Dear Rabbi Silver:

As I told you over the telephone, your acceptance of the program appearance before the Kent Rotary Club on April 27 was wonderful news indeed!

By way of refreshing your memory, let me say a word about the background of the proposition. Iz Kastin, who is currently President of our Rotary Club, is a man who devotedly and enthusiastically, but always good humoredly makes evident his Judaic allegiance. The nature of his observations on many occasions have produced rollicking, good-natured exchanges which, nevertheless, have been in a kindly spirit.

We deeply respect Iz Kastin for his services as President of the Club. In that capacity, as in everything else he undertakes, he has given everything. Consequently, it seemed most appropriate to me that on this occasion we could undertake a fond deception which would solidify before the entire Club (100 fine persons including a large number of University personnel) the serious and substantial contribution Judaism has given to the world in which we live. It is quite possible that for a few brief moments at the beginning of the program portion of the meeting there would be a bit of humor, undoubtedly complicated by Iz's wonderment as to just why you were there. In any event, however, be assured that the major purpose, even though it starts as something of a recognition of Iz and his religion, ought to terminate in a meaningful discussion of Judaism. Obviously, the subject is huge in its scope and you should consider yourself at perfect liberty to select any one or combination of facets.

Rabbi Silver -2-March 22, 1965 Conspiratorial secrecy is an essence. Club bulletin will carry no advance announcement -although, of course, there will be ample succeeding publicity. Above all, Is must not know of these intents. One other person who does know is Dr. Ronald Roskens, Dean for Administration and Assistant to the President, who will be in touch with you with respect to providing you with the driving directions which you requested. Further, please do not hesitate to be in touch with him in any other way since he is in my confidence on this matter and I am dictating just hours in advance of departure for a supervisory visit to our AID Project in Tanzania. We have all heard so much about you that it will be a deep personal pleasure for me to meet you and to listen to you.
