Dear Dan:

Enclosed please find a draft of a proposed letter to Salo Baron and two types of letters to those you are going to invite to serve on the Academic Advisory Council. It goes without saying that I hope you feel free to alter them in any way you deem desirable. After all, they are letters from you and I am not yet familiar with your "style".

If you should decide to send them out directly, please let us have copies for our files. If you would like us to do them, it would be well for you to let us know which ones you would like to address by their first names.

I am afraid that we have not thought through the implications of having an Honorary Chairman. If it is really only honorary then he has no ongoing responsibilities. I do not know how Baron would look upon this since he has not yet put himself on the shelf, so to speak. On the other hand, there might be certain problems about his being the Chairman since he is inclined to be somewhat on the autocratic side and does not take suggestions too readily. If it is to be only a gesture, then we must select an active chairman, and the letter to Baron might have to be couched in such a way to indicate that we do not expect any major responsibility from him.

As to the invitees, I have several reactions:

- 1. Robert Gordis is not a full-time academician. As you know, he is the Rabbi of a very large and active congregation in Rockaway Park. He is the only part-time academician among the nominees.
- 2. Ben Halpern is on a sabbatical and will be in Israel until June, 1969. So, obviously we must find a replacement for him. Without him there is no one from Brandeis.
- 3. Your list contains no one who is teaching at the Jewish Theological Seminary.
- 4. Geographically your list has no one West of Cincinnati nor South of Nashville.
- 5. The group primarily interested in Hebrew and language may feel that there is no one from their ranks. They are not likely to look upon Rabinowitz of Cornell as one of their own. It may be necessary, therefore, to come up with someone more closely identified with Hebrew language and literature.

Rabbi Daniel Jeremy Silver -2-October 10, 1967 6. I would be quite happy to have two sociologists like Sklare and Goldstein but I would imagine that the classicists are likely to look askance at this kind of distribution (and it would be even more accentuated if Ben Halpern were in the picture). I know these are annoying details but I do think we ought to clear them up and satisfy ourselves before the people are actually invited. Perhaps, too, you may want to fix some kind of date for the first session and indicate that in the letter. Or we can wait for a while and write them again after we have set up the agenda for the first meeting. I am sending along some copies of correspondence that you might find of interest. If you have any suggestions before I reply to them, do let me know. Pursuant to your statement of expense, I am enclosing a check in the amount of \$105. Our checks require two signatures and ordinarily we send the checks on to Buffalo for Irving Levick to sign. In this instance I would suggest that you sign the check. I assume that it is okay for me to make some other appointments, if possible, for the two of us in Boston for Monday afternoon. I have written to Philip Lown and Eisig Silberschlag, Dean of the Hebrew Teachers College, suggesting appointments Monday afternoon after 3 p.m. So, please keep the afternoon free. All the best. Executive Director Encl.

Dear Dan:

Following our telephone conversation, we received several additional responses from invitees to the Academic Advisory Council. As you will see, there is only one outright declination, from Glatzer. Do you still want to have someone from Brandeis? With these, only the following have not been heard from: Arthur Hyman (whose letter had to be re-addressed and so has just received it), Marshall Sklare and H. A. Wolfson.

I am attaching a list of Board members who would be in a position to make a decent contribution to the Grants Program, and have indicated their latest gift.

We still have \$32,626 of obligations on our fellowship grants. We also have a \$12,500 bank loan incurred before I came to the Foundation to help meet grant commitments. I don't see how we can make any firm plans for next year's grants until we have disposed of our current obligations.

Everything seems to point to Graubard's being Jewish, but I am checking it out further with Sidney Goldstein who is Chairman of the Sociology Department at Brown and is, as you know, coming on our Academic Advisory Council.

That's it for now. More to come. All the best.

It was a positive and helpful document and calls upon the communities to provide the level of support requested by us.


I am enclosing a copy of a letter from San Antonio which is self-explanatory. I will hold off replying until I hear from you as to your wishes in the matter.

Incidentally, we have been receiving quite a number of requests for additional copies of our brochure so that we are going ahead with the reprinting. The cost is not an inconsiderable one, and it has been suggested that where quantity orders are involved, we ought to make a charge. On the other hand, this is essentially an institutional interpretation piece, and there might be some question as to the appropriateness of charging for it. Do you have any opinion on this?

I assume you will be interested in the Birmingham allocation and am enclosing Harold Katz's note. That is quite a hefty increase -- from \$25 to \$200. I have acknowledged it, but you may want to do something on your own with your Birmingham contacts.

You will recall that you didn't have your calendar with you when you were here on Monday and that you would check out your available dates in April for our Board meeting. I have been reviewing the matter of the grants recommendations in my mind, and I feel rather strongly that we should allow for a little more time following the March 1st deadline before having the meeting of the Academic Advisory Council. I would much prefer to see March 25th as the date for that meeting rather than March 1lth. Similarly, I would prefer to see our Board meeting postponed until a later date -- preferably Monday, May 6th. Hopefully, we would be in a better position to assess what our fund raising potential will be for the Grants Program. Please let me have your views.

I have tried to reach Nat Rosenberg in Denver and Charlie Zibbell in Los Angeles, but they are attending the UJA Western States Leadership

- B. CONSIDERATION OF GRANTS APPLICATION FOR 1968-1969 Introductory Comments:
 - Deadline for filing applications was March 1st. In some instances, there has been insufficient time to obtain needed clarifying information, supporting data and references.
 - Kits contain summaries divided into three main categories:

 Pre-Doctorals (new) in Yellow left pocket;

 Pre-Doctorals (renewals) on blue sheets in right pocket;

 Post-Doctoral and "Independents" on green sheets -right.

 Detailed folders are here if we need to refer to them.

Role of the Academic Advisory Council in this Process:

To make an appraisal of the particular application in terms of of the merits of the project, the competence of the applicant to carry it out;

Not necessarily to pass on financial request except where it appears to be out of line.

Explain that the rest of the process -- Committee on Grants and the Board of Directors -- must be guided by further considerations of available funds as well as additional obligations and requests: organizational applications (e.g. Yiddish Dictionary Committee); and commitments from previous years (e.g. Szajkowski's two-year grant for his studies of American Jawish Overseas Work).

Preliminary screening has eliminated those applicants who are not citizens of the U.S. or Canada, and those who have not had at least one year of graduate study. Also, preference is to be given to <u>Jewish</u> scholars, and to those who are likely to make a contribution to Jewish culture in America. (There are some applications from individuals who indicate they plan to live and teach in Israel.) *Might discuss problem of Israelis.

Names of applicants have not been disguised. While it is hoped members of the A A C will share their opinions and experience with applicants who are their own students or their immediate colleagues, they should excuse themselves from "voting" on them.

"It goes without saying" that these sessions are "executive" and confidential.


