

hopes for his musical achievement, I have tuned him out. Though God did
not give us ear lids we can and do turn off the world when it serves our

way

purpose. In a strange, my son's piano explains my presence here. Campaigns
and fund-raising luncheons have become rather routine and predictable elements
in our lives. We expect to be asked, we expect to give and far too often

we tunk out the purpose and the reason for our achievem. We are preoccupied

by the paraphernalia of campaign rather than by the precise cause, the

philosophy of life which summons us to a luncheon such as this. The page of the philosophy of life which summons us to a luncheon such as this.

magazine estimated that we Jews give more than 625 million dollars each year for edicational, welfare and relief causes. Three and one-half per cent of the American people give 15% of our nation's total contributions. I doubt that there has been a similar level of generosity. But in the process we have become a little careless and indiscriminate. Often the extent of our gift depends on who asked us and how often we asked them, rather than on the urgency and scope of the cause. Too often the gift makes no impact on our spiritual lives. It has become perfunctory if not asked by our house and too.

Why am I here? Hopefully, so that you will unstop your ears and allow yourself to hear a simple statement. One-half million lives depend in large measure on the success of the United Jewish Appeal. The United Jewish Appeal is the foundation stone on which the physical renewal and personal rehabilitation of the Jewish people rests. This is the cause which supports the

dispossessed, sustains the undernourished, counsels the confused, provides transportation and seed money for the settler, makes it possible for him to have hope indannew land.

I am a Rabbi and not a professional fund raiser. I have probably out in as many similar meetings as this as anyone here. Permit me, therefore, to turn aside from the familiar path taken in such appeals, to concentrate rather on the questions and the feelings which we share when the time comes each year for this "What, another massive multi-million dollar campaign? More talk of and emergency quotas. We had an urgent drive last year and the year before. Not again!" Yes, again, and/pro bably will have a similar drive next year and your children's children also a drive 40 years from now. We live in a turbulent age and the business of survival is a costly and difficult undertaking which can never be run at a profit. Perhaps, some day, every man will live under his vine and tinder his fig tree and none will make nin afraid. But not in our day and not while the cold war burns not Not while violent passions surge through our world. / In the late 1940's we thought that the need could be rather clearly described. We would settle those who had would survive the war and Nazi holocaust and who were still suffering in those bleak camps for displaced persons. Herculean effort supported by the most generous giving cleared the camps and gave five million people a new start in life. But our job was not over. We suddenly became aware of the hundreds of thousands of Jews who live in Yemen, Syria, Iraq and Egypt. The Arab governments began a program of systematic in medieval squalor. Through harassment against these unfortunate. Again, the personal sacrifice and dedicated energy is brought them out of the Mellahs to freedom and opportunity in Israel. One million human beings received a new lease on life but our job was not over. There was revolution in Algeria, there was political terror in Tunis, there was a hardless quality to life behind the Iron Curtain. of relief went on at a high rate in Israel and in France. Hundreds passed daily

through Vienna in search of a little peace and security. Need arose in unexpected places. Five-thousand Jews had to flee the Corgo, twelve thousand Guba. Nor is it difficult to see where need continues and may arise. Two and one-half million Jews remain in Russia where many suffer economic and religious indignity. Time is running out for the 300,000 Jews of the Union of South Africa even as time is running out for the misbegotten white minority of that unfortunate land. Yes, there will be other United Jewish Appeal campaigns, other 73 million dollar quotas, other years in which 50,000 refugees are on the highways of this world. I think quite often of the anonymous citizen of our Bible who cries out to the guard of the city walls "Watchman, what of the night?" The guard's cautious, realistic reply, "The morning cometh, but also the night."

It is not that we have not done enough, it is rather that bitter passion still roils the politics of our world. There will be many another campaign such as this. Let us not be blind to what has been accomplished. Those of you who have visited Israel have seen the dramatic, almost unbelievable of A NATION OF EASTWILLY a vigorous and creative democracy out of a barren and sandy place which, but a halfe century ago was the home of a few Bedouin and the jackels. Many of you have been to France and you have probably not seen the community of North African refugees who are being given dignity and opportunity and whose young are being educated in the intricate responsibilities of our technological age. The work of Jewish survival goes on as it has always gone on You know there is really no mystery to the survival of the Jewish people. Our survival rests on the age-old sense of being one people (Hebrew is a set ser for) The strong and successful in the family have always willingly lent their strength to those whose lives have been darkened. We are spending today, many millions to succor the Jeweries of North Africa and to welcome them into lands of larger political freedom. Seven-hundred years ago their great, great grandfathers, then the leaders of a secure and proud community,

spent equivalent sums to save the Jews of Spain, whose safety and lives were threatened by the actions of fanatic Barber tribes-people. Shall we not say then, in the very real sense these refugees are not receiving charity but simply the return of a long-term loan extended generations ago by our forefathers But, let's turn back for the moment, to Dallas, January, 1966 and to ourselves. We grumble a bit. How often can we be asked to give and even as we grumble the answer comes loud and clear "Would you really rather have to receive?" /// MAKE AM What I should like to suggest this noon is that if we are serupulously howest Account of we would have To admit The?
homest we benefit tremendously by the giving. The generosity of the American Jew has been one of the major factors which has kept us human. Money is a blessing but also a subtle poison. Money is power and power corrupts. Those who have the good things of life and can purchase respect often end up by feeling that they are somewhat better and apart from the rest of the human race. One of Sholam Alechem's delightful characters put it this way.

"If you have money, you are wise and handsome and can sing." Now, those who sing their own praises find many reasons to speak degradingly of the less successful.

Put silver in back of a piece of glass and you can no longer see the beauties of nature and the throngs milling the street but only your own anxious and drawn countenance. When we turn away from the responsibilities of citizenship, when we lose our sense of partnership in the human enterprise, we end up being imprisoned in our own narrow and anxious prison - world. Let me make this point by re-telling for you a poignant family history first set down by the brilliant Yiddish writer I. L. Paretz. He makes his point without action, simply by telling as the contents of four wills in four generations of one family. When Reb Eliezer died they found under his pillow the following will: "It is my wish that my children remain associates in my timber trade. After my death they are to make a new enclosure around my cemetery and repair the roof of the synagogue. My wife, may she live, shall occupy the house by herself but the synagogue. My wife, may she live, shall occupy the house by herself but

take in a poor orphan girl to live with her so as not to be lonely. She and the children are to have equal shares in my estate." When his son Benjamin died he left a longer will: "With regard to my wealth, I leave no will, for I am convinced that the members of my family will either live in peace and in unity among themselves or will divide my wealth.among themselves justly. It is my wish that my wife and my children should distribute alms annually, one-tenth of their profit. Should it happen that the business does not show a profit they should give charity all the same. By no means should they help a poor relative from the amounts destined for charity. A man should not derive personal benefit from charity and when he gives away money to poor relatives it is just as if he had given it to himself. I beg that my sons be not given too much to vanities or be too anxious to grow rich, for the bigger the merchant the smaller the Jew in him. "When Maurice the grandson died, he died in Paris and not in Peland and he left a cameral will giving 5% to charity and the rest mounier SR. to his only and beloved son. //When Maurice died his will was of another nature. "I, Maurice Ben Ditzon, Jr. am leaving this world neither in joy nor in grief but account of its emptiness. I can no longer live because I no longer have anything to do here. "There is no day without its night. There is no night without its day." Light and darkness - promise and danger are inseparable. So it is written in that mystical treasury we call the Zohar. I would take the intermingling of frustration and achievement, of danger and of promise, as the treasure of our discussion of the American Jewish Community.

We live under changing skies. Struggle and determination will be required of us as they have been required of every generation of Jews in our long ascent torough history.

Let us begin with the sunshine. These are prosperous and relatively painless years for our Communities. There are few poor among us. The vast majority of American Jews belong to the middle class and their aspirations soar even higher. Professional and academic skills are in short supply and an exceptional number of our men and women have Acres of Company of the holder of Locasian to Torah (to learning) are qualified. Strange is it not that centuries devotably to Torah (to learning) have such an extraordinary dividend?

There is, of course, discrimination. The unwritten rule 'no Jew need apply'
still exists in the upper echelons of industry. This is especially true in the
executive suites of the major banks, in the larger utilities, in the giant steel
and automobile corporations. In the average Jew found these restrictions more

The Jewish community at at home and the American Jew returned to his nation a full measure of gratitude. A survey by Fortune magazine revealed that individual Jews contributed some 625 million dollars annually to educational, cultural and welfare causes. This sum represents 15% of the total sum of monies given - given, be it noted, by a group which represents 3 or 3-1/2% of the population. This survey disproved and for all the occasionally heard peeve of our nervous Nellies: "Sive - but only to our own causes." Roughly 1/2 of this 625 million was given to the United Appeal, Medical Research, colleges and universities and that promotes the general welfare.

Most Jews, I believe, looked on the Vatican Council as a happy symbol of Review of an era of good feeling. A careful best the Council matterit clear that the Roman Catholic Church has not disbanded its missions, nor denied its historical claims as the only proper repository of truth. Pope Paul obviously lacks the largeness of spirit of Pope John. But in Cleveland and in Chicago, in St. Louis and Boston,

and I am sure also here in the state, individual priests and church men met and the state of community concern. If dogma remained largely medieval most Jews hand the experience of working together would inaugurate a new era in Catholic-Jewish relationships. Would it? Were we living in a fool's paradise? The answer Rests with the answer emotional set and historical perspective. There are some when the two days bracket every night and others when two nights bracket every day.

Our and communities are continuing their now familiar work of local welfare of and overseas rescue and relief. The ever-increasing efficiency of our federations tended to make many overlook the scope of this service and the number served. Each year the statistics on campaign brochures comes as something of a shock of These past years Federations have emphasized two areas of planning - the raising of capital reserves and the cultivation of new leadership. Both of these concerns reflect the atmosphere of success which permeates our communal establishment. We are looking ahead and we are looking ahead with a great deal of confidence. In many communities there allecations depended of annual allections there are now reserve funds which will tide the agencies over most short-term business recessions and permit the language of the same of th

The emphasis on smoothing the road ahead has lead to an emphasis on leadership training. Little groups of the carefully selected are being cultivated assiduously. As a result their individual pledges have increased but may I speak a word of caution. The emphasis on youth, especially on the gilded youth, is potentially self-defeating. Too often young men who have no other recommendation than a sizeable inheritance are precipitated into responsibilities for which they have not qualified themselves. Lionized by a community which pants for their pledge they have begin to patronize the federation which courts them. The emphasis on the gilded youth has also tended to alienate the gifted youth. We need men of substance and we need men of substance and we need men of substantial learning. We cannot afford to alienate our best minds by a leadership selection which measures only a man's stock portfolio.

ALLO

The emphasis on finance brushes our federations with a sticky varnish of political timidity. Everything is going so well no one wants to rock the boat. the NGGO to bodies Y SOFT PEDGLED on the national level has been softened supportive services to our own middle class people. Our health and counseling agencies render specific services to the indigent, but our name and our presence is too often missing from these programs of political and social action by which the poor and outcast of the land demand their rightful place in our society. Protestants have their inner city parishes. CAtholics have Vista and PEACE. have as exceptionally large number of Jews active in the NAACP, CORE, HEAD START and the rest, but the central institution of our community, the Federation, is present common only by indirection. We prefer to have the Congress or committee or the Congregations sponsor controversial marches and meetings - in so doing we allow ourselves to be ticked off as a smug and self-satisfied suburban group with SEEK TO ESCAPE THE STICKY RATIONS WHILE THE only a mirrority interest in change. I believe the change to be unfortum te -I wish I could say untrue - and I believe our people by and large demand far tetter of us. Parenthetically, I might add that in Cleveland we have established a Fublic Welfare Committee within the Federation - I have the honor to chair this committee, and we have brought anto our staff a full-time executive who will be responsible for enlisting our corporate strength in the War an Poverty.

Permit me to revert for still another moment to the programs of leadership training because I believe these tend to have far too narrow a focus. The average program includes visists to local institutions and a careful analysis of local and national agency structure and perhaps an Israel study mission. All the ingredients are there but the soup has no flavor. The tem the instinctive and humane sympathy which is the Jewish way of looking at things is missing. Permit me an example. An increasing number of these carefully cultivated young people are becoming finicky about the way in which monies are raised. If their grumbling means that George Jessel and/or a fashion show has no place on a fund-raising

We must find a way of training men and women not only to staff our social work agencies but to make their judgments by the twin standards of professional competence and Jewish tam. It is not enough to train men and women to be members of hospital Boards if the training does not emphasize a difference between a Jewish and a county hospital. I am speaking now not of the elemental requirements of having kosher facilities in the kitchen and a place for a ritual brith in the nursery. These I take for granted. County hospitals make such provisions. Rather I am thinking of Board attitudes toward the pay scales of orderlies or the unionization of hospital employees and its concern as to the quality of medical service offered clinic patients.

I here long been convinced that we are guilty of over-developing loyalties to the Recent or the Cleveland Jewish Federation and of soft-pedaling the truth that the Jewish community is spiritually world-wide and indissoluble and that the need of a psychologically disturbed and handicapped Morrocan Jew or Maabaaranik has as urgent a claim upon us as our desire to have an indoor swimming pool at our center or to place another marriage counselor on our Family Service staff. Today men are appointed to a local board. They become immersed in its on-going program. A staff request for a research study on adolescent behavior or for the purchase of new equipment for the golden age center which becomes the urgent focus of community interest. The Budget Committeess of Federations are badgered with such requests and they are finding it difficult to allocate sufficient funds for overseas relief and rehabilitation. Today our annual campaigns raise fairly states sums.

Every addition to the local budget represents a subtraction from the international life-saving and life-giving enterprise. I recently visited one community which had cut

substantially its JDC and UTA allocation in order to underwrite the Sunday School education of each child in the community.

Our communal enterprise is humming along, but 'there is no day without its night. ' The re are storm clouds heavy in the communal sky. The American Jewish Community seems to be floundering, emotionally uncertain of itself, its reason for being or its future. We hear these questions raised most pointedly as the communities digest the statistics of inter-marriage. Apparently from 12 to 20% Jour and minges involved unions with brides or grooms of other of marriages of Jawa faiths. The less sanguine shake their heads sadly and say kaddish forgetting that we gain just as many converts as we lose by defection. The more perceptive realize that the problem is not one of numbers - it cuts much more deeply. third generation young adult is asking a simple and basis question. What concrete and positive difference will it make for me if I remain a Jew?' "Prove to me that it is important for me to remain Jewish." Unfortunately, all too often the experience of his parents is no help. He demands something more than membership in a Jewish Country Club, the annual signing of a United Jewish Appeal card and high holy day attendance in the synagogue. He cannot see what was unique or urgentabout a Jewish hospital or a Jewish old folks home.

The Tewish press is full of Jeremiads on the sterility of Jewish life philantrophy without philosophy - the edifice complex - the gilded ghetto. This
is not, of course, the whole story. Slowly but perceptably the congregations and,
to a lesser degree, the community have moved from building to program - from pledges
to piety - from membership to mitzvah and it is none too soon (if it is not already

been on the bellow - button dight to see the problem in some historical recognitive.
Forty years ago only one Jewish family in ten had any synagogue affiliation, less
than two out of ten youngsters received a single hour of religious instruction and


only one in a hundred spent any time in class beyond the age of thirteen. Center programs were secular - and congregation programs often more of the same. Assim lation was a popular goal. Zionism was a queer and suspect atavism. We had to depend for our intellectual and rabbinic leadership on men who had been trained abroad. Today we can look back on a generation in which American Jews have published more on substantive Jewish themes than the entire literary product of the Spanish golden Six families in ten are affiliated with the synagogue and over 90% of our children receive some religious instruction. The recent at study at Wilkes-Barre revealed an encouraging level of interest among our adolescents. I have in my own congregation some 200 high school-age youngsters who are enrolled in a strong academic This is only a been an wire program. But if we believe in the continuity of our Jewish communities much greater effort will have to be made in the areas of learning and understanding. We have been remarkably unenlightened in exploring meaningful ecoperation between congregations and communities. Federation programs rarely deal with the challenging religious problems of the day. Congregational programs and curriculums rarely deal of community structure and philosophy. We spend money on squash courts and billiard rooms for our centers but nd on libraries in the same buildings. We need to take a new hard look at the Hillel structure, There is evidence of a burdgeoning interest SOME COMMUNITIES have osTABLISKED Chains OF SEWISH STUDIES in local universities. Far more ought to. The Jewish student wants ideas and unn challenge rather than cookies and a second-rate fraternity. Community leaders require Torah as well as welfare expertise. Why not institutes in which the executive Board of the Federation is informed by scholars and rabbis as well as by agency heads and federation executives? In an age where Federal funds increasingly finance hearth SOCK and health services perhaps it is time to turn these institutions over to the community and spend our monies and efforts on colleges of Jewish study and teacher-training Ignorance threatens the life and wholeness of every Jewish community. institutes.

There are those who believe that because the Jewish Federation is strong that it will always be so and this is not necessarily so. There are those who believe that


But, as we should have learned in the Kashmir arms sent for cold war purposes quickly become involved in the petty hot wars of small nations. Recently when the king of Jordan ceremonially received a shipment of heavy. American tanks he publicly announced "we are now prepared to set th time and place for the final attack on Israel." More recently the Russians have, for the first time, publicly underwritten the Arab program of revenge.

The day darkens. The responsibilities of the Jewish community multiply. We have mobilized an inordinant amount of concern over Soviet anti-semitism. I have never been an unqualified supporter of these protests. There are two-and one-half million Jews in Russia who cannot leave our mass meetings and marches and return to secure and well-protected homes. The Russian bear has a notoriously evil temper and if he is goaded too far he may take a brutal swipe with his paw at those Jews who live behind the Iron Curtain. But, today I have another fear in this area. Russia seems to be relaxing some of the more minor restraints on Jewish life (the baking of matzoh) at the same time increasing the shrillness of her attacks on Israel and on Zionism. She is cunningly playing on the innocence of not a few within our communities. She hopes a few prayer books will silence our public outrage at her mischievous and callous encouragement of Arab bloodlust. Russian is playing a deliberately provacative game in the Middle East and I am afraid the United States is playing an unwittingly provacative game. The United States has favored Israel with financial support and political encouragement - and well we might. Israel is our one stable friend in that part of the world. The Israeli radio is the one broadcast which does not spew anti-American venom. Israel's technical and economic aid to the Sub Sahara African nations is the one element of stablity which is effective in that area. But our government has shied off from a final commitment to the Israeli security - a guarantee of her and our borders American Jewish Community has shied away from publically calling for such a pledge. Yet, we will have spend our billions in vain if war destroys all that we have helped to build.


I am of the opinion that the era of calm and routine is over for our Jewish community. It is no longer enough to do well, but we have always done well. The shadovs are darkening. The interest of your children's generation in Jewish affairs may not be taken for granted. Our educational enterprise requires a complete overhaul. We can no longer be satisfied simply to sustain and improve the quality of our welfare services. We need to study the rationale of all of our institutions - to drop those whose tasks are now public policy and to multiply those which we alone can create. We can no longer be non-political if to be political is to be enrolled in the cause of racial and economic justice. We can no longer be non-political if to be political is to voice publicly our concern with international safeguards with the State of Israel. I am confident that Israel will survive and that Judaism will survive. But we cannot depend upon the goodness of God alone. Vision and ingenuity is demanded of us. A new set of priorities and a revised blueprint for our communities. Let me close with a parable from the book of Jeremiah. It is night in a small-walled Palestinian One who is abroad late calls out to the guard on the wall: "Watchman, city. what of the night?" and the watchman answers: "Morning cometh, but also the night."

I am writing to you in reference to the wisit you will be making on our behalf to El Paso on Monday, November 14th. Since the situation is a rather difficult one, I wanted to write you ahead of time so that you might be able to consider some of these points when you prepare your presentation for the meeting.

Ostensibly, your visit to El Paso will be highlighted by two functions. One is the groundbreaking ceremonies for the new Jewish Community Center at 4:00 p.m., to be followed by a community-wide dinner celebrating that occasion later in the evening. Originally, the community had planned to use this occasion for their annual meeting, but then decided to change it and put all emphasis on the groundbreaking and festive ceremonies in connection with the Jewish Community Center to be built. You may ask yourself what the United Jewish Appeal has to do with the groundbreaking for a Center. Very much, indeed, since we have already been informed that because of the new Center, the UJA proportion might have to be cut considerably -- that is, unless additional funds are raised. The fact is that over the last years the total amount raised in El Paso has gradually decreased. With the new Center making additional demands for funds from the Welfare Fund, this can have a very serious effect on the amounts received by UJA. The Center, therefore, has a very direct relationship to the UJA. It would, therefore, be most helpful if you would keep thees things in mind for your presentation.

Community leadership is quite concerned about meeting its obligations both to the Center and to the UJA, and hopes that your presentation to the entire community leadership will make them realize that greatly increased funds have to be raised to meet all the needs of the community. "There is no day without its night. There is no night without its day." Light and darkness - promise and danger are inseparable. So it is written in that mystical treasury we call the Zohar. So it has always been in Jewish history.

American Jews belong to the middle class and their aspirations soar even higher.

Professional and academic skills are in short supply and an exceptional number hous live Themselves acceptant of our men and women are qualified and activally coming the ladder of success.

Strange is it not that centuries of devotion to Torah (to learning) has paid in our day such an extraordinary dividend?

There is, of course, discrimination. The unwritten rule 'no Jew need apply' still flourishes in the upper echelons of industry. This is especially true in the executive suites of the major banks, in the larger utilities, in the giant steel and automobile corporations. It he average Jew finds these restrictions more irritating than shackling. There are many roads to a good living. There are few door on which we dare not knock. A Jew is Ambassador to the United Nations.

Another is among the closest advisors of the President. A third has been named an associated Justice of the Supreme Court - more Jews were elected to Congress Tuesday last than to any other in our history. Our children are perhaps the first generation in all of our history who shake their heads in bemusement when an

elder speaks the bitter but loving plaint 'schwerz zu seinem Yid. '

The Jewish community feels at home and the American Jew returns to his nation a full measure of gratitude. A survey by Fortune magazine revealed that individual Jews contributed some 625 million dollars annually to educational, cultural and welfare causes. This sum represents 15% of the total sum of monies given - given, be it noted, by a group which represents 3 or 3 1/2% of the population. This survey disproves the occasionally heard peeve of our more nervous with the given - but only to our own causes." Roughly 1/2 of this 625 million was given to the United Appeal, Medical Research, colleges and universities and to all that promotes the general welfare.

'There is no day without its night.' The sunlight always casts a shadow. Anti-semitism is not dead. Its ugly voice could be heard in a New Rochelle Civil Rights meeting where Jewish shopkeepers and apartment owners were flayed by angry and intemperate organizers. It could be heard in the hush quiet of select clubs as the privileged complained against the parvenue who were challenging them for control of the city. It could be heard in a Chicago park where white ethnic crowds have swastika speakers it was a crowding upon the could be heard in the ugly venom of those who bestride the South in the inquisitional white of the Klan. Each of us heard unexpected words spoken unexpectedly from unexpected lips. No one could be sure what would happen if the economy went into a tailspir.

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Most Jews, I believe, looked on the Vaticar Council as the happy symbol of

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that the Roman Catholic Church has not disbanded its missions, nor denied its historical claims as the only proper repository of truth. Pope Paul obviously lacks the largeness of spirit of Pope John. But in Cleveland and in Chicago, in St. Louis and Boston, and I am sure also here in El Paso, individual priests and church men met with us on many levels of community concern. If dogma remained largely medieval most Jews were confident the experience of working together would inaugurate a new era in Catholic-Jewish relationships. Would it? Were we living in a fool's paradise? Our answer rests with our emotional set and historical perspective.

Our communities are continuing their now familiar work of the health and welfare and of overseas rescue and relief. The ever-increasing efficiency of our services tends to make many overlook the scope of this service and the number served. Each year the statitistics on campaign brochures comes as something of a shock. These past years Federations have emphasized two areas of planning the raising of capital reserves and the cultivation of new leadership. Both of these concerns reflect the atmosphere of success which permeates our communal establishment. We are looking ahead and we are looking ahead with great deal confidence. In many communities there are now reserve funds which can tide the agencies over most short-term business recessions and at the same time permit the agencies to experiment with new dimensions of service.

The emphasis on smoothing the road ahead has lead to an emphasis on leadership training. Little groups of the carefully selected are being cultivated assiduously.

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Little groups of the carefully selected are being cultivated assiduously.

The emphasis on youth, especially on the gilded youth, is potentially self-defeating.

Too often young men who have no other recommendation than a sizeable inheritance are precipitated into responsibilities for which they have no qualified themselves.

Lionized by a community which pants for their pledge they they begin to patronize the federation which courts them. The emphasis on the gilded youth has also tended to alienate the gifted youth who tick us off as gross and materialist. We need men of substance and we need men of substantial learning. We cannot afford to alienate our best minds by a leadership selection which measure only a man's stock portfolio.

The emphasis on finance also brushes our federations with sticky varnish of political timidity. Everything is going so well, no one wants to rock the boat. We concentrate a raising money for supportive services to our own middle class people.

Our health and counseling agencies render specific services to the indigent, but our name and our presence is too often missing from these programs of political and social action by which the poor and outcast of the land demand their rightful place in our society. Protestants have their Inner City parishes. Catholics have Vista and PEACE. We have An exceptionally large number of Jews active in the NAACP, Gran,

HEAD START, and the rest, but the central institutions of our community, the PerbaraARF
tion, is present only by indirection. We prefer to have the Congress or Committee
or the Congregation's sponsor controverstal margin. I meetings - unfortunately in
so doing we allow ourselves to be ticked off as a smug and self-eatisifed suburban
group who seek to escape the sticky responsibilities. I believe the change to be unfortunate - I wish I could say untrue and I believe our people by and large demand
far better of us. Parenthetically, I might add that in Cleveland we have established
a Public Welfare Committee within the Federation - I have the honor to chair this
committee, and we have brought onto our staff a full-time executive who will be
responsible for enlisting our corporate strength in the War on Poverty.

Permit me to revert for still another moment to the programs of leadership training because I believe these tend to have far too narrow a focus. The average program includes visits to local institutions and a careful analysis of local and

national agency structure and perhaps an Israel study mission. All the ingredients are there but the soup has no flavor. The tam, the instinctive and humane sympathy, which is the Jewish way of looking at things, is missing. Permit me an example. An increasing number of these carefully cultivated young people are becoming finicky about the way in which monies are raised. If their grumbling means that George Jessel and/or a fashion show has no place on a fund-raising program, I could not agree with them more, but if they mean that the community has no right to solicit them energetically and to expect a meaningful response I could not agree with them less. The Protestant Church may pass the charity plate. Synagogues are financed by membership dues or, if they are old-fashioned, by a public " "let everyone hear," the process of selling alyiahs.

Overly discreet campaigning is not only ineffective but un-Jewish.

I would add that we are guilty of over-developing loyalties to the El Paso or the Cleveland Jewish Federation and of soft-pedaling the truth that the Jewish community is spiritually world-wide and indissoluble and that the need of a psychologically distrubed and handicapped Morrocan Jew or Mazbaaranik has as urgent a claim upon us as our desire to have an indoor swimming pool at our center or to place another marriage counselor on a Family Service Staff. Today men are appointed to a local board. They become immersed in its on-going program. A staff request for a research study on adolescent behavior or for the purchase of new equipment for the golden age center which becomes the urgent focus of community interest. Budget Committees of Federations are badgered with such requests and they are finding it difficult to allocate sufficient funds for overseas relief and rehabilitation. Every addition to the local budget represents a subtraction from the international life-saving and life-giving enterprise. I recently visited one community which had cut substantially its JDC and UIA allocation in order to underwrite the

Sunday School education of each child in the community.

Our communal enterprise is humming along, but 'there is no day without its night. ' There are storm clouds heavy in the communal sky. The American Jewish Community seems to be floundering, emotionally uncertain of itself, its reason for being, or its future. We hear these questions raised most pointedly as the communities digest the statitistics on inter-marriage. Apparently from 12 to 20% of the marriages of our sons and daughters involve unions with brides or grooms of other faiths. The less sanguine shake their heads sadly and say kaddish forgetting that we gain just as many converts as we lose by defection. The more perceptive realize that the problem is not one of numbers - it cuts much more deeply. The third generation young adult is asking a simple and devastating question. 'What concrete and positive difference will it make for me if I remain a Jew?' 'Prove to me that it is important for me to remain Jewish. ' Unfortunately, all too often the exp ts is no help. He demands something more than membership in a Jewish social club, the annual signing of a United Jewish Appeal card and high holy day attendance in the synagogue. He cannot see what was unique or argent about a Jewish hospital or a Jewish old foller home.

The Jewish press is full of Jeremians on the sterility of Jewish life - philanthropy without philosophy - the edifice complex - the gilded ghetto. Judaism has been
for far too many, for far too long, a sociological label a status-giving structure
rather than a spiritual devotion. This is not, of course, the whole story. Slowly
but perceptably the congregations and, to a lesser degree, the community have moved
from building to program - from pledges to piety - from membership to mitzvah and it
is none too soon (if it is not already to later). Forty years ago only one Jewish family
in ten had any synagogue affiliation, less than two out of ten youngsters received a
single hour of religious instruction and only one in a hundred spent any time in class
beyond the age of thirteen. Center programs were secular - and congregation:

programs often more of the same.

a queer and suspect atavism. We had to depend for our intellectual and rabbinic leadership on men who had been trained abroad. Today we can look back on a generation in which American Jews have published more on substantive Jewish themes than the entire literary product of the Spanish golden age. Six families in ten are affiliated with the synagogue and over 90% of our children receive some religious instruction. LEADERShop IS LARGELY DRANDFROM BUR OWN CHILD REN recent study of Wilkes-Barre revealed an encouraging level of interest among our adolescents. I have in my own congregation some two hundred high school -age youngsters who are enrolled in a strong academic program. But if we believe in the continuity of cur Jewish communities, this is only a beginning. Much greater efforts will have to be made in the areas of learning and understanding. We have been remarkably unenlighted in exploring meaningful cooperation between congregations and communities. Federation programs rarely deal with the challenging religious problems of the day. Congregational programs and curriculums rarely deal of community structure and philosophy. We spend money on squash courts and billiard rooms for our centers but not on libraries in the same buildings. We need to take a new hard look at the Hillel structure which too often betrayathe scholarly interests There is evidence of a burdgeoning interest in local universities. Some communities have established chairs of Jewish studies at local universities. Far more ought to. The Jewish student wants ideas and challenge rather than cookies and a second-rate fraternity. Community leaders require Torah as well as welfare expertise. Why not Institutes in which executive Board of the Federation is informed by scholars and rabbis as well as by agency heads and federation executives? In an age where Federal funds increasingly finance health services perhaps it is time to turn such institutions over to the community and spend our monies and efforts on

colleges of Jewish study and teacher-training institues. Ignorance is the threat to the life and wholeness of every Jewish community.

It is not enough to tick off Jewish survival as a miracle. Jews have survived because we have been a realistic and responsible community. Lam of the spinion that the error of the man and routine is over. It is no longer enough to do well. The interest of your children's generation in hamen affairs cannot be taken for granted. Our educational enterprise requires a complete overhauling. We can no longer be satisfied to improve thing. He so lines. We need to study the rationality of our institutions, to discard those whose tasks are now public policy and to multiply those which increase our self-awareness and spiritual awareness. We can no longer be non-political, if to be non-political is to isolate oneself from the problems of race and poverty and our role in the nation. I am confident that Judaism will survive but we cannot depend upon the goodness of God along. Vision and ingenuity is demanded of us--a revised blueprint that priorities for our community.

Above all else we need to re-emphasize the interdependence of the family of Israel. The existence of the State of Israel has encouraged and given pride to this generation of American Jews. We have visited--we have marveled at the pioneering spirit--it has redeemed some of the materialism of our lives. American Judaism has responded nobly to the needs of immigration, resettlement and rehabilitation.

Our support is rquired now in another direction. Israel can survive economically only as a brain bank, and idea center, for the developing nations of our world. Israel has made a fine name for herself in Central Africa and in Latin America but there is an educational crisis in Israel to-day. 60% of the children in Israeli schools come from African and Oriental homes recommend which do not have the tradition of European literacy. Israel can finance free public education through the 8th grade. Although

her children go on to an academic high school and less than 1 in 2 of these matriculate in college. Israel is expending a surpriscingly large percentage of her budget for children college. She requires 64 new high schools, scholarship monies, and doubling of her college enrollment, and all of this yesterday.

If Israel were not threatened by her neighbors, she could generate educational monies from her own resources. Because of Arab intransigencies, ar defense budget is high and for the stall ow our help -I am often asked, 'Can Israel survive?' all the state of Israel is the third Jewish commonwealth, the first two went down in flames. ' No one can give you a certain answer. In my grayer moments I wonder whether our world will survive with bitter national rivalries and the flare of napalm. I am confident that Israel can and will defend herself -- the youth is strong and the nation sturdy. You have heard of the now almost nightly incidents and Israel's borders. I was there this summer when the Syrians planed up some farm buildings and planted mines which killed two farmers. French mistere fighter-interceptors as they flew off in a retaliation raid. Israel has been remarkably restrained in the face of extreme provocation. Israel has brought the issue of border peace to the United Nations. Israel desires peace and is prepared to negotiate directly with all of her neighbors. refused once again the Secretary General's plea for a conference on these issues.

The King of Jordan has said that Israel must be liquidated and Nasser has promised to march into Israel on a red carpet of blood. We cannot blink away the fact that

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the Near East is tense, volatile and engaging in a costly ar ne'er-do-wells, so-called Palestinian Liberation Army of Ahmed Sukaray, er is receiving Red Chinese arms, and his payroll is met by Kwait oil royalties. Nasser has received 550 Soviet war planes, 1200 tanks, 80 warships, 100 ground to air missiles and an undetermined number of Russian technicians, in all some 200 billion dollars worth of military aid. Syria which is on its way to becoming the first Soviet satellite in the Near East has received almost a billion dollars of military hardware and some 600 technicians in the past six months stort . Jordan has received American tanks and planes. Israel has bought counterbalancing weapons from the West. Syria, especially, has been truculent. # The time does not seem to be a likely one for a co-ordinated Arab attack. Nasser's best troops are committed to his conquest of the Yemen. Cairo's economy teeters on the brink of bankruptcy. Jordan and Saudi Arabia have united in a new American Allimute To counter st Nasser's ambitions. sponsored military attack Radio Cairo has called for Hussein's assassination. Syria has had three governments and five revolts in the past 18 months -- the nation is and the economy is disrupted. Most of her professional army officers are currently in exile, apparently planning another coue.

If realism governs public policy then it is unlikely that the Arab states will launch an attack against Israel now. But deparate men take desparate chances.

The Damasuus government is throwing caution to the wind trying to distract public attention from the near anarchy in Damascus. Syria is counting on the many pledges of complete support which Moscow has made these past twelve months. Moscow promised Syria complete support in any border undertaking. Moscow will determine in Laces.


Russia's long term ambition is to replace the West as the dominant economic factor in this part of the world. If Russia wants to co-exist with the West she will restrain the Syrian hot heads. If she wishes to embarrass the West and open up a second front to make our involvement in Vietnam even more difficult she can do so in the Middle East without too great cost to herself. A Syria with full Russian backing feels herself more powerful than an Israel with uncertain support. And so often in the past, the United States is inecitably involved in the problems of peace keeping. If the United States publicly commits itself to the support of Israel, Russia will inevitably weigh her decisions more carefully. At the moment, Washington is building a Saudi-Arabica, Jordan, Iranian alliance to counter-balance Russia's control of the United Arab Republic. The danger here is that we are backing royalist and feudal government and the time for reform and revolution must come. The danger here is the lesson of Kashmir that weapons sent for one purpose can be quickly mentioned to satisfy the petty missions and large hates of the smaller nations. Recently, when the King of Jordan ceremonsously received a shipment of heavy American tanks he armormeed "We are now prepared to set the time and place for the final attack on Israel. The question of peace in the Middle East is a small part of the larger question of peace in the world. In the Near East only Israel is democratic and under the rule of law. American and Israel interests coincide. The American Jewish community has a profound responsibility to explain this coincidence of interest to their neighbors so that our government can count on our nationwide support if and when it determines publicly to support the political integrity of Israel's borders.

The responsibilities of the Jewish community multiply. We have mobilized a concern over Soviet Anti-semitism. May I humbly suggest one danger implicit in this program. There are 2 1/2 million Jews in Russia who cannot

Russian Bear has a notoriously vial tempor and if he is goaded too far he may take a brutal swipe with his paw at those Jews who live behind the iron curtain. At the moment I have another fear. Russia seems to be relaxing some of the more minor restrictions on Jewish life--"the baking of matzohs" but at the same time increasing her support of Syria and her shrill attacks on Israel and on Zionism. She is playing cunningly on the innocense of not a few in our communities. She thinks that a few prayer books will silence our public outrage at her callous bloodlust. We must be clearly aware that Russia threatens the security of 2 1/4 million Jews of Israel quite as dangerously as she threatens the religious welfare of the Jews of the Soviet Union.

Again, the Jewish community cannot avoid mixing in politics. The United States has favored Israel with Alok Aws Community and well we might. Israel is our one stable friend in that part of the world. Radio Israel is the one broadcas: which does not spout anti-American venom. Israel's technical and economic aid to sub-Sahara nations is a major element of stability in that area. Our government has shied off from a final commitment to Israel's security and guarantee of her borders and the American Jewish community has shied away from calling publicly for such a pledge. There we will have spent our billions in vain if we are Not Compact to that which we have helped to build. "There is no day without its night. There is no night without its day." There is no assurance of the survival of Jewry but there is every indication that Jewry can survive wholesomely and usefully if we bester ourselves and take our responsibilities in hand.

May I close with a parable from the Book of Jeremiah: It is night in a small walled Palestinian city. One who is abroad late calls out to the guard on the wall, "Watchman, what of the night?" and the watchman answers, "Morning cometh, but also the night."

The motivation for our deeds in a complex society such as ours quickly becomes a non-Jewish and often without our knowing it a perversion of our Jewish ethic. Typically the emphasis on tsedakah becomes the United Appeal and then an attack on the welfare state though Jews have lived in the welfare state throughout most of their history. The synagogue, competently organized, remains the one place where we search for the uniquely Jewish and where these values are thrown up at us and taught. In any case, I am grateful to you.
