

THE MEDIUM IS THE NIGHTMARE — FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

It was about eleven o'clock. I had been at my desk and before turning in for the night I turned on the television. There was news of the bloody fight for Hue and the mortar attacks in Saigon and a clip from a reassuring speech by the Vice President. For this time and place it was a typical broadcast full of the contradictions which beset our vainglorious enterprise in Viet Nam. We have gotten used to battlefield reports which belie official comment and official comment which plunges us deeper and deeper into an Asian war.

Suddenly I was in Khe Sanh with a group of helmeted and flack-vested marines behind a sandbag protection. They were terribly young and except for the uniforms and the presence of death this scene could have been taking place in a quiet home and on a quiet street in our city. An eighteen-year old was strumming a guitar and the group was singing of the absurdity of war.



HERMAN D. STEIN
January, 1968

In July, 1967, Herman D. Stein, D.S.W., Dean and Professor of Social Work of the Case Western Reserve University School of Applied Social Sciences, was named Provost for the Social and Behavioral Sciences of Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. On January 2, 1968, Provost Stein was appointed by the Mayor of Cleveland as Chairman of the newly-constituted Commission on the Crisis in Welfare.

Dr. Stein came to this University from Columbia University in 1964 where he had been a professor and the Director of the Research Center of the School of Social Work. He had first joined the faculty in 1945, and his major area of concentration was centered on the application of social theory to social work practice.

From 1947 to 1950, before rejoining the Columbia University faculty, Dr. Stein served as Deputy Director of Research and Budget and Director of the Welfare Department for the American Joint Distribution Committee, European Headquarters, Paris, France. While in Paris, Dr. Stein also was a member of the faculty of the Paul Baerwald School of Social Work at Versailles, which he helped to organize.

Other academic appointments included the Smith College School for Social Work and the College of the City of New York, Department of Government and Sociology.

Dr. Stein frequently has been called as a consultant to groups concerned with planning in developing countries, and with social welfare, social research and social work education.

Since 1963, Dr. Stein has spent one sabbatical year and part of several summers abroad, where he has consulted on behalf of the United Nations Children's Fund and the United Nations Bureau of Social Affairs in Tanzania, Thailand, India, and the Ivory Coast.

Dr. Stein is President of the Council on Social Work Education and a member of the Commission on International Social Welfare of the National Association of Social Workers, as well as a member of the Experimental and Special Training Review Committee of the National Institute of Mental Health, Public Health Service, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

He has published more than fifty articles which have appeared in the major professional social work and social science journals. Dr. Stein has served as editor for Planning for the Needs of Children in Developing Countries, a publication of the United Nations Children's Fund. He was co-author with Joseph L. Blau, Nathan Glazer, Oscar and Mary F. Handlin for the Characteristics of American Jews, and co-editor with Richard A. Cloward of Social Perspectives on Behavior.

He is married to the former Charmion Kerr and is the father of three daughters, Karen, Susan, and Naomi.
