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




I will use as my title on March 28 "Why I Am Glad Isaac Mayer Wise Is Not Alive Today."

Mr Shimon Peres, the Israel Defence Minister and member of the negotiating team, said "complete propo-sals" were given to Dr Kissinger. "We have concluded our proposals this afternoon.' -AP.

Paul Martin writes from Aswan: Dr Kissinger will decide whether the time has come to introduce his own proposals for a Sinai disengagement after his latest talks here with President Sadat. Although the gruelling session which has just wound up in Israel has shown few overt signs that the gap has narrowed, Egyptian officials' confidence has not been shaken.

Dr Kissinger went straight to President Sadat's villa after arriving in Aswan tonight to present him with Israel's proposals.

The Egyptians have made it known that they regard the present phase of the tough talking as primarily concerning the future of relations between Israel and the United States. They see themselves as the fulcrum in attempts by Dr Kissinger to exact from the Israelis a more flexible approach to the question of a new withdrawal on the Egyptian front.

"If the talks fail, it will create a divergence in American and Israeli policy in the Middle East for the first time since 1954", a senior Egyptian official said. "Failure would also bring the first test of American feelings about continuing support for Israel and the cost of this to the United States."

For the sake of completeness and accuracy it is sad to have to reprint the worst of his fulminations, and the sharp boundary he drew between him and his, and them and theirs:

If it were not for the reform congregations of New York and Philadelphia, there would be as much difference between the Hebrew population of those cities and of this great country as between us and the inhabitants of North Africa. It is next to an impossibility to associate or identify ourselves with that half-civilized orthodoxy which constitutes the bulk of population in those cities. We are Americans and they are not. . . We are Israelites of the nineteenth century and a free country and they gnaw the dead bones of past centuries. Besides the name we have very little in common with them. For the honor of American Judaism and our defense opposite the enlightened world, we do not want to have even that in common; we let them be Jews and we are the American Israelites. . . .²³

We had noted earlier that Wise disliked Yiddish and transmitted dislike to others after him. But it would not be wise to permit do to be a mere assertion. Here are some of his own words:


So they have now a jargon, without alphabet (they use the Hebrew) and without grammar, an obsolete and corrupt German-Hebrew-Slavonic excuse for a language.

From these harsh words he went on to say that both customs and language keep "them" strangers in the United States. Of course Christian fanaticism and "absolutism" had made them what the were, but this was only slight consolation.²⁴ He regarded the Yid press, of which there were then three journals in New York we thousands of readers, as doing harm to the Americanization of immigrants, "ever so many of them can read nothing besides to jargon literature."²⁵
