

Talked with Morris Levinson about the possibility of his arranging a meeting with New York Federation leaders to discuss a grant to the NFJC. I reminded him that Rabbi Silver had tried to reach him last week before he left the country to see whether something could be set up during the period when DJS will be in New York City in connection with the Foundation's review by the LCBC (January 22nd).

Mr. Levinson commented that we were the third agency which this week has called upon him for similar purposes; that as a member of the Federation's Distribution Committee he felt that he could not take such a step, but that he would be glad to speak up and vote for it if and when the matter came before the Distribution Committee. He expressed grave doubt as to the possibility of the Federation including any additional beneficiaries at this time since its fund raising has been on a plateau and falls far short of the needs of the current agencies.

After some further conversation, Mr. Levinson agreed to discuss the matter with Rabbi Silver when they next get together. He indicated that he might not be able to attend the LCBC meetings as he originally hoped and that he may be away from the city until the middle of February.

RE: Telephone Conversation with Aaron Goldman, Washington

Spoke with Mr. Goldman following receipt of his letter of January 8th to Rabbi Silver in which he explained the feeling that it is premature to undertake discussions about including the NFJC in the Washington UJA.

After some review of the Washington UJA situation, he agreed that there might be some point in having some discussions among a few people as a preliminary to any formal approach to the UJA. He felt that Isadore Breslau is a key person who must be persuaded before there can be any movement. When I told him about Meyer Brissman's suggestion that a few individuals undertake to solicit by letter in behalf of the NFJC, he admitted that this metic might be somewhat productive but he was quite unenthusiastic about becoming involved in this way.

At the close of our conversation, he asked that I send him a list of the welfare funds in major cities presently making allocations to the NFJC, and he agreed to be helpful in bringing together a group of men for a discussion after the end of February.

I was glad to have the opportunity to talk with you on the phone today. As I explained, Rabbi Silver is out of the country and will be back the end of next week. But he was hoping that you could arrange for a few men to get together with him in Washington either January 23rd or February 5th to discuss a) inclusion of the NFJC in the Washington UJA and b) such other measures for securing financial support pending our admission as a beneficiary of the UJA.

I very much appreciate your time and views. While I can understand that we may not be able to succeed this year in getting into the UJA, there would certainly be some value in talking the matter through with several interested people who could help advise us as to what steps can be taken as well as what we might do to obtain some funds from Washingtonians until such time as we get into the UJA.

### NOTES FOR PRESENTATION TO LCBC

January 22, 1968, 8:30 a.m.

The LCBC expects us to present the following in our initial presentation:

- a) The major items in the agency's recent financial experience and the budget estimates in relation to the program, emphasizing the changes from preceding years and the reasons for them;
- b) The agency's income and sources of financing, particularly the amounts to be sought from welfare funds and the method of apportioning requests;
- Implications of the June (Israel) emergency and its aftermath;
- d) Answers to the various specific questions posed in the attached LCBC document of May, 1967.

It is suggested that our initial presentation be confined to  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour if possible, after which the floor will be opened for discussion.

 a) Our presentation might start with a quick summary of the areas of program activity as contained in our Statement (copy attached).

The agency has concentrated on those programs which it has been able to initiate and control since thus far its efforts at cooperative planning and coordination for the field as a whole could not be productive without the ability to grant funds to various agencies to further their particular projects.

The 1967 fiscal experience was affected significantly by several factors:

Income: During first half of year lacked lay leadership to mount fund-raising efforts from non-welfare fund sources; thereafter, Israel emergency reduced the opportunity for intensive solicitation.

Expenditures: In the face of uncertain income, agency curtailed its grants and did not fill the professional staff position.

Nevertheless, programmatically, the year was marked by significant activity and accomplishment.

Projections for 1968: Referred to in Statement under "Program Priorities".

b) Financing for 1968: NFJC is seeking approximately \$100,000 more than it obtained in 1967, with \$35,000 hopefully to come from welfare funds, \$45,000 from other foundations (largely for Research Study on the Teaching of Judaica on the American Campus); and the rest from individuals and organizations. (See p. 5 of our Statement)

We intend to approach the LCBC communities for the bulk of the projected \$35,000 increase from welfare funds by apportioning the amount through community quotas. (If pressed for examples, might refer to material in Philip Bernstein's memorandum which suggests a range of increases from \$500 to

\$7,500 for LCBC cities. It is based on Cleveland's leading allotment of \$15,000. Actually, we're suggesting that even Cleveland up its allocation somewhat.)

- c) <u>Implications of Israel emergency</u>: Already referred to it briefly. But we probably should make some further comment about its possible effect on fund-raising both within the welfare funds as well as in our other approaches.
  - d) Questions included in LCBC Document of May, 1967

### Financial Status

- 1. The NFJC's present financial status is better than it has been for some years due to unspent funds because of an unfilled professional position. This, however, is poor economy. The bank loan of \$12,500 was reduced in 1967 to \$10,000 and will be further reduced as payments on allocations from 1966 and prior years are received. (These total \$5,100.)
- 2) In 1967 the response from welfare funds for accelerated cash payments has been very favorable, considerably better than in previous years. At the end of the year 79% of the current allocations had been paid as compared with 76% at the end of 1966. But a larger number of welfare funds had failed to notify NFJC of their 1967 allocation by the end of December, having been delayed by the additional IEF campaign.

### Reassessment

- 3) Our Statement to the LCBC contains material on two items referred to in this question (local community cultural planning, and teaching of Jewish Studies in colleges and universities). On the others, see #4 and #5 below.
- 4) The NFJC is still eager to develop a program for improving the financing of the cultural field as a whole, and is prepared to explore with the LCBC some productive approaches including the possibility of joint appeal to welfare funds. But in the light of the rather inconclusive session with the LCBC in January, 1967 the NFJC has had no encouragement from this source to pursue the matter further. The NFJC does not have expertise in this area. Since its specific proposal for a joint cultural appeal failed to receive broad approval by the LCBC, we hoped that the LCBC would offer some concrete suggestions as to how to proceed along other lines. This was based on the assumption that the LCBC was in agreement in principle about the need for some significant improvement in the financing of the cultural field as a whole and in bringing together the various agencies into some more cooperative and cohesive relationship.
- 5) a) The NFJC continues to search for an effective means to achieve greater coordination and joint planning among the Jewish cultural agencies. To this end it is planning to reactivate the Council of Jewish Cultural Agencies in the early Spring to review with them various possibilities for a meaningful program. It is convinced, however, that no substantial progress will be made until such time as it can hold out the prospect of providing financial assistance to help implement plans and programs recommended by the Council. Along these lines we would welcome suggestions from the LCBC.

b) There is genuine doubt as to the value or purpose of the Foundation's preparing further "analytical reports" to welfare funds on the national cultural agencies until such time as it has the means of demonstrating its ability to financially assist them in their work. None of the agencies primarily devoted to cultural work is receiving adequate financial support from the welfare funds and no matter how the Foundation sets forth a particular agency's needs or potential contribution, it is unlikely to materially improve the situation. If the NFJC were in a position to exercise some leadership with the agencies based on the ability to help them financially, it might be in a position to suggest various changes in structure, scope, emphasis, etc. To make such recommendations at this time to welfare funds might be viewed by the agencies as endangering what little they are now receiving from the welfare funds and could destroy the possibility of the Foundation's effective work with them in the future.

In our judgment the Foundation's ability to bring about needed changes within and between the cultural agencies can come about only after a period of working together in a cooperative planning and coordinating relationship in which the Foundation can be of some help financially. The distribution of analytical and critical reports to the welfare funds at this juncture would be of little constructive service.

6) We have been actively seeking to engage a staff member to assist the Executive Director. Commencing with the middle of January, 1968 we have secured the part-time services of Miss Miriam Ephraim until such time as a full-time staff person can be found. Miss Ephraim, who before her retirement was Director of Program Services of the JWB, is one of the outstanding Jewish communal workers of this generation. She will be working on the Fellowship Program and with the Council of Jewish Cultural Agencies. The Foundation is also looking for a qualified person to direct the research study of Judaica in the colleges and universities.

### NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR JEWISH CULTURE STATEMENT TO LARGE CITY BUDGETING CONFERENCE

January 22, 1968

The National Foundation for Jewish Culture was created in 1960 under the sponsorship of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. With the general purpose of serving as a central focus for the Jewish cultural field, it was given a broad and comprehensive mandate, including: the enrichment of the programs in the field by strengthening the existing Jewish cultural agencies; providing a better understanding of the field of Jewish culture and its needs; and initiating such new programs as required.

In its brief existence the Foundation has compiled a notable record of accomplishment and has clearly demonstrated the validity for its establishment. It has provided evidence of the considerable potential which exists for dynamic Jewish cultural growth; and it has revealed that with increased understanding and support America can become a truly creative center of Jewish cultural life.

### AREAS OF ACTIVITY

In pursuit of its objectives the Foundation engages in a variety of programs and activities, a few of which are cited below:

Clearing House and "Central Address" for Jewish Culture -- The Foundation has become increasingly recognized and used as a resource for information and advice on Jewish cultural matters. In this way it renders service to individuals, organizations and communities; channels matters to the appropriate cultural agencies; determines needs and encourages the development of programs to meet them. Having a comprehensive overview of the field, it is in a position to assess the problems as well as the requirements of the cultural enterprise as a whole.

Interpretation of the Cultural Field -- Through a variety of approaches, including bulletins and other publications, personal appearances before federations, and addresses to audiences in many cities, the Foundation has endeavored to describe and interpret the work and needs of the various cultural agencies as well as of the total field of Jewish culture. It has sought to provide the basis for an increased appreciation of the role which a knowledge of our cultural heritage can play in the meaningful Jewish survival in America. It encourages exposure to Jewish scholars through their publications as well as in lectures so that there can be a wider dissemination of Jewish knowledge and culture on the American scene.

Aid to National Jewish Cultural Agencies -- The Foundation has made subventions to a number of the national agencies for special research, for publication of scholarly works, and for the preservation of archival materials. It has also provided professional service and specialized consultative assistance with particular problems. It has tried to help them to interpret their work to the local communities and in their efforts to obtain a greater measure of support from welfare funds.

Developing American Jewish Scholars -- One of the Foundation's major achievements has been its program of assistance to students preparing themselves for careers in Jewish scholarship. Recognizing the desperate shortage of properly trained scholars for research, university teaching, writing, archival work and similar activities, the Foundation in 1961 initiated a program of Scholarships, Fellowships, and Grants-in-Aid. Despite limited funds, the Foundation's program has been immensely productive. It has had a profound effect on the encouragement of gifted young students to pursue advanced Jewish studies, and with each succeeding year the number of highly promising applicants increases. Thus far the Foundation has awarded 130 Pre-Doctoral grants aggregating more than \$265,000. Many of these Fellows have completed their training and are currently teaching in thirty leading American colleges and universities. A number have already made significant contributions in writing and research, and it can be expected that the leading Judaic scholars of the immediate future will come from their ranks.

It is regrettable that a far larger number of talented and promising students could not be helped by the Foundation because of insufficient funds. For every successful candidate the Foundation has had to turn away four other meritorious applicants, some of whom were not able to pursue their Jewish studies and went into other fields where more ample financial assistance was available.

Grants to Established Scholars -- The encouragement of creative work by established Jewish scholars has been another area of Foundation programming. Increasingly, academicians, researchers and writers are applying to the Foundation for assistance to enable them to carry out a special project in the Judaic field which they would not otherwise be able to do while working full time. Thirty-five such grants have already been made by the Foundation which have resulted in some significant additions to the American Jewish scholarly product.

Here, again, so much more could be accomplished for the contribution of original research and valuable publication if a modest additional amount were available for such grants.

Work with Colleges and Universities -- The Foundation's involvement in the academic world has brought it into close contact with the major colleges and universities. It is consulted frequently on such matters as curricula for courses of Jewish studies, personnel for teaching positions, establishment of Chairs of Judaica, setting up libraries, grants resources for graduate students, etc. The remarkable proliferation of courses of Jewish Studies in colleges and universities throughout the country has created the need to devote even more of its staff service to these institutions of higher learning. Because of the growing importance of this development and the vastly increased number of Jewish students on the American campus for whom these programs of Jewish Studies may have such significance, the Foundation regards this as one of its priority areas for the immediate future.

Demonstration Programs for Local Communities -- From time to time the Foundation has undertaken to develop pilot projects for adaptation by local communities. In the final analysis it is only as the cultural product is used by people in their daily living that it will take on meaning and substance. A predominantly college-educated generation of Jews can be reached by cultural programs of authentic quality and excellence, and it becomes increasingly

clear that the organized Jewish communities must assume the initiative in planning for this aspect of their people's needs fully as much as in the areas of "health and welfare". The Foundation, therefore, has been experimenting with new types of programs, such as the Scholar-in-Residence and lecture series by distinguished Jewish scholars that can have broad application by many communities. It is also eager to undertake a few demonstration efforts in developing community-wide cultural planning bodies for comprehensive local programming on a year-round basis.

Coordination and the Council of Jewish Cultural Agencies -- As has been reported previously to the LCBC, the Council of Jewish Cultural Agencies which was established within the framework of the Foundation, has not functioned for several years after its initial recommendations for projects could not be implemented because of the lack of funds. It has been felt that little prospect for fruitful work by this body can be anticipated until such time as there is greater likelihood for funding at least some of the programs which it would recommend. The Council still has the potential for making a substantial contribution to the field through a pooling and exchange of ideas, assistance in establishing priorities, joint planning, and cooperative effort on major programs. Although the specific proposal presented by the Foundation in 1967 for joint fund raising and allocations for the cultural agencies failed to obtain any clear-cut consensus from the LCBC, there needs to be further search for appropriate measures to deal with the critical underfinancing of the cultural field. Even a modest increase would provide some basis for reviving the Council and bringing together all the interested cultural agencies into a cooperative planning process.

### PROGRAM PRIORITIES FOR 1968

In addition to its ongoing activities, the Foundation in 1968 will seek to emphasize several projects for special attention. These include the following:

Research Study on the Teaching of Judaica in American Colleges and Universities -- Sound planning for the future development of Jewish studies in institutions of higher learning requires that a comprehensive, indepth examination of the field be undertaken as soon as possible. The remarkable proliferation of these courses has presented many questions and problems which demand careful assessment before appropriate measures can be developed to deal with them. The Foundation's intimate involvement in this field makes it the logical sponsor for such a study. It is therefore proceeding to approach various foundations for the funding of the study which it estimates will require about 18 months with an expenditure of approximately \$80,000. While it is planned that a Study Director will be engaged to conduct the project, the Foundation staff will be available for various ancillary services. The findings of this study should have important implications not only for the Foundation's future activity in this field but for the whole development of the teaching of Judaica in American colleges and universities.

Academic Advisory Council -- Late in 1967 the Foundation appointed an Academic Advisory Council composed of fourteen of America's outstanding Jewish professors to help guide the Foundation in matters pertaining to the field of scholarship and to its work with the colleges and universities. The Council will help screen applications for grants and it will probably submit

suggestions to the Foundation on such other matters which in its judgment will advance American Jewish scholarship. The creation of the Council will further strengthen the Foundation's competence in this vital area and should serve as a valuable base for cooperative efforts in other phases of the Foundation's work.

Professional Association of Jewish Scholars -- With the growing number of professors of Jewish studies there is an increased recognition of the need for a suitable forum in which to exchange ideas and experiences as well as develop improved methods and standards for the teaching of Judaica on the American campus. The Foundation, in response to this need, has been working with a group of academicians to explore the possibilities and to consider various specific proposals. Because the establishment of such an instrument would be of importance in the development of a profession of Jewish scholars, the Foundation will continue to give this matter its close attention during the coming year. The newly formed Academic Advisory Council will probably be asked by the Foundation to lend assistance in this task.

Expanded Grants Program -- During the coming year it is essential that the Foundation increase the number of its awards both at the pre-doctoral level as well as to established scholars. The gap between available university teaching posts in Judaica and the number of qualified candidates is widening and it is ironic that academic institutions are vainly pleading for competent Jewish scholars. As a result, some colleges have begun to employ people who are poorly trained and inadequately prepared to teach Jewish studies. This threatens to undermine much of what the Foundation has so painstakingly been building, and can seriously affect the standards of quality and excellence which we have sought to associate with the teaching of Jewish studies. It requires many years to develop a first-rate Jewish scholar, and it is vital that the Jewish community not let promising students drift off to other fields. The Foundation intends to make a determined effort to secure additional funds for this program so that more meritorious applicants can be given the means to continue their preparation for a career in Jewish scholarship.

Similarly, aid to creative independent scholars to enable them to conduct research, and to write and publish their works, must be increased as more of them turn to the Foundation. It would be unfortunate if the impression should grow in scholarly circles that there is little point in applying to the NFJC. It is essential that scholars secure the image of an organized Jewish community which is interested in their continued creativity and is prepared to assist them in their efforts.

### FINANCING

Jewish Welfare Funds -- The basic financing of the Foundation continues to come from Jewish welfare funds which in 1967 accounted for 83% of the Agency's total income. While the number of allocating communities continues to increase (83 in 1967), there has been no substantial aggregate increase in allocations. Three LCBC cities still do not include the Foundation as a beneficiary (Denver, St. Louis and Washington, D. C.). In 1967 two more LCBC cities (Baltimore and Boston) made additional allocations earmarke for the Foundation's Grants Program.

In order to make possible the minimum advance toward the immediate program objectives for 1968, the Foundation is seeking an increase of approximately \$35,000 from welfare funds above the 1967 estimated allotments. Inasmuch as the basic operating budget, exclusive of grants and subventions, is projected for \$83,000, every increase in welfare fund allocations will be applied to the Grants Program. The additional \$35,000 sought would represent only a minor increase for each of the LCBC communities.

Other Financing -- It is recognized that the attainment of the Foundation's program goals requires major funding from sources outside the welfare fund framework. In 1968 the Foundation will be addressing itself to the development of several major financing possibilities:

- approaches to individuals and foundations in the New York City area;
- solicitation of selected individuals in a limited number of cities for gifts toward a \$1,000,000 Fellowship Endowment;
- 3) gifts to a general Endowment Fund; and
- contributions on an annual basis toward the funding of earmarked projects.

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### Suggested Questions for Review of 1968 Budget

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### NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR JEWISH CULTURE

The basic questions for all agencies about organization, finances, and program and activities in 1967 and as projected for 1968, as noted in the attached "Background Materials Regarding Cooperating Agencies," are to be covered fully. In addition, the following specific questions are suggested to the National Foundation for Jewish Culture in preparation for review of its 1968 budget:

### Financial Status

- 1. What is NFJC's present financial status? How is the general fund deficit carried, and what are the present expectations regarding its elimination?
- 2. What has been the response to NFJC's request for accelerated cash payments to avert the need for bank loans?

### Reassessment

- 3. What further steps have been taken, or are under consideration, to implement the findings of NFJC's internal reassessment process, including new emphases on the interrelationships among the cultural agencies, improved financing for the field, local community cultural planning, and services to colleges and universities which have programs of Jewish studies?
- 4. Specifically, in the perspective of the present needs and trends in programming for all agencies engaged significantly in Jewish cultural work, what further explorations has NFJC conducted of a possible joint appeal to welfare funds, and other possible improvements in financing?
- 5. What is NFJC's current thinking regarding: a) the achievement of more extensive coordination and joint planning among the Jewish cultural agencies? b) analytical reports to welfare funds on the agencies?
- 6. What progress has there been in augmenting professional staff, as projected for 1967?



### Sources of Income

7. What does NFJC see as potential sources of income for the Jewish cultural field and for its own activities? What, in NFJC's view, are the relative responsibilities of welfare funds and of other income sources, such as foundations and individual donors, in financing: a) Jewish cultural work? b) the services of NFJC?

Following our conversation yesterday I chatted with Phil Bernstein and James Rice about the approach we should take to secure an improvement in our Chicago allocation. The suggestions that emerged point to the advisability of your talking in the first instance to Morris Glasser (You may remember that you met him at the LCBC meeting last week -- he is chairman of the LCBC.) Glasser is the immediate Past President of the Chicago Federation, and the suggestion is that you ask him for his advice as to how we should best proceed to bring Chicago up to a level commensurate with that of Cleveland, Detroit, Boston, Baltimore, etc.; that while what we are seeking from Chicago this year is a doubling of its \$7,500 allocation, this in reality is a minuscule amount in the goal of over \$10 million for the 1968 campaign. You might indicate that Phil Klutznick is a member of the Foundation Board and that you had thought of discussing the matter with him but that before doing so, you wanted to get Glasser's counsel. Glasser's address and telephone number are 69 West Washington Street, Chicago 60602 - 312-236-9500.

In the light of what develops in your conversation with Morris Glasser, you can better determine what approach should be made to Phil Klutznick. However, a letter could go forward to him explaining what we are seeking and asking for an opportunity to discuss it with him either by phone or in a personal meeting.

Jim Rice has suggested that we could mention both to Morris and Phil that we have discussed the matter with him and that he is certainly accepting of our objectives, and would like to be helpful. He questioned whether it was realistic to expect a doubling of our current allocation, but he agreed that Chicago is decidedly out of line as compared with some of the other cities cited above.

Please let me know how you would like to proceed with Chicago so that we will know what to do at this end.

Samuel J. Silberman and David G. Salten (New York Federation)

The NFJC was created in 1959 by action of the General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, representing the federations of the United States and Canada.

In the ensuing eight years, the federations have been providing annual allocations to the Foundation which in 1967 totalled \$98,000.

Almost half of the Jewish population of the United States resides in New York City from which the NFJC has received no financial assistance.

The Foundation has rendered service to individuals and institutions in New York representing a very considerable proportion of its work. Among its current applications for grants are requests from 43 individuals, either affiliated with institutions in New York or native New Yorkers who are attending universities elsewhere. Thirty-one applications for predoctoral grants and twelve applications from independent scholars are from New Yorkers.

The Foundation has sponsored alertness credit courses for New York City public school teachers which have been attended by close to 1,000 teachers.

It has enabled a significant number of students to prepare themselves for teaching of Judaica in local colleges and universities.

It has made possible the preparation of studies and publications that are utilized by people in the New York area.

It has worked with numerous agencies and cultural organizations in the furtherance of Jewish cultural programs utilized by the New York population.

Its scholars have appeared as lecturers throughout the New York area.

The Foundation has received no financial support from organized Jewish sources in New York City for any of these activities. In effect, the federations of other communities are paying for services to New York.

The NPJC would prefer not to develop costly fund raising apparatus to solicit financial support in New York City. It would rather use its limited staff for substantive work. A modest annual grant of \$50,000 from New York would permit the Foundation to meet some of the more pressing obligations in this area.

My suggestion is that you make formal application to him, and that you supply him with the necessary date within the next fortnight. On the basis of my discussion with him. I would suggest that you cut down the total cost from \$80,000 to \$60,000, and that you apply for \$30,000 and pledge to match the grant from the Marrill Trust with an equal amount. 1. Board Meeting -- I have been doing a lot of thinking and exploring following our discussion about the Board Meeting. I am increasingly concerned about the date of October 6th, particularly since you are thinking of extending the meeting through dinner and early evening. I am sure that we will be subject to considerable critcism since this will be erev Sukkot. Apart from possible objection of your rabbinical colleagues on the Board I anticipate a problem in connection with people who will want to be home for that evening, and who might object to riding back to New York Cityfrom our meeting.

If you feel that Sunday would be the best day of the week for such a meeting I see no other time prior to October 6th except September 8th. If we go beyond October 6th we would have to skip the following Sunday as well because of the holiday complication and that would bring us to October 20th which might be regarded as pretty late.

Because of the date complication I have not yet written to Salo Baron. As soon as we can nail this down I shall write to him.

As for place, I have been checking a variety of places but have nothing nailed down. This too will be somewhat dependent on the date. Thus far I have not been able to get anything on the Sarah Lawrence situation. Country clubs are not interested in making available their facilities on a Sunday which evidently is one of the busiest days of the week for them. Considering the need to have a business session in the morning, I think it will be rather tricky business to try to meet in two different places. Would you be willing to settle for something at Columbia or Barnard for the full day?

On Program, it occurred to me that we could have a session "Frontiers of Jewish Scholarship" - developments and needs in such fields as Bible, History, Philosophy, Sociology, etc. We could invite a person from each of these fields to talk from ten to fifteen minutes, emphasizing some interesting new trends, findings, new areas, etc.

I shall await your comments on date, place, etc. before I proceed further.

2. Application to Merrill Trust -- I am enclosing a copy of Milton Konvitz's letter regarding our application for a grant for our projected Study. I have tentatively recast our budget in accordance with his suggestion by reducing the total from \$80,000 to \$60,000 and I am enclosing a copy for your comments. I believe you have the original. If you are in agreement with him about the approach I would like to get up a covering letter of request so that we can get it off to Dean Thomas this week.

- 3. Study Director -- On Friday I interviewed Dr. Irving Graeber. I enclose some material on him. He is 49 years old and currently is free lancing and preparing a book on Jews in the United States. He is a pretty knowledgable person and is a thorough researcher. My one concern about him is that he is inclined to be dogmatic and argumentative and I wonder whether he can discipline himself so that as an investigator he seeks information rather than spouts his own opinion. He would require some fairly close supervision on this score. He is very much interested in the opening and would be willing to work for \$12,000 a year which is a lot less than we had budgeted. He is available immediately. I have asked him to go over our prospectus and to talk with me again this week about how he would visualize the Study design. Meanwhile, I am trying to get definite word from Paul Ritterband and I have been checking out two or three other possibilities. Let's agree that we will select someone no later than this month.
- 4. Note from Felixson on Los Angeles (copy enclosed) -- This sounds better.
  Let's hope the results prove to be as encouraging.

Dear Jim:

Thank you for your recent letter advising us of the opportunity to seek reconsideration of our reduced allocation through your Special Appeals Committee. It is encouraging to know that the matter will be reviewed and we are hopeful that it will receive careful and sympathetic consideration.

As we have indicated in our previous communications to the Chicago Jewish Welfare Fund, the maintenance budget of the National Foundation for Jewish Culture depends entirely on allocations from local Jewish welfare funds. The Foundation has maintained a scrupulously tight rein on its housekeeping operations which have been most modest throughout the seven years of the Agency's existence. Despite endorsement by the Large City Budgeting Conference of an expanded budget to carry forward much needed program, the Foundation has avoided incurring additional expenditures until there was assurance of increased income. In its financial operations, the Foundation has always endeavored to act cautiously and responsibly to avoid insofar as possible deficits and indebtedness.

Nevertheless, there is an irreducible minimum beyond which it is impossible to function. In a year when the Foundation had every reason to expect at least a modest increase in welfare fund allocations, a 25% reduction in the allotment from Chicago has accentuated a serious problem at a time when our belt is already tightened to the point of strangulation. Actually, some of the Foundation's essential functions have had to be curtailed, and we have even postponed filling a much-needed professional staff position to assist our Executive Director because of the stringent financial situation. Obviously, the healthy survival of an agency cannot be achieved in this way.

An equally serious aspect of a reduced allocation by the Chicago Jewish Welfare Fund is the dangerous effect it may have on other communities. Already Cleveland, which makes an annual allocation of twice the amount of Chicago's former level of support, is concerned about continuing what it regards as a fair allotment if other major cities are going to lag far behind. A reduction in Chicago's allocation could be disastrous in leading the way for others to emulate your example.

Mr. James P. Rice August 29, 1967 At this time it is of urgent importance that we strengthen the Tewish cultural bonds of our people and help them find the kind of identification and satisfaction which exposure to authentic Jewish ideas and intellectual contributions can substantially stimulate. This is the time when it is imperative that we intensify our collective efforts in the advancement of those programs that will fortify our sense of pride and security in the contribution which Jewish cultural effort makes to the larger society. The Chicago area has benefitted directly from the Foundation's work during the past year in a number of ways. An award of a Fellowship grant was made to a young Chicago scholar to complete his doctorate in the field of Tewish studies so that he can enter upon an academic career that will ultimately lead to creative effort in the service of the Jewish group. During the year the Foundation has been in frequent consultation with several universities in the Chicago area as well as with professors of Jewish studies on a variety of projects that will undoubtedly redound to the benefit of your community. Throughout the year we are called upon by individuals, organizations and educational institutions in Greater Chicago for various services. And in a broader sense, Chicago's stake in an effective Foundation is bound up with that of communities throughout the land. The dividends in the form of books and publications, research. college courses, lectures, preparation of academicians, strengthening of national cultural agencies -- all represent a generous return for your modest investment. We earnestly hope that in your review of your financial situation and your reappraisal of the Foundation's situation, you will find it possible at least to restore the cut. We respectfully remind you that our original request was for an increase that would include some support for our Grants Program which thus far Chicago has not assisted. We are still eager for an opportunity to meet personally with you and your leadership to discuss this, and our President, Rabbi Daniel Silver, and our Executive Director, Harry Barron, are prepared to come to Chicago at your convenience. Meanwhile, we shall be pleased to furnish any additional data desired by your Committee to help it reach a knowledgeable decision. I do hope we may hear favorably from you in the near future. 

This is a quickie but I shall not be in the office tomorrow (have to go to Richmond to speak to their Postgraduate Young Leaders Group and to work out arrangements for their next Scholar-in-Residence program). So, I'll try to dash this off to you.

First, Salo Baron phoned here today, obviously miffed that he had not heard from us. (I had understood that you were going to write him and smooth things out.) I explained that we ran into time problems and had to telescope our sessions, hoping that we shall have another opportunity to have his paper presented. He made it clear that he does not want us to publish it; that he wants us to return it to him. He needs to be mollified, and I think you'll have to drop him a warm note.

I got wind last week that Leon Jick, contrary to his promise to me, was approaching people to plan for a conference of Professors of Judaica, and when one of the people reminded him that the Foundation is deeply involved in this program and plans to hold such a conference, he was supposed to have shrugged it off. I therefore wrote him a sharp note last week asking how come. Today he phoned me while in New York and asked for an opportunity to get together.

We met for an hour during whichtime it became clear that he had been making some approached to a number of people (I know of at least two: Janowsky and Neusner). He admits to some four or five. The purpose, he claims, was to sound them out about the value of such a conference as well as program suggestions. He says that he has a grant to set up such a conference and from an institutional standpoint he must do so. But, he insists, he wants to work with me and asked me to serve on an Advisory Committee. I pointed out that this is not a personal matter; the Foundation is committed to this enterprise (went on record as favoring it almost two years ago) and that we also have some understandings with the Hebrev Culture Foundation. I again pointed out the greater value of waiting until some of the findings emerge from our Study. He tried to minimize the significance of the study and felt that there could be another conference a year later.

We went 'round and 'round on this and he finally agreed to hold off for a bit in the hope that we might come up with some solution. He claims not to want a hassle and divisiveness but it is clear that he is determined to have a Conference. He would prefer not to get involved with other organizations like the H C F, but he might be willing to make it a partnership between Brandeis (Lown School), NFJC and perhaps Hillel (although here again he is not too happy to share with them.)

D.J.Silver - 2 -Oct. 16, 1968 A . . . . . . . . . At the end of our conversation, he was beginning to make sounds like he might be willing to hold off on a Conference until XXXXXXXXX September, 1969 on the assumption that out Study will be completed by the end of the Summer. But he still wants us to cansider an earlier arrangement. I indicated that our Agademic Advisory Council will be meeting later this Fall and has this on the agenda. Frankly, I have grave question about his assurances and protestations of cooperation. He sounds as though he is under some pressure to produce a Conference. I wouldn't be at all surprised if his angel"is Phil Lown. Now comes the more ugly aspects of inter-organizational conflict. It could het messy. What do you suggest? Jeny,

I am assuming that you have been informed about the matter of the new Canadian tax regulations and their effect on the transmittal of funds by Canadian federations to the National Foundation for Jewish Culture. We are still hopeful that some means can be found whereby this Foundation can continue to obtain direct financial support from the organized Jewish community. Until such time as this can be effectuated, however, the Board of the Foundation has agreed to the suggestion made by members of the Canadian Foundation for Jewish Culture that we authorize the Canadian Foundation to serve as our agent in the disbursement of funds in Canada and to advise those Canadian sommunities which make allocations to us to transmit our allotments to the Canadian Foundation.

We are prepared to enter into such an arrangement with the Canadian Foundation on the basis of the following understandings:

- 1. Disbursement of NPJC funds for Canadian grants awards will be made only upon specific authorization by the NPJC.
- 2. All other expenditures of NFJC funds will be made only upon approval of the NFJC.
- NFJC funds disbursed by the Canadian Foundation for purposes other than grants subventions will be repaid by the Canadian Foundation to the NFJC grants fund.

If the above arrangement is acceptable to the Canadian Foundation for Jewish Culture, will you please be good enough to notify us officially so that we can in turn inform the Canadian federations. We hope that this arrangement will prove helpful to our common purposes and result in the furtherance of useful and creative Jewish cultural work in Canada.

We received today the enclosed copy of a resolution adopted at a recent Board meeting of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Indianapolis. We might want to make use of this in connection with our LCBC presentation. I am also enclosing a copy of a letter which I received from Alan Kandel of Detroit which also has bearing on our LCBC appearance.

As you will see from my note to Rabbi Irving Cohen, I have set up a session with him in Atlanta for Saturday, November 15th at 11:30 a.m.

On the Academic Advisory Council matter, we have now heard from Twersky that he cannot attend a meeting on December 16th, but will try to make a meeting on December 23rd. The only other member not heard from is Moshe Greenberg, and we have now been advised that he is in Israel and will be there for the rest of the year. We now have three members of the Council who are unavailable to us this year, and I again raise the question about substitutions or alternates. I am also beginning to wonder whether in the light of the interruption in the direction of our study we should postpone the meeting of the AAC. One of the things we were going to do with them was to submit our study design on the assumption that it would have gone through some process by the Technical Advisory Committee. That now seems out of the question in the next several weeks. Let's talk about this soon.

You offered to be of help to us and I am not losing any time in following up on it. There are two matters where your assistance would be particularly appreciated:

- (1) We have not yet heard from the Jewish Community Council of Mashville regarding our 1968 allocation. Our official request was for \$250.00. If that can be improved on, we would be delighted.
- (2) The need for additional scholarships and fellowships is most urgent and we are asking friends to sponsor individual grants wherever possible. The size of these pre-doctoral fellowships varies from \$3,000 to \$5,000. It would be lovely if you and some of your friends could underwrite a scholarship for the coming year. It is a splendid investment for insuring a creatively American Jewish future.

A major step towards strengthening of credit courses in Jewish studies at American colleges and universities as well as coordinating the efforts of Jewish organizations in this field is expected as the result of a nation-wide survey being undertaken by the National Foundation for Jewish Culture, it was announced by Dr. Daniel Jeremy Silver of Cleveland, President, of the organization.

The growing concern of the American Jewish community over the alienation of Jewish college youth is being countered in part by the promotion of such courses.

At the 36th General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federation and Welfare Funds in 1967, Dr. Bernard Martin, Abba Hillel Silver Professor of Jewish Studies and Chairman, Department of Religion, Case-Western Reserve University. went so far as to declare, " The need for providing more opportunities for study of Judaism is obvious. Every major university in the country ought ideally to have a chair of Jewish Studies. To be sure, the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations for more than forty years have sought to provide instruction in Judaism on the campus, and their efforts have been very significant and, in many cases, quite successful.

"It must, however, be recognized that Hillel necessarily works in the fact of certain built-in and virtually insuperable obstacles. On those campuses (and they are the vast majority) where Hillel courses are not given any academic credit, students simply have no time for them; they are far too burdened with the requirements of their regular curriculum. Furthermore, non-accredited courses that are not taught by full members of the university faculty lack academic prestige. Beyond this, in the nature of the case they often demand little in the way of serious study or sustained intellectual discipline."

Academic work in Judaism has grown at a swift rate in American institutions of higher learning since World War II, ranging from single courses at some colleges to undergraduate majors and Ph.D. sequences at such schools as Harvard, Yale, Wisconsin, and U.C.L.A. It is estimated that at least several hundred institutions of higher learning now include such offerings in their courses of study.

This proliferation reflects some basic changes in contemporary American society which have their effects, in turn, on colleges. As the United States has been forced to abandon its former isolationism and take a primary place in world affairs, it has been constrained also to abandon Anglo-Saxon Protestant cultural parochialism for a more cosmopolitan attitude.

In this connection, Dr. Silver quoted a memorandum by a professor at a medium-sized university in Pennsylvania, urging upon his administration the inclusion of Jewish studies in the curriculum. The professor said in part, "For too long indepth Jewish studies have been conducted in a relatively few large university centers.

...operative was the so-called 'imperialism by hyphenation' which spoke only of the 'Judaeo Christian tradition,' relegating Judaism to the status of an adjective, rather than viewing it on its own terms."

Another factor is the changing character of the study of religion in colleges. Often consisting of denominational indoctrination in earlier American higher education, today it has been changed in many centers of learning to an academic discipline. A respected scholarly association such as the American Council of Learned Societies has indicated an interest in promoting this approach at universities which find it appropriate. In any such scientific study of religion, learning about Judaism assumes an important role.

It is also important that in the 1963 United States Supreme Court decision outlawing Bible Reading and the Lord's Prayer in public schools, Justic Clark pointed out that nothing in the decision would bar the study of the Bible or of religion "when presented objectively as part of a secular program of education". This has opened the possibility of training instructors for public schools in this subject at teachers' training colleges. The State of Pennsylvania, for one, has already completed as official syllabus for high schools in the area.

a good number of Protestant-sponsored institutions, to take a strong interest in the teaching of Judaism in recent years.

However, Jewish studies are in a special case in this regard because they also cover the modern State of Israel and its Hebrew language. Language and Area Centers sponsored by the Federal Government under Title VI of the National Defense Education Act include a number of Middle East Centers where Hebrew language and literature is taught.

Dr. Silver noted that there have been previous surveys, all pointing to the expansion of the field. However, the study planned by the National Foundation will not only cover more accredited colleges and universities than have ever before been included, but will also attempt to project manpower needs, analyze present training facilities, and make recommendations for future developments.

"We are confident," he said, "that we will have the cooperation of other Jewish organizations working in this area. This matter is a concern and interest of the entire Jewish community. In fact, we hope that one of the results of the Study will be to effect greater coordination of Jewish organizations on this enterprise."

The major contribution toward the \$60,000 budgeted for the survey has been a \$25,000 gift from the Charles E. Merrill Trust.

The National Foundation for Jewish Culture was founded eight years ago, by decision of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. Since that time it has cooperated with a number of colleges in setting up programs of Jewish studies, as well as subsidizing fellowships for advanced students in the field paying for the publication of books and arranging public lecture series in communities throughout the country. Its headquarters are at 315 Park Aven South in New York City and its Executive Director is Dr. Harry I. Barron.
