Might it. therefore, be an idea to give this lecture at the Leo Baeck College? It is a lot to ask of you in view of the fact that the other topics have been prepared by you. In fact, if it is too much of an imposition do not hesitate to let me know. I am fascinated by the rise and fall of Moses in the midrash and would suggest as my topic "Moses and the Hungry Bird." I would deal with two Hellenistic midrashim about Moses and the ibis bird which suggest, at least to me, that Moses may have been venerated by an early syncretistic Judao-Egyptian cult. These bird midrashim are continued in changed form in the later tradition and I believe you would find it appropriate to this lecture. It is all part of a larger study on Moses in the midrash which I am beginning. I could suggest other topics, but this is the one I have been working on. If it doesn't meet your needs I will suggest another. I will be delighted to preach Saturday morning. Adele and I look forward to having lunch with you. DR. ARYEH SAMUEL DORFLER was Senior Lecturer at the Leo Baeck College from its foundation until his death on the 26th December, 1968, about two months after his seventieth birthday. He was one of the most respected scholars in contemporary Progressive Judaism. During his years as a lecturer in Talmud, his warm personality influenced a whole generation of Progressive Rabbis, who still think of him with gratitude and affection.

Dr. Dorfler was born at Stryj in Austria but later took Israeli nationality. After leaving Gymnasium, he entered the Berlin University, where he received his Doctorate of Philosophy, Magnum cum laude.

He then studied at the Hildesheimer Rabbiner Seminar and afterwards at the Hochschule fuer die Wissenschaft des Judentum, where he received his Rabbinical Diploma.

In 1940 he went to Israel, where he worked till 1954 at the Gymnasium in Herzlia, Tel Aviv as the leading teacher of the upper forms. He was especially interested in those students who were concerned with the Humanities and, as a result, many of his students are now leading professors at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and in the U.S.A.

DR. DANIEL JEREMY SILVER is Rabbi of the Temple in Cleveland, Ohio. He has lectured and taught at various institutions of higher learning in the United States and is the Adjunct Professor of Religion at Case Western Reserve University. Dr. Silver has combined a distinguished career in the pulpit with creative scholarship which has brought him recognition in many quarters. Some of his books are Maimonides and Maimonidean Criticism, Judaism and Ethics and text books in the field of Religion now under preparation for use by University Students. Dr. Silver has published articles in the field of Theology, Ethics, Rabbinic Studies, Jewish and general history. For many years he served as editor of the Journal of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

In giving the Dorfler lecture, Dr. Silver plans to look at Rabbinic texts particularly the Midrashim which deal with the rise and fall of Moses as viewed within a certain stream of the Rabbinic tradition. Dr. Silver's concern places the Rabbinic tradition into the cultural framework of its time and will also present us with Hellenistic texts.

Dr. Silver was ordained by the Hebrew Union College in 1952 and holds a number of academic degrees including the degree of doctor of Philosophy. He is one of the most active clergymen in the United States and deeply involved in communal work as well as in the academic community.




