at ten o'clock

I have been asked to read to you, tonight, a"Tzores Document" recently uncovered in a high-class library raid. While the authorship has not been definitely verified, there is much circumstantial evidence to indicate that this is the brain-child of none other than our guest of honor. Even though it may lack the scholarly quality associated with Rabbi Silver's sermons, it is, nevertheless, a document of deepest sincerity.

Rescued from the soleum depths of the Rabbi's wastebasket, it was recently brought to light, and has its first reading this evening.

This sermon is titled: "A Rabbi's Lot Is Not A Happy One". In a foreword, there is this notation: "Recently I addressed my congregation on the subject—"Letters I Have Received From Boys at The Fronts'—which I shall now supplement with this paper, entitled—"Complaints I Have Received From Members in Arrears."

Here is the comen, in its outirety:

The Sermon, transcribed and translated by Leo neumark, I shall grow frevent, in its unexperyeted Entirety.

My friends as I sit in my study, overlooking Virginia, I am reminded that, although the ministry, in its more serious phase, is hardly a comic opera, there are strange analogies to the song and dance efforts of the semi-classic.

Those of you who may have heard Gilbert and Sullivan's delightful operetta "The Pirates of Penzance" may remember the song "A Policeman's Lot is Not a Happy One". It is immediately evident that neither Gilbert nor Sullivan had any real acquaintanceship with Rabbis; otherwise the song might have had a different title. What do policemen know about trouble?

In my large and extensive filing system, where I keep copies of famous sermons — for inspirational purposes only — I also have one compartment under "G", which I term "The Gripes of Wrath". Here I file, for ready reference, the thousands upon thousands of letters that are received, annually, from members of my congregation. It is upon these gripes that I shall discourse this morning. So I draw, more or less at random, one example from this Bag of Gripes. It reads:

Dear Mr. Levi -

Some months ago I had a sudden attack of indigestion brought on by eating too many Kipfel. Fortunately I recovered in a few days. However, your Rabbi failed to call on me while I was ill. It is true he came to see me the next Sunday, but I had already recovered and had gone to my gin rummy game. So of what use was such a visit to me? The next time I am sick I will try some other Temple. I am sure the "service" will be better.

And another that came to us recently:

Dear Rabbi Harris -

You have caused much trouble in my home. Did not my wife pour tea as good as any of the others? Did she not pass cakes like anyone else? Did she not bring a fine sterling silver service that we borrowed from my sister-in-law who does not like to lend it? Yet in your bulletin are the names of all the hostesses except my wife's. You preach brotherhood and good will. Does this make for brotherhood and good will? I ask you — and I answer "No." — and I say, too, that never again will my wife pass tea or cakes — or even water — at your sisterhood meetings.

A few days ago, in my pan mail, the following two complaints came almost simultaneously, providing something for a Solomon to solve. The one read:

Dear Rabbi -

Why is it that we cannot have heat in Mahler Hall?
At the last meeting I had to keep my coat on during the entire performance. Fortunately it is a new fur wrap and it did warm me up a little to see how my friends stared and glared at me, wondering how I could afford it.

And the other:

Dear Rabbi -

Why do you keep Mahler Hall so hot? It is difficult to keep awake with some of the speakers you engage, and when you keep the hall so warm, keeping awake is utterly impossible. Please be so kind and put the heat on the speakers - not the hall.

And now you know why I did not contribute to the mortgage fund.

For many years there has been a peculiar difficulty of perfecting a satisfactory lighting arrangement for the interior of the Temple. This is a matter that I should perhaps bring to the attention of the Board. They, however, would find the solution difficult, inasmuch as only a few of them are familiar with the interior of the building. Pertaining to this subject, I shall quote from two letters out of my Gripe-Bag. The first is from Mrs. Moe Light, and reads like this:

Dear Mr. Weitz - (You know he is the President.)

Why must we sit in medieval gloom every Sunday? It is hard for me to recognize people more than three pews away. And they probably have the same difficulty. Consequently, only a few people really know I have been to Temple. I believe I could get a little more light on the Rabbi's sermons if there was a little more light in the Temple. At least I could see him talking.

And here is a note from Mr. Nacht, who writes me -

Dear Rabbi -

Mach Sunday I am distracted from my prayers by the large center light in the ceiling of the Temple. Instead of praying I am figuring out the amount of money wasted in burning that light, and how it would pay the interest on the new mortgage when it may be put on the Temple - God Forbid.

But not all the complaints have to do with the Temple. Some strike much closer home. Many are "Hutzpah" letters that criticize me, personally. Evidently some folks think my sermons are too long; and a few, alas a very few, complain that they are too short. Sometimes, though they seem to be just right. A few weeks ago a lady came to me

after the service and said gushingly: "Rabbi, you cannot imagine how much your sermon meant to me. You were awfully cute." Be that as it may, it has long been my practice to speak only till noon, sometimes omitting some of my most effective passages, so that my flock may get home to their rationed Gefulte Fish with Matzoh glose, and then to the movies or bridge games without undue delay. Of what doth it avail a man to save his soul and lose his seat at the poker table.

Of the subject matter of my sermons there is of course much complaint. However, I will only repeat what one of my faithful attendants said to me - "Rabbi, I think you are a great preacher. You never put any religion into your sermons."

From many of my loyal and devoted flock, I am criticized for traveling too much. "Why pay our Rabbi good money," they argue, "so that others may enjoy him, free of charge." It has even been suggested that I carry samples from Printz-Biederman, as a dide line.

I shall dwell only lightly on complaints regarding the Sunday School. As there are only 800 children enrolled in the Sunday School, the complaints this year have not exceeded 800. Too much Hebrew; not enough Hebrew. Too much draft; not enough ventilation. Too much home-work; not enough home-work. Out too early; out too late. Teachers too old; teachers too young. Too many parties; not enough parties. Oy veh is mir!

And now I begin to see why I am being tendered this 25th Anniversary celebration. It is to demonstrate, no doubt, the amount of punishment that a Rabbi can absorb in 25 years.

To paraphrase a famous saying: "You can displease all of the people some of the time, and you can displease some of the people all or the time, but ever a Rabbi cannot displease all of the people all of the time." But why worry? I shall never deliver this sermon anyway. It's contrary to the laws of Virginia.

Dear Mr. Weitz:

When I started out in this newspaper business a well informed and wise adviser told me that material compensation was in all probability the least of the things which might help enrich the life of the young man who linked his career to the progress of his community through the medium of a newspaper.

My dear Abba:

I am informed that, this month, you will celebrate your fiftieth birthday, and likewise that your congregation will commemorate the twenty-fifth anniversary of your ministry to it. I can easily believe that you will be fifty years old, even though I was not present upon the happy occasion of your birth. But I find it very difficult to realize that your ministry to The Temple covers a period of a quarter of a century, although, as you know, I was actively connected with your coming to The Temple.

I remember very clearly when my old and very dear friend, Rabbi Moses J. Gries, came to Cincinnati to confer with me about the question of a worthy successor to himself to that great pulpit. It was a joy to me at that time to present your name to his consideration and, through him, to the authorities of the congregation, and to insist that there was absolutely no other alumnus of the College whom I wished to recommend for this high position. I remember, too, very vividly how, a few weeks later, when the UAHC met in Baltimore, Ben Lowenstein and Charlie Eisenman came to me in the Belvedere Hotel and asked me to introduce them to you, so that, as representatives of the congregation, they might report back to their colleagues their impression of you. Obviously, their impression was favorable, for it was only two or three weeks thereafter that your election as Rabbi of The Temple was publicly announced.

It reflects your spirit and mirrors your thought and purpose. And in that service and in that achievement may you and Virginia and your two fine boys find immeasurable satisfaction, unending happiness and deep consciousness of Divine blessing. All this I wish and pray for you in loyal and affectionate friendship.

It is always easy to find men who are willing to give lip service and perfunctory support for matters of public concern. As Henry David Thoreau once said, with truthful bitterness, about such moral jellyfish:

"They hesitate, and they regret and sometimes they petition; but they do nothing in earnest or with effect. They will wait, well disposed, for others to remedy the evil, that they may no longer have it to regret. At most they give only a cheap vote and a feeble countenance and Godspeed to the right, as it goes by them."

But, as we of The Consumers' League have especial reason to know, Rabbi Silver, in such matters, has never hesitated nor merely regretted. He has not waited for others to remedy the evils that beset us, the while he gave only a cheap vote and a feeble countenance for the right. On the contrary, he has given freely, generously, passionately, of his time and his purse, of his tremendous moral enthusiasm and his incomparable eloquence, for the causes of social improvement and economic reform.

When unemployment insurance in 1930 was only a phrase of uncertain meaning and very questionable reputation, he threw open the doors of his study to join with our committee which met there week after week in the study of that subject. From that committee there came the famous bill which was introduced in the Ohio Legislature in 1931 - and for the first time unemployment insurance became a living issue in this state. Still later he served as a member of the Commission which Governor George White appointed to investigate the whole subject, and served with distinction. And when tiresome spade

work and tedious drudgery were required to translate the proposed legislation into actual enactment and effective operation - it was Rabbi Silver who was always the first man to be called upon and the first man to respond - for conferences - or legislative committee meetings - or public mass meetings.

Eventually all of this work flowered into effective legislation, and at this very moment there are hundreds of thousands of men and women in Ohio who have at least some measure of economic security because of a law which came about in no small part because of his courage, his energy and his disinterested devotion to the public welfare.

It is with immense pride, therefore, that we record the fact that for many years Rabbi Silver has been a loyal, faithful, and generous member of the Consumers' League of Ohio, that he is also our beloved and honorary Vice-President, and that through all these years he has been a tower of strength in every campaign of The Consumers' League for increased protection and greater economic security for the working men and women and children of Ohio.

The Temple Cleveland, Ohio. Dear Rabbi Silver: I wish to send you my best wishes for your 50th birthday which is also the 25th anniversary of your occupying the Cleveland pulpit. I am glad that this occasion gives me an opportunity to express the feelings I have towards you and I think I may allow myself at this moment the luxury of expressing my appreciation of your character and gifts. I have been fortunate enough to see you and to hear you time and again. I remember one occasion when I heard you speak to your congregation in connection with modern works by Jewish authors, on the problem of Jesus in Jewish literature. It was apparent to me that you were deeply concerned to place your profound learning at the service of your people, to be a teacher in Israel. It seemed that light and truth were spread by your words, and it was a memorable hour I spent at your feet as your pupil. Whenever you appear in public there is in your speeches a seriousness and lack of exaggeration which carry conviction to your listeners. Your leadership in Zionist activities has proved abundantly a rare capacity not only for making demands, but for carrying those demands through to fulfillment. That, in my estimation rests upon your power to urge your cause with a combination of passion and judgment, even when, with the inspiration of true leadership, you have had the temerity to give expression to ideas which might not be popular and conventional politicians prefer to leave alone. I have often mentioned on behalf of the Keren Hayesod our appreciation of what you did for Palestine. I wish to repeat today how thankful we are for your untiring activities in building our funds. Perhaps I may dare, just once, at this moment,

As an admirer of all those qualities which have made you able to realize the depths to which humanity can sink and the heights to which it can rise - and that applies to Judaism too - I wish you today good luck for a fresh start in the years of life that are before you. 
