willingly recognize the existence of the State of Israel. Their leaders have time and again publicly announced their intention to wipe Israel off the map . . . This is their clearly avowed intention. Until these states have made peace with Israel and have abandoned their intention of exterminating it, or until such time as the Western nations have given Israel the assurance of a military alliance, the young State must, as best it can, look to its own defenses."

He further declared that "Israel desires no 'arms race . . . Israel has no expansionist ambitions.'

Whatever the condition of the frontiers and the relationship between Israel and its Arab neighbors, there is one front on which the new republic dare not relax its efforts—the task of building a modern nation on territory allowed to go to wreck and ruin for 2,000 years under foreign conquerors.

Phenomenal strides have been made in transforming the Holy Land into a productive nation. Its population in seven years has increased from 650,000 to 1,720,000. Immigrants constantly pour in from the troubled areas of the world such as French North Africa. To sustain these people and integrate them into a viable economy is the task of the bond drive. For this reason Cleveland's great religious leader has accepted the responsibility for its direction.

RABBI SILVER RIPS FOREIGN POLICY

Hits at Wooing of Franco, Tito and the Arabs

By MARC D. GLEISER

Terminating 1955 one of the better years in the decade of uneasy peace following World War II, Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver took time to rip the nation's foreign policy yesterday in his review of the year at the Temple.

"We cannot lead the world toward freedom and democracy and at the same time woo and praise the Fascist dictatorship of Franco and the Communist dictatorship of Tito," he said.

He added that the nation could not in good conscience supply weapons to feudal lands like Iraq and, at the same time, deny them to friendly, independent little states like Israel.

We must discard the false formula that everyone who is not with us is against us, he said, and we must learn that many states want to be friends even though they cannot join us in a military alliance.

This nation has been wedded to two dogmas, he asserted, that we must arm West Germany and must not recognize Communist China—and these two lines have helped Russia's cause.

"Our foreign policy definitely needs rethinking," he said, adding that America would not win by weapons but by ideas, where democracy was definitely superior to any dictatorship.

"Failure Canceled Success"

Dr. Silver expressed disappointment at the result of the year's two meetings among the world's top powers.

"The meeting at the summit was a success, the meeting at Geneva was a failure, and the failure canceled out the success so that today we are where we were before the meetings," he said.

Emphasizing that the Geneva conference was wrecked over the issue of Germany, he asserted that maneuvers on the part of the East and West were transparent with neither side clearly ready yet to abandon the cold war.

He pointed to recent travels by Russia's premier, Nikolai Bulganin, and her Communist boss, Nikita Khrushchev, as an attempt to rouse old enemies and to curry favor for their side.

Despite intensive propaganda by leaders, he said, the peoples of the world, at heart, want peace and co-operation and see no reason why they should not trade with each other.

He asserted that Russian journalists who visited here found it in their hearts to praise in highest manner many of the things they saw on their return to their homeland.

World War Danger

Turning to the problem of the Middle East, the rabbi remarked that if war came there it was bound to develop into a world conflict despite the fact that nobody wanted it or could gain thereby.

"The Arabs cannot be appeased with pieces of Israeli territory—that is the same program as Munich which led to World War II," he said.

Dr. Silver added that Russia's recent denunciation of Israel was an attempt to win the Arab world and also to cover-up for

Offers a Solution

The rabbi offered two steps to help solve present complications in the Middle East:

1. Military equilibrium between Israel and the Arab states upset by huge sales to Egypt, must be restored. If Israel can get weapons, she will defend herself effectively.

2. Our own country should conclude a security treaty with Israel and Arabs who want peace which would agree to hold present borders against any further changes.

Turning to other aspects of the world scene, the rabbi pointed to the Salk antipolio vaccine as a major contribution to the health, security and happiness of all human races.

He's Recovery

On the American scene, he pointed to the recovery of President Eisenhower as a major happening of the year and said that, barring unforeseen happenings, he would be at the helm of the government for the rest of his term.

He asserted that desegregation moves had done much to further the American ideal of equality despite a hard core of resistance that erupted in such atrocities as the Emmett Till lynching.

He concluded that no complete end to world conflicts would be apparent in the coming year, but emphasized that any move could be regarded as a valued step forward to the ultimate goal of peace in the world.

Dr. Schwartz said that the 1955 campaign results represented a 20 per cent increase over figures for the previous year.

1,000 Hear Noted Rabbi In City

Religious Heritage Will Guide America, Dr. Silver Declares

"Given peace and comparative economic stability, the American Jewish Community will move forward, develop, expand its institutions, and contribute to the total life of the nation," Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, one of the nation's foremost Reform rabbis, said here last night.

Dr. Silver spoke on "Religion—the Next 50 Years," at Sinai Temple on the Sabbath eve of the temple's 50th anniversary. He also declared that America will undergo a "tremendous undergirding and strengthening" in world leadership during the next 50 years because its background is "interwoven with religious convictions."

1,000 Hear Speaker

More than 1,000 persons filled the main synagogue and overflowed into the Community House to hear Dr. Silver, who is rabbi of The Temple, Cleveland, Ohio, largest Reform Jewish congregation in the country.

Dr. Silver emphasized several times that even though 1956 might "seem rather dark"—when in the midst of men and women of faith "who produce, because of their faith, the eternal hope of man—I seem to hear the constant resolve, 'I will not die.'"

"I don't want to overdraw the picture; we're not in the millennium," he warned, after stating that the three major trends of this age are the abolishment of poverty, of war, and of racial inequality.

Great Age For America'

But this is a great age for America, he said.

"As soon as it rights itself in its foreign policy and finds the

right approach," it will lead the world in democracy.

Our age also will find a formula of toleration, which will allow conflicting ideologies to live together, he said.

"These ideologies might be irreconcilable in theory, but they are not so in practice."

At one time, Catholics and Protestants didn't believe they should live in the same world together, he continued. Then, after "100 years of war," a way was found with neither religion changing an "iota of what was written in their books."

See East-West Hopes

During the next 50 years, the East and West also will find a way to live together, Dr. Silver predicted, but America must take the lead in courageous give and take diplomacy and assume "urgent" United Nations leadership in the reduction of armaments and in providing material help to backward nations.

The problem of the next 50 years in American-Jewish life is no longer how to modernize Judaism—we've modernized quite sufficiently," he quipped to his Reform Jewish audience—"The problem is one of reconversion of Jews to their faith.

"Judaism is more than benevolence and charity. This will not preserve the faith of our people."

No Jewish community ever survived for long without deep loyalties, religious worship, Jewish studying, Jewish teaching and religion.

and Jewish learning—"until the very last day of one's life."

Points To Dangers

"What we should fear most is the rise of a generation of prosperous Jews who have no spiritual anchorage," he said. "My friends, that's our greatest danger."

He termed this generation "blustering minds," some of them dangerous, "especially to a minority group."

What is likely to endanger the American Jewish community, he warned, is an "unconscious drift." Not one of conviction, but one of belonging to a temple and not attending; lack of religious education; homes "without meaning."

"No religion survives in an emotional and intellectual vacuum," Dr. Silver asserted.

Responsibility For Home

He pointed out that the place to train the child is in the home, and parents should not shift the responsibility to the schools, the social worker, or the street.

"There will be dissension and division in the public schools if we burden them with problems they should not be burdened with," he warned.

Early in his talk, Dr. Silver referred to Dr. Henry E. Kagan, rabbi of Sinai, as "one of the most gifted and forward-looking men in our ministry" who has presented "a unique contribution" in the field of psychiatry.

ISRAEL'S PRESIDENT ASKS U. S. JEWS' AID

MIAMI BEACH, Feb. 3—Israak Ben-Zvi, President of Israel, appealed to United States Jews today to provide "the tools for economic progress" for his country. He urged immediate purchases this year of State of Israel bonds.

His speech was called on the eve of the opening here of a national drive to raise \$75,000,000 in bond sales for the economic development of Israel. The message was addressed to Abraham Feinberg of New York, president of the Israel bond organization, and Jacob Sher, drive chairman for the Miami area.

"By helping us acquire the tools for economic progress, you fortify us in our quest for peace and stability," the message said. A luncheon of the national women's division of the bond organization will be held tomorrow. Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt will be the principal speaker.

The campaign will open with a dinner tomorrow night, in the Seville Hotel. The speakers will include Dr. Joseph Burg, Israeli Minister of Posts; Leon H. Keyserling, chairman of ex-President Truman's Council of Economic Advisers; Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, chairman of the board of governors of the bond organization, and Jacob Sher, drive chairman for the Miami area.

Mr. Truman's Memoirs: Tensions Increased

INSTALLMENT 8, EXCERPTS FROM 'YEARS OF TRIAL AND HOPE'

By Harry S. Truman

THE fact that there had been an exchange of messages between Washington and London in contemplation of an Anglo-American investigation into the problem of homeless Jews in Europe soon became public. On Oct. 30, 1945, I received a wire from Zionist spokesmen which said, in part:

"What is called for is a policy not a further inquiry. Based upon bitter experience over many years, we venture to affirm that the setting up of the proposed commission will bring the solution not one step nearer."

Within the last seven years, three major intergovernmental conferences and committees, in addition to our own War Refugee Board appointed in 1944 and already dissolved, have sought to deal with the question of Jewish refugees and of Jewish immigration. Each of these efforts ended in dismal failure, stemming from the central assumption that doors of Palestine, unlawfully barred to Jewish immigration by the British Government under the terms of its White Paper of 1939, must remain barred.

What is urgently needed, is not another roving expedition or a further time-consuming investigation but immediate concrete measures in conformity with a policy long established and clearly defined by valid international agreements. We therefore respectfully submit that what is called for immediately is:

1. The immediate admission of 100,000 Jews into Palestine, as requested by you, Mr. President.

2. The abandonment or revocation forthwith by the British Government of the White Paper of 1939.

3. A joint pronouncement by the British and American Governments indicating their intention to support and pursue a Palestine policy consonant with the original purpose and underlying intent of the Balfour Declaration—the Palestine Mandate.

4. Following such joint pronouncement it would be most useful to constitute a joint commission to explore what means by which both commercially cooperate in the implementation of the announced policy in the light of their respective interests and responsibilities."

We appeal to our Government again to employ all its moral and political influence that justice and humanity may triumph.

One of our main problems was that Palestine was not ours to dispose of. It had been legally entrusted to the British by action of the League of Nations—to which we did not belong—and the British were, in fact, in possession of Palestine.

In my own mind, the aims and goals of the Zionists at this stage to set up a Jewish state were secondary to the more immediate problem of finding means to relieve the human misery of the displaced persons.

Since the diplomats were having so much trouble in agreeing on the scope and purpose of the proposed committee of inquiry, the matter was not taken up again until Prime Minister Attlee came to Washington in mid-November. Out of these talks with Attlee there came understanding with regard to Palestine.

THE Committee on Palestine began its work with public hearings in Washington on Jan. 4, 1946, and then traveled to Europe and the Near East to study the situation on the spot. Its report was presented to me on April 22, 1946, by the American chairman, Judge Joseph C. Hutcheson, a highly respected Federal judge from Texas. The Committee recommended unanimously that 100,000 certificates be issued for immigration into Palestine and that actual immigration be pushed forward as rapidly as possible.

As for Palestine, the Committee urged the adoption of these three principles:

I. That Jew shall not dominate Arab and Arab shall not dominate Jew in Palestine.

II. That Palestine shall be neither a Jewish state nor an Arab state.

III. That the form of government ultimately to be established shall, under international guarantees, fully protect and preserve the interests in the Holy Land of Christendom and of the Moslem and Jewish faiths.

The Committee concluded, however, that the relations of Jews and Arabs were at the present so strained that any attempt to establish independence or nationhood would only result in civil strife. For that reason they recommended that the mandate be continued, at eventually there should be a trusteeship agreement with the United Nations, and that the terms of the trusteeship agreement should aim at bringing Arabs and Jews closer together.

Judge Hutcheson and his colleagues had done a notably conscientious job, and I felt that the Committee was pointing in the right direction. However, it remained now to persuade the British to take action on the report. Having consulted with Dean Acheson and other advisers (Byrnes was in Paris), I sent a message to Attlee:

May 8, 1946

From the President to Prime Minister Attlee:

"In view of the urgency surrounding the question of the admission to Palestine of the 100,000 Jews whose entry is recommended by the Committee, I sincerely hope that it will be possible to initiate and complete the consultations with Arabs and Jews at the earliest possible moment."

Attlee replied at once, asking for time to discuss the matter with his Foreign Secretary, Bevin, who was in Paris, and two days later there followed a more extensive message from the Prime Minister. Attlee said that the British were agreeable that consultations with the Jews and Arabs be initiated as quickly as possible. He pointed out, however, that Britain was at that moment engaged in important and delicate negotiations with Egypt and suggested a postponement until May 20 or later. Attlee said also that a period of two weeks for the Jews and the Arabs to prepare for the conference was too short and that a month would be better.

Meanwhile, in a body, the diplomatic representatives of the Arab states in Washington called on Acting Secretary of State Acheson to voice their protest against the Commission's recommendations.

I could appreciate Attlee's problems, even though I was unwilling to admit the necessity for further delay. I decided therefore that I would accede to his wish to delay the communications to the Arabs and Jews until May 20, but then I wanted to see the entire problem pushed forward with dispatch.

To the heads of the Arab states who had backed up their ministers by personal telegrams to me, there went individual mes-

sages similar to this one to the Regent of Iraq:

May 17, 1946

His Royal Highness
Prince Abdul Ilah

Regent of the Kingdom of Iraq

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your telegram of May 8, 1946, and have taken careful note of your government's views with respect to the report of the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry as set forth therein.

You will recall that on a number of occasions the Government of the United States has informed the Arab Governments that in its view no change should be made in the basic situation in Palestine without prior consultation with both Arab and Jewish leaders.

You may rest assured therefore that no decision regarding the Committee's report will be made without prior consultation with the Government of Iraq.

I desire also at this time to send Your Highness my personal greetings and best wishes for the welfare of your people.

HARRY S. TRUMAN.

The official reaction in England to the report of the Anglo-American Commission was not encouraging. As soon as it was published, Clement Attlee told the House of Commons that, before taking any action on the report, his Government would ask the United States to share the additional military and financial responsibilities that he thought would arise. He also said that large-scale immigration into Palestine would not be resumed until the illegal Jewish armed units were eliminated.

The British press, in the weeks to follow, set a tone that was decidedly unfriendly. Many of them said or implied what Ernest Bevin, the Foreign Secretary, later said in a speech on June 12—that our interest in helping the Jews enter Palestine was due to our desire not to have them in the United States.

I realized that it would be difficult to get action from the British, but while there was much clamor in the United States that something be done, the country was neither disposed nor prepared to assume risks and obligations that might require us to use military force. Nevertheless, I wanted to have a full appraisal of the military factors involved and asked Dean Acheson to get an opinion from the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff urged that no United States armed forces be involved in carrying out the Committee's findings. They believed that the political shock attending the reappearance of United States armed forces in the Middle East would unnecessarily risk serious disturbances throughout the area far out of proportion to any local Palestine difficulties.

They were primarily concerned about Middle East oil and in long-range terms about the danger that the Arabs, antagonized by Western action in Palestine, would make common cause with Russia. The second argument in particular was one that I had not lost sight of at any time. The pressure against Turkey and the incidents in Iran all pointed only too clearly to the fact that the Russians would be ready to welcome the Arabs into their camp.

The British Prime Minister cabled me on May 27, sending me a catalog of subjects which he thought should be taken up when the experts of our two Governments sat down together. Out of the ten recommendations of the Committee, the British had built up no less than forty-three "subjects" which they felt needed discussion by the experts. My reaction was that this procedure would only serve to postpone any relief for the 100,000 homeless Jews that we still wanted to see admitted into Palestine. I replied that it was my primary concern to relieve suffering by the admission of these 100,000.

The British did not want to discuss the matter of the 100,000 immigrants without talking about all aspects of the Palestine problem.

Dr. Bob Bone, Attlee wrote that he was ready for the joint talk to get underway.

My desire to persuade the British to remove immigration restrictions in Palestine had been on more receptive ears if it had not been for the increasing acts of terrorism that were being committed in Palestine. There were armed groups of extremists who were guilty of numerous outrages. On June 16 eight bridges were blown near the Trans-Jordan border, and two explosions were set off in Haifa. The following day there was a pitched battle between Jordanian British troops in Haifa. Explosions had started a fire and caused great damage in the rail yards there. British officers were kidnapped. Others were shot out of passing automobiles.

There had been an ever increasing number of the British uncovered a plot by an extremist group to kidnap the British Commissioner in Chief in Palestine.

The British, because of the violence, were anxious to get the discussions of the joint committee under way as soon as possible. I accommodated Attlee in this matter by sending the United States group over on July 10, a week earlier than had been planned, and by making the Presidential plane available to get them there.

During the two weeks that followed, this joint cabinet committee sat and deliberated in London. Because both Attlee and I knew how sensitive the Jews and the Arabs were on the issues involved, it had been agreed to observe strict secrecy until agreement could be announced. However, leaks apparently developed, and on July 23 the American press published a fairly detailed account of the recommendations of the committee.

In substance, the plan proposed by the committee was the creation in Palestine of something resembling a federal system of two autonomous states but with a very strong central government. Approximately 1,500 square miles (of a total of 45,000) were to become a Jewish state. The central government would retain control of the cities of Jerusalem and Bethlehem, as well as of the southernmost section of Palestine, the Negev. The remainder of Palestine would become an Arab state.

Included among subjects under central government control would be immigration.

NEITHER the Jews nor the Arabs welcomed this plan. It satisfied nobody.

The Arabs even objected to the proposal in the report that, in order to help the transition, there should be an outright grant of \$50,000,000 from the United States to aid the Palestinian Arabs.

The situation was not improving. Only a few days before, Jewish terrorists had blown up the King David Hotel in Jerusalem with considerable loss of lives. I studied the London proposed plan with care. But I was unable to see that anything could come out of it except more unrest. The plan made the admission of the 100,000 conditional on its being accepted by the Arabs, so no relief was offered in that direction, either. It seemed a retreat from the fine recommendations that had been made by the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry earlier in the year. I, therefore, felt compelled to inform Attlee that the Government of the United States could not go along.

My message of Aug. 12 said:

"* * * The opposition in this country to the plan has become so intense that it is now clear it would be impossible to rally in favor of it sufficient public opinion to enable this government to give it effective support."

By the fall of 1946 the situation looked, as I wrote to a friend, "insatiable." As I said in this letter, "not only are the British highly successful in muddling the situation as completely as it could possibly be muddled, but the Jews themselves are making it almost impossible to do anything for them."

The Jewish Agency for Palestine, the official spokesman for the Zionists, had just declared that it would not even sit down with the British to discuss their proposals.

Meanwhile, the Jewish extremists in Palestine were continuing their terrorist activities. And top Jewish leaders in the United

States were putting all sorts of pressure on me to commit American power and forces on behalf of the Jewish aspirations in Palestine.

I understood the position of the British Government. They found themselves hard-pressed throughout the empire, unable to muster either the funds or the forces to take care of all their responsibilities, and yet anxious to relinquish as little of their standing as a world power as possible. They had spent many years and millions of pounds cultivating the friendship of the Arab world, both to secure the lifeline of the empire through the Suez Canal and to gain access to the oil resources of the Middle East. They were, understandably, most reluctant to antagonize the Arabs.

The Arabs were an uncompromising as the Jews. They made an appearance at the round-table talks which the British convened late in January, 1947, but they would not yield an inch from their position that Palestine was Arab country and should be kept Arab. The talks collapsed, therefore, on Feb. 4, 1947, and the British then decided to put the whole matter before the United Nations. These was, of course, a good deal of criticism, especially of Foreign Secretary Bevin's handling of the situation. Certainly he did not help matters when he told a Labor party caucus that American Zionists were to blame and later when he stated in the House of Commons that all would have been well if only I had not spoiled his plans by sticking to the idea that 100,000 Jews should be given a home in Palestine.

He was referring, of course, to a statement I had made on Oct. 4, 1946, which happened to have been the Jewish holiday of Yom Kippur. Presidents have often made statements on this holiday, so the timing was nothing unusual, and what I had said was simply a restatement of my position. A few days later, Governor Dewey said that several hundred thousand should be admitted, and Bevin now told the British House of Commons that I had made my statement to forestall Dewey's—in other words, I had taken my position for political reasons only.

This was a very undiplomatic—almost hostile—statement for the Foreign Secretary of the British Government to make about the President of the United States. He knew that this had been my position all along.

The President of the United States, of course, cannot spend his time replying to personal attacks and insinuations. If he did, his time would be fully occupied with nothing else. So, while I was outraged by Mr. Bevin's unwarranted charge, I had Charlie Ross [Press Secretary] issue a very moderate, entirely impersonal statement from the White House that pointed out that the matter of getting 100,000 Jews into Palestine had been the cornerstone of our Palestine policy since my first letter to Attlee in August, 1945.

JERUSALEM, Mar. 26 — (UPI) — President Eisenhower today assured Israel that the United States "is exploring every avenue" to find a satisfactory peaceful solution to the Israel-Arab dispute.

"Through my friend, Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, who is about to visit Israel, I should like to take the opportunity to convey my personal greeting on the occasion of the celebration of Passover, your historic festival, and on the eve of the eighth anniversary of the establishment of the State of Israel.

"I have followed with admiration the progress and development of your country. The American people wish you young state peace and prosperity.
