



Dr. Gaylord has read to me that portion of your letter relating to the B'nai B'rith Sabbath conducted at Rodef Sholom Temple.



Smellie of the major dangers that confronted the Jewish community in 1948 was factionalism. It seemed always to be almost to split into warring camps. There was a definite rivalry between the home & foreign born. Often this was translated into an antagonistic patriotism and into a silent but nonetheless present conspiracy to limit the inclusion of the newly immigrated into the clubs, synagogues, & communal board controlled by the older born Jewish element.

more dangerous & more basic was the split between those who felt a kinship of responsibility to fellow Jews the world over & those who had shrunk the idea of American isolationism and would have nothing of foreign relief or Zionism. The newer immigrant groups had still many a family tie in the old world. They brought in their baggage Israel's traditional love of Zion. of self-hating Anti-Semites and a small group of hypocritical fanatics

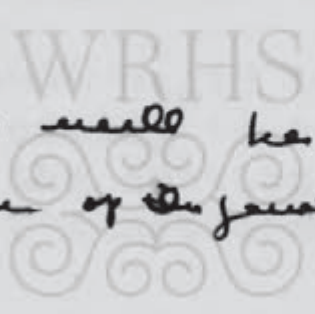





A practicing attorney for a half century, Mr. Haber is a partner in the firm of Burke, Haber and Berick and serves as a director of many important industrial companies.

It is most appropriate that in this—the first meeting of the National ADL Executive Committee in this area—we honor this modern giant of Jewish life who is one of this community's first citizens.
